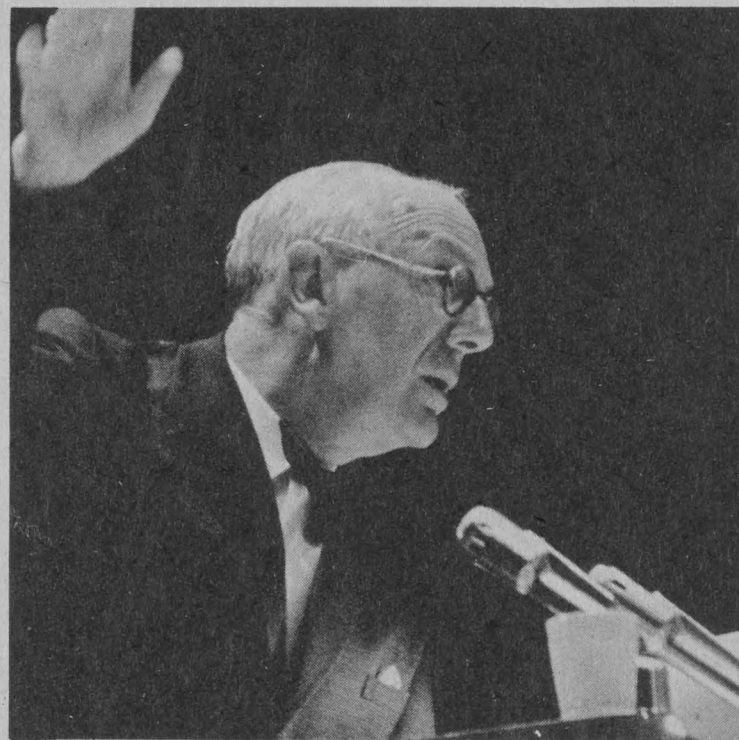

Kitto to deliver second lecture

"The Orestes -- Legend in Aeschylus" will be the topic of tomorrow's lecture by Dr. H.D.F. Kitto, Regents professor at 4 p.m. in Campbell Hall.

Second in a series of four, the lecture will be followed by "The Orestes -- Legend in Sophocles and Euripides," Oct. 24, and "Thucydides History of the Peloponnesian War," Nov. 7.

In each lecture Kitto attempts to show the similarities in literary outlook and structuring in the works of a Greek epic poet, two tragedians and a prose historian. His first address dealt with the Homeric Odyssey.

Kitto will discuss the Greek trilogy objectively, explaining the structural style and content of the plays which are nearly 2500 years old. "The Orestes," composed of "The Agamemnon," "The Libation Bearers," and "The Eumenides," discusses the timeless tragedy and triumph of man, the struggle to divine destiny through his own free and indomitable will.

The lecturer has written several books on Greek drama and is professor emeritus of Greek at the University of Bristol.

Moore's works at gallery

Currently on display at the Santa Barbara Museum of Art are works by Henry Moore, Jack Baker, and John Burton.

Henry Moore, residing in Muchhadden, England, is considered one of the outstanding sculptors of the twentieth century. Donald Brewer of the La Jolla Art Department assembled the collection of Moore's water color drawings. The Santa Barbara exhibit is the largest collection of Moore's works ever to be shown in southern California.

Jack Baker is an art teacher at the Santa Barbara High School. He has spent much time in Af-

rica working with the imperial school system. Several of his paintings displayed are centered around the African theme.

Oct. 10 and 24, hour long programs will be presented in the Museum's Lecture Gallery at 2 p.m. A short color film on "Henry Moore" and a lecture entitled "Contemporary Sculpture" by Vern Swansen, the Museum's Curator on Education will be featured. Swansen will speak on "Greek Vase Painting" Oct. 24.

John Alexander Pope, Director of the Freer Gallery of the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C., speaks on Angkor Oct. 14.

Mme. Nhu in states

NEW YORK -- Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu arrived here yesterday and spent a quiet night in her hotel. The Vietnamese ruling family member flew in from Paris where she harshly denounced American newsmen for their coverage of the protest burning of a Buddhist monk in Saigon.

Her father, the ex-Vietnamese ambassador to this country who resigned in protest against his country's suppression policies, told reporters that his daughter had a "very bad case of power madness".

Meanwhile, the new Vietnamese ambassador in Washington cautioned officials that only he can speak for his country, and that whatever Mme. Nhu says does not have the authority of the Vietnam government behind it.

