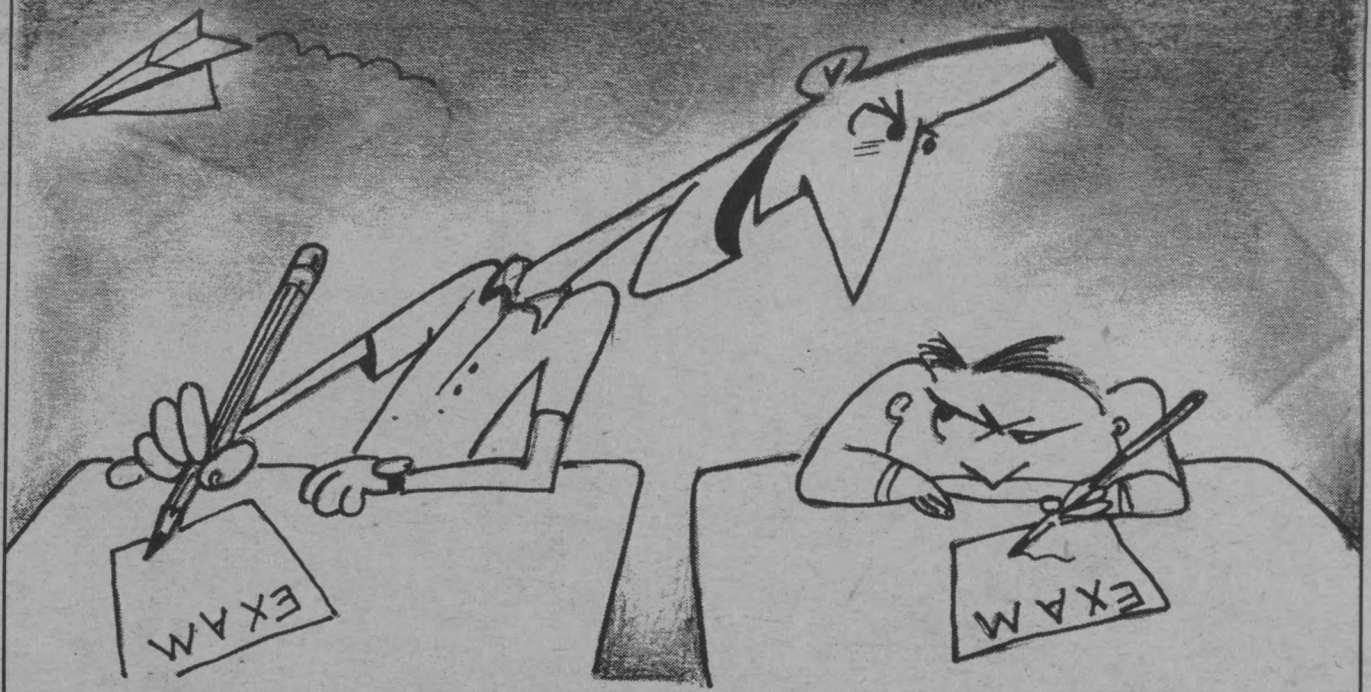

CHEATING:

Is it all that bad?



U. of Idaho Prof: 'Cheaters learn more'

When UI junior Sarah Hewlett pulled out a "cheat sheet" during her Spanish midterm, some might say she was engaging in academic dishonesty. And when sophomore Derrick Fell began scratching calculus equations into his forearm with a ball-point pen, others would say he was short-circuiting the learning process.

Both students, who claim to have cheated more than 30 times in the past, have high grade point averages and plan to go on to master's programs after graduation. But traditional wisdom holds that students like these two aren't really learning anything at all.

So how will they make the grade in grad school? According to sociology Professor Bernie Hammon, they're already on the way.

"Studying," says the controversial researcher, "is way over-rated. As a matter of fact, a student who cheats on a test is going to know the material two weeks later just as well as one who studies for it."

"What we're saying here is: it's OK to cheat," Hammon contends.

Hammon's assertions, published last month in *Sociology and You*, fly in the face of academic policies on cheating at every major university in the country, but he is sticking by his guns.

"They say I'm a quack, a charlatan, a fraud, that I'll do anything to get published," Hammon said in a recent interview. "But my research says cheating is just fine, and that's what I say, too."

He argues that the stress of cheating on a test will actually help students retain the information they put down. "When somebody's freaked out and sweating and thinking they're going to get kicked out of school, they remember the experience. That information becomes *very* important information."

The Most Dangerous Man?

Hammon's superiors, however, don't appear as convinced. Sociology Department Chair Wade McMonday went so far as to call Hammon "The Most Dangerous Man in Academia."

"To claim that cheaters are better students is ludicrous. I know those students who study and those who cheat and I know a lot more about this than Hammon," McMonday asserted.

