### Selection of AMS Officers Voted for Wed., April 13

Selection of AMS officers for 1949-50 semesters will take place on both the Mesa and Riviera campuses Wednesday, April 13. Offices to be filled are those of president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, historian, and sergeant-at-arms.

Those interested in running for the offices should secure a petition from the Graduate Manager's office. 125 signatures of men students are necessary. Petitions must be turned in to the Office of the Dean of Men on or before April 13.

#### Requirements

Each candidate must have been in regular attendance at UCSBC at least one year prior to Fall 1948, he must have a C grade average, and must carry at least 12 units during his term of office.

All sponsors and candidates for the general student body elections will meet May 3 at 4:00 p.m. in Ridge Hall 101 to discuss the publicity for general student body elections which will be held on May 19 and 20. Petitions for the candidates must be in to the Publicity Committee by May 13.

AMS will hold its elections on April 13 at which time the new student body constitution will be presented along with the proposed student body fee raise of \$2.15.

### Artist Series Gives Annual Dance Concert Thursday, Friday Eves

Variety and fun will be the keynote of the eleventh Annual Dance Concert to be presented in the Riviera Auditorium at 8:30 this Thursday and Friday night. As a part of the Associated Students

Artist's Series this year the dance concert brings in different numbers that will appeal to young and old alike.

An annual project of the Women's Physical Education the concert is entirely original with the dances being choreographed by the Dance Composition class under the direction of Miss Jean Belling. Ideas for the dances come from many sources including past experiences, or a certain piece of music. The latter was the case in a suite called "Three Shades of Blue" which is the opening dance of the show. The dance is divided into three sections depicting three different moods of the blues.

One of the most colorful and amusing numbers in the show is the tale of Till Eulenspiegel and his merry pranks. Depicting the roughish pranks of a young imp who delights in making miserable the lives of the market women and the pompous lords and ladies, Arlene Mohs had the role of Till. One part of the dance is a duet with Till and his lady love, danced by Eleanor Conte, in which Till makes love to the lady only to be rebuffed and rejected.

A unique feature that has never been included before is a Chinese Spring Festival Dance which is being done by a group of Oriental college girls. There is an ancient myth that in the Spring a festival took place and the young people gathered together to celebrate it. This dance depicts the celebration and is accompanied in part by small Chinese instruments which the girls carry.

Out of the past comes a suite of American Folk Scenes which includes not only variety of dances but also of accompaniment. Harriet Beu's solo dance will be done to "The Mountain Whippoorwill" which will be read by Joe Donegan, a drama student. A group dance will be done to a piano arrangement of "She'll Be Comin' Round the Mountain." A third type of accompaniment will be presented by Ed Harris, music

### AWS Decides New Election Rules

Rules for the publicity of the AWS candidates were discussed and decided upon at a meeting of the Publicity Committee on March 31.

The committee members limited publicity to three 22 x 28 size posters and two 8 x 12 posters. Candidate sponsors are reminded to abide by the University ruling that no publicity will be placed on buildings or on the grounds of the school. It is also a ruling that all publicity must be cleared through the Publicity Committee which is headed by Jim Schilt, chairman.

June Marie Davidson, vice-president of the Student Body who is in charge of the elections; and May Nakanishi, president of AWS, also attended the meeting.

#### REVISIONS IN THE CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE III, Section 2  
If any elected member of the Student Body becomes ineligible, within two weeks after the date of his election, he shall be removed from his office and the Legislative Council shall appoint someone to fill the position until action is held unless otherwise provided.

ARTICLE IV  
Section 3. The non-voting members of the Legislative Council shall be the Graduate Manager of Associated Students, THE PRESIDENT OF THE COLLEGE RECREATION ASSOCIATION, one faculty member appointed by the Provost of the College, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the STUDENT CHAIRMAN AND/OR REPRESENTATIVES OF ALL STANDING COMMITTEES AND THE SECRETARY OF THE STUDENT BODY AND A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE MESA CAMPUS.  
Section 7. The Secretary shall:  
a. Keep in a proper book accurate records of meetings of the Associated Students and Legislative Council AND CABINET.  
Section 12. If a voting member is to be represented by a proxy, the member must present in writing this fact to the president not less than five (12) hours before a meeting of the Legislative Council. A PROXY SHALL NOT HAVE THE POWER TO VOTE.

