GAUCHOS FACE HEAVY BILL WITH FRESNO, USC, UCLA

The league-leading Gaucho baseball squad this weekend will tangle with the cellar dwelling Fresno State squad in two tilts. Coach Spud Harder's horsehiders will be highly favored to down the Bulldog nine. The Stater team has thus far this season had four league games and has yet to hit the victory circle.

Coach Kenny Gleason's Fresno lads are mostly inexperienced and the hill-top team should have no trouble in downing the inlanders. The real test for the hometown nine will be next Monday's battle with the rough and ready Trojans from USC. The Figueroa Tech squad of Coach Rod Dadoux is, as usual, loaded with diamond talent.

The Fresno Staters have three power hitters on their squad, freshman first baseman Bill Hansen, who leads the Doggy team with a .439 average and infielder Al Torress and catcher Dave Rodgers, who have .400 averages. The main weakness of the State team is its weak pitching staff. This should insure a victory for the home town lads, who are loaded to bear with slugging power. With lads like Hal Abbott, Verne Wrightson, Bill Alhouse, and Cy Williams, the Gauchos should be able to hang two bulldog pelts from their belts.

The Tommy Trojan-Joe Gaucho tilt should evolve into a battle of the century. If the pampus rider nine can down the Troy squad they will obtain much prestige along the coast. A capacity crowd is expected to witness this tilt Monday. The line up for the Gauchos will probably be the same as it has been in the other league tilts.

Graduation Events Planned by Seniors

Tentative plans of the graduating senior class of June 1947 include a senior breakfast, a banquet, and a senior day, according to Jack Erickson, senior class president.

GAUCHOS NIP C.O.P. IN OVERTIME TILT

Al Katich's sharp single into left and two hear-breaking COP errors in the last of the tenth inning gave the Gauchos a 10-9 victory and their third conference win against no losses Tuesday on the Cabrillo Field diamond in the first extra inning game and the most exciting three hours of the young season. Ten errors ultimately led to the downfall of Jerry Haines, Tiger starter, who scattered eight hits and pitched brilliant ball after a shaky start that saw the Santa Barbarans jump out to an 8-1 lead after two innings.

Going into the 9th frame, Dale Scott had the game all sewed up with a 9-5 lead but two singles bunched with two walks and a crucial error by Mark Steinberg tied it up until the lucky tenth. Bill French, who retired the Tigers in order in the top of the 10th, received credit for his first league win of the year.

The Gauchos contributed four errors, but two slick double plays by the Alhouse, Steinberg, and Wrightson combination made up for the miscues. The hilltoppers were aided no little by 7 walks, 3 of them coming along with 3 costly errors sandwiched around a double by Billy Alhouse, which produced six big Gaucho tallies in the second. Grant Dunlap, COP shortstop, who garnered three for four, was the only man to get more than one hit.

FIRST HONORARY SOCIETY
Key and Scroll is the first national honorary society for junior women in the United States and was instigated in Southern California in January of 1946 by USC, UCLA, and Santa Barbara. Since then numerous universities from all over the United States have written for information concerning the organization, which Miss Smith, as president of AWS, will present to the conference in Minneapolis.

RUSSIAN SATIRE PRESENTED IN ASB STAGE PRODUCTION

Final rehearsals are progressing for the college theatre's spring production, "The Inspector General," to be presented April 10 and 11 under the direction of Mr. Upton Palmer, lecturer in Speech.

Nikolai Gogol, author of the play, is known as Russia's first naturalist and first great satirist. Like Charles Dickens, Gogol was a talented character actor and superb reader; these talents afforded excellent background for his characterizations, which are displayed so ably in "The Inspector General."

Throughout his life, Gogol was harassed by censorship. In fact, it was the intervention of Nicholas I, himself, that saved "The General." At the first performance of the play, Nicholas I was in the audience, chucking at the manner in which his government was being satirized.

Mr. Upton Palmer brings to Santa Barbara College a background of theatrical production which includes Ibsen's "Hedda Gabler," Kaufman and Connelly's "Beggar on Horseback," Dekker's "The Shoemaker," and a stage version of "Alice in Wonderland."

"The Inspector General" deals with the contempt with which Gogol held the governmental morass of that time. He was at one time a clerk in the governmental service, which will account for the apparent authenticity of his characters. He no doubt received the "yen" for the theatre and acting from his father who was fond of theatricals in which he himself acted. He also directed and even wrote two comedies which are recognized in Ukrainian literature of today as classics. His first writings were under pseudonyms and were not successes.

Throughout his life Gogol was harassed by censorship. Such an instance was at the first performance of "The Inspector General" at which the authorities tried to suppress the performance. The production was saved, however, by the applause and laughter of Nicholas I who at the performance in Petersburg chuckled at the manner in which he and his government had been characterized.

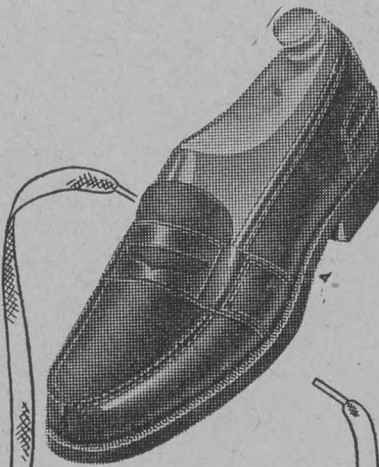
