Conducted by Carl Zytowski, the Little Orchestra is a chamber ensemble made up of University and Summer Session students.

Admission is free to this outdoor event. Patrons are urged to bring their blankets and cushions, to come out to sit under the stars, and to enjoy an evening of relaxing chamber music.

FAY-COOPER COLE TO TALK ON "SCOPES TRIAL" TODAY IN LECTURE HALL

"The Scopes Trial" will be the topic of a lecture at 8 p.m. today by Dr. Fay-Cooper Cole in the Classroom Building Lecture Hall.

Dr. Cole is a well-known anthropologist and a member of the staff of the National Science Foundation Summer Institute in Anthropology at UCSB. Chairman Emeritus of the Department of Anthropology at the University of Chicago, Dr. Cole has done extensive work in archaeology in the southwestern U.S. and Mississippi Valley and in ethnology in British Malaya and the Dutch East Indies.

This evening's lecture is the second in a current series on "Evolution in the Modern World" being presented this summer by the NSF Institute in Anthropology. Admission is free.
