## GAUCHOS BATTLE WAVES IN SEASON'S LAST GAME AT LA PLAYA STADIUM

It's third down and three to go tonight when the Pepperdine Waves meet the Santa Barbara Gauchos in La Playa Stadium at eight o'clock. This is the third time in the history of the two schools that they have met on the gridiron and tonight's winner will finish the 2C2A race in third place.

Pepperdine's conference record is 1-1-1. They have defeated L. A. State, as have the Gauchos, lost to the Aztecs of San Diego State, another point in common with the locals, and have tied Cal Poly, 7-7. Here the similarity ends, however, for the Hilltoppers lost to the San Luis Obispo club. In season competition, the Waves have lost four games, being defeated by Fresno State, Loyola of Los Angeles, San Diego State and Brigham Young University of Utah. They have vanquished Redlands, L. A. State and two Navy teams: Point Mugu and Terminal Island.

### Outstanding

The boys from the big city boast a couple of outstanding individual performers on their roster. Jack Bighead, 215 pound end who was elected to the Little All-Coast squad last week, is second in yardage gained via pass receptions and needs only 32 more yards to edge out the league leader, Chet Nicholson of San Diego. The man who throws most of the aerials which Bighead plucks from the blue is Rudy Osuna, freshman flash from Santa Paula High.

The whole Pepperdine offense does not have an exactly awe-in-

## RED CROSS FORM CAMPUS CHAPTER

A Red Cross chapter has recently been formed at Santa Barbara College under the approval of the Student Council. Pat Williams was appointed chairman by Bob Christofferson, Student Body President.

The purpose of the campus chapter is to provide men and women students with the opportunity to help plan and administer their volunteer activities in the campus, community, national and international Red Cross programs. Santa Barbara is the only Cal campus which up to this time hasn't had a campus chapter.

Dr. C. Douglas Woodhouse is faculty advisor, Desmond Kincaid is vice chairman, and Barbara Toal is secretary-treasurer. The projects and activities are under the direction of various chairmen.

Desmond Kincaid who is in charge of the blood program, stated, "We will have a blood drive on campus every three months, the next to be in February. By providing more and better facilities we feel that we can more than double the 120 pints donated in the last drive."

Entertainment for servicemen will be handled by Ed Monreal. He plans to organize shows to take to Camp Cooke on the first Wednesday of every month, and also take small groups of entertainers around to the hospital wards to the men who are bedridden.

The motor corps will be chairman by Bill Myers, who will be in charge of driving Red Cross station wagons to Camp Cooke and also be on reserve for use of the city chapter.

Fund-raising will be handled by Marc Wallace and Jack Baum who will plan and administer the Red Cross Drive in March. Pat Smith will organize receptionists and clerical workers for Red Cross activities and special occasions, and will also help to augment the Grey Ladies service in hospitals for servicemen.

Canteen services, under the direction of Barbara York, will be set up at blood drives and special occasions.

### UP-STYLE

*El Gaucho* will follow an up-style policy for the rest of the semester.

Down-style, the policy of not capitalizing words like "college" in Santa Barbara College, was used heretofore, but proved impractical since contributors to the paper are used to capitalizing such words.

## CHAIRMEN NEEDED FOR COMMITTEES; DEADLINE TUESDAY

Several Associated Student Body chairmanships and positions are now open and appointments will be made on December 11.

Application forms are available in the Student Body Office and should be turned in along with a letter to Bob Christofferson before December 11, when they will be considered at a Legislative Council meeting.

An upper division student familiar with student activities is needed for Activities Control Board Chairman and Secretary next semester. The job involves scheduling of all campus activities, both Associated Students and private organizations.

A Student Member-at-Large of the Finance Committee is also needed. This committee is responsible for all financial matters of the Associated Students. The student does not need to be especially adept at accounting but should be able to understand financial matters clearly.

The Judicial Committee, now undergoing revision, will be a very important one next semester, Bob stated, and will need a chairman. This committee acts as an advisory committee to the Faculty Committee on Student Discipline in regard to conduct of examinations, cheating and proctoring.

