

Goleta Work Contract Has Regents' OK

Planned construction and conversion projects on the new Goleta Campus are now proceeding. Last Friday the Regents of the University approved the signing of an \$800,000 contract with the Alco Construction Co. of Los Angeles for conversion of the military-type buildings on the campus.

Sixty temporary buildings will be changed into structures suitable for college use and 17 other buildings will be either moved or salvaged as a part of the contract.

This is the first major contract for work on the 408-acre campus which is scheduled for occupation by the fall of 1952. At least 18 months will be required for the reconstruction program.

Spurs, Squires to Enforce Frosh' Ten Commandments

2. Freshmen must carry a copy of the Frosh Bible with them at all times.

3. Freshmen attendance at all student body rallies and meetings is a must. Bibles will be stamped at the five required events during Green Month.

4. A thorough knowledge of the history of UCSBC as presented in the Frosh Bible is required of all freshmen.

Gauchos Take Beaver Tilt By 47-7 Score

After being outfought and outgained in the first quarter, the Gauchos bounced back in the second period and went on to trounce the Cal Tech Beavers 47-7.

Saturday's game saw the Gauchos get off to a slow start, similar to ones which hampered them last season, but then the offense got clicking and the Beavers couldn't keep up the pace.

After the Gauchos had attained a first-period margin of 7-0, the Beavers, sparked by the passing and running of Dick Karasawa, tied up the count 7-7 early in the second period. Then the Gaucho attack got moving and a 21-7 half-time margin was rolled up.

In the second half the Gaucho reserves wore down the thinly manned Beavers as every man on Coach Engle's bench got into the game.

Corrie Stars

Leading the Gaucho offense were Dave Corrie, who proved himself to be a tricky and powerful runner; Don Steere, who is a hard man to stop on the punt returns, and game Captain Russ Bertell, who furthered his line-plunging reputation on a beautiful scoring play.

Al Southworth, who was the leading Gaucho defensive player, broke the ice midway in the first period when he intercepted a pass by Dick Karasawa on the 50 and ran the ball down the sidelines for the first score. Some excellent downfield blocking on the part of teammates made the score possible.

Clyde Francisco came through with his first of five conversions to boost the score to 7-0.

Tie Broken

After Karasawa's score, early in the second quarter, the Gauchos broke the tie when Russ Bertell burst through on an off-tackle play

Editorial

An Idea for the Greeks . . .

Sororities recently have finished their fall rushing of new pledges under the direction of the Panhellenic Council, and fraternities have just begun a period of pledging. Since Registration Week, one of the favorite campus topics of conversation has been the activities of the Greek organizations.

The methods of rushing and pledging used by the sororities and by the fraternities provide a striking contrast.

The women had a highly organized, strictly regulated program designed to give every rushee an acquaintance with each sorority. A series of formal invitations and replies was used and the preference bidding was taken care of in an efficient manner.

Fraternity rushing continues throughout the year and it is only the period of pinning that is regulated by the Interfraternity Council and the office of the Dean of Men. Pinning of pledges began yesterday and will continue for fifteen days.

Sorority rushing is a highly formal and correct business, while the fraternity rushing is carried out with marked casualness. Perhaps the fellows could borrow a few beneficial ideas from the women which would be of value to both the fraternities and to the men who are rushing.

Specifically, a more accurate rush list should be compiled during Registration Week. At the end of Registration Week all fraternities could hold open house for an afternoon during which rushees could attend each house to meet the men in it. Then the houses could rush on their own schedules until the weekend before formal pinning starts. At that time a preference rush list could be given to the office of the Dean of Men or the Interfraternity Council from which bids could be sent to the rushees and they could make their own choices.

This procedure would give each rushee a chance to become acquainted with each fraternity and would eliminate the "let's catch him first" attitude too often exhibited on the part of the fraternities. Such an attitude, while it may seem to be the very essence of rushing, sometimes leads to hurried decisions on the part of both the rushee and the fraternity and to regrets to both parties later.

Perhaps there are a few ideas here that are worthy of IFC consideration and thought before the spring pledge period.

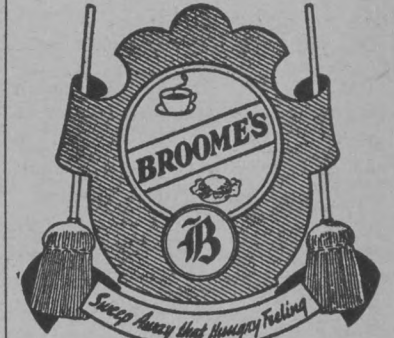
Late registration will continue until Saturday, September 30. Following that date, statistics on the total enrollment for men and women in each class may be obtained.