ARTICLE V  
Section 19. Press Control Board Membership:  
a. President of Associated Students  
b. Editor of El Gaucho  
c. Editor of La Cumbre  
d. Editor of Student Directory  
e. Editor of College Magazine  
f. Instructor of Journalism  
g. Faculty representative selected by the Provost.  
h. Graduate Manager (non-voting).  
i. Director of Publicity (non-voting).  
Section 21. Judicial Committee Membership:  
a. Chairman of Committee appointed by the Legislative Council.  
b. Six student members, consisting of two seniors, two juniors and two sophomores, who have been approved by their respective deans.  
c. Faculty member (non-voting).

ARTICLE VI  
Section 4. Should read—MEETINGS SHALL BE HELD TWICE A MONTH.  
ARTICLE XII  
Section 6. D1. Delete entire sentence.  
1. Delete "and the band."

#### BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I  
b. Admission to social events the Associated Students, SOCIAL COMMITTEE AND LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.  
c. Admission to all Artist Series or MUSIC CONTROL BOARD events, under the conditions prescribed by the Associated Student Body and MUSIC CONTROL BOARD and the LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II  
Section 8. An audit of the Associated Students books shall be made by a certified public accountant at least once a year in the FORM PRESCRIBED BY THE FINANCE AND PRE-AUDIT COMMITTEES.

ARTICLE III  
Section 4. Council Awards:  
b. The Legislative Council Key shall be awarded to all members of the Council, and CABINET and shall be awarded on the basis of ONE OR MORE YEARS service to the Associated Students and regular attendance to all Council meetings. Regular attendance shall be recognized as no more than five unexcused absences, the validity of the excused absences being determined by the President of the Associated Students and recorded by the Council Secretary. The Council Key shall be presented at the final awards assembly of the school year. For two years service as a member on the Legislative Council the member shall receive the gold Council Key with a small sapphire set in the key.  
Section 5. f. The last sentence shall read: A life pass shall be granted to all who win three varsity awards. THE SENIOR ATHLETIC MANAGER SHALL RECEIVE THE APPROPRIATE VARSITY AWARD IN ACCORDANCE WITH HIS PERIOD OF SERVICE UPON THE RECOMMENDATION OF DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS AND APPROVAL OF BOARD OF ATHLETIC CONTROL.

Section 6. Music Awards  
a. Any member of the Associated Students who has given three years of meritorious service in such musical organizations which have a faculty sponsor and are recognized by the Music Control Board as authorized groups, shall receive the Music Key.  
1. An additional award shall be given to Band members holding the offices of Band Manager, Band Librarian, and Band Drum Major.  
2. Awards shall be given to Band members who

have completed two full semesters of meritorious service.

b. The standard U.C.S.B.C. gold key with the word music raised diagonally across the crest shall be the music award.

1. The band officers awards shall be:  
(a) First year—a dark blue sweater with a block C, with a musical note and the letters SB superimposed.  
(b) Second year—a varsity blanket with a music letter.  
(c) Third year—a white sweater with a block C, with a musical note and the letters SB superimposed.  
2. The Band awards: Shall be the standard circle C with superimposed lyre.  
c. Recommendations for the Music Awards shall be made by the director of recognized musical organizations and shall be approved by the Music Control Board.

ARTICLE III  
Section 5. j. Changes words to read instead of "the athletic award will be awarded to any man who has earned an average of 3 points etc." to read "THE ATHLETIC AWARD WILL BE AWARDED TO ANY MAN WHO HAS EARNED AN AVERAGE OF 2 POINTS etc."