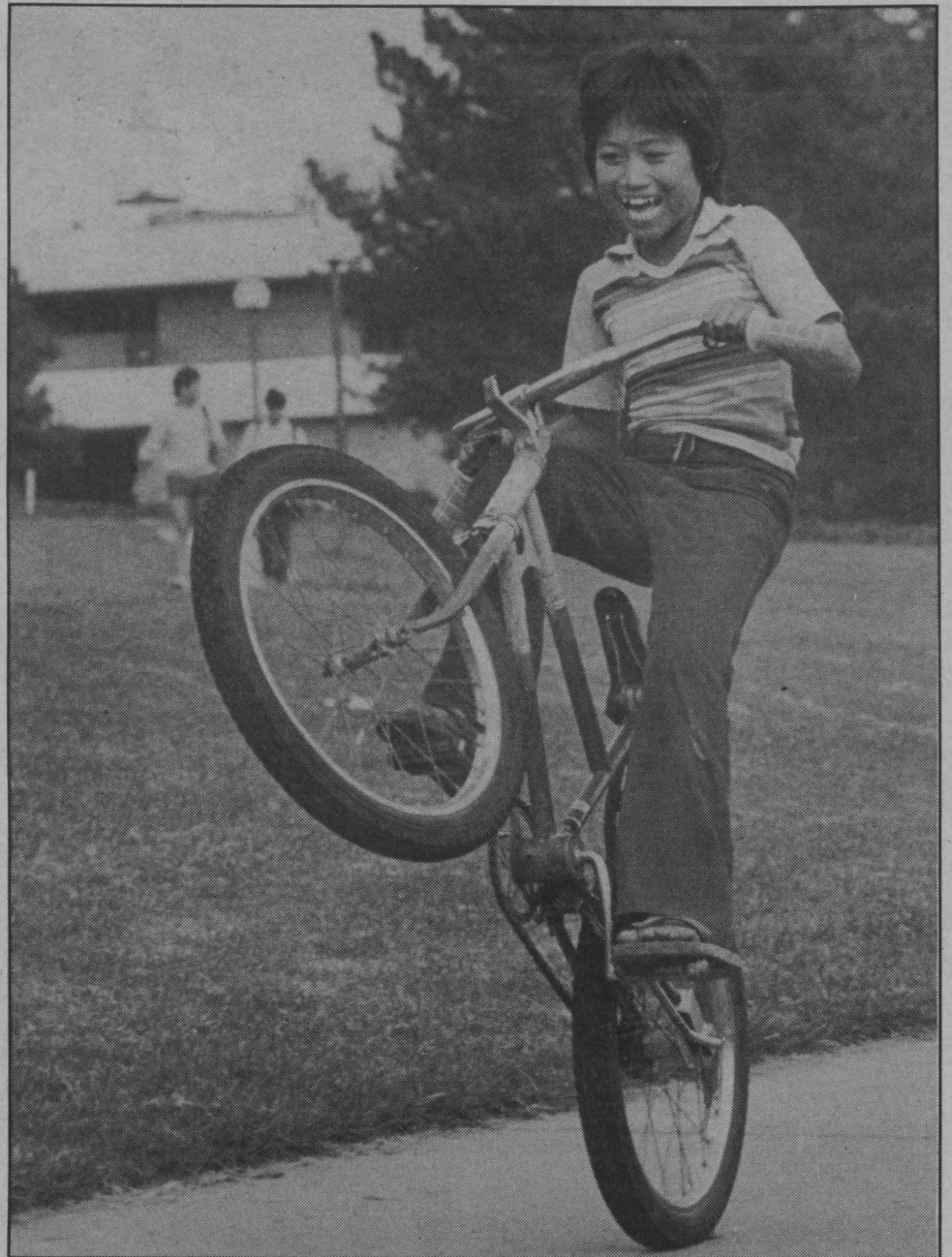
The chair was especially concerned about the teaching tactics Hammon will use when he comes back from sabbatical next semester.

"He's going to have a class full of cheaters, because he'll tell them to be cheaters. It'll be a disaster. Cheaters never prosper."

But Hammon counters that for cheating to remain an effective strategy, it must be used responsibly. See CHEATING, Page 7

TOUCHÉ: Bike jousting on the Ol' Miss

Rhed Haight is one of a new breed of college thrill-seekers. Several of his kind die every day from road rash and puncture wounds suffered while doing single combat on a vehicle most students consider mere transportation.

Haight, 23, is a bike jousting.

Bike jousting has swept Mississippi City by storm, drawing hundreds of male students onto the road with brooms, umbrellas, fishing poles or anything else they can use to poke an opponent. But, to the distress of university and law enforcement officials, the sport is leading many students straight to the grave.

"It is such a rush. The only thing that comes close for me is when I saw *Point Break* and decided to skydive over Tibet with a 'chute I knew wouldn't open to meet the Dalai Lama for brunch," Haight said excitedly. "But I never did that."

This ritualistic sport goes back to the days of the Louisiana Purchase, when chivalric French colonists fended off encroaching Anglos on the newly invented "biciclough," according to history Professor Hank Williams III. The mounted jousting traditionally start 27 feet apart, and try to dismount the opponents using their pikes.

"When I'm on that bike and I know my rusty chain could snap at any minute — that's when it really gets good,"

Haight, a Mississippi City native, added.

Crunch Peterson, 19, who came across bike jousting when he was hit by a tire that had violently dislodged from Haight's bike, said the sport is "fun" and requires a lot of "creative thinking."



"I guess what attracts me to bike jousting is that it gets my creative juices flowing," he reflected, with tiny beads of sweat forming on his brow. "But death has flashed before my eyes many a time while popping a showy wheelie on the way to meet my opponent."

"I often find time to recite as many as three stanzas of Sylvia Plath before getting to the actual jousting part," Peterson added.

Not every Mississippi City resident, however, has caught on to the sport. "It just ain't right for those young hotdogs to joust along the banks of the Mississippi River looking for a quick thrill," said a fed-up Virgil Homesly, 67.

Alison Banger, the mother of Bang Banger, who died in a bike joust on Christmas Day, is outraged that the sport is still legal under a 130-year-old state law.

"What is this?" she said. "I just don't know what is this."

Haight admitted, though, that bike jousting has its down side. "I once took too many chances and slipped on some mud on the jousting track. I knocked out my two front teeth, and I've been sucking creamed corn through a straw ever since," he said, offering a gummy smile. "And I killed my brother over Thanksgiving."

Despite the unfortunate events, Haight maintains he will never give up bike jousting. "Me and bike jousting make a great team. We go together like Indiana Jones and the search for the Holy Grail, Rocky and Bullwinkle, Sears and Roebuck, mud and Mississippi City."

BULLSEYE: Longhorn U. bombers hit Mexico

Is an award-winning student film reason enough to conduct air raids on a sovereign nation?

The bombing of three northern Mexican villages by TC film studies students has the Mexican government, as well as student groups, irate at the death and destruction brought by the action.

A stern letter of warning from the Mexican Embassy in Washington, D.C. is just the latest development in what started as a student film project, but soon became an international incident.

An attempt to "add realism" to a large-scale student production led a film studies professor to assign 12 students to bomb quiet rural communities south of the border in a restored WWII plane.

"I thought it was a good idea. I don't see what all the squabbling is about," Professor Lizi Mandren said. "We took first place in the annual student film festival."

Although the film, entitled *Where the WoodChunks Fly*, did take home a \$150 grand prize from the contest, United Humans for Humanity President Zorich Jiri was not impressed, claiming the film did not merit the killing of over 700 people.