P.E. Professors Hodgkins, Whittaker Relate Adventures Cycling Thru Western Europe

Miss Jean Hodgkins and Miss Pat Whittaker, instructors in Women's Physical Education, recently told of their summer adventures in Europe in an interview for *El Gaucho*. They were accompanied by Miss Marya Welch, instructor in Women's Physical Education at Davis.

The traveling pros left Santa Barbara June 10 for an extensive tour of Europe by bicycle and train. They sailed from America to Europe and back again on the R.M.S. Samaria, primarily a student ship on which there were various groups of people who wanted to study the international living or the customs of the countries, or who just wanted to see Europe.

Long Drive Home

On the trip home the travelers drove 96 hours straight from Quebec to arrive back early the morning of September 14.

Altogether they covered 17,000 miles and went through 10 countries: England, Holland, Denmark, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Italy, France, Sweden and the Isle of Capri.

Although they bicycled through the countryside, they didn't bicycle a lot of the time because they wanted to cover lots of distance. They found the bicycling tours to be the most enjoyable.

Passion Play

From Munich, Germany, they bicycled to Oberammergau to see the Passion Play, which is presented only once every ten years. From there they went to Florence and Rome for the Holy Year celebration, which is given only once every twenty-five years.

After seeing Rome they spent four delightful days on the Isle of Capri by Naples. Then they traveled by boat from there to the French Riviera, "which does not compare to Santa Barbara," commented Miss Whittaker.

Saw Chateaus

Then they went to the Loyre Valley, which is noted for its chateaus, and saw many of the main chateaus there. They did a lot of bicycling in that valley, which is on the plain and the biking is very easy.

"After the valley we went to Paris and stayed on the left bank in the Latin Quarter for about ten days," said Miss Whittaker. "It was simply wonderful. We saw the galleries and ate French onion soup and saw all the historic spots, cabarets, the French ballet and the Follies Bergere." Their verdict on the Follies was: "Disappointing."

In England the travelers saw several plays, including one starring Laurence Olivier and "The Cocktail Party" of T. S. Eliot.

Knew Santa Barbara

Of the people they met, the professors found them very friendly and very interested in America. Many of them wanted to come here, all had heard of California, and a surprising number had heard of Santa Barbara. One Italian student wanted to come to Chicago to become a gangster.

CAL TECH TEAM PHILOSOPHICAL ABOUT DEFEAT

Telling how it feels to lose the season's opener to a superior squad by a score of 47-7, Cal Tech Coach Bert LaBrucherie praised his Gaucho opponents as "a deceptive and well-coached team."

The atmosphere of the Beaver dressing room after their defeat was quiet and somewhat philosophical. The fellows knew they were out-manned and out-weighted. They also knew they played a good game.

Coach LaBrucherie stated that Gaucho Coach Roy Engle "would have a good ball club before the season was over." He particularly singled out the Gauchos' speedy backs and the exceptional work of safety Don Steere and transfer Dave Gorrie at fullback.

"Gauchos Good"

Before heading for the after-game dance, members of the Cal Tech team said about the game: "The Gauchos are a good team; however, they've got more depth and have had more practice."

Beaver Quarterback Al Marshall and Halfback Dick Karasawa, who gave the Gauchos plenty of trouble, cited the fact that the Beavers began practice only two weeks before the Gaucho game and that the Beavers were heavily outmanned as reasons for the overwhelming Gaucho victory.

Praise Players

Both players praised Santa Barbara defensive line-backers Ron Ternquist and Al Southworth. They also had a healthy respect for Right Guard Warren Vinton.

Explaining the lopsided loss, LaBrucherie said that "we let the Gauchos get too many quick touchdowns in the first half, and from there on there wasn't much we could do to hold them."

Twenty-five Tracksters Preparing for Season

Cross-country got under way last Saturday when Coach Nick Carter journeyed to Westwood with the Gaucho harriers. The Westwood meet is a traditional affair, opening the Southern California cross-country season.

No official score is kept and the marathon men are just running for the sheer joy of competing.

Negotiations still are pending on the establishment of the intercollegiate cross-country schedule. As yet no definite program has been arranged.

At the present time over twenty-five track enthusiasts are working out at La Playa in preparation for the spring track season.

and twisted and turned down the field for 53 yards and the second score. Bertell was saved from making only a short gain by Rollie Brice, whose key block paved the way for the touchdown.

Punt Runback

A few minutes later the Gauchos scored their final TD in the first half on a brilliant runback of one of Hal Woody's punts by

Don Steere who took the ball on the Gaucho 23-yard line.

Woody proved himself to be a fine offensive back for Cal Tech and a very fine punter.

The second half saw the Gauchos increase their margin as the hard line play of Coach Williamson's crew wore down the defenders. The only weak spot which appeared in the line was the weakness of the defensive tackles who didn't seem to charge fast enough to bother Karasawa's passing.

