'Y' MEN TO JOURNEY NORTH FOR CONCLAVE OF THIRTY COLLEGES

Local Y.M.C.A. Workers to Choose Students to Attend Convention at Asilomar

Announcement of the annual convention of college men at Asilomar, on Monterey bay, beginning December 26, was made this week by local Y.M.C.A. workers. The conference includes representatives from thirty colleges in the Pacific southwest prominent in student government, campus journalism, athletics and Christian work, and will cover a period of seven days.

The conference curriculum will include discussion of campus problems, Bible study, inter-collegiate and international friendship, worship, vocational counsel undergraduate participation, and messages from leaders in the field of Christian education.

1928 A. W. S. CONVENTION

THROUGH the efforts of its six representatives, Santa Barbara State college has been awarded the 1928 conference of the Associated Women Students of Southern California. This is a great boon to State, as it will give the Roadrunners yet another opportunity to demonstrate that it is an institution of abilities as well as hospitalities.

The annual convention brings together the student women leaders of all the colleges and universities in Southern California, numbering over one hundred and fifty. These representatives of various colleges have special topics to conduct concerning campus activities. Santa Barbara's subject this year at the University of Redlands was "Social Activities." The theme of the conference concluded last week-end was "The Permanent School Calendar."

Santa Barbara State must look forward to this conference and carefully lay plans, so that the representatives next year may know that their selection of Santa Barbara was well made. A special budget should be prepared by the Student Body and the Associated Women Students to cover the expenses of entertainment and development of the program necessarily involved, and this might well be commenced with the coming semester.

MINOR INTER-COLLEGIATE ACTIVITIES

THE development of minor intercollegiate campus activities is gradually taking place in Santa Barbara State college.

Santa Barbara recently has been extended invitaitons to join two intercollegiate debating circles. A team is now oragnized that is representative of the college, and several debates have been scheduled. The outcome of these will determine in large measure whether the Hilltoppers will become members of some collegiate debating league.

Minor athletic sports are coming in for their round. Swimming is trying to get a toe-hold on a few athletic competitors who have not extended their efforts to basketball. A California Coast meet may possibly be scheduled at the conference meeting in San Francisco next month.

Gymnastics have been recognized for some time as a part of the gymnasium class program. There is very promising material in this class. Enough to warrant entering a team in the Pacific Coast meet, which, the writer, understands, permits freshmen to compete.

Besides these, there is the possibility of women taking up swimming as an inter-class sport. This has been tried before, but a few ardent supporters of the sport hope to give it another trial.