"You can't just go blowing up any old town you want," Jiri said. "Especially without asking for permission. Think about it, people were sitting on their porches, shooting the

breeze when ... kaboom ... there goes the neighborhood."

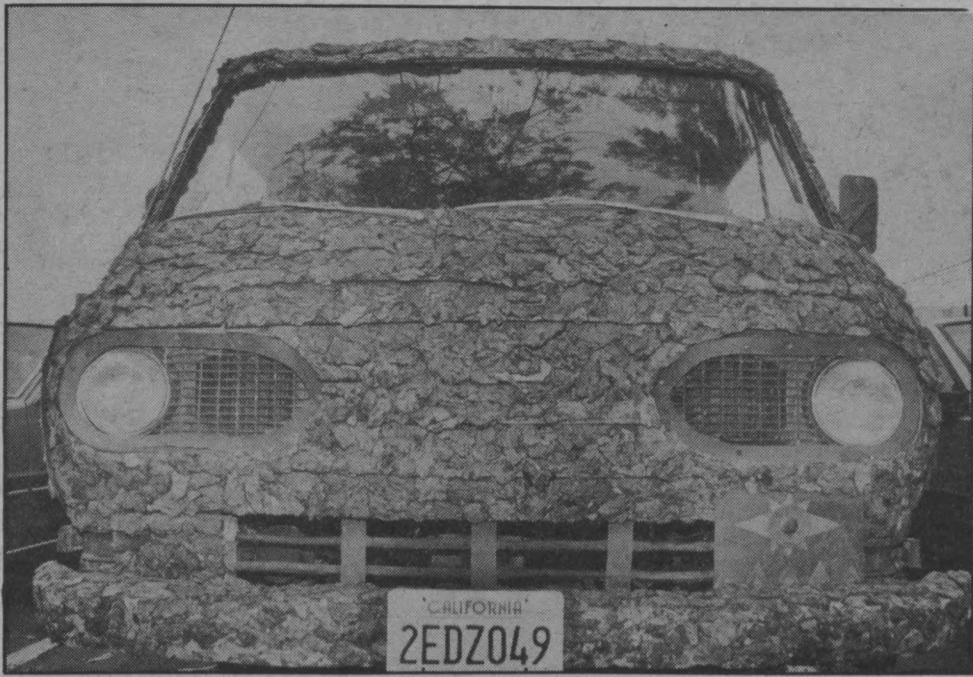
The Mexican Embassy used ever stronger language. "Any further sorties from Texas College will be considered an act of war, warranting severe retaliation against the school," a recent letter states.

But junior film studies major Symon Launcher believed the bombing was worth it. "Not only did I learn how to do a

focus pull, I learned how to release six tons of explosives from the belly of a B-24," he said.

"When I heard that many people perished, I was sort of glum," Launcher said. "But when our Provost Sam Sibling told me the footage was going to be in the opening sequ-

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No Kiddin'

New U. for kids is a place for prodigies

When Janice Kemper got out of a Zoology 138 midterm on a sunny Tuesday, she rushed to the four-square court. John Henderson, president of the Pequeno University Associated Student Body, missed an executive council meeting last month because *Come Home, Snoopy, Come Home* was airing.

Pequeno University President Billy Rueben, a Ph.D. in psychology, sleeps with a night light glowing securely in the corner.

"Pequeno is a harbor of sorts for the intellectually endowed, but temporally-disadvantaged student," was how one four-year-old freshman put it.

For years in this country, brilliant children in search of higher education have been forced to shed their childhoods and attend major universities like MIT and Cal-Berkeley, where the schooling was great, but snack times were few and a good game of dodge-ball was out of the question.

But new Pequeno U. in Albuquerque, NM is giving genius kids the education they need, with the childhood amenities they deserve.

"Pequeno is long overdue," said Barbara Newman, a six-year-old junior nuclear engineering major who also conducts the school's jazz ensemble. "With my peers around me, I can learn in a most germain manner, without the perpetual agitation coming from the pomposity and misguided sexual energy of adults," Newman said, testily sucking an Otter Pop in her dorm room.

Similarities or Differences?

Newman's attitude is typical of the Pequeno student. But the close observer might recognize more similarities than differences between the children's school and those geared toward older students. Here the words "kid," "tyke," and "small-fry" fall under the school's "fighting words" policy, and their use is grounds for loss of swing-set privileges and even expulsion. Pequeno students consider themselves "youths."

During the Persian Gulf War last year, Pequeno students joined their older brethren across the country in protesting the overseas action. During one particularly vocal protest, a band of some 300 students succeeded in tearing down the facade of the administration building.

More frequent Pequeno student government issues vary between such debates as whether throwing dirt clods should be considered the same as rock-throwing and the more politically topical discussions like whether Hungary's treatment of their Turkish minority deserves the school's internationally feared Class "A" Abomination distinction.

A debate flaring on campus currently centers around a proposal for mandatory faculty retirement after age 12.

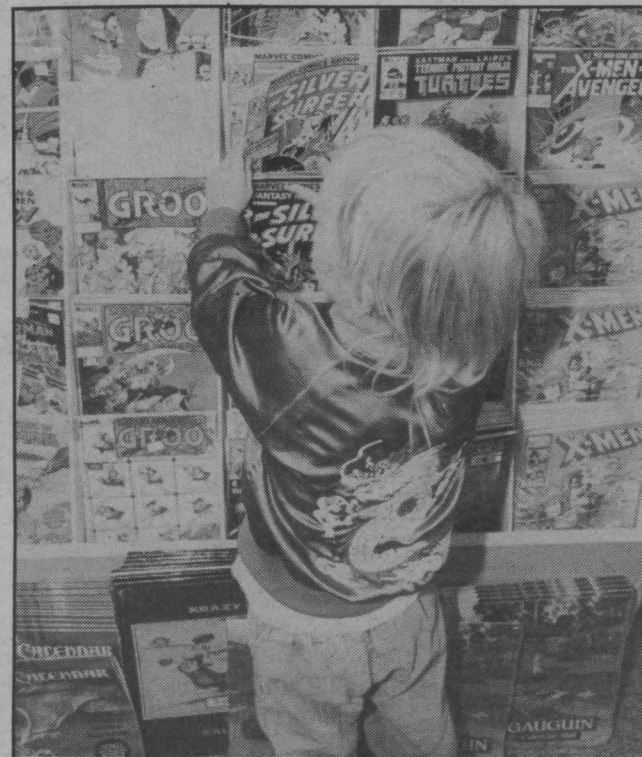
Henderson, a five-year-old sophomore majoring in aquatic biology, characterized Pequeno's political bent as "pragmatically liberal, but bearing an urgent message of fiscal conservatism."

