## GET SET FOR BIG NIGHT! BOB SPROUL ARRIVES TO GREET ALL NEW GAUCHOS

All freshmen and new students will be on the Riviera Campus on Thursday evening, Oct. 1, for the President's Reception, at which time President Robert Gordon Sproul will personally welcome each Santa Barbara College newcomer.

This has long been the gala social event of the fall semester and new students will have an opportunity to shake hands and chat with the nation's outstanding university president.

Each new student will be greeted by a faculty host and hostess and introduced to President and Mrs. Sproul and Provost and Mrs. J. Harold Williams. They will then be escorted by student hosts and hostesses to meet student body officers and finally participate in an evening of dancing. The cafeteria will be transformed into a gaily decorated ballroom. Refreshments will be served all during the evening on the Ebbets Hall Roof Garden.

What should the new students wear for this event?

Women—informal or "dressy sport." The college women are asked not to wear formals on this occasion.

Men—informal, meaning Sunday suits with tie.

All new Gauchos should reserve the evening of Oct. 1 for an opportunity to get acquainted with their president and provost, in addition to meeting student body leaders and other new student members of the campus community.

This event will be a fine evening for all concerned and will have one of the best dance orchestras in Santa Barbara entertaining for the event.

Freshmen are asked to come at 8 p.m. and gather at the Quad steps. Transfer students should arrive at 8:30 p.m. They will be issued name cards at tables near the Quad steps and then escorted into the AWS room where they will meet the president and provost.

### Registrar Counts Noses--Sees 1554

The first week of registration at Santa Barbara College saw 1554 enroll for the fall semester. This preliminary figure does not include late registrants, who probably will increase the figures announced by Dr. Paul Wright, Registrar.

Student enrollment this fall has surpassed the number enrolled for the fall semester last year. The final enrollment last fall was 1547.

Significant in this year's statistics is the substantial increase in the number of new students, which is 15 per cent over last year, indicating that the enrollment trend is now going upward. Because of the increasing birthrate, college officials estimate that the enrollment will double here in about 10 years.

The number of veterans registering this fall has been somewhat less than anticipated, but an increase in the number of Korean veterans is expected for the spring semester, according to Dr. Wright.

### ROTC Rifle Teams

The Varsity and ROTC rifle teams begin practice this week in preparation for a busy season.

Practices will be held Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday each week from 4 to 6 p.m. at the High School indoor range. All students interested in intercollegiate and national rifle competition should come to the range at one of these times.

## Homecoming Plans Are Under Way For Biggest, Best Yet

Limiting the aspirants to the title of Homecoming Queen to upper-division women, the Homecoming committee under the general chairmanship of Melinda Horn is deeply engrossed in preparations for the annual event.

Reason for the limitation, said Melinda, is that the position is one of prestige and honor and therefore should be something for which to strive. No student should achieve this honor upon first entering college, the committee feels.

In addition to being a junior or senior, the candidates must have a "C" average for the preceding semester and also an over-all "C" average for her entire time in college. Upper-division transfer students are eligible.

Deadline for applications for candidacy is Friday, Oct. 2. The fee is \$2 and they must be turned in to the Associated Students Office. Chairman is Carolyn Cox.

Judging will be at an assembly at 11 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 15, in the Quad. "Judges will be prominent Santa Barbara businessmen," Melinda continued. Each candidate will be judged on first impression, charm and poise, beauty, applause. Her court will be announced that night at the first performance of the Galloping Gaucho Revue. On Friday night, Oct. 17, the queen will present the awards for the GGR skits.

### No House Decorations

Another innovation in the celebration this year will be the elimination of house decorations. The reasons for this, stated Melinda, were the limited time for preparations and the difficulty of the judging townspeople in getting around to all the houses since they are not centrally located.

Micheltorena and State Streets mark the starting point for the Homecoming parade. The procession will march south on State to Haley Street. Floats may be entered in three divisions: fraternity, sorority, organizational. Starting time is 2:15 p.m.

Judging will be on the basis of general impression, cleverness and originality, amount of work involved, beauty and theme adherence. There will be no restrictions on the theme, "3-D Hits UCSBC," contrary to the statement given in last week's *El Gaucho*, said Melinda. Decisions concerning the adherence are at the discretion of the committee. Parade chairman is Chappy Bortz.