Plans are being made to bring in some outside talent for the evening, with the possibility of a Hollywood celebrity and name band being considered. This will be one of the big events of the semester and will need a real organizer, according to Bob.

## Cinch Notices Out; 546 Distributed

Somber greetings from the registrar were received by apprehensive Santa Barbara College students last Wednesday afternoon, when 546 cinch notices were quietly placed in student mailboxes.

The women, who outnumber the men in enrollment, received fewer notices than the men, getting 258, to the men's 288. According to information received from the Office of the Registrar, the average was about one third of a notice to each student enrolled.

It is to be noted that the notices are only warnings, not actual failure notices. The student is expected to mend his study habits or investigate the cause of his failure up to this point, the Registrar's Office announced.

## Legal Status of Minors Told For Alcoholic Beverage Use; Large Penalty Now Possible

Minors caught using fraudulent identification or possessing any alcoholic beverage in a public place are guilty of a misdemeanor and may be sentenced to \$500 fine and six months in jail, it was revealed by members of the State Board of Equalization and the Deans of Men and Women in defining the legal status of minor students and liquor consumption.

### New Laws

New laws were written into the California Alcoholic Beverage Control Act by the State Legislature at their last session which went into effect this Fall. Two sections were added concerning minors to combat the circumvention of the law which had been occurring. These new rules made the use of false identification or possession of any alcoholic beverage in a public place a misdemeanor and subject to due penalty.

### Excerpt

Excerpts from Section 61 of the Act read as follows:

(c) Any person under the age of 21 years who presents or offers to any licensee, his agent or employee, any written evidence of age which is false, fraudulent, or not actually his own, for the purpose of ordering, purchasing, attempting to procure, the serving of any alcoholic beverage, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

(d) Any person under the age of 21 years who has any alcoholic beverage in his possession on any street or highway or in any public place is guilty of a misdemeanor. This subdivision shall not apply to possession by a person under the age of 21 years making a delivery of such alcoholic beverage in pursuance of the order of his parent or in pursuance of his employment.

### Misdemeanor

The seriousness of a misdemeanor on the record of a student was stressed by Dean of Men Lyle Reynolds. He stated that besides the penalty were the more serious results that the students name would remain permanently on police records making him ineligible for many jobs. Some of the jobs denied a person with a misdemeanor or on his record are many of the better professional positions, teaching, and officer's schooling in the service.

Misdemeanors make up 85 to 95 per cent of all crimes and a liquor crime would have as serious results as theft and similar crimes. Violators of the minor's liquor laws are arrested by men from the State Board of Equalization and are turned over to the police department for action.

## Deadline Monday For Doll Dressing

Dolls dressed by women students for the Council of Christmas Cheer are to be turned in with apparel completed to the Office of the Dean of Women by Monday, December 3rd, announced Jane Engel, chairman. So far, very few of the 100 dolls which were given out to various women's organizations have been turned back completed.

The dolls, grouped in an organizational classification, will be prominently displayed next week in the two trophy cases in the lobby of the Administration Building. At the end of the week, they will be judged by a panel of faculty members who will announce the ten best-dressed dolls.

A tag with the girl's name and organization should accompany each doll turned into the Dean's Office.

## Speech Tournament Entered by Gauchos

Five picked students of Santa Barbara traveled to Fresno last week to participate in the Annual Western Speech Association Tournament.

Competing against 49 colleges and more than 400 contestants from all of the seven Western States, the Santa Barbarans turned in one outstanding performance after another to be labeled as one of the top speech squads at the tournament, according to information from the Speech Department.

Under the supervision of Dr. Upton S. Palmer, four of the five Gauchos reached the semi-finals and one of these four, Cathy Cox, reached the finals and took fifth place in Women's Impromptu Speaking.

Peter Kane, a sophomore, competing in his sixth year of public speaking reached the semi-finals in Men's Discussion and Men's Extemporaneous Speaking. In discussion there were 53 participating and in men's extemporaneous there were 65 participating.

Roger Denney, a sophomore, in his first year of inter-collegiate competition, reached the semi-finals out of a total of 85 participants in Men's Impromptu Speaking.