"The time has come for a new breed of political thinkers who carry with them compassion and benevolence toward their fellow humans, and also a realistic schema for a dynamic and accessible economic base."

College, it seems, is college.

A Lot to Prove

As a campus of little people in a big-people's world, at times it seems Pequeno U.'s major concern is proving their

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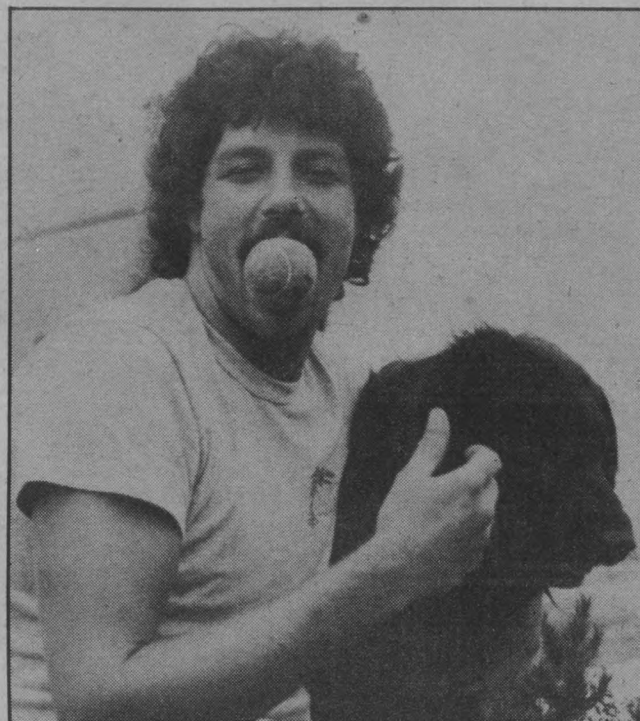

Just as a chicken in a large red box will play a miniature piano when the lights start flashing, scientists at the U. of Alabama have dozens of male volunteers retrieving tennis balls by mouth at the bark of a dog.

Over the last decade, scientists have conditioned 10 native Alabaman men to drop to all fours and wrap their lips around a slobbery tennis ball, just as Ivan Pavlov conditioned canines to salivate at the chime of a dinner bell 65 years before. "We were really amazed that these civilized men had been reduced to salivating animals anxious to please their barking pets," Alabama Mutual Head Researcher Dr. Bob Yall said. "It's very interesting to see a grown man with a mouth full of yellow felt."

Yall said his team began the testing in hope of discovering how close man and his best friend really are, claiming the breakthrough discovery of male human behavior runs consistent to his private thoughts during his "thinking time" on the toilet.

Yall says the data his researchers have collected does for psychology what Einstein did for physics. "If Pavlov could make his dogs salivate, then this reversal of roles is essentially the same

as the Theory of Relativity, where matter can be turned to energy and vice-versa. It's a staggering revelation we've given the world."

Cousin said that although no concrete explanation can be given for the See PAVLOV, Page 13

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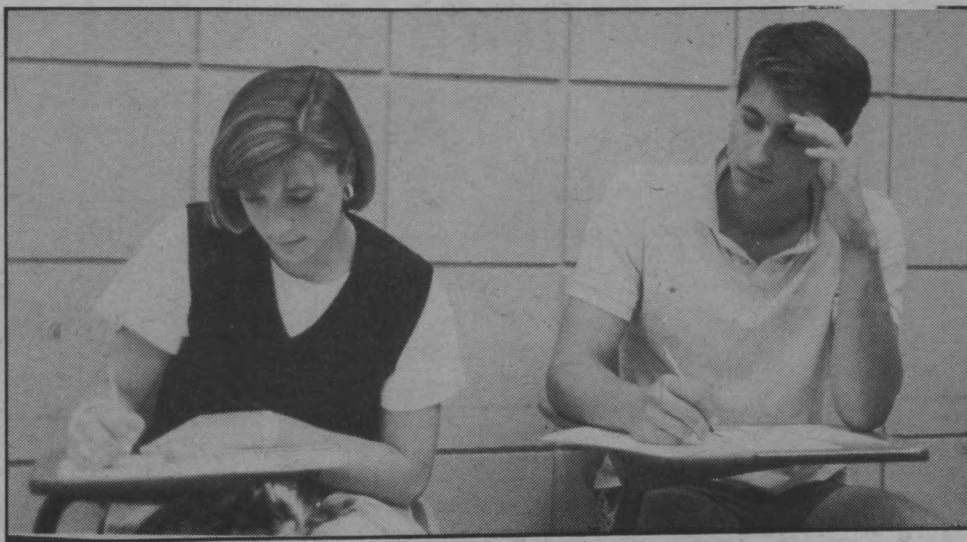
(Continued from page 1) tive learning tool, it must be absolutely forbidden by the teacher, with iron-fisted punishments for those caught.

"If I tell a class to cheat, that eliminates the anxiety of the cheating experience and the retention would be lost. That would be as bad as telling them to study."

"Next semester, I think I'll just give them so much information to memorize that they'll *have* to cheat. If they don't, that's their tough luck."

Although College Provost Hermes Wieberhausen disapproves of this idea, Hammon has tenure and the provost says there's nothing he can do about it. "It's one of those situations where you just grit your teeth and hope he falls down a staircase or something," Wieberhausen said.

But senior Jerry Koncini, a sociology major, is hoping just the opposite. He's taken

four classes with Hammon so far, and is signed up for his "Guilt and Its Consequences" course next semester.

"I love his classes," Koncini said. "I like them."

Hammon's How-to Guide
Although Hammon will probably spend a lot of his time in the near future just

fending off attacks from those who take issue with his ideas (*Sociology and You* editors have already received 54 replies to his article), he says he will publish again soon. This time, he wants to put out a list of the cheating techniques that "work best."

