#9 UCSB Spikers Suffer First Loss

The UCSB women's volleyball team has spent the first few weeks of September away from home and has experienced only one bump in the road in its 10-match road trip, losing to #6 University of Florida.

The Gauchos began the season ranked 11th in the nation by the USA Today/AVCA Coaches poll, but have recently moved up in the rankings to a #9 seeding. After reaching the NCAA West Regional Semi-Final last season, the Gauchos are again off to a strong start, amassing a 9-1 overall record thus far. In the first game of the year, UCSB defeated Illinois 15-5, 15-11, 15-5, giving UCSB Head Coach Kathy Gregory her 600th career victory. Gregory became the 14th Division I volleyball coach in history to

notch 600 career wins.


Santa Barbara continued its domination in the next eight matches, not even surrendering one game to any of its opponents. The Gauchos' first test came in the final match of their road trip, against the Gators. However, Florida came out on top in the seesaw battle, taking the match in five games, 15-13, 7-15, 15-12, 6-15, 16-14.

"We are very happy to be 9-1," Gregory said. "We'd like to be undefeated, but that loss came against a very good team on the last match of a very long road trip. We had lots of opportunities to take that match, but we just didn't capitalize when we should have."

Senior middle blocker Michelle Christ continued on Gregory's point.

"They outplayed us in most aspects of the game; we just didn't follow through," Christ said. "But we were still able to stick with them. It showed that we can compete with top-10 teams and be able to beat them."

Senior outside hitter Roberta Gehlke led the Gauchos with 36 kills and 21 digs while hitting .301 against Florida. According to Gehlke, the final game of the match was a closely fought battle.

"In the fifth game, we could have done better, but it really could have gone either way," the Huntington Beach native said. "A kill there or a kill here would have decided it in either team's favor. It was a tough loss, but it was a reality check for us. They showed us our weaknesses and pointed out for us things we could do better."

Senior outside hitter Charlene Conley chipped in with a 21-kill performance while hitting at a .286 clip.

"That match came down to who made less

errors," Conley said. "We pretty much went point for point with them in the last game, but they just made less errors. The loss was definitely an eye-opener for us. But I see us continually improving every practice and everyone is set on having a good season."

Despite the loss, Gregory remains confident in her team, due in large part to the Gauchos' three seniors, Gehlke, Conley and Christ.

"Leadership this year will definitely lie on their shoulders," Gregory said of her seniors. "Along with

Roberta, Charlene has played very well for us. And with Michelle, they are all going to be a very important part to our success this year."

However, aside from their seniors, the Gauchos also tap talent from their youth. Freshman outside hitter Brooke Niles currently leads Santa Barbara in hitting percentage.

"Brooke Niles has been a very important factor to our success," Gregory said. "She's been consistent and is hitting .333. For a freshman, that is just outstanding."

Harder for Gauchos to Win at Harder Stadium

The UCSB women's soccer team opened a four-game homestand at Harder Stadium this past weekend, with games against Westmont and Cal State Northridge. Before last Friday, Santa Barbara had a record of 2-2-1 and a two-game winning streak after downing Western Illinois 5-0, and Idaho State 2-1 on a recent road trip.

However, UCSB's offense was held in check over the entire weekend, and the Gauchos were edged in all of the games. Although Santa Barbara didn't score in any of the games and dropped each contest by a score of 1-0, UCSB Head Coach Paul Stumpf sees many positives in the way his team has been performing thus far in the season.

"We've clearly made progress in our games since last season," Stumpf said. "This season we're dominating teams we didn't dominate last season. Even in our losses this weekend, we outshot both teams — our shots just didn't go in."

One reason for the Gauchos' success has been the play of forward Tiffany Dawson. The sophomore leads UCSB both in goals (four) and overall points (eight), and is one of Santa Barbara's main offensive threats.

"We started really well," Dawson said. "But we struggled last weekend big time. We had a bunch of scoring opportunities, but we just didn't put any of them away. But we're a totally different team from last year. We get plenty of shots on goal, and our defense is more solid."

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Poloists Break Even at USC Tourney

Although the Pepperdine Waves visited Campus Pool on Sept. 11, the UCSB men's water polo team did all the crashing, winning its season opener against the Waves 12-10.

Sophomore playmaker Amit Seker led the Gauchos with six goals, and currently leads Santa Barbara with a total of nine goals and 11 points.

With a first win under their belts, the Gauchos (3-2 overall) traveled to USC to take part in the 13-team Southern California Tournament on Sept. 18 and 19. In its first game of the tourney, Santa Barbara faced the University of the Pacific and fell prey to the Tigers, losing the game 6-5. With the Gauchos ahead 5-4 in the fourth quarter, the Tigers' Chris Lund scored two goals, including the go-ahead goal with 1:41 left to play.

