## New Librarian Assumes Authority As College Expands Book Supply

Appointment of Dr. Donald C. Davidson, formerly librarian at the University of Redlands, as head librarian at Santa Barbara College was announced recently by Dr. J. Harold Williams, acting Provost.

The new librarian, a native of Canada and an authority in Western history, is the first man to serve in this position at the college. He succeeds Katherine F. Ball, who has resigned.

### ANNEX PLANNED

In the immediate future, according to Dr. Williams, the library will have an annex in a temporary study hall to be erected soon near Ridge Hall. The present reorganization plans at the library include the replacing of seldom-used books with new books which are needed and for which funds are available.

Assisting Dr. Davidson in the reorganization will be the Faculty Library Committee, of which Dr. MacKenzie Brown is chairman.

### MILITARY LEAVE

Dr. Davidson was granted military leave while at the University of Redlands, serving in the Sixth Infantry Division for three years, in New Guinea, the Phillipines, and Korea. He was awarded the Soldier's Medal for rescuing two Americans from drowning in Lingayen Gulf, and a Bronze Star for meritorious duty.

A native of Vancouver, British Columbia, Dr. Davidson was graduated from the University of California at Berkeley where he received his Ph.D. degree in 1937, writing a dissertation on the Alaskan-Canadian Boundary.

## Part-Time Tasks Under Men's Dean Listed in Office

Part-time jobs for men students attending Santa Barbara College are available in very limited quantities, announces Mrs. Raupach, college director of men's employment.

The scripts will be given without gestures or scenery, with the emphasis placed on expressive reading.

In contrast to former summer sessions when the plays were performed by faculty members, this summer's program will be by volunteer students. Admission is free and all students are invited to come.

## Psychological Tests Aid Remedial Work In Clinical School

The clinical school for pupils of average or better-than-average intellectual ability, who are retarded in the skill subjects of reading, spelling, and arithmetic, has once again been established at Santa Barbara College.

The staff is under the direction of Constance Chandler, Ph. D., who is clinical psychologist and Coordinator of Research and Guidance for the Ventura County schools. Dr. Chandler will be assisted by Mrs. Charlotte Morrison, B. S., M. S., remedial reading specialist in LaCumbre Junior High School, Santa Barbara; Miss Ada Simpson, B. S., remedial reading specialist for the Ventura City schools; and Mrs. Hattie Maguire, A. B., Montecito Union Elementary School.

### NEW METHODS USED

The psychological methods employed will be adapted to the needs of the individual students but will emphasize the kinaesthetic approach to learning as developed by Drs. Grace M. Fernald and Ellen B. Sullivan of the University of California at Los Angeles.

As an aid to diagnosing learning difficulties, complete clinical studies will be made of each individual. Tests of hearing, vision, speech, memory achievement, intelligence, diagnostic reading, and personality will be included. Parent conferences will be welcomed, and reports on each student's work will be mailed soon after the close of the summer session.

## First Summer Hop Held at Rec

The first big dance of the Santa Barbara College summer social season will be held at 9 p.m. tonight at the Recreation Center on Carrillo Street, according to Graduate Manager Bill Russell in charge of arrangements.

Associated Students Cards may be purchased in the Graduate Manager's Office in Ebbet's Hall at any time during the day.

Music for the dance will be furnished by Herb Fredlund's Orchestra, and Herb announces that they will have a vocalist. Arrangements had not as yet been completed regarding the decorations, nor had the theme been announced by press time on Wednesday.

## College Speech Clinic Open to Applicants

A speech and hearing clinic to work in conjunction with the remedial school has been set up on the campus, according to Dr. John C. Snidecor, head of the Speech Department.

The clinic will deal with children from four to fourteen years of age. A limited number of students of high school and college age will be accepted. Students enrolled for remedial speech and hearing may enroll in the clinical school without additional charge.

The new organization is under the direction of Dr. John C. Snidecor, Chairman of the Department of Speech, and Fellow in the American Speech Correction Association. He will be assisted by Mr. Richard Post, Kern County Speech Correctionist, and by Mrs. Ruth R. Davis, Santa Barbara College graduate student.

**On Air-Age Classes  
Nosy Gaucho Reports**

Since I am practically the only reporter "El Gaucho" has this semester, I am scouting around like a real news-hawk Saturday when I run into this guy in the library.

He is sitting behind a table, and a bunch of guys are leaning over the table talking to him. It is registration day, and I almost immediately figure out that the guy must be a teacher, especially when there is a sign in front of him which says, "Mr. Shaut." The peculiar thing about this bunch of guys gathered around is that they are all waving their arms and making noises like airplanes and each trying to talk faster than any of the rest. I walk over to where I can listen.

