### "Of Thee I Sing" Continues Riviera Run This Week

**Parr, Maher, Dahl Keen in Lead Roles Of Gershwin Musical**

The student production of Geo. Gershwin's "Of Thee I Sing," a musical comedy on a grand scale, opened Wednesday night for a four-night run in the Riviera Auditorium. The principals in the cast for the Wednesday and Friday night productions include Dave Swain, Shirley Newlin, Barbara York, and Tom Keen, while the principal roles for Thursday and Saturday nights include Robert Parr, Clair Maher, Dolores Dahl, and Tom Keen.

From the first note of the ultra-modernistic orchestra overture to the last note of the dynamic finale, the show is a rollicking satire on American political life. The plot is centered about John P. Wintergreen's campaign for the Presidency, which he wins by proposing to Mary Turner in every state in the Union. Dave Swain as Wintergreen and Shirley Newlin as Mary are persistently proclaiming their love for each other throughout the play.

Dire complications arise when Wintergreen refuses to marry Diana Devereaux, the winner of the Atlantic City bathing beauty contest. Barbara York was very convincing as the jilted Diana, and pouted prettily scene after scene.

#### Keen Acting

Probably the most Dickensian character was Throttlebottom, the meek little Vice-President who runs around wearing a black raincoat and carrying a black umbrella. Tom Keen is fascinating in this part and practically steals the show.

Among the minor roles, Del Jean Palmer deserves a big bouquet for her performance as the maid in the first scene. Ted Shank should also be praised for his acting in the supporting role of Wintergreen's campaign manager.

Bob McCole as Jenkins and Carolyn Steiner as Miss Benson, private secretaries of "Mr. and Mrs. President," made a cute comedy team for the song and dance numbers.

### "Bear-Like" Change Favored; "Cubs" Get Support on Ballot

Majority of the students are in favor of changing their nickname from Gauchos to something else—preferably something "bearlike." That fact seemed evident as the results of a campus opinion poll were tallied yesterday. Of the 43 ballots returned, 25 were in favor of scrapping the name Gaucho, and 154 voted to retain it.

Of the suggested changes, Cubs got the most support with 136 ayes. Bearcubs got 34 votes, Grizzlies 31, and Pandas came up with 22.

Miscellaneous suggestions were Sea Bear (C-bears), Golden Wave, Teddy Bears, Honey Bears, Goleatians, Bearcats and Oso (Spanish for bear).

This poll resulted in almost the identical count as the election last spring in which Gaucho supporters won out by a plurality. There has been a continuous undercurrent of tal about changing the nickname since the campus joined the University of California family in 1944. In an election in 1945 between Gauchos and Cubs the Spanish name won by a small margin.

Santa Barbara has used the name Gauchos since the early thirties when it was changed from Roadrunners.

er from Occidental 37-33. Last week they copped high honors in the Redlands tournament by clipping dint of their winning ways in the Redlands affair, the Gauchos will compete in the Los Angeles Tourney next week at Pan-Pacific Auditorium.

Tonight's game will feature 23 of Santa Barbara's greatest basketball players over a period of the past fifteen years. Nine first-string and second-string all-conference members grace the Alumni's roster. Three members of the alumni squad are playing for the semi-pro Santa Maria Dukes—Quinton Simms, Bob Sherman, Harvey Hubbler, and Charlie Jones. Hubbler was the most valuable player in the 1947-48 season, and was all-conference in 1946-47 and 1947-48. Quinton Simms was all-conference for three years from 1946 to 1949.

Tom Guerro, voted the most valuable hoop man in the 1939-40 and 1940-41 campaigns will coach the alumni. Guerro made Little All-America and second-string All-America team of 1940.

Pacing the Varsity will be Center Bob McCutcheon, named most valuable player in the Redlands tourney, who is averaging 15 points per game. Forward Gene Snyder trails closely behind "Mac" with 12 digits. Bernie Fox, who keeps company with Snyder at the other forward post, has a total of 26 tallies in the four games played.

Huddy Scott and Nick Fasola, two fast-stepping guards round out the Santa Barbara Hilltopper team.

### DEAN ANNOUNCES SORORITY GRADES

Announcement of the scholastic status of the sororities on the Santa Barbara campus for the year 1948-49 has been made by Dean Sweet. Phi Kappa Gamma leads the other sororities with its year's grade-point average of 1.585. In recognition of this accomplishment, the sorority was awarded a trophy earlier this year at Homecoming. In second and third places respectively are Gamma Delta Chi averaging 1.510, and Delta Sigma Epsilon 1.426 (plus 2 units incomplete). Following these groups are Sigma Delta Phi, 1.420; Alpha Theta Chi, 1.397 (plus 2 points incomplete); Tau Gamma Sigma, 1.370; Chi Delta Chi, 1.357; and Delta Zeta Delta, 1.327.