Applications for floats in the parade, plus a sketch and a written description of the proposed float, must be turned in to the A.S. Office. Deadline is Tuesday, Oct. 6; fee is \$3.

### Rally Planned

Immediately following the parade will be the big rally, continued Melinda. Tentative place for the event is the Santa Barbara County Courthouse sunken gardens. Rally chairman is Dick Canada.

During the Homecoming game, which pits SBC Gauchos against the Los Angeles State College Diablos, the queen will present the parade trophies. After the game the annual Homecoming dance will take place. Band and location will be announced later.

This is the cry being sent up by Larry Taylor, director of the Galloping Gaucho Revue, SBC's annual Homecoming variety show. Performances are set for Thursday and Friday, Oct. 15 and 16.

Any new student with talent is urged to enter, Taylor said. Deadline for paying the \$2 entry fee is Tuesday, Oct. 6, with tryouts scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 8, in the Mesa Auditorium. Subsequent rehearsals will be in the Riviera Auditorium, Sunday, October 11 through Wednesday, October 14.

## Lt. Col. H. H. Haines Fills College Post Vacated By Lt. Col. E. R. Maddox

Lt. Col. Harold H. Haines has taken command of the ROTC unit at Santa Barbara College of the University of California, relieving Lt. Col. Edward R. Maddox who has served with the college for three years. The post also includes the chairmanship of the college Department of Military Science and Tactics.

Lt. Col. Haines comes to Santa Barbara directly from Greece, where he has served for the past three years, assisting in the training of the Greek army.

### ROTC Product Himself

A product of the ROTC program himself, Lt. Col. Haines received a BA degree and a reserve commission from Washington State College in 1931. He remained in the reserves until 1940 when he was called to active duty in connection with the defense program. During World War II he served with the Third Infantry Division in the North African and Italian campaigns.

He became part of the Regular Army in 1947 and shortly thereafter attended the Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth.

An enthusiastic adherent of the Army's ROTC program, Col. Haines stated that from 20,000 to 25,000 officers are provided to

the Army annually by this plan—the largest source of Army officer material.

Lt. Col. Maddox will leave Santa Barbara in the near future to report to the Alaskan command at Ft. Richardson, Anchorage, for further assignment.

## Graduate Mgr's Office Serves Many Student Functions

The office of the graduate manager, located in the hall near the cafeteria, has five able workers ready to serve the students of SBC. Under the able direction of Graduate Manager Robert L. Lorden, these people serve most of you either directly or indirectly during your stay here.

The name graduate manager stems from the fact that the man holding the position must be a graduate of SBC. He does not deal with the alumni of the school; on the contrary, his position is that of business manager of the associated students.

The office is created by the constitution in which his duties are listed. There it states, "He shall be the official representative of the Associated Students in all of its business dealings and shall be responsible to the Legislative Council for the efficient conduct of all matters pertaining to his office."

The graduate manager is appointed by the legislative council with the approval of the Provost, according to the constitution.

The director of the Associated Students' News Bureau is appointed by the graduate manager, who also supervises the activities and budget of the News Bureau and all publication finances.

### Many Other Services

Besides the constitutionally stated duties the office performs many other services. One of the main ones is the check-cashing service. The 10-cent service charge was set up by council in 1946 to cover operational costs and allow the continuation of this service. "Students who wish to cash a check must show identification so signatures can be checked. Your stu-

dent body card is the best means of identification you carry," stated Bob Lorden.

A part-time job placement service for men students is run through the graduate manager's office. Help-wanted calls are continually being received in this office, and a bulletin board located outside the office is kept up to date with current job offerings.

### Tickets Sold

Ticket sales and monies for all associated student activities and events are handled here, as well as associated students' budgeted accounts and custodian accounts. These last named include the accounts for those organizations recognized on campus but not provided for in the associated students budget.

"Ticket sales have been greatly

simplified by the free admission to the football games. This office will have less to do along that line now that this privilege is included with the student body cards," said Bob Lorden.

The college cabin also is handled through this office. Reservations, which must be made well in advance, will be accepted from all recognized college groups.

Small loans also are handled through this office. The service is available with the student body card. Maximum loan is \$10 for a period of 30 days.