The idea is anathema to some, but Hammon con-

tends it can only help. "I've got some dynamite ideas. Like this one time a student had a friend call the administration building and say my son had been arrested to get me out of the classroom."

"Now, I don't have a son, and so I skewered the kid, but it was a great try. I respect that."

Inti-Illimani was forced into exile while on tour in Europe in 1973 when the democratically-elected government of Salvador Allende was overthrown by the military regime of General Augusto Pinochet.

During their 15 years in exile, they were never forgotten at home; Chilean fans would secretly listen to bootleg copies of banned records on headphones. When Inti-Illimani finally returned to Chile in 1988, more than 130,000 people attended one of their concerts. 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FIDEL(ITY): Comrade U.?

At the University of Miami, the Bay of Pigs is never far from students' minds, but the political science department is recreating the incident in reverse by offering Cuban dictator Fidel Castro a guest lecture-ship this spring.

Not only is the bearded strongman teaching a course entitled, "Introduction to Communist Insurgency and Other Marxist Drivel" but he is also offering a seminar called "The Red Peril: Fact or Fiction?"

Student reaction has been enthusiastic so far, according to oceanography professor and unrepentant Marxist-Leninist Serfus Upe. 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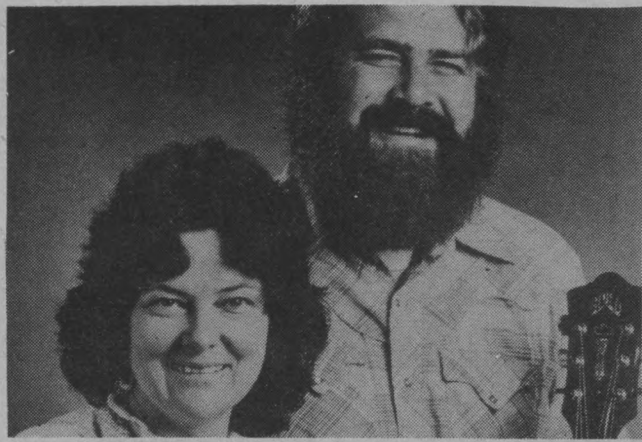

Maulaffe promised no letdown after last week's release, *Hosen in Your Leder*, and they're as good as their word.

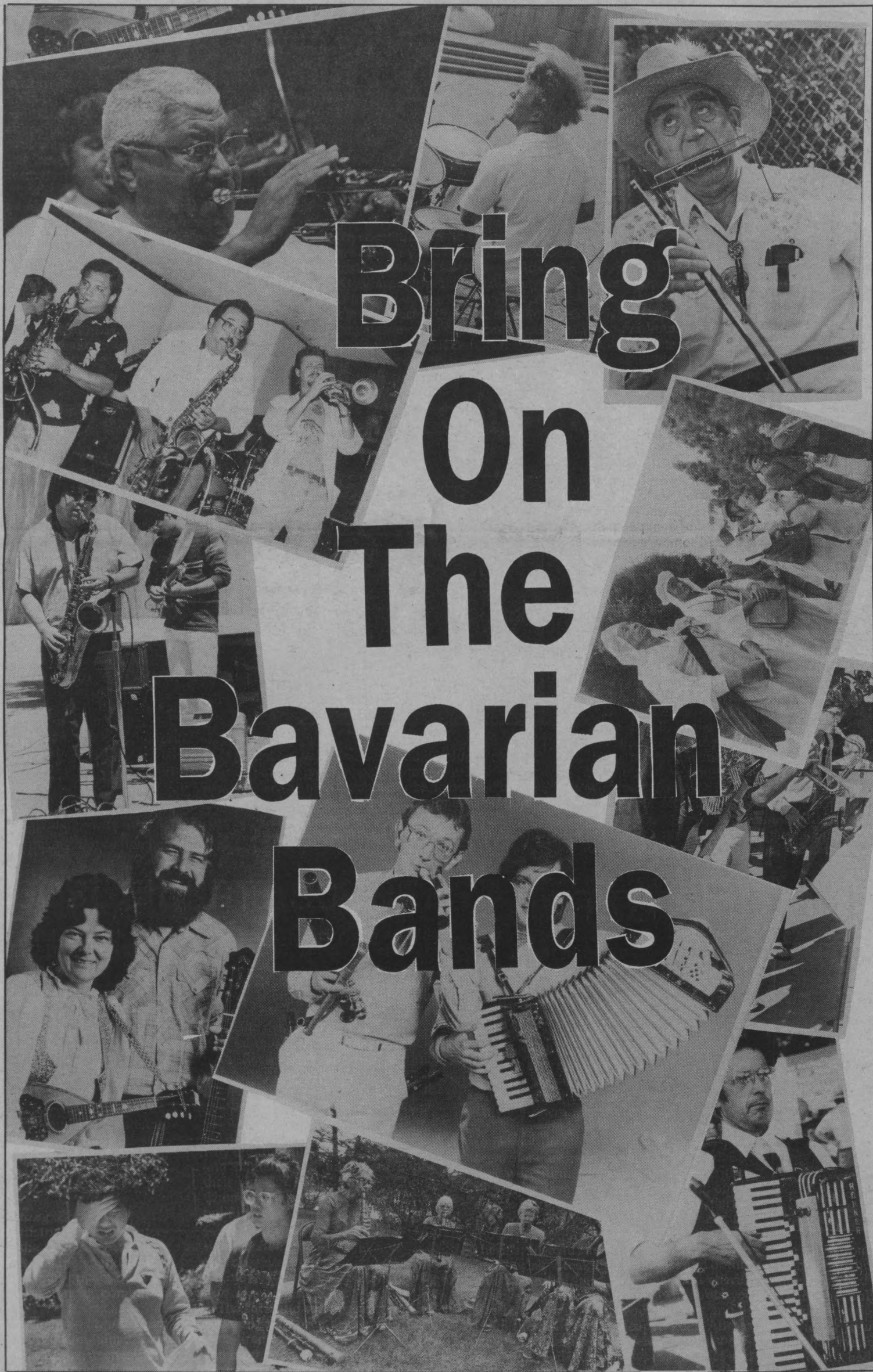

Issues

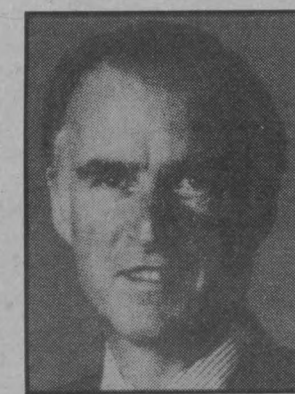

He plans to capitalize on his good physical shape and hopes that no one notices his bad teeth.