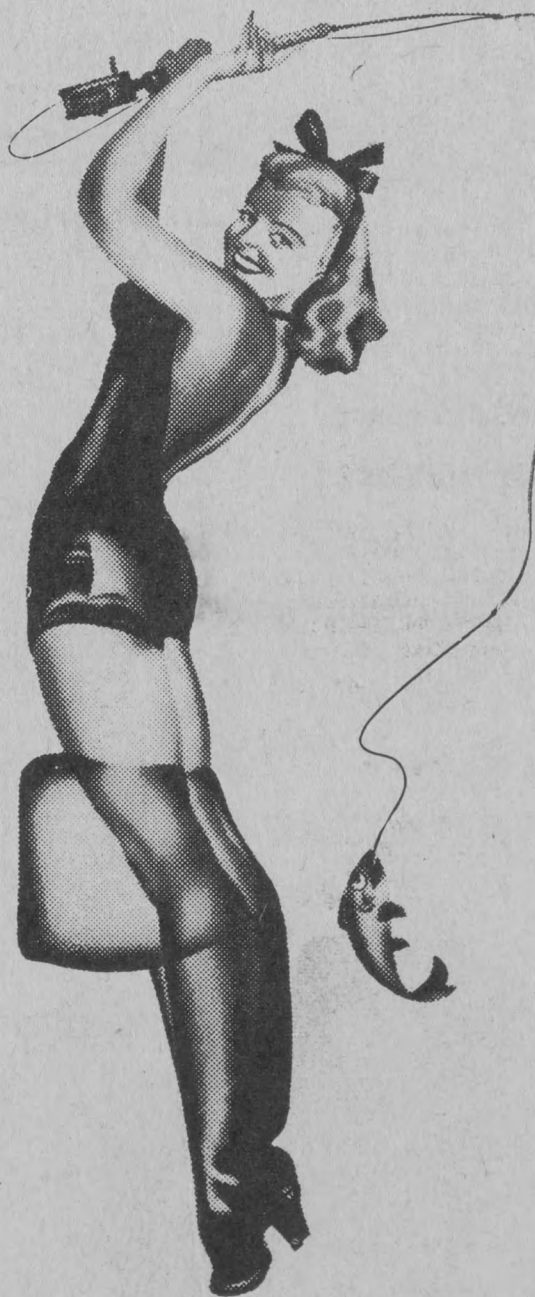
BIRMINGHAM -- Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. announced yesterday that he would give the city of Birmingham just two weeks to hire 25 Negroes as policemen. He warned that if his demand was not met, there would be renewed demonstrations in the city.

King left the idea in the minds of reporters that a national march on Birmingham was a strong possibility.

FLORIDA -- Hurricane Flora has left at least two nations in critical conditions. Both Cuba and Haiti have not only suffered tremendous loss of life, but are reeling under the loss of a significant part of their crops as well.

Staff seeks team improvement

Although the Gauchos scored and impressive 42-0 victory over Riverside last Saturday, the football coaching staff expressed mild displeasure over their team's performance after viewing films of the contest.

"We didn't look too good, and will have to improve, although it's pretty hard to tell because we didn't know exactly how good

Riverside was," stated coach Pete Rhielman.

Next Saturday UCSB plays Sacramento State at Sacramento. Last week Sacramento shut out Long Beach State, 4-0.

Backfield coach Rusty Fairly scouted the Long Beach-Sacramento game.

The Riverside game saw the biggest score that the Gauchos have racked up since 1952 when they beat Cal Poly, 48-0. In a scrimmage game in 1959 UCSB racked up an 83-6 total over lit-

tle Southern California College.

A previously inactive Gauchos rushing attack at Riverside game also was unveiled. Coach Jack Curtice's team had run just 53 running plays that gained 135 yards in their first two games. But UCR suffered through 47 Gauchos running plays that accumulated 250 yards.

Ernest Zomalt's two interceptions raised the Gauchos' season total to ten for three games, which should put them among the nation's leaders in that department.

A Delt spokesman termed the tournament "highly successful", and said that the fraternity plans to make the competition an annual affair.

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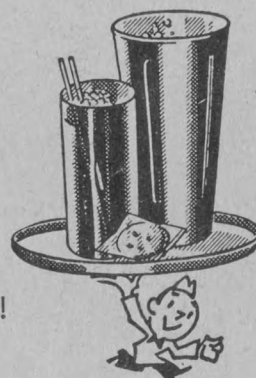
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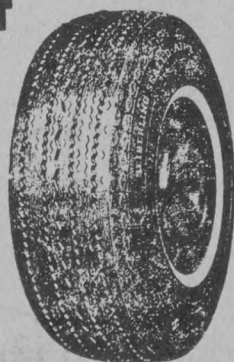
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
