"MEET THE WHEELS" TOMORROW

LIBERAL, APPLIED ARTS TWO-DIVISIONAL SET-UP STARTS THIS SEMESTER

GREATEST EFFECT ON LOWER CLASSES

Deans for the newly-created divisions of applied arts and liberal arts at Santa Barbara College last week began work on curriculum organization changes which are expected to have a far-reaching influence on the local branch of the University of California.

Dr. A. Russell Buchanan was approved by the Board of Regents in Berkeley as Dean of the Liberal Arts Division and Dr. John C. Snidecor as Dean of the Applied Arts Division. Both have been prominent on the local campus and are widely known in the field of higher education.

Greater freedom will be provided in the announced goal of creating a model liberal arts institution here, but within the framework of a single general college.

Effective in Fall

The two divisional organization of the college will become effective this fall, although students who have reached their Junior year will probably find little change, the greater impact being felt in the first and second year enrollments.

Liberal Arts Committee

Dr. Buchanan in his new capacity will serve as administrative officer for the liberal arts program of the college and as chairman of the liberal arts advisory committee, which will include Dr. Elmer R. Noble, Chairman of the Department of Biological Sciences; Dr. George Hand, Associate Professor of English; Dr. William F. Aggeler, Chairman of Foreign Languages and Dr. Alma P. Beaver, Associate Professor of Psychology.

Dr. Snidecor will be administrator for applied arts and chairman of an advisory committee, including E. E. Erickson, Professor of Industrial Arts; Dr. Edna D. Meshke, Chairman of the Home Economics Department; Dr. Lester B. Sands, Associate Professor of Education and Dr. Walter Buchanan, Assistant Professor of Music.

The establishment of two divisions is one of two important transformation steps being taken by the College, the other being a move to Goleta, probably in the Fall of 1949.

The student mail boxes have been moved to roomier surroundings on the opposite side of the quad, along the wall reaching from the Housing Office along the front of the AWS Room to the entrance to the Science Offices.

Big Sisters Set to Help New Femmes

Before the close of the spring semester a group of student-women volunteers, known as "Big Sisters," wrote to women who had been accepted as UCSB freshmen. These new students, known as "Little Sisters," are to be, upon their arrival at Santa Barbara, taken under the wings of their big sisters.

Some duties of this organization are to receive and welcome new women students, help them to unpack, show them the campus and town and help them to register. These services do not end with the turning in of registration books, however, but continue throughout the entire school year.

There will be an important meeting of the Big and Little Sisters on Thursday, Sept. 16, at 1 pm in the Auditorium.

A table will be placed on the gym lawn on registration day for little sisters who have not yet been appointed big sisters and vice versa or for those sisters who have lost one another.

Bookstore Staff Doubles Strength

Increased to over double its normal strength, the staff of the college book store is in good shape to handle the heavy task of selling an expected 18,000 volumes during the course of this week, according to Harold Cole, manager of the store.

The prospect of getting books is brighter than it has been since the pre-war days. Publishers have filled all orders, and only in the event that the classes are larger than anticipated by the instructor will students be forced to wait for their books.

In addition to handling books, the book store is also well stocked with stationery supplies, special home economics, arts and industrial arts kits, candy, tobacco and miscellaneous incidentals.

Football Tickets Available at Russell's Office

In order to avoid congestion at home football games it has been urged by Bill Russell, graduate manager, that students purchase tickets prior to game time.

The twenty-five cent student tickets may be purchased at the graduate manager's office (next to the cafeteria) upon presentation of student body cards. Tickets for guests are also available in that office.

Compliance with this request will enable students to obtain the more desirable seats at La Playa field and end the necessity of standing in line while the game is underway.

BEANIES-RIBBONS, LATEST FASHION FOR FROSH CLASS

On September 20 freshmen will resume the observance of an old college tradition—the men will wear beanies and the women ribbons.

These traditional symbols of the intellectual tenderfoot shall be sported until the freshman-sophomore mud brawl on Oct. 8. If the freshmen emerge as victors in the fray, the beanies and ribbons shall no longer be required.

