From a field of nine upper class candidates, prominent Santa Barbara businessmen will choose the 1953 Homecoming Queen and her court of princesses at an all-school assembly tomorrow at 11.

The queen will be presented tomorrow night at the first performance of the Galloping Gaucho Revue; she will present the awards to winning skits on Friday night and will also present the prizes for the parade winners.

The candidates, sponsors and activities are as follows:

### NANCY CAMPBELL

Calling San Bernardino her home, this Sigma Kappa pledge is 17 years old and a transfer junior from Stephens College, Columbia, Mo. She is five feet six inches tall and weighs 130 pounds. Brown hair and hazel eyes complete the picture.





Elections were held last Wednesday to fill the offices for the freshman class. Chuck Eckert was chosen by the freshmen to head their class government. A runoff is being held today between Cynthia Billig and Dave Slagel, vice-presidential candidates, to determine who was chosen as second in command. Abbey French was elected to fill the remaining position of secretary-treasurer.

There were fifteen candidates in all—five for the office of president, six for vice-president and four for secretary-treasurer. The candidates for president were Jack Alder, Nick Bennion, Chuck Eckert, Bill Thomas and Richard Woodward; for vice-president, Cynthia Billig, Mike Bowman, Barbara Griffith, David Slagel, Carolyn Tisdale and Pat Wiese, and for secretary-treasurer, Beverly Bunch, Abby French, Martha Leeper and Marilyn Nollac.

According to Election Committee Chairman Teddy Tye, "Out of the freshman class less than half voted, which is a poor showing of class spirit. Let's have more participation from you freshmen in the coming activities!"

"A long-range plan is to be organized in such a way as to integrate freshmen into campus," said Chuck. "We will work with other groups on campus in order to get the experience necessary to take on some of the many campus responsibilities."

He says, "The social events all depend upon the cooperation of every freshman. We would like to have a class picnic in the near future and we would also like to sponsor an all-school dance of some kind."

Also Chuck stated, "I will work on the Legislative Council to represent the freshman class and, in general, will keep a sharp eye on the freshman class interests on campus."

# DEATH OF COED RESULTS FROM DIVING EXPEDITION

A sub-marine collecting expedition organized last Friday ended in the death of pretty, blonde senior Eva Lewin, a zoology major at Santa Barbara College.

With Dr. Donald M. Wootton, assistant professor of zoology at SBC, and Albert L. Harbury, a graduate of SBC, Eva went to the waters near the Mesa to dive for marine specimens, after spending part of the day in the waters off Stearn's Wharf, helping to collect materials for classroom use.

Al swam out on the surface before Dr. Wootton and Eva to check the clarity of the water and was followed by them. While still on the surface Dr. Wootton noticed that his air supply was running low and motioned Eva to return to shore. Eva clearly indicated by nodding her head that she was in agreement with this.



**Eva Lewin is dead. I know many of you were closer to her than I. For myself, if there is any consolation, it is that Eva was not so concerned with the future that she did not enjoy life from day to day. She was happy the day she died—doing the work that she wanted to do. I would like to believe that her rabbi spoke truly of Eva's death when he said: "Man is born to die; when he dies is unimportant."**

**To all of Eva's friends I can only say how sorry I am and how sorry that we were not able to save Eva.**

across the Atlantic, the biology laboratory located on a jutting palisade along the coastline of South Devon, where he worked for nine months, and a quiet country inn on the outskirts of Plymouth, where the family made its residence. 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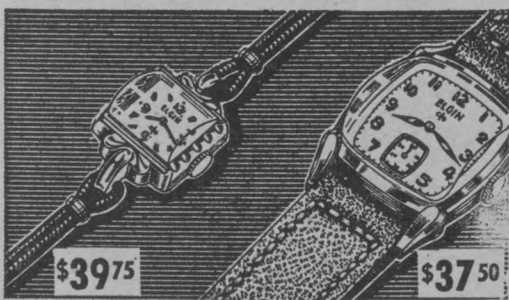
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Side by side, they swam back toward shore 10 to 15 yards when Eva suddenly stopped swimming; she removed her mouthpiece with an uncoordinated motion and clearly showed that she had lost control of herself. Wootton tried to get a response from her, but failed. He cleared her air line at that time and made sure that her air supply was adequate.

When he replaced the mouthpiece, she kept it there for a short time and then removed it with the same uncoordinated motion. In between these periods she swallowed water from the waves, more than she would have, had she been in control of herself.

Dr. Wootton removed her aqualung and, keeping her head above water as much as possible, brought her back to shore. Since Eva had not started to dive in the waters off the Mesa, she was using her lung on the surface only as a matter of convenience.

By this time, Al realized that they were in trouble and swam toward shore, reaching them just as Dr. Wootton brought Eva out of the water. He immediately started applying artificial respiration, prone pressure and arm lift method. He continued until the fire department crew arrived and began its unsuccessful attempts to revive Eva with a resuscitator.

It was emphasized that something happened to Eva to cause her to lose control of herself, what it was is not known. Emphasis was also placed on the fact that the aqualung could not have been the cause of the accident, nor could the safety valve, since this is operative only after all air is exhausted. Wootton could still breathe out of the lung when it was tested no the beach after it had floated on the water, automatically discharging air for an undetermined number of minutes.