ARTICLE IV  
Shall read COMMITTEES AND BOARDS (Duties and Powers)  
This article will contain the same duties and powers as listed in the present constitution except for those now listed:

(Boards)  
Section 7. Music Control Board  
a. MAINTAIN AND BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE ACTIVITIES OF THE COLLEGE BAND.  
d. THIS BOARD SHALL SUPERVISE ALL EXPENDITURES FOR THE COLLEGE BAND.  
Section 9. Press Control Board.  
h. Chairman of the Board shall be elected from among the editors of El Gaucho, La Cumbre, Student Directory, and College Magazine.  
i. The editor of El Gaucho shall automatically be the Board's representative to Cabinet.

(Committees)  
Section 12. JUDICIAL COMMITTEE  
a. PURPOSE:  
1. TO ACT AS A COORDINATING BODY BETWEEN STUDENTS AND FACULTY, TO MAINTAIN A HIGH STANDARD OF TEST ADMINISTRATION, AND TO RAISE THE LEVEL OF STUDENT CONDUCT AND MORALE.

2. TO CREATE AND MAINTAIN A STUDENT COURT TO INVESTIGATE REPORTED CASES OF FRAUDULENT BEHAVIOR IN CLASSROOMS, AND TO SUBMIT RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING PENALTIES AND MEANS OF ALLEVIATING UNFAIR PRACTICES IN CLASS WORK, TO THE FACULTY DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE.

b. MEMBERSHIP:  
1. MEMBERS OF THE JUDICIAL COMMITTEE SHALL HOLD OFFICE UNTIL TERMINATION OF ACTIVE SERVICE BY GRADUATION, WITHDRAWAL FROM THE COLLEGE, OR RESIGNATION. THE RESIGNATION OF A MEMBER, NEGLECTED THE OBLIGATIONS OF COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP, MAY BE REQUESTED BY A UNANIMOUS VOTE OF FIVE (5) MEMBERS OF SAID COMMITTEE. STUDENT LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL SHALL HAVE POWER OF RECALL.

c. STUDENT COURT OF THE JUDICIAL COMMITTEE:  
1. FUNCTION: TO HEAR CASES SUBMITTED TO IT BY FACULTY MEMBERS, BY THE FACULTY DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE, OR BY STUDENTS. AFTER HEARING AND INVESTIGATING THE CASE, THE STUDENT COURT SHALL SUBMIT A LIST OF ITS RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE CASE TO THE FACULTY DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE FOR APPROVAL AND ACTION.

2. POLICY: RECOMMENDATIONS SHALL BE BASED UPON INDIVIDUAL CASE FINDINGS, DUE CONSIDERATION HAVING BEEN GIVEN TO ESTABLISHED PRECEDENT.

3. MEMBERSHIP: ANY FOUR MEMBERS OF THE JUDICIAL COMMITTEE, IN ADDITION TO ITS CHAIRMAN, SHALL CONSTITUTE THE STUDENT COURT. THE CHAIRMAN OF SAID COMMITTEE SHALL ACT AS PRESIDING OFFICER OF THE COURT.

4. DECISIONS: UNANIMOUS VOTE OF THE STUDENT COURT SHALL BE REQUIRED FOR ALL DECISIONS. DECISIONS SHALL BE APPROVED BY THE FACULTY DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE BEFORE BECOMING EFFECTIVE.

5. CASE HISTORIES: ALL CASE HISTORIES SHALL BE CONSIDERED CONFIDENTIAL. EXCEPTIONS TO THIS PROVISION SHALL BE APPROVED BY THE FACULTY DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE.

6. APPEAL: ANY STUDENT MAY APPEAL TO THE FACULTY DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE FOR FURTHER CONSIDERATION OF THIS CASE.

ARTICLE V  
Shall read ELECTION CODE. Everything after

the first four paragraphs in the present constitution Article IV (Elections) shall be transferred to the By-Laws.

