RUSSIAN SATIRE PRESENTED IN ASB STAGE PRODUCTION

Final rehearsals are progressing for the college theatre's spring production, "The Inspector General," to be presented April 10 and 11 under the direction of Mr. Upton Palmer, lecturer in Speech. Nikolai Gogol, author of the play, is known as Russia's first paturalist and first great satisfiest. Like Charles Dickens, Corol was a

naturalist and first great satirist. Like Charles Dickens, Gogol was a

talented character actor and superb reader; these talents afforded excellent background for his characterizations, which are displayed so ably in "The Inspector General."

Inspector General. Throughout his life, Gogol was har-assed by censorship. In fact, it was the intervention of Nicholas I, himself, that saved "The General." "The Inspector General" deals with the contempt with which Gogol held the governmental morass of that time. He was at one time a clerk in the gov-ernmental service, which will account for the apparent authenticity of his characters. He no doubt received the "yen" for the theatre and acting from his father who was fond of theatricals in which he himself acted. He also di-

rected and even wrote two comedies which are recognized in Ukranian literature of today as classics. His first writings were under psuedonyms and were not successes.

Througout his life Gogol was ha-rassed by censorship. Such an instance was at the first performance of "The Inspector General" at which the authorities tried to suppress the performance. The production was saved, however, by the applause and laughter of Nicholas I who at the performance in 1836 at the Alexandrovski Theatre in Petersburg chuckled att the manner in which he and his government had been characterized.