If, however, the sophomores win, then the hapless frosh shall continue to wear their symbols until the Santa Barbara-San Diego football game on Nov. 20.

Beanies and ribbons may be purchased in the registration line.

The Santa Barbara College Social Committee has taken great pains to assure new and returning students a warm welcome. The weekend preceding school is studied with events designed to make students better acquainted with college life and fellow students.

One of the first social events will be the AMS-AWS student-faculty picnic at Oak Park at which time the students will meet the faculty members.

The Rally at the Goleta Airport will send our football team off to Oregon where for the first time Santa Barbara College will compete with one of the nation's lead-grid squads.

Friday night there will be a stag howdy dance at the Carillo Auditorium. This no-date affair is slated to begin at 9:00.

The above are but three of many events planned by the social committee to start off the new semester. All students are urged to attend as many of the affairs as possible in order to start the new term in the right spirit.

'Bible' Set as A Frosh 'Must'

Phil Jacks, El Gaucho sports editor, has edited a Freshman Bible which will soon be on sale.

The "bible" will contain information necessary for new students, rules and regulations, school songs and cheers, and miscellaneous information.

All frosh men are urged to attend the annual overnight outing sponsored by the Gold Key, senior men's national honorary fraternity. The outing is to be held on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 18 and 19, at Camp Drake.

A car caravan will leave the school at 2 pm and will arrive at Camp Drake in time for a Saturday afternoon sports program. In the evening there will be a huge feed followed by entertainment, at which time each of the freshmen will introduce himself.

Following Sunday breakfast there will be a morning swim, and then the group will return to Santa Barbara.

This outing, which has been quite successful in the past, is designed to acquaint the freshmen with the student body officers, members of the faculty, and their fellow students.

All Time, All High Expected With New Enrollment

An expected enrollment of some 28000 students this fall will mark a new record for Santa Barbara College. Last year's peak of 2650, the record to that date, is well under this year's all time all high.

About 1500 new students have already been accepted, and new requests have been coming in all the time.

Registrar Jerry H. Clark has promised a new, well-organized registration procedure which will eliminate most of the tedious waiting lines and long delays.

Dr. Clark Assumes Registrar Duties

Dr. Jerry H. Clark, manager of the Vocational Guidance Center in Santa Barbara became Registrar of UCSB on July 1, succeeding Dr. Lester B. Sands, who will assume full-time duties as associate professor of education.

Dr. Clark is a native of Texas and began his college work in that state at Southern Methodist University, where he completed the AM and MA degrees. Later he earned the PhD degree in psychology at the University of Texas. After a short business career in Texas, Dr. Clark served in the United States Army as personnel consultant and clinical psychologist, leaving the services with the rank of captain. During the past year he has been identified with the Vocational Guidance Center, organized cooperatively by the Veterans Administration and the University of California Extension.

In addition to his duties as Registrar, Dr. Clark will serve as director of admission and ex-officio secretary of the faculty.

For the first time in the college's history, the Gaucho football squad will travel by chartered airline service, according to an announcement by Graduate Manager Bill Russell. Western Airlines will provide Coach Stan Williamson's team with chartered service to the University of Oregon game to be played September 18 in Eugene.

Tentative itinerary calls for departure from the Goleta airport at 10:00 am Friday, September 17, arriving at Eugene after a non-stop flight. The squad will probably take a light work-out Friday afternoon on the Oregon gridiron. Return trip will be made after the game, with the team arriving home at 10:15 Saturday night.

Western airlines has assured first class service for the 33 players, Coaches Williamson and Keliher, Trainer Gill, and the team manager.

GaUCHO-Webfoot Fray at Eugene

The 1948 football season gets underway this Saturday when the Santa Barbara Gauchos play the University of Oregon at Eugene. Head Coach Stan Williamson has named a squad of 33 men to make the northern trek, and the team will depart by airplane this Friday morning. The Ducks will rule as strong favorites against the Gauchos, but the boys in Blue and Gold will be in there fighting every minute.