Section 1. j. THE VOTES FOR THE POSTS OF REPRESENTATIVE-AT-LARGE SHALL BE COUNTED AS FOLLOWS: IF ANY CANDIDATE OR CANDIDATES RECEIVE 31 PER CENT OR MORE THAN 31 PER CENT OF ALL VOTES CAST FOR THE REPRESENTATIVE-AT-LARGE IN THE PRELIMINARY BALLOTING, THEY SHALL BE DECLARED ELECTED; IF ONE CANDIDATE RECEIVES THE REQUISITE NUMBER OF VOTES FOR ELECTION, THE THREE CANDIDATES RECEIVING THE NEXT LARGEST NUMBER OF VOTES SHALL BE CONSIDERED CANDIDATES IN THE FINAL ELECTIONS AND THE ONE RECEIVING THE LARGEST NUMBER OF VOTES AT THAT TIME SHALL BE DECLARED ELECTED. IN THE EVENT THAT NO CANDIDATE RECEIVES 31 PER CENT OF ALL VOTES CAST, THE FIVE CANDIDATES RECEIVING THE LARGEST NUMBER OF VOTES CAST IN THE PRELIMINARY ELECTIONS SHALL BE CONSIDERED CANDIDATES IN THE FINAL BALLOTING, AT WHICH ELECTION THE THREE CANDIDATES RECEIVING THE LARGEST NUMBER OF VOTES SHALL BE CONSIDERED ELECTED.

Section 1. k. Each student shall have three votes. He may cast one vote for each of the three candidates.

Section 12. a. Senior, Junior and Sophomore Class officers shall be elected in THE REGULAR STUDENT BODY ELECTION.

b. DELETE WORDS "AND COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES."

d. OFFICERS OF THE SENIOR, JUNIOR AND SOPHOMORE CLASSES SHALL COMPLY WITH THE ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS SET FORTH IN ARTICLE III.

#### ARTICLE VI

(Amendments to By-Laws)  
a. Three-fourths of voting and non-voting student members shall be required to amend the By-Laws.

b. These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the Associated Students members at any Student Body ELECTION, provided the signed proposal is posted at least one week in advance and is published in full in El Gaucho.

If this revised constitution is adopted, the sections pertaining to elections shall take effect on April 12, 1949, and the rest of the constitution will go into effect on May 30, 1949.

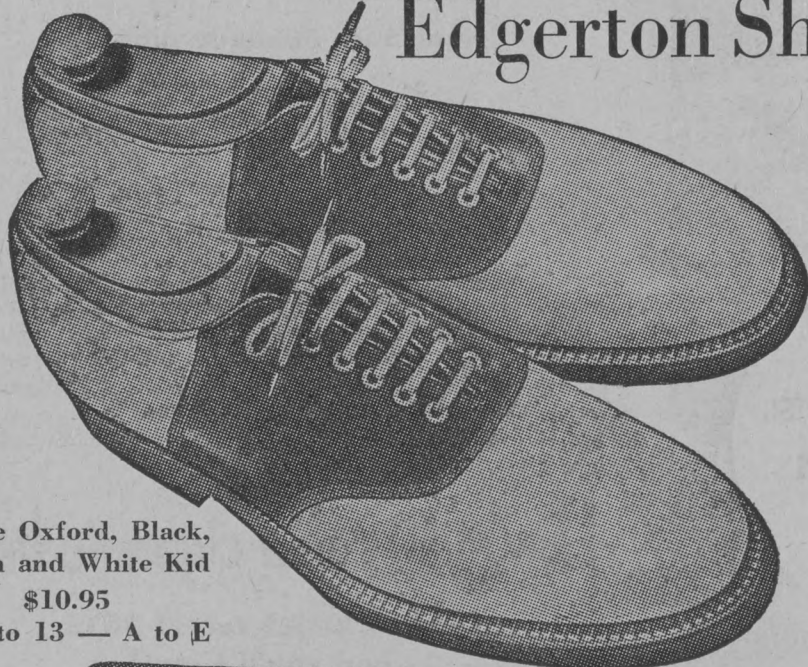