The status of the sororities for the Spring semester 1949 indicated that Phi Kappa Gamma, with a 1.616 grade average is first, followed by Gamma Delta Chi, 1.602, second; and Chi Delta Chi, 1.411, third. Next in rank scholastically are Sigma Delta Phi, 1.405; Delta Sigma Epsilon, 1.382 (plus 2 units incomplete); Tau Gamma Sigma, 1.366; Delta Zeta Delta, 1.329; Alpha Theta Chi, 1.322 (plus 2 units incomplete).

At the beginning of next semester, the name Gaucho will be put to the test once and for all, at an official campus election. Only two names will be on the ballot (according to present tentative plans) and the issue will be settled.

Thanks to Dick Johnson, slippery Gaucho halfback, Santa Barbara's footballers edged their opponents in two departments, punt returns and kickoff returns, in the final statistics issued from George Obern's Office of Information recently. Johnson led Gaucho scorers with 24 points and was second in rushing with a 3.0 average per game.

Russ Bertell, named on the All-2C2A squad for honorable mention, carried the pigskin 55 times for 253 yards and a 4.6 average to garner top rushing honors among Gaucho backs. Dick Gorrie threw four touchdown passes, but Glenn Mullaney had a better record for completions with 42 out of 82 for a 51 per cent average.

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## Open Letter

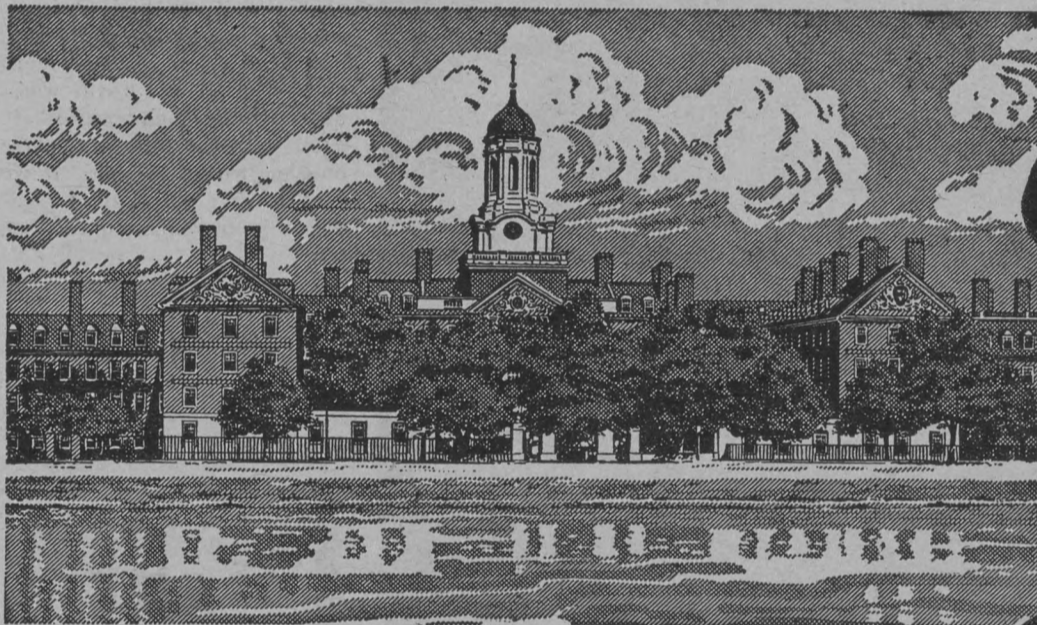
Dear Gals,

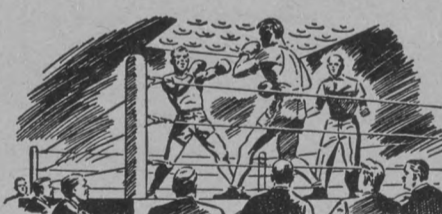
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## Major Ed Wall, Harvard, '40 -Flying Executive, U.S. Air Force!



Born in Newark, N. J., he moved to Boston at an early age, graduated from the public Latin high school in 1936, entered Harvard the same year, where he majored in economics and government.