Eva was fully qualified in the safe use of the aqualung in underwater diving. She had three training sessions of approximately one hour each in a pool, during which she learned, not only how to use the lung, but also how to combat any difficulties that might possibly arise in connection with aqualung diving.

Dr. Wootton is an expert diver, not only because of his wide experience with the aqualung, but also because of special instruction he took at Scripps Institute of Oceanography at La Jolla. He was at Eva's side throughout the entire time they were in the water. Neither Wootton nor Eva did any underwater diving during this session.

Al Harbury has had training and experience in using the aqualung in underwater work in the ocean. He has completed the American National Red Cross senior course of instruction in life saving and water safety, which includes training in the latest methods of artificial respiration.

Memorial services for Eva Lewin will be held Friday night at 8:15 pm at the B'Nai B'rith Temple at 2112 Santa Barbara Street. This is a special service to which all those who knew Eva in Santa Barbara are invited. Rabbi Max H. Kert will officiate.

It has been requested that flowers be omitted at the service Friday. It is felt that the money that might have gone into flowers for this service might better be added to the memorial fund which has been created with the desire that an Eva Lewin Memorial Award go annually to a girl student interested in marine biology; not necessarily a girl with high grades, but one with an enthusiasm similar to that of Eva's.

## Is There Anyone For Colonel's Coeds?

The ROTC program was first established at Santa Barbara College in 1947. In order to assist the ROTC cadets and stimulate interest in the program, the Colonel's Coeds were formed in 1950. The organization consists of 20 women, five from each of the four classes, with the honorary ranks of Colonel (seniors) Major (juniors), Captain (sophomores), and Lieutenant (freshmen).

The members are elected by vote of the ROTC cadets, based on scholarship, participation in campus activities, and popularity. All candidates for membership must have at least a scholastic average of C in the required number of units. Election of new freshmen members is held in the Spring semester. Vacancies occurring in other classes are filled at the same time or at any other time determined by the group.

The fall election will fill vacancies for one senior, four juniors, and two sophomores. Application forms will be mailed to all sorority houses and boarding houses with five or more girls on Oct. 14. Additional applications may be obtained from the Military Science Department. All applications must be turned in to the eDan of Women's office by Oct. 22, and should be accompanied by a photograph, if possible. Photographs may be turned in to the Dean of Women's office as late as Oct. 26, but applications will not be accepted after Oct. 22.

Election by the ROTC cadets will take place on Oct. 28 and 29. All applicants will be notified of the winners as soon as possible thereafter, according to Captain Mercer M. Dody. Colonel's Coeds will be presented at a ceremony in the near future.

In past years, activities of the group have included being present at ROTC ceremonies, participation in the annual Military Ball and joint social functions with members of Scabbard and Blade, national honorary military organization. Pins showing insignia of rank have been adopted by the group and are worn at all ceremonies and on Thursday of each week.

In 1952-53 the Colonel's Coeds operated the program concession at the football games and Easter Relays. Some similar project is undertaken each year to produce funds and minimize the cost of activities to the individual.

Additional activities under consideration by the group are a picnic for incoming freshmen men, awards for outstanding ROTC students, and presentation of a program at a student assembly.

The Colonel's Coeds at present are Doris Claire, Jodi Buckle, Peggy Eagan, Linda Wallschlaeger (seniors), Terry Osterhaus (junior), Judy Curry, Margaret Murdock, and Pat Dominus (sophomores). Captain Dody urges all women students to apply for membership.

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# GAUCHOS ABSORB 59-6 DRUBBING BY CAL POLY

Cal Poly's Mustangs gave notice last Saturday night that San Luis Obispo wasn't the place to come for a team seeking its first win. Coach Roy Hughes' big Poly squad made an example out of the Gauchos to the tune of 59-6 as they won their eighth straight conference game in two years and practically clinched their second straight CCAA championship.

Right halfback Dale Miller scampered 43 yards after pulling in a 40 yard pass from Bucky Baird late in the final period for the only Santa Barbara score.

The Gauchos fumbled twice and threw a pass into the arms of the opposition early in the first half, and this was all that was needed to take the spirit out of the inexperienced Blue and Gold eleven. The Mustangs, playing heads up football, cashed in the mistakes for touchdowns with fullback Lawson bulling his way aver from the six, end Dick Moran recovering a S.B. bobble in the end zone, and halfback Perry Jeter scampering 19 yards to paydirt after collecting a pass from Bob Neal.

Apparently trying to make up for lost time at halftime, the San Luis men quickly added two more markers to lead 33-0 with the game a little better than half over.

The Gauchos, determined to score, filled the air with passing in the later stages of the game, completing eight out of sixteen. Left halfbacks Sal Padilla and Bucky Baird led separate drives which brought the Blue and Gold into Mustang territory only to be stopped once by fumble and another time by interception. Ends Charlie Green and Britton Tresville and halfback Dale Miller were on the receiving end of the aeriels.

It was Miller who then contributed the only Gaucho score on a pass from Baird which covered 88 yards with only 35 seconds remaining.

Coach Stan Williamson stated after the game that he now agrees with Colliers Magazine that Cal Poly is the most powerful small college on the West Coast and added "they were just too big and too experienced for us. They won't lose a game this season." Ol' Stan is happy with the improvement of the passing attack, however, and thinks the Gauchos are capable of winning every remaining game if the improvement is an indication of things to come.