Teddy Tye, also a sophomore, making her first bid for inter-collegiate forensic honors, reached the semi's in Women's Impromptu Speaking with 40 or more contestants.

## Liquor Laws . . .

The new liquor laws touched home recently when several UCSBC students were found with improper identification and put under the jurisdiction of the authorities.

It is unfortunate that the content of these laws was not brought to student attention before some of our fellow students were marred by arrest for something that many of us have been guilty of at one time or another. What is done is done, however, and we can only do everything possible to prevent a recurrence.

These new rulings put teeth in the previously ineffective liquor laws and make the use of false identification to obtain liquor and the possession of liquor in any public place a misdemeanor — a crime which will put the same blot upon one's records as robbery and theft.

What can happen to a minor arrested for violation of one of the liquor laws is something that should receive a great deal of consideration. Besides the possibility of a \$500 fine plus six months in jail, are years of preparation in college wasted because a police record disqualifies a person for teaching and many professional jobs and even advancement in the armed service. That is a big price for a short time of enjoyment.

Now that we know our position, we will be far ahead to make sure that we don't endanger our future by unnecessary chances. Whether or not we drink is our personal choice, but if we do, it should be done with caution and judgement realizing that if we are under age we have a moral obligation to those responsible for us not to commit an act that can cause harm to them or us.

Christmas Seals will be mailed to the students this week, according to Mrs. Monroe.

To El Gaucho:

RE: THE ARTICLE ON THE FOOTBALL TEAM

I am surprised the football team and the Student Body paper, too, would permit anything like that to get into print; most of all because it reflects ominously on the ability of the football team to put into practice those qualities which constitute a team, and also because this attitude carries a reflection on the school, too.

What are some of the qualities that make a team a team. To me, they are, one: the sense of fair play among themselves and between them and their coaches in the sense that each should do the best he can for the others. Teamwork means working as a unit not as eleven separate individuals. Each member is just as important as the others. I believe the number of people who go to a game to watch one individual is in the minority; most people like to watch the cooperation and coordination of a team.

Next, the quality of cooperation, among themselves and between them and the coaches. Any football team does not play as individuals but as a team, each member contributing his best and as much as he is capable of. Any spectacular playing over and above the team happens through the cooperation of each member, whatever his position, blocker, running interference, whatever it is.

Next, the quality of willingness to accept instruction, the acknowledgment that the coach is there as long as he is there in the capacity of an instructor, and the team is there to carry out his instruction. Else, why have a coach at all?

Next, the quality of honesty, both with themselves and with their instructors—honesty in the sense that you accept each and every member and the coaches as a member and the willingness to work with and for each other for the promotion of the team, hence the school, not for the promotion of any one member.

The fact that a football team refuses to work for any coach does not speak well for any of them; it

means simply that somewhere along the line, the qualities making for sportsmanship and fair play have not been absorbed.

What are the members of the team going to do when they go into the big, big world, if they do, which is made up of an infinite number of personalities, some of whom they may like, others they may not like. Are they going to refuse to work for someone who may have different opinions? Will they quit, or will they do their jobs, always maintaining their highest sense of what is right. An individual, they will find, cannot always pick his associates.

I don't know anything of the circumstances surrounding the football team and the coach; but I do believe it does not reflect very well on the team, and on the school either, to let it be known that a team refuses to put into practice the qualities of sportsmanship and fair play, which after all, are what they should be evidencing in addition to the mechanics of playing ball.

It seems to be the spirit that is missing from the football is perhaps the spirit of sportsmanship and fair play.

### UP Little All-Coast Names Gorrie, Gaunce

Two Santa Barbara Gauchos, Grant Gaunce and Dave Gorrie, were named last week to the second team of the United Press Little All-Coast Football Team for 1951.

Although playing guard for the Gauchos, Grant Gaunce was selected tackle for the second team. A junior from Alhambra, Gaunce's 215 pounds have been the bulwark of the Gaucho line all season.

Gorrie, turning in top-flight performances against Cal Poly, Phibpac, and San Diego State, gained his spot at fullback even though he was out with injuries for the greater part of the season. He is from Pasadena, also a junior.

