The three games on Sunday were hard-fought battles, with both teams


exchanging leads. But Santa Barbara was never able to outlast the 49ers in any of the games, especially during a critical second game. "They just have too

The turning point for the match was in that second game, when UCSB had its best chance of winning a game and perhaps shifting the momentum. The Gauchos had two game points before eventually losing in a heartbreaker, 18-16.

UCSB had another chance to take a game, leading 10-7 in the third, before Long Beach stormed back to close out the match with eight consecutive points.

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Santa Barbara Wins Season Debut; Westmont Gives Gauchos a Scare

The UCSB men's basketball team un-veiled its version of the killer B's on Friday night, as it defeated Westmont College 73-64 in the season opener. Sophomore forward B.J. Bunton and

junior point guard Les Bean combined to account for 40 of the 73 Gaucho points as the two rescued Santa Barbara $(\hat{1}-0)$ from

a potentially disastrous home debut. UCSB was expected by many to easily roll over the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Warriors (1-2), who came into the game undersized and outmanned. But Westmont hung tough and took a 33-31 lead into halftime before the Gauchos could take control of the game

"I really felt like [Westmont Head Coach] John Moore's team would play their hearts out," said UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm. "I just hoped they wouldn't play harder than us. And I don't think they played harder than we did. We played very, very hard tonight."

Bean brought the crowd to its feet three times on the night by soaring for some spectacular dunks, one of which was called a technical foul by referee Jerry White because Bean hung on to the rim afterwards - a call that was questioned by Pimm.

'The rule is that you're able to hang on the rim when there is a crowd underneath you," said Pimm, who added that replay clearly showed that there were Westmont players below the basket. "You don't want to fall wrong in that situation. How-ever, I don't think he needed to dunk the ball. He could've just put it on the backboard. But Les had a great game, he had some good shot selections and took control."

Things went a little tougher than expected for the UCSB women's basketball team this weekend.

The Gauchos entered their season opener with a perfect exhibition record, but found that the regular season can be a bit harsher as the squad narrowly defeated the University of Missouri-Kansas City 64-62 on Friday and lost 81-71 to the University of Kansas

Leading the way for the Warriors was junior Joe Kearns, who finished the game with 17 points and three rebounds. Senior Chris Lang contributed 12 points for Westmont.

But the night belonged to Santa Barbara's Bean and Bunton.

The two started the game by scoring the first 14 Gaucho points in the initial 10 minutes of the game. "I saw a lot of openings in their de-

fense," said Bean, who had a game-high 21 points, five assists and four steals. "So I was aggressive and tried to penetrate and score.

at the Firestone Fieldhouse in Malibu. The game will be televised live on a reg-

ional basis by Fox Sports West - Channel 37 — at 5 p.m., with Bill MacDonald calling the play-by-play action and former USC Head Coach George Raveling providing the color commentary.

"I really don't think the game being televised will affect us that much," said UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm. "What concerns me more is that it's the first road game. The first road game could be a little bit shaky to start. We really need to con-centrate and focus against Pepperdine." Junior forward Matt Pinkney agreed.

"I'm not nervous. I haven't really even

thought about [the telecast]," he said. "The key is just to play it like any other game and play hard. We just want to go out and win.'

The Waves (0-1) stumbled in their season opener under new coach and former UCLA assistant Lorenzo Romar. They lost to a tough Weber State team 80-54 on Friday.

"At this time of the year, for most schools, it's more about what you're try-

ing to do than what the other team is trying to do," Pimm said. "Pepperdine is a very athletic team and they have some very good players."

Leading the charge for the Waves will be sophomore forward Tommie Prince, who transferred from Arizona State last season. Prince struggled in the Waves' first game but still finished with eight points and nine rebounds.

"They have some good shooters," Pimm said. "[Sophomore] R.J. Powell, [senior] Marques Johnson and Tommie Prince are all capable scorers."

