

UCSB Soccer Team Is Stayin' Alive With a Conference Win Santa Barbara Hands New Mexico a 1-0 Defeat at Harder

The UCSB men's soccer team may have been knocked down momentarily in its hunt for a playoff birth over the course of the weekend's play, but by no means was it knocked out.

The Gauchos (11-4-1 overall, 3-3 Mountain Pacific Sports Federation) suffered a heartbreaking 2-1 overtime loss to UNLV at Johann Memorial Field in Las Vegas on Friday, but returned home to Harder Stadium on Sunday to de-feat a pesky University of

New Mexico team, 1-0. The Runnin' Rebels' Brian Wilson scored the game-winning goal on a penalty shot after Santa Barbara senior defender Jeff Johnson was called on a controversial hand-ball in the penalty box in the seventh minute of overtime. Johnson and the rest

of the Gauchos immediately contested the call, in-sisting that the ball hit his shoulder, rather than the hand. Unfortunately, the referee stood firm on his

call. "Taking away all the excuses, I thought we played well enough to win, well enough that we should have gotten a better result than a loss," said UCSB Head Coach Mark Arya. "We created several good scoring opportunities that we just didn't quite get the handle on."

The Gauchos found the back of the net first in the 13th minute of play on a header goal from junior midfielder Ryan

Schomberg. "I played the ball out to Jeff Johnson and he beat his man on the wing and then crossed it," Schomberg said. "I came across the middle and headed it to the far post."

UNLV tied the score at one all early in the second half when Rebel James Mitchell launched a header past diving freshman Gaucho keeper Stewart Sanders.

UCSB entered the overtime period short-handed as sophomore forward Danny Mann received his second yellow card at the 88th minute. To make matters worse, the Gauchos lost another man minutes into overtime, when Johnson was given a red card for his intentional

hand-ball in the penalty box.

"There were definitely some questionable calls," Sanders said. "Since we were only playing with nine men in the overtime, we had to step it up to a higher level. We still had our chances, but just didn't finish."

UCSB coaches were concerned about how the Gauchos would handle the loss to UNLV.

"A loss like that is very devastating," Arya said, "partly because we know what ramifications it has for us as far as playoff po-tential, as well as guaranteeing us a spot in the top two in the MPSF.

"But the biggest thing, regardless of what it does to the standings, is what it does to you emotionally, when you know that you're playing well enough to win and you don't get that result. That in itself makes you ques-tion what you have to do to win. We felt that we were the better team that makes it even more difficult, more hard to justify.'

Santa Barbara bounced back into the playoff picture by handing the Lobos of New Mexico a 1-0 loss in a sluggish Sunday afternoon game.

"I thought we played well enough to win the match," Arya said. "We're dealing with a sick team right now, a lot of players

Gaucho Spikers Take 11th Straight Victory With a Sweep of Fullerton

With its 11th straight win, the #11 UCSB women's volleyball team moved one step closer to its all-time winning streak record of 13 straight wins with a sweep of Cal State Fullerton Saturday night in the Events Center, 15-7, 15-7, 15-3. Although the Gauchos (17-4 overall, 10-0 in the Big West) were heavily favored to beat the Titans (7-15, 0-10), Santa Barbara Head Coach Kathy Gregory couldn't have been happier about her team's latest victory. "I know I say this all of the time, but it is really hard to get motivated to play games you're supposed to win and play well," Gregory said. "We started off tentative, but we ended up playing very well. For this match, it was more important for us to play well than anything else because we have to be ready for Long Beach next weekend. The #13 UCSB men's water polo team watched its road to the playoffs grow longer this weekend as the squad dropped two Mountain Pacific Sports Federation matches. Santa Barbara fell to Pepperdine, 9-8, Friday and then were stopped by Long Beach State on

With 11 digs, McCown headed up the defense for the Gauchos, but as usual, three seniors, Tammy Stiner, Kim Keys and Jennifer Kaylor, led the offense and blocking. Keys pounded out a game-high 14 kills at a .385 hitting percentage — while making five blocks, including one solo. Kaylor, secondranked in hitting percentage in the Big West, continued to show incredible accuracy, tallying nine kills at .692.

With perhaps the strongest all-around performance, Stiner hammered out 10 kills at .563,

Saturday, 13-11. Friday's contest in Malibu was a battle between evenly matched schools until the very end. The #6 Waves (8-7 overall, 2-3 in MPSF) jumped on the board first, taking a 2-0 lead after the first period.

The Gauchos (6-13 overall, 1-5 in MPSF) answered back in the second quarter scoring three, including senior driver Kevin Eggert's two-point goal. However, Pepperdine was also able to put three shots in the UCSB cage and led 5-3 heading into the second half.

Both teams struggled offensively in the third quarter with the Waves scoring only two points to Santa Barbara's one. Trailing 7-4 with just 6:19 remaining in the contest, the Gauchos began to mount a comeback as junior driver Tyler Rameson netted a shot behind Pepperdine goalkeeper Vatche Shirkjian — trimming the Wave lead to just two. Less than a minute later UCSB tied the score at 7-7, when freshman two-meter man Donny Hooper connected on a twopoint shot — his fifth goal of the year.

Pepperdine quickly broke the tie when senior driver Sean Lane scored at the 5:15 mark. However, Santa Barbara answered back with a goal by sopho"The game was going to overtime," said UCSB Head Coach Joe O'Brien. "The players didn't do anything [wrong]. It's very disappointing."

Saturday, UCSB tried to rebound against #7 Long Beach State. The 49ers used their size advantage and excellent goaltending on their way to a 13-11 win.

"Long Beach plays around their hole man, and that's not our style of play," Scholten said.

Santa Barbara did score the first goal of the contest and led 1-0. The lead was short, however, as Long Beach (7-8 overall, 2-4 in MPSF) tallied three firstperiod points and took the lead for good.

On the other side of the ball, the Gaucho offense was once again firing at full power as UCSB was able to score in double digits for the ninth time this season. Eggert was able to add to his teamhigh scoring total as he notched five goals — giving him 48 points so far this year. Also scoring for Santa Barbara was Estabrook (3), Scholten (2) and Rameson.