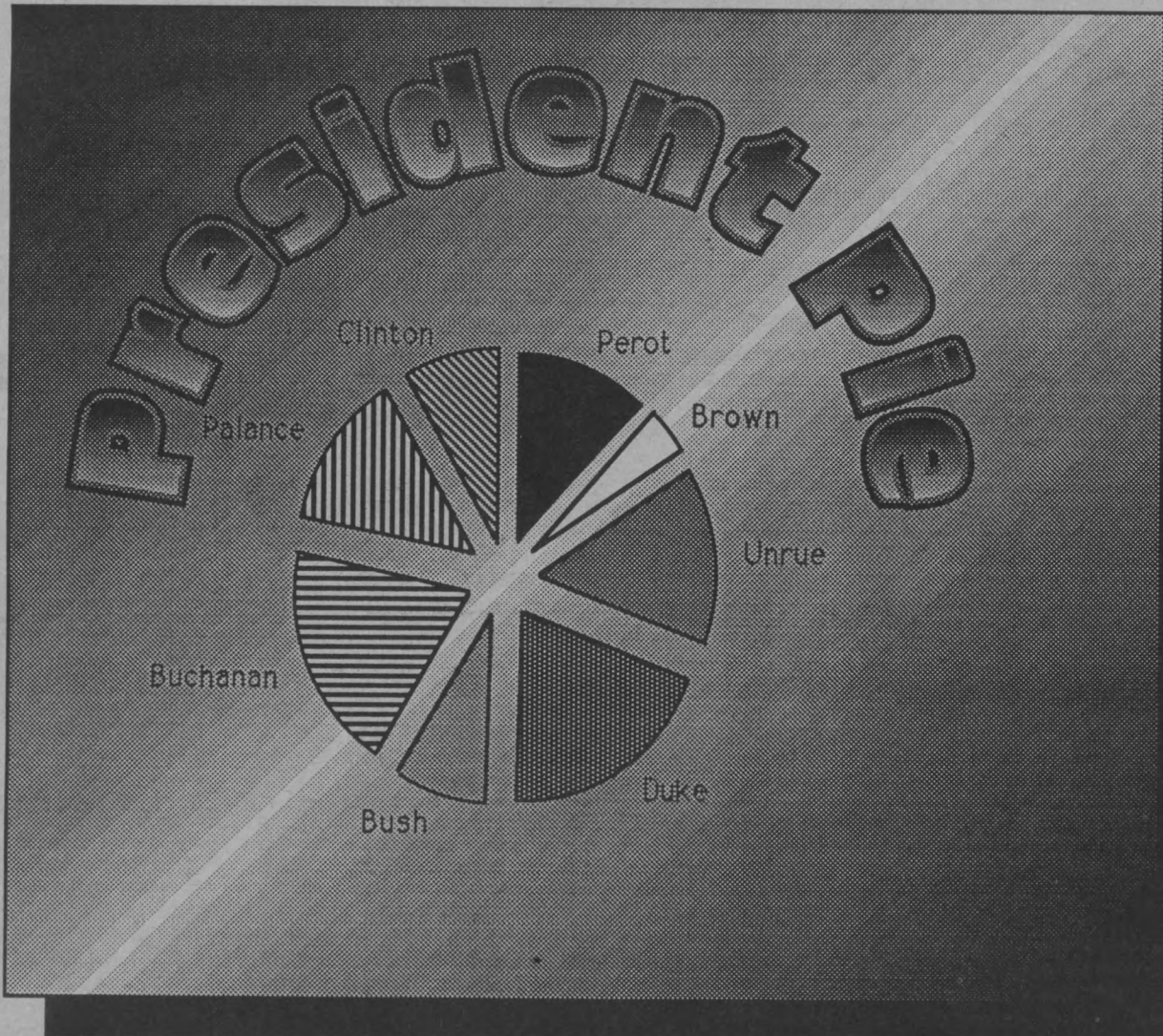
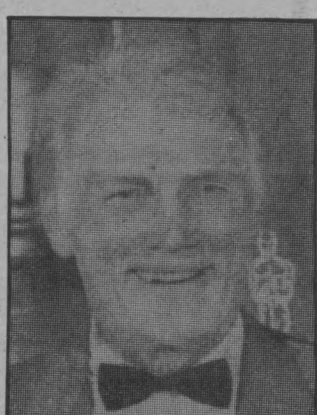

 merit in traditionally adult fields. 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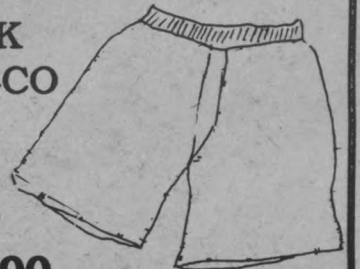

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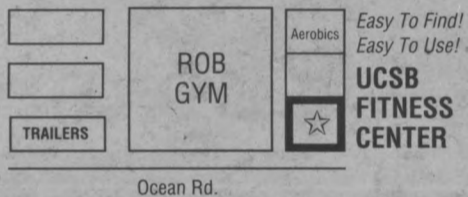

Football: Does anyone care?

In a strange turn of events, college football teams are going the way of the dinosaur around the country. Following the lead of an obscure California university, Cal-State Santa Barbara, more and more schools are getting rid of their football programs.

The reason? Too much money, campus officials say. Do you mean they make too much money or cost too much money?

academic matters." Across the river in South Bend, the University of Notre Dame faced the same problem. Only a monetary grant from alumnus Raghieb "Fig" Ismail, now a professional football player, saved the program from extinction like the dinosaur. Unlike the dinosaur, however, Ismail donated upwards of a billion dollars.