The Gauchos this year have picked a tough, long row to hoe—the toughest games in the history of the school—and the first 10-game schedule in as many years.

20 Lettermen

After looking over the list of 20 returning lettermen and a couple of handfulls of newcomers, the coaching staff rates this year's squad slightly better than last year's. The hardest blow to the squad is the graduation loss of Jack Miller, defensive fullback and long distance punter, and John Daniels, 1946 all-conference center. Both of these men are assisting Coach Williamson and his Assistant "Doc" Kelliher whip the squad into form on the coaching staff this year.

Brightest prospect of the season is the return of Sam Cathcart, all-CCAA halfback last year, who will be back to better his 10 touchdown record of last year. Cathcart underwent an ankle operation a few weeks before football practice which may slow him down a bit in the early part of the season. His average trip with the ball last year was worth almost six yards.

Another halfback who will get plenty of ball carrying duty this year is Kenny Duddridge, who has much of the same style of running as Cathcart. Duddridge averaged slightly under five yards per try last year.

Members Needed on Social Committee

Shirley Hillis, chairman of Student Body Social Committee, invites all interested students to serve with her in approving and planning dances and other social functions. Decorating the place at which the affairs will be held is another service offered by this committee.

Initial Dance On Friday

The social affair to mark the opening of the Fall semester will be the Howdy Dance to be held at the Carrillo Auditorium on Friday, Sept. 17, 9-12 pm.

The dance, sponsored by the student body social committee, will be a stag affair, free of charge, and strictly informal.

Recordings of the nation's top orchestras will supply the music and the dance is expected to enjoy the huge success it has for so many years.



Dozen Halfbacks

In all, there are almost a dozen halfbacks fighting for the starting berths, half of which lettered last year. Earl Engman, defensive wizard, is almost certain to man one of the halfback spots on defense, and will also do his share of the ball carrying. The other half of the Cathcart family, Royal, has been showing up well during practice, and seems to be ready to roll this season. Billy Steele and Tommy White, who lettered last season at quarterback, have been shifted to the half slot, and have been working well.

The quarterbacking is much healthier this year with Glenn Mullaney as the outstanding prospect. Mullaney began to click toward the close of the season last year, and is going right on from there. His passing is good, and he is very cool on the field. To back up Mullaney are such men as Dick Gorrie, a transfer from Pasadena City College, Knute Clark from Santa Monica CC, and Jim Taylor, who also claims Pasadena as his alma mater. Darkhorse of the QB's is Quentin Sims, twice second string all-conference basketball guard, who is out for football for the first time since his high school days.

At fullback we find co-captain Sam Dimas, Mel Patton, and ex-quarterback Bill French, all letter winners. Dimas is a hard worker both on offense and defense. Patton last year ran two kickoffs all the way and increased his speed even more with a season of track. French has made the change to full very rapidly, and can be counted on to carry his share of the burden. Newcomer Jack Nelson rounds out the fullback prospects.

Line Depth

The line shows more depth this year than last, according to Williamson who has been working closely with the forward wall. At the ends are four returning lettermen, all capable of offense and defense. The drills so far show Fred Lloyd, Russ Wenzlau, Bernie Paulson and Al Katich as capable receivers. Bob Baker and Dick Pakilla, both big men, are giving the monogram winners a run for their money.

The squad lost all but two lettering tackles, Max Pickarts and Bob Woolridge, through graduation. Les Reed saw limited action last year and is ready for the new season. Wayne Templeton, 196 pounder, is making a strong bid for one of the starting berths.

At guard we find lettermen George Crilley, Joe Rossi and Cy Williams, all big, strong and fast. Some of the newcomers are making it hot for these men. Among them are Bill Brozowski, Frank Domingez, and Ron Thomas. George Harnden, who was a squad member last year, is looking better than he ever has, and can be counted on to do his job well.

Key Center

The key man over the ball is Frank Kirkland, co-captain, who received second string center honors on the all-conference team last year. John Brudin, Lionel Purcell, and ex-JV men Glen Conradi and Dick Schaefer are the new men out for this position.