"Against UOP, we had chances to win," UCSB Head Coach Joe O'Brien said. "We just misfired on our shots and played uninspired."

Junior 2-meter player Tom Coughlan led UCSB with two goals. Junior goalie Trevor Spence also racked up 10 saves in

the Gaucho loss.

UCSB battled #1 USC later on that day and would also come up short against the Trojans in another tight game, losing 7-5. The game was tied at five apiece late in the fourth quarter when the Trojans' Ivan Babic scored with 3:48 left to play. USC would score once more in the fourth for the final tally.

"We played pretty strong that game," said junior driver Joey Pacelli. "But in the last quarter, it just seemed that we had a sort of three-minute lapse."

Seker, sophomore playmaker Scott Miller and sophomore 2-meter player Patrick Treman all scored one goal apiece for the Gauchos. Senior 2-meter player Chris Driscoll also scored one two-point goal. Spence garnered 13 saves for UCSB.

On the final day of the tourney, Santa Barbara faced UC Davis and came away with a 9-5 victory. Coughlan led the Gauchos' offense with two goals. Santa Barbara also handed Navy a 13-2 thrashing in its last game of the SoCal Tourney.

"We played real well that game," Coughlan said. "Everyone got a chance to play and get into the game. I think the team is coming along well and we've been improving with every game."

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
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


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Daily Nexus Sports Quiz

The '99 Gaucho team has shown great potential, even this early in the season. After going winless in their first three games, Santa Barbara squared off against Western Illinois Sept. 1. The team responded strongly to its early season adversity and blew the Leathernecks out, 5-0. Five different Gauchos scored in the victory that has easily become the highlight of the '99 season.

"Western Illinois was our best game by far," Stumpf said. "We scored five times, and took only 15 shots. It was obvious that the quality of play from the team was just much better for us in that game."

This weekend the Gauchos hope to build on the success they enjoyed before their current home-stand, with games on Friday and Sunday. Santa Barbara takes on Boise State and then Idaho, the Gauchos' first two Big West conference games of the season. Last season UCSB went 1-1 against the two schools, and Stumpf is confident his squad will perform well against them this time around.

"We beat Boise State and were edged out by Idaho last year," Stumpf said. "But both games were pretty evenly matched. I can't guarantee a victory, but I think we match up well against both teams."

Although the Gauchos have lost four games this season, UCSB has lost by

just one goal in three of those four games, and as they continue to improve they might soon find themselves on the front end of such close contests.

"I expect us to do well," Stumpf said of the remainder of UCSB's schedule. "We've just got to learn to not only dominate teams but put them away, too."

Junior April Loveland agreed, echoing the confidence of both her coach and her teammates about the upcoming games against the Idaho schools.

"We're expecting two wins," the fullback said. "We're confident in ourselves. The team has improved a lot since last year, and we've been playing good defense and dominating our games."




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Gaucha Soccer Team Off to Impressive Start

The UCSB men's soccer team defeated Sacramento State and St. Mary's in a northern California road trip this past weekend. The Gauchos (5-2), under the direction of Head Coach Tim Vom Steeg, won both games 3-1 and will return to Santa Barbara for an away game Friday versus local rival Westmont.


Santa Barbara has already doubled its home-win total from last year. The Gauchos, who went 1-10-1 at home last season, are currently 2-0 at home with victories over Cal Poly and Denver. The victory over Cal Poly, the Gauchos' home opener, was senior goalkeeper Stewart Sander's eighth career shutout.

Much of UCSB's success can be attributed to the play of Santa Barbara City College transfer Jaime Ambriz. Earlier in the season the Gauchos participated in the Coors Rebel Shootout in Las Vegas. The Gauchos went 1-1 in that tournament, defeating West Virginia 3-2 and losing to Kentucky 5-1. In those two games Ambriz scored three goals, had one assist and was named Best Offensive Player of the tournament.

This season's Gauchos are a very young team, with five times as many underclassmen as seniors on its roster. The team returns to Harder Stadium this Sunday, for a game against UC Irvine at 3 p.m.




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
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In compliance with the State and University of California guidelines for implementation of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), this Notice of Preparation is to inform the public agencies and the general public that the University of California Santa Barbara is preparing a Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) and LRDP Amendment for the above named project.

The proposed Engineering-Science Building will consist of approximately 59,500 assignable square feet (asf), or approximately 102,600 gross square feet (gsf). The facility will include classroom space, instructional laboratories, scholarly activity and research, and faculty and administrative space. The building will consist of three elements, clean rooms, generic dry laboratories, offices and meeting/teaching spaces. The proposed location of the Engineering-Science Building is on the east side of the Main Campus in proximity to the existing Engineering II building. The project site is designated for Academic Uses in the LRDP.