"I had some money left over from my contract, so I decided to help them out," Ismail said in a press conference. "I still have a year of eligibility left, so I'd like to have a team to come back to if I decide to turn amateur next year."

Meanwhile, here at Laramie State, the football program will stay, at least for another year. The question is, does it deserve to stay? That question was posed to Chancellor Jean-Luc Kirk.

"Well, we did lose \$16 million on football," Kirk admitted. "And we did finish 0-11. But still, it's fun to go and drink beer at the games sometimes."

Kirk expressed irritation at the general trend of football bashing, saying, "If those idiots at Long Beach Tech and Santa Barbara A&M hadn't ditched out on their program, we wouldn't be in this mess."

"We didn't ditch out on the program, we abandoned it," explained Santa Barbara student Scott Chippendale. "But we didn't need it anyway. I mean, why should we ever sacrifice twenty bucks a year to gain national respect? Who wants to see Division I football anyway?"

That's the question that everyone seems to be asking. Laramie sophomore Wallace Cleaver summed it up perfectly by saying, "Who wants to see Division I football anyway?"

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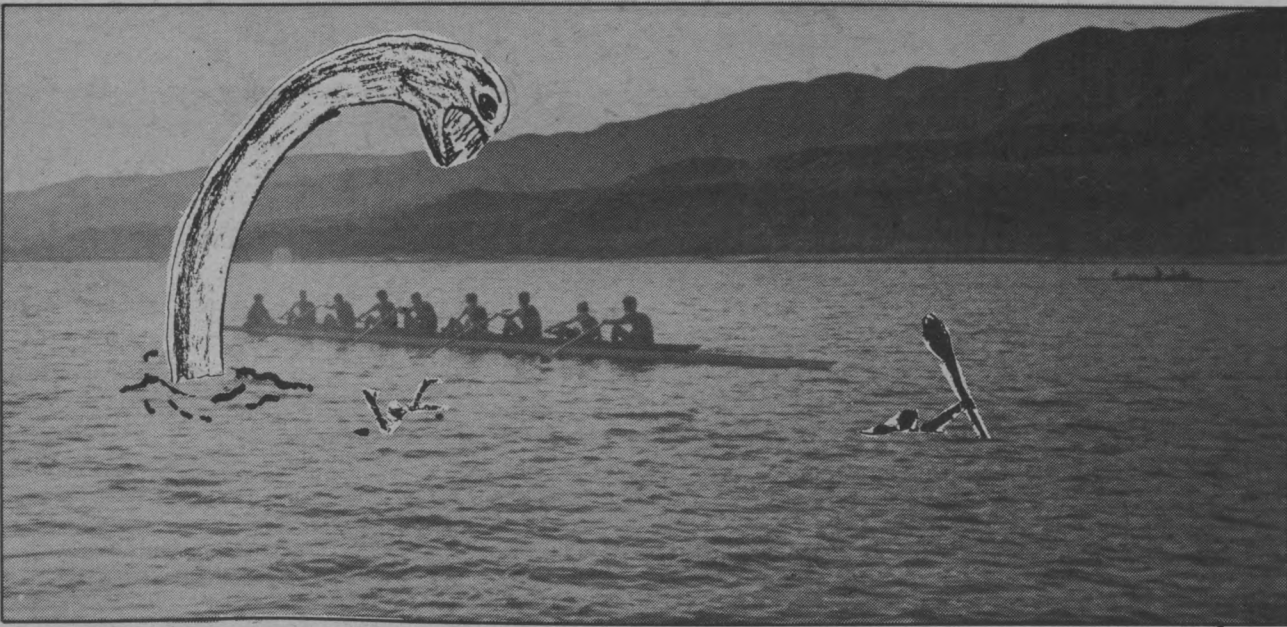

CREATURE: Beast Devours Rowers

A hazardous waste spill near the North Bay Rowing Club on Greenville Lake on the Ohio-Pennsylvania border had dire consequences last month as 72 members of university crew teams were devoured by a bloody great sea serpent, which rose out of the lake and swallowed several shells and rowers.

"It was incredible," said Coach Larkspur Pumpnickel, coach of the Cal-Los Angeles varsity crew team, who was on the lake when the monster rose out of the water. "It was really huge, and just gulped down the Berkeley boat. Then it went and grabbed several more."

In all, 58 members were lost in the nine boat Varsity Heavyweight final, including all nine of the coxswains. As other boats struggled to get out of the water, some of them were picked off as well.

According to witnesses, the giant beast was grey-green, covered with scales and approximately 62 feet in length. After eating the crews, it was seen picking its teeth with an oar in the center of the lake.

Initially the serpent was thought to be a prehistoric creature unearthed by massive coal mining in the region. However, scientists quickly said that the possibility of a creature living in Ohio for that long is slim.

"Are you kidding me? People hate northeast Ohio," said Cuyahoga State Biology Professor and East Cleveland Chamber of Commerce Chair Edna Foof. "We can't get people to stay for five years, not to mention 60 million."

Though authorities would not comment on the incident, an anonymous source said that the monster was the result of the illegal dumping of bio-mutagenic chemicals into the water by Bio-Gen, a local genetics corporation.

"I know that it was done by Bio-Gen. The president himself probably went out there and dumped it into the water," said Mark Leenhard, an employee who spoke on the condition of anonymity. "Don't print my name though, or else I'm a dead man," he added.

It is not known how many members of the various crews were actually eaten and how many simply drowned. Authorities were attempting to capture the monster and examine its stomach contents, but attempts to corral the beast proved fruitless.

"We could be dealing with a very smart creature here. He may be storing some of the kids away for later in the year, when fewer rowers are likely to come out on the lake," said Ohio state trooper Clyde "Speed" Trap. "Depending on his diet, like if he likes fiberglass, he could stuff the shells with the kids and munch on them like stuffed celery sticks. It

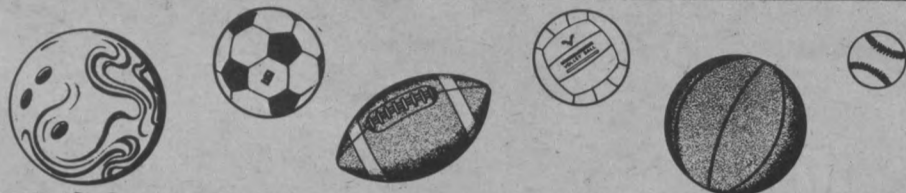

A "Lifer" no more Murder turned jumper knocking them dead

Jim Juggins has traded in his place on Death Row for a place on top of the Track and Field world, and he couldn't be happier.