The game will also be a sort of homecoming for two Gauchos. Junior forward Josh Merrill and Assistant Coach Jon Wheeler are both new to the UCSB program after brief stays at the Malibu

"I've been waiting for a long time for this game," said Merrill, who played the 1994-95 season at Pepperdine before transferring to Santa Barbara. "I don't want to get too excited, but it's going to be a good game. I know their team fairly well, but there are also a number of new guys I don't know."

Wheeler was the assistant coach for the Waves last season after coaching stints at UC Davis and UC Berkeley.

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KANSAS: Santa Barbara Falls to Jayhawks

on Sunday. "Overall, I was pleased with our effort," said UCSB Head Coach Mark French. "We played hard and did

good things against a good Kansas team." While the split was disappointing to the team, it was not unexpected. University of Kansas entered the game ranked #12 in the country and was seeking to avenge last season's defeat in Santa Barbara.

The Jayhawks jumped on the board first when preseason All-American Tamecka Dixon scored two of her 17 points just nine seconds into the contest. The teams continued to exchange baskets until UCSB freshman point guard Stacy Clinesmith buried a three-pointer to give the Gauchos their first lead with 14:52 left in the half.

From that point on, the two teams seesawed with the lead before Kansas took a 39-38 advantage into halftime.

The Jayhawks were sparked in the opening period by Angie Halbleib, who hit three treys on her way to 14 firsthalf points.

The second half proved to be costly for Santa Barbara, as Kansas began to pull away with 15 minutes remaining in the game. UCSB was able to close the lead to four, but the Jayhawks again put together a run, taking an 11-point lead when Halbleib converted a layup at the 9:46 mark.

The Gauchos attempted to close the gap, but foul trouble became a factor and hampered the squad. Both Clinesmith and senior guard Erin Alexander fouled out of the game, leaving UCSB without its starting backcourt tandem. Without the duo, Kansas was able to preserve the home-court win by hitting its final free throws, sea-

ling the game. "I thought we played well defensively," French said. "At times, we broke down and let too many drivers [inside], which is against our defensive philosophy.

UCSB was led by senior forward Amy Smith, who poured in 23 points and grabbed 13 rebounds. Clines-mith (11) and Alexander (14) were the only other Gauchos to score in double digits.

Halbleib led all scorers with 29 points, while Dixon added 17 and Nakia Sanford threw down 14 for the Jayhawks.

"I think we are at a point where we should not feel good about a loss," French said. "It should irritate us, and we should be upset that we lost.'

Friday night's contest against Missouri-Kansas City was supposed to serve as a warm-up for Kansas, but became a true test when the Kangaroos battled with Santa Barbara the entire game.

UCSB came out to a fast start, leading by as many as 14 points in the first half. The Gauchos, however, became cold from the floor, allowing the Running 'Roos to pull within eight at the half, 33-25.

Second-half action saw Santa Barbara become as cold as the midwestern weather, as the team shot a miserable 29 percent from the field. The poor UCSB shooting opened the door for UMKC, but the 'Roos could not capitalize on the opportunity.


After the Gauchos led by 16 with 10:26 on the clock, the Kangaroos began to chip away at the lead with a 26-10 run, tying the game with only 2:12 left. Neither team could score until Alexander converted with 54 seconds left in the game.

The basket was only Alexander's third of the game as she endured one of her worst shooting performances since coming to Santa Barbara, going 3-15 from the floor and 0-7 from three-point land

Freshman forward Kristi Rohr led UCSB with 16 points and 14 rebounds in her first collegiate game. Alexander and Clinesmith followed with 11 and 12 points respectively.

UMKC was supported by the efforts of Darci Haas, who finished with a game-high 17 points. Teresa Grimes (11) was the only other player above 10 points for the Kangaroos.

The Gauchos will next be in action this Friday as they host the GTE Shootout in the Thunderdome. The twoday event will draw the University of Wisconsin, UC Irvine and the University of Delaware.

phomore Erin McCown contributed seven kills and 14 digs. "We did what we had to against Boise


State," Gregory said. "We served well and played well defensively."

Boise State was led by sophomore outside hitter Robin Phipps and junior middle blocker Becky Meeks.


Phipps had nine kills and eight digs while Meek chipped in eight kills and four blocks.