Ebbets Hall, the home economics building on the Santa Barbara College Riviera campus, was dedicated in 1930 in honor of Charlotte P. Ebbets, director of home economics from 1913 to 1935.

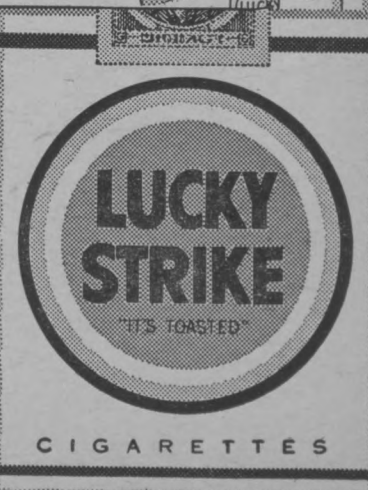
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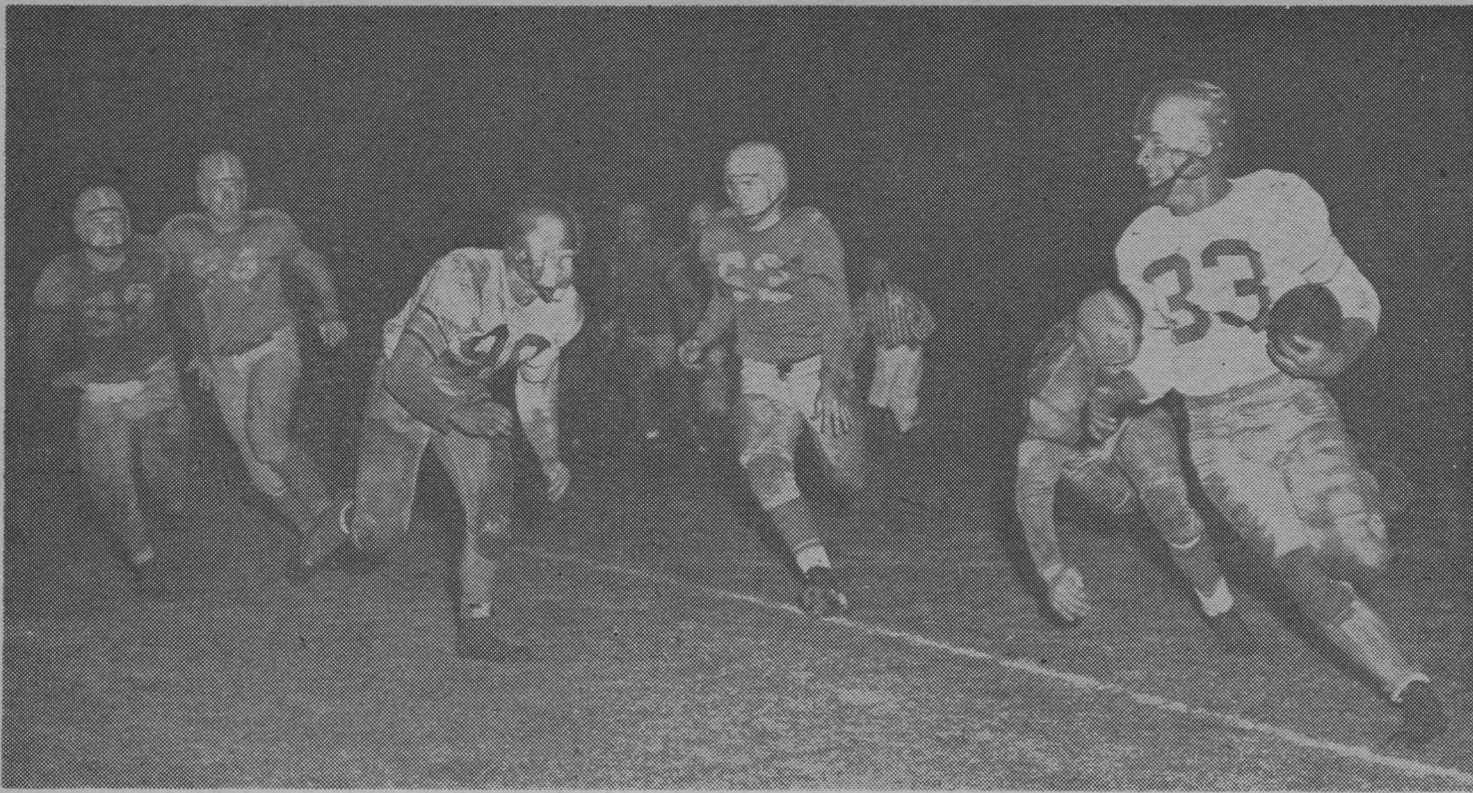