"I'm doing so much better now that I've been paroled," the ex-con said in his trademark Scottish accent. "I mean, prison is cool for a while, they pay for your meals and everything. But soon, everything tastes the same."

Juggins now only tastes sweet victory, as he has assumed the world's top rank in the long jump. His jump of 31'2" (wind-aided) last November at the Convicted Murderers Olympics gave him the world record and made him an immediate front-runner for the Barcelona games.

This is all new territory for Juggins, who just two years ago was known as #45634738 in Concord's state prison. The former Scotland High School track champ was sentenced to die after his conviction on three counts of murder, dismemberment and loitering.

But his attorney continually appealed his case until New Hampshire state justice Earl Pound, a huge track and field fan, recognized Juggins' name and overturned his sentence.

"We just can't have a talented athlete like that put to sleep," explained Pound, who reduced Juggins' sentence from the death penalty to one year in prison and 200,000 hours of community service.

"I thought it was a fair trade," Pound said.

Since being paroled after serving an exhausting eight months ("I behaved really well inside," he explained), Juggins has made it his life's goal to become the top long jumper in the history of the sport. For the first year of his training, he still wore the ball and chain of his prison time around his wrist to remind him of his past.

"Sure, it made jumping harder, but then I took it off and just flew," he said.

As the new world record holder, Juggins has become somewhat of a celebrity. His non-traditional competition attire of a tank-top and plaid kilt have become popular with his fans. His unusual accent has also made him a candidate for Nike endorsements.

"The company wants to make an ad where I kill some people in Reebok shoes, but then go out and jump in Nikes. Get it? Break the law in Reeboks, break records in Nikes. It's brilliant, I think."

But the ascent of Juggins has not been so well-received by others in the

sport. Fellow athletes have privately complained to officials about a convicted murderers presence at track events, where starter pistols are readily available.

"I can't stand those type of people," Juggins said. "They are so narrow-minded. Sometimes, I just want to kill them."

"Just kidding."

Yes, these days Juggins is able to laugh at his past, all the while assuring that his wild days of murder and rampage are behind him.

"The long jump is my life now," he proclaims. "I hardly ever think about massacre anymore."

NHL strike brings professionals to college rinks

As the National Hockey League players association prepares to strike today, many of the NHL's brightest stars have shocked the sports world by agreeing to terms with colleges across the United States to play NCAA hockey. The players, most of whom entered professional hockey as teenagers, have not attended American universities and have therefore retained four years' worth of NCAA athletic eligibility. The players will enter their respective colleges as freshmen, and should be in uniform in time for games on April 3.

The first of the NHL stars to hook up with an NCAA team was Los Angeles Kings' Captain Wayne Gretzky. The Great One explained at a press conference March 27 why he responded to requests by the University of California at Santa Barbara to come play at UCSB.

"I think it would be fun," Gretzky said of his decision to play college hockey in Santa Barbara. "It's near my home in California, and I've heard the weather's nice there. I don't know anything about their program, but I think I can really help improve it."

Gretzky, who will enter UCSB as an undeclared freshman, was apparently unaware that Santa Barbara has no hockey team. How-

ever, with his announcement to join the nonexistent program, plans were hurriedly drawn up to create one.

"We plan to use many members of our best intramural floor hockey team," UCSB Athletic Director Johnny Krasser explained. "We're also searching for any students who can ice skate."

One student already committed to joining the team is senior James Gerald, one of few UCSB students with ice hockey experience.

"Dude! I'm going to skate on a line with Gretzky!" Gerald excitedly ranted. "It's all about me!"

Gerald, a sociology major, indicated that he expected a rewarding hockey career at UCSB.

"Dude," he said. "Chicks will finally dig me."

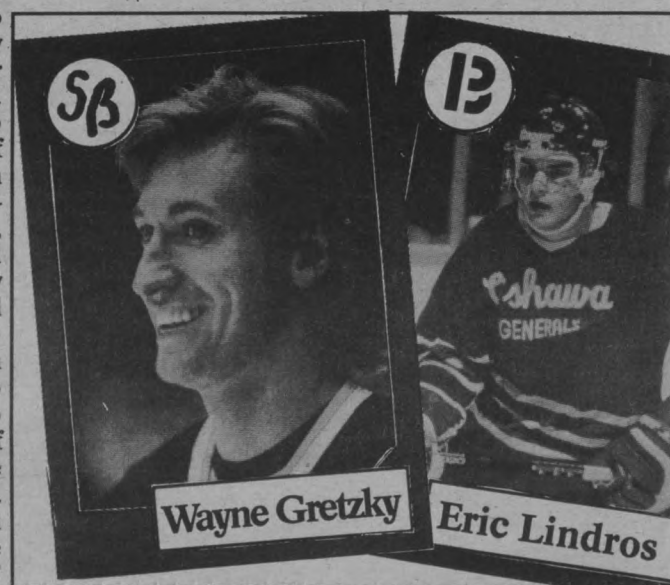
The lack of an ice hockey facility would not be a problem, Krasser insisted, explaining that the athletic department would be taking advantage of the campus' natural resources.

"We're going to freeze over part of the lagoon and construct an outdoor arena," he said of the sludge-filled cesspool at the southern tip of the UCSB campus, obviously not thinking clearly. "Someone told me it was possible."

After Gretzky signed a letter of intent to come to Santa Barbara, colleges across the nation went into an instant frenzy in an attempt to sign top NHL play-

ers. The NCAA moved to eliminate the free-for-all by establishing a draft order for the rights to sign players. The top pick went to Bloomsburg University of Pennsylvania, which selected 19-year-old sensation Eric Lindros. However, Lindros was not pleased with his selection by Bloomsburg, and promised not to attend the school. "I refuse to sign with them," said Lindros, who was offered a scholarship to play hockey in excess of what Bloomsburg's entire faculty makes in a decade. "(skip) ...