Cal Poly's Alex Bravo was also named to the second team's backfield. Gauchos will remember him as the Mustang who scored both touchdowns in Cal Poly's 14-7 victory over Santa Barbara. Bravo also set a new ground gaining record for the Mustangs this season.

### Basketball Season Underway Tonight; Gauchos vie Trojans

The Santa Barbara College Athletic Department isn't wasting any time this year. Tonight while Coach Roy Engle's football squad closes out the pigskin season with the Pepperdine game, Coach Hop Findlay's basketball players open the casaba season at Pan Pacific Auditorium in Los Angeles, where they will meet mighty El Trojan from the University of Southern California.

Hop plans no immediate change in his starting line up. He will go with the same five that he used in a recent practice game against San Diego Navy. Manning the Forward posts are Don Bradshaw, a senior and a veteran from last year's varsity, and Ken Kesson, a converted guard who also lettered last season. Findlay has moved forward Lloyd Heavin into the center position. Heavin, a 6'2" junior is reportedly demonstrating real genius for ball handling and rebounding. Driving from the guard position will be veteran Allan Jacobs and Tom Moss, who lettered last year at Center.

Opposing the local talent, USC Coach Forest Twogood will present a team consisting of Ken Flower and Captain Don Underwood at Guards, Bruce Bennet and Bob Morton at the Forwards and either Bob Boyd or Jerry Pease in the pivot position. Other able hoopers on the L. A. campus are Al Lamont, Ed Simpson and Dick Davies.

This will be the first official game of the year for both teams. They have met twice before, with SC emerging the winner both times. In 1947 the score was 45-36 and last year it was 71-49. The Gauchos overall record in 1950-51 was 14 wins and 15 losses.

Tomorrow night the Hilltoppers continue their season when they meet Loyola. This game will also be played in Los Angeles.

### AZTECS CINCH 2C2A TITLE THURSDAY; DOWN GAUCHOS 40-0

Clinching the 2C2A Conference title, the San Diego State Aztecs downed an outclassed but fighting Gaucho Varsity 40-0 in a Thanksgiving Day mudbrawl at Aztec Stadium.

An inspired Gaucho eleven scared the socks off the cocky Aztecs in the first half as they stopped San Diego's vaunted power cold until late in the second period and came close to putting across two touchdowns. Quarterback Jessie Thompson broke up the deadlock for the Aztecs however, as he pitched a pass to end Chet Nicholson in the end zone to give San Diego a 7-0 lead.

#### Aztecs Explode

The second half was a different story as San Diego exploded to score 20 points in the third period and add another 13 tallies in the final quarter to swamp the Gauchos to end the season as one of the nation's undefeated teams.

Coach Roy Engle's crew muffed a golden scoring opportunity late in the second period as one of the Gaucho's famous kickoff return plays almost went all the way.

Following the Aztec's first score, Bill Davis took the kickoff on the 20, faked a handoff to Ron Ternquist, and then lateraled out to Gary Morris on the sidelines. Morris, who along with Dave Gorrie, played a great offensive game for the Gauchos, took off down the sidelines behind eight blockers. Things got fouled up on the San Diego 31, however, and someone missed Ed Rickerts, who knifed through to save the day for the Aztecs.

#### Fumble

On the following play from scrimmage, Dave Gorrie boomed through the middle to the Aztec four yard line where on the next play the muddy ball squirted lose and the Aztecs recovered.

From then on the Gaucho's doom was sealed as Art Preston, on the first time the Aztecs got the ball in the second half, took off on a 49-yard jaunt to paydirt, to give the Aztecs a 14-point lead.

#### No Stopping

Gaucho fumbles and intercepted passes were turned into scores by the Aztecs as the Gauchos tried desperately to stop the running of Art Preston and Preston Robinson and the passing of Thompson.

The attempts were futile however, as the Aztecs pounded on until the final gun to roll up 231 yards on the ground against the Gaucho's 81, and add another 162 yards by passing while the Gauchos compiled 77.