Stan Williamson will use the "T" formation this year with some changes from last year's style. The team is essentially light and fast, and will depend on deception and an aerial attack.

Goleta Airport will be the scene of a football rally to see the Gaucho grid squad off to Oregon on Friday, September 17, at 10:00 am.

On Saturday the Gauchos will play the powerful University of Oregon team at Eugene. The Hilltoppers are considered the underdogs but should prove tough competition for the northern neighbors and the story may even end with a surprise twist.

Part-Time Workers Receive Pay Hike

Part-time student employees of the university will hereafter receive pay at the same hourly rate as full-time employees doing comparable work, which means that beginning September 1, 1948, the rate for clerical work will be \$.923 an hour, based on the \$160.00 a month rate for full-time clerks working a 40 hour week.

This announcement was made today by President Robert G. Sproul on the basis of recommendations from Personnel Director Boynton Kaiser.

Re-Classification

The new pay scale, however, requires the establishing of another job classification for positions of less responsibility than that of clerk. This new position will be described as attendant. It will include all jobs requiring the presence of an employee but not continuous work, and will carry a beginning pay rate of \$150.00 a month or \$8.65 an hour.

Personnel Director Kaiser pointed out that his recommendation is based on the assumption that part-time student employees can perform as efficiently during their working hours as full-time employees in comparable positions. If this doesn't prove to be true there will be, probably, a tendency for administrators of departments to substitute full-time employees for part-time employees whenever possible, he said.

Proficiency Test In Speech Set

All candidates for a teaching credential who are not taking or who do not plan to take Speech 11 must pass the Speech Proficiency Test on or before entrance into the junior year.

This test will be given on Thursday, September 23, from two until five; on the morning of Saturday, September 25, from ten until twelve, and on Tuesday, September 28, from two until five in the afternoon.

Any students interested in this test should see the speech bulletin board in Oak Hall for instructions.

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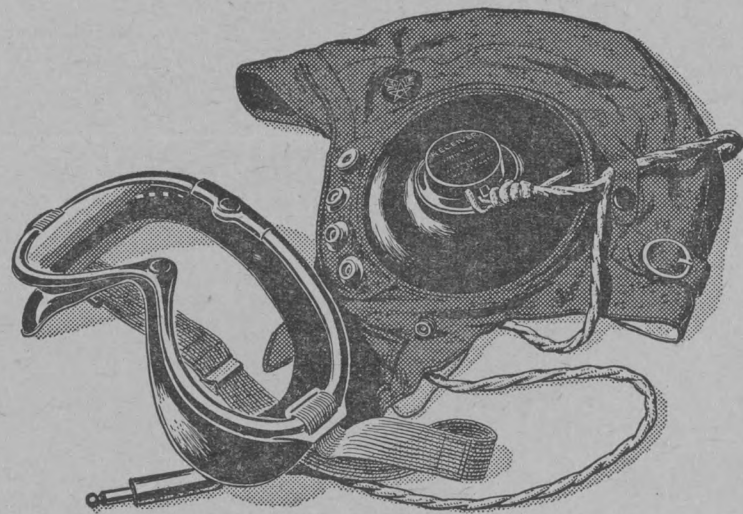
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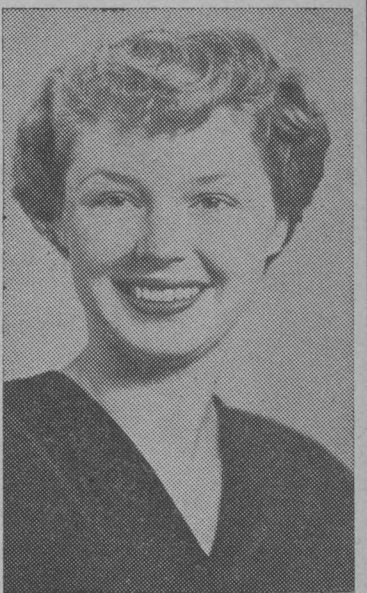