Vinton Scores

Early in the third period the Gaucho line broke through the Cal Tech forward wall and blocked out of Woody's punts on the 39. The ball rolled back to the three-yard marked where it was picked up by Warren Vinton who dived over for the score. Vinton filled in very well at the guard spot and was the stumbling block in many a Cal Tech play. Frank Dominguez also showed up well at guard and very few Cal Tech runners got by him.

Dave Gorrie was the man who then took over the Gaucho offense as he scored the next two TDs. The first one came on a 16-yard smash through tackle and the second on a twisting, turning, 18-yard run through most of the Cal Tech secondary.

The final touchdown was scored by Ken Brittingham, who went over from the one-yard line to culminate a 45-yard drive by a Gaucho reserve squad which played most of the final period.

Promising Future

In all, the Gauchos looked very promising and in the opinion of Cal Tech Coach Bert LaBrucherie the Gauchos could go a long way this season. Coach Engle also was pleased with his team's performance, though he stressed the fact that there still is a great deal to be done to round the squad into shape.

This task will be made a little more difficult by the injury to Mike Moropoulos, who started at center for the Gauchos. Mike had his knee injured early in the game and it is not yet known how long he will be out of action. He certainly will miss next week's game with Pomona.

Junior Varsity Ties Coalinga Team 13-13

The Junior Varsity football squad twice came from behind to tie a highly favored Coalinga College varsity, 13-13. Halfback Les Harris pushed over both tallies.

The Falcons scored the first time they had the ball on a fourth-down pass from Bob Smith to Vince Rogers, good for 14 yards. Phil Breuser converted. The Junior Gauchos tied things up in the second period when Harris covered the last six yards around right end. Hal James added the point. The Gaucho drive was sparked by the quarterbacking of Augie Ramirez and the running of Joe Phillips, Bob Gottschalk and Harris.

Harris Bobbles

Harris bobbed a high punt and Coalinga recovered on the UCSB 40, midway through the third canto. A long pass from Clarence Billbrey to Ray Walsh led to pay dirt. JV Jack Allen blocked the attempted placement.

The Blue and Gold again came from behind as Harris tallied on a two-yard smash over right tackle. Ken Brittingham, who engineered the drive from his fullback post, set up the score by carrying for four yards on a fourth-down do-or-die run. Passes from Ramirez and Andy Logan to Ends George Mattais and Hal James gave impetus to the drive. James' placement was blocked by Jack Henry.

Moral Triumph

The tie was a moral triumph for the JV, who didn't win a game all last year. Only 22 men faced the red-and-white horde of 36 Falcons, and they'd practiced together for only four days.

The Junior Gauchos are tentatively scheduled to meet San Luis Obispo JC next Friday.

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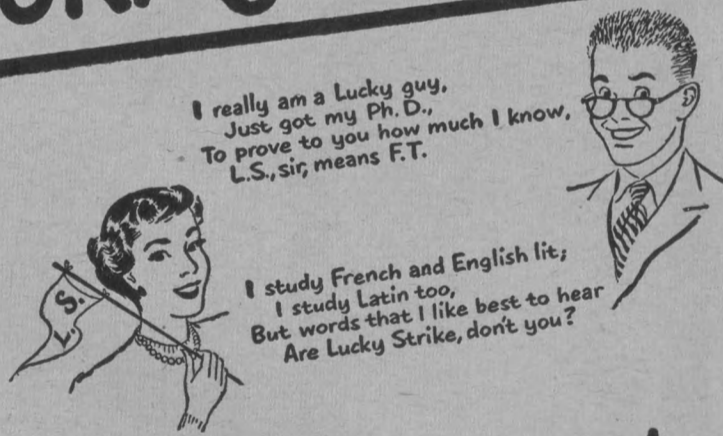
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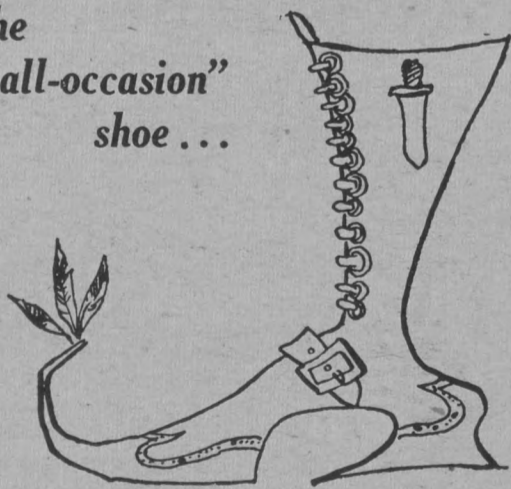
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
