Land Appropriation Bill Signed By Richardson

Governor Richardson has signed the land bill allowing the college \$12,500 for two and half acres of land west of the college, according to a telegram received by President Phelps last Thursday evening. The land was secured for future expansion of the college.

Just what the land will be used for has not yet been definitely decided, but it will probably be used for a Home Economics building and several dormitories to be built a few years hence. There is enough room on this stretch of land for dormitories to accommodate three or four hundred students.

The College is not in immediate need of this land, but it was secured to prevent it from being used for other purposes than for College expansion.
