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
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# **Know Your Neighbors F.M. Interview with a Dancing Man**

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
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
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#### F.M. Presents: Your First Week of School as a Computer Flow Chart

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




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#### Student Caught in Loop!

R: They seem to be more conservative, like, like they all got short hair, and they all look clean.


**F.M.:** Do people treat you differently because of your appearance?

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#### **EXISTENTIAL?**







The guy was a marksman. It was

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
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
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
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