"An' this stupid jerk," one of the guys is saying, "an' this stupid jerk gets himself looking down the gun barrel on the sub, an' before he can even radio for help the sub blasts him right out of the sky. We pick up most of the crew a few days later, but . . ."

"Pardon me," I say, "but are all you guys registering for a course? All but you, that is," I say, pointing to Mr. Shaut behind his desk.

"We were discussing the class I am teaching this session," he replies; "and who are you?" I introduce myself and say I am looking for a story for El Gaucho and maybe this is it. And then I ask him what kind of a class is this which just has a bunch of guys swapping sea stories.

"We were discussing my air-age education class, which is regrettably misnamed Aircraft Workshop," he answers. By this time, as is usually the case when I drop in on a group, the guys are beginning to drift away, and pretty soon Mr. Shaut and I are alone at the table.

"The air-age is having a terrific impact on society," states Mr. Shaut, glad to see that I am not a hangar flier; "It is important that we are flying today. The air-age has not only changed our thoughts and habits regarding methods of transportation, but it has also changed our concept of geography. We in America are accustomed to seeing our country in the middle of a map, with a huge ocean on each side, but when we look at our country on

a globe we see that our great fortress of Pearl Harbor is no more between us and Asia than Australia is. The Aleutian Dutch Harbor is much nearer the American-Asia highway."

"Gee," I answer, "I never thought of it that way. Is that the kind of stuff you teach in your class?"

"That's a rough idea of the type of thing we talk about," he answers. "It is really a sort of laboratory course. We are going to use a Link Trainer and show how this type of equipment can be utilized in aviation training. We expect to have some lively discussions; there are several ex-fliers enrolled, some of them with wide experience in various fields. We'd like to have all the guys on the campus who are interested in aviation drop in and see us, whether they can enroll in the course or not."

"That sounds swell," I say; "how about me? I used to be a blimp pilot . . . can I come too?"

"I said AVIATION," he answers, "but you may come." This stops me. I change the subject and ask Mr. Shaut where he's from and how come he is teaching this class.

He replies that he is Stanley A. Shaut of Baldwin, Long Island, New York. He was graduated from the State Teachers College in Oswego, N. Y., with a Bachelor of Science degree in Education and later got a Master's degree from N. Y. U.

He was a pilot in the Navy's first land-based squadron (the one of Mason's "sighted sub, sank same" fame) and chased subs in the North Atlantic and Caribbean.

This is all I can get out of him.

**First National Gaucho Frat Holds Installation Dinner**

**Veterans Corner**

Important information for veterans attending Santa Barbara College will appear in this column and in this portion of the "El Gaucho" each week. Vets should watch this space for announcements.

FAILURE to take at least 4 units of study during each summer session will deprive the veteran of his subsistence, warns C. Douglas Woodhouse, coordinator of college veteran's affairs. Some vets have not been observing this regulation.

PURCHASE of duplicate items with the veteran's white book cards during any one semester will cause a bill of recompensation from the college to be instigated, or the possible suspension of the vet's subsistence, as a penalty.

A NEW loose leaf binder is permitted veterans each semester, it is revealed.

VETERANS who have registered without their certificates of eligibility must obtain them at once or subsistence will be discontinued or retarded for an indefinite period of time.

TRANSFERRING veterans should notify the college vet's office of their change of college at least two weeks in advance of the move to insure proper book-keeping of records and subsistence allowances.

**3:30 P. M.—SWIMMING MEET.** Events for all swimmers at Municipal Pool, West Beach.  
 Awards: Gold, silver and bronze Semana Nautica medals for men, women and open winners. Ribbon awards for three places in all other events.  
 Entry Fee: No entry fee other than regular admission to the pool. Entries close at 3:15 p.m. at the pool, July 5.

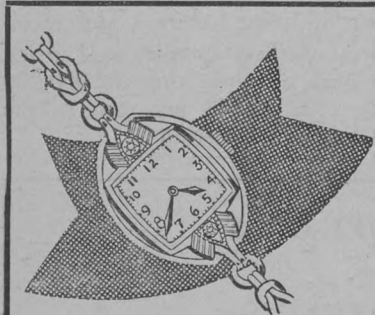

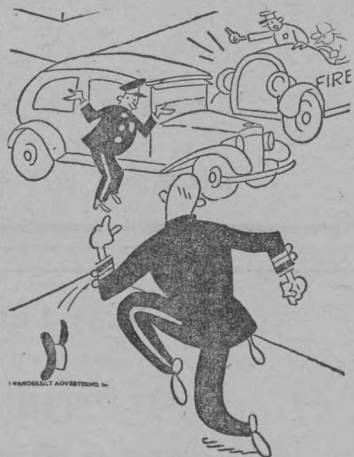