## GAUCHOS RALLY TO TIE WHITTIER, 7-7; PARSONS GOES 55 YARDS FOR SBC SCORE

The Gauchos opened the 1953 football season at La Playa field last Friday against the Whittier Poets, with a 7 to 7 tie. This score brought mixed emotions from the large crowd on hand.

The Gauchos got off to a bad start in the first quarter when a pass by Padilla was intercepted by George Sackman. The Poets then drove 53 yards which ended with an eight yard pass from Sackman to end Fox, for the first touchdown of the game.

It seemed that the Gauchos were doomed to defeat as the Poets ran wild in the first period. The Gauch defense could not seem to get organized. However, things began to look up for the Gauch team in the later part of the second period.

Ned Parsons, the young man from Orange Coast, took a hand-off from Bucky Baird and twisted and turned for the 55 yard line with the key block thrown by Marv Ashby at the 50 yard line. From there on Parsons just outran the Whittier defenders to score for Santa Barbara. Baird kicked the extra point to tie the score.

This supplied the spark that the Gauchos needed and in the second half, the defense tightened up and the offense looked much better. Something was lacking last week and that was the Gauch passing attack. Pass interceptions put the Gauchos in trouble a couple of times. Morris punted in the second period to put the Poets in a hole deep in their own territory. Later, Lee Powers blocked a punt on the Poet's 40 yard line to set the stage for Parsons' electrifying run.

Tailback Roger Gartland came in late in the game and if the Gauchos had not been plagued by pen-

alties they might have gotten a drive started. On defense the Gauchos who looked good were Norm Stelli, Jack Dayton, Bill Lowe and Chuck Miller.

The second half showed the rigors of on-way football, as neither team could mount a serious drive. It seems that conditioning will be the big factor in the game this year. No one can say the Gauchos looked bad in their first game, though much was lacking. Once the backfield begins to click, the Gauchos will be a well thought of opponent.

Next week they meet the Occidental Tigers and this should be a good test for the Gauchos.

### Golf Squad Tryouts To Be Held Soon

There are eight places to be filled on the Santa Barbara College golf squad this season, six of which, by virtue of lowest recent scores, will play in competition. ## DR. TURNER SPENDS YEAR IN WASHINGTON AGENCIES

Ford Foundation granted a Fellowship Award last year to Dr. Henry A. Turner, Political Science professor. Dr. Turner elected to work in various agencies of our nation's capital.

In the latter part of August Dr. Turner arrived in Washington and began work in the Research Division of the Democratic National Committee. By October he was transferred to the Speakers Bureau where it was his duty to find speakers for various cities, towns and hamlets throughout the country, plus plan the itineraries of the speakers. His major assignment in the latter line was Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee.

### Budget Bureau

After Dwight Eisenhower's election Dr. Turner began working with the Budget Bureau. During the campaign President Eisenhower stated that it was his intention to make amendment to the highly controversial McCarran-Walter Immigration Law. After his election the President re-emphasized his intentions on this subject to the point that Dr. Turner was asked to make a study of the stormily discussed immigration law. He spent 10 weeks interviewing people in relative fields and gathering information on Capitol Hill before he submitted his preliminary report.

### Legislative Act

One of his major recommendations was for the passage of an emergency immigration act for a period of 18 months which would allow some 200,000 homeless Europeans to enter. It so happened that the State Department had made a similar study and had recommended a similar action. The matter was then emphasized to the point that it was brought before the attention of the executive branch.

Dr. Turner, then representing the Budget Bureau on a committee for the drafting of this emergency bill, was approached by Max

Rabb, Sherman Adams' assistant, to become attached to the White House staff. In this capacity Dr. Turner became special assistant to Mr. Rabb. During the closing sessions of Congress the emergency measure was adopted.

Dr. Turner feels that he has enriched his apprehension of political science, the party system and the operation of government in general by his year in Washington, D.C.
