# No Clear Choice for Democrat Or GOP Presidential Candidates

Now that the important Michigan and Maryland primaries are over, the Presidential candidates are preparing for the home stretch in the race for the nomination of their parties. What appeared to be an obvious choice two weeks ago is now ambiguous. A first ballot victory at either convention now is more dream than certainty.

In the last two weeks, Jimmy Carter was defeated by two newcomers, California Governor Jerry Brown and Sen. Frank Church, while narrowly defeating Mo Udall in Connecticut and Michigan.

In the Democratic race, there are still 1,023 delegates to be chosen, 743 in primaries. Carter is ahead with 741, uncommitted number 363, and Udall has 292. A total of 1,505 delegates is

needed to win the nomination, which means that Carter must win 76 percent of the remaining delegates for a first ballot victory.

Carter's bandwagon has slowed down. In all three states involved in last week's primaries, he was substantially ahead three weeks prior to the primary. The erosion of this support agrees with several polls that have shown his support to be "soft" and susceptible to others.

Though he won in Maryland, Brown garnered no delegates. He did, however, win two delegates in Vermont Saturday. The eleven delegates pledged to Henry Jackson in Maryland have stated their preference for Brown. Brown will also pick up some of the delegates pledged to Sargent Shriver, who endorsed him a few weeks ago.

Today there are six primaries.

Carter is expected to win in Arkansas, Tennessee, and Kentucky. Church will win in his home state of Idaho. Brown is expected to win Nevada easily.

Oregon is the sixth primary and features a hotly contested race between Carter and Church, with a write-in campaign by Brown. Carter and Brown are even, with Church far behind in the polls.

Of the 177 delegates at stake, Carter is expected to win 100, giving him over 800 delegates. Church and Wallace should win 20 to 30 delegates each, and Brown will win about 10 delegates. Udall is waging a token campaign in the three Southern primaries.

In the Republican race, Ronald Reagan is ahead of Ford by 508 to 435 delegates, with 378 (Cont. on p.6, col.1)

# North Hall-Ellison Area Bike Closure

The Transportation and Joint Bicycle Committees are going to create yet another pedestrian "diamond lane," only this time, the new bike-free area will be even larger. Beginning tomorrow, the central "campus core" between South Hall, the library, North Hall and Ellison Hall will be closed to bicycles.

Cyclists will be channeled by police officers onto the existing bikeway north of the library, and will have to park on the west side of Ellison or in the main Phelps-Ellison parking lot, where the bike racks from the south side of Ellison will be relocated.

The blockade will be set up only as an experiment for a two week period. "The overall goal of the experiment is to determine ... if the separation of cyclists and pedestrians in selected areas will reduce the accident rate, while not greatly inconveniencing the cyclist," stated Mark Perbix, Advisor to the Student Bike Committee.

Bicycle safety has become the concern of the University as the accident rate has increased alarmingly over the past two years. Community Service Organization (CSO) estimates that one out of every five students has been involved in some kind of accident in the school year.

"I think it's important that people realize the magnitude of the bike problem that exists today," Perbix said.

In conjunction with the experiment, an opinion survey of 1400 students and 600 faculty and staff will be conducted to determine the overall attitude toward the experiment and bikes in general. Perbix considers student opinion very important in assessing the experiment,

"because we want to have student approval."

The survey and data collected from the experiment will be evaluated over the summer before any referrals are made. So far, the committees have expressed a high degree of satisfication with the first phase, the blockade between South Hall and the Library, but noted that they have received little student feedback on that.

Other bicycle improvement plans are being considered, such as building underpasses and new paths, including one connecting the Old Gym and Robertson Gym through Lot 21. But these projects are costly, and Perbix feels it unlikely that they will be receiving enough money to complete them.

One of the negative effects of setting up the barriers may be the use of alternative means of transportation, including cars, as bicycle riding becomes more and more of an inconvenience. Perbix noted that this is a possibility, and the survey will help to determine how great a risk this may be. But he feels that this should not inconvenience cyclists so much as to force them to drive cars to campus, when they are within cycling distance.

"I think the survey response will probably be in favor of it because, at some point, everybody gets off their cycles to walk, and they will know they benefit from it." Perbix is not looking forward to student response Wednesday, which he feles will be "shitty," but says, "Once people change their routine, they should temper their reactions."

Perbix is happy about the plan, "This is something that should have been done two years ago, and is finally being done now."

# Economic Problems Rank at Top for Endsley

Supervisorial Candidate Sees

Thus feels Julian Endsley, and if elected to the Board of Supervisors from the Third District, he intends to do something about these problems.

There are no organized groups supporting Endsley's candidacy. "I am not owned by anybody" he reported, "If I got a check from an industry I'd honestly send it back. I don't want to be in that position."

If elected, Endsley said, "I would be a full-time supervisor. That is one of the bigger headaches of the past. I think it's high time some second administrative assistant wasn't saddled with responsibility handed to him by the elected official."

Endsley advocates a growth rate for the district of about .5 percent. He feels the growth rate should "be geared to the natural growth rate of all permanent district residents. I can't accept a positive no vote on growth. I don't see any moral

leave just because he exceeds some growth limit."

To solve the problems currently facing the third district Endsley believes cooperation between the various sectors of the community is necessary. "I think we should sit down with industry, government, the Water Board and commerce and talk a little serious turkey about working together to eliminate unemployment and producing a growth rate within the limits already discussed," said Endsley.


"Someone needs to get their heads together and point the direction in which it can be done," he continued. "We need positive cooperation in overcoming the economic depression. And it can be done without great heavy growth."

Concerning Isla Vista Endsley stated, "It has special advantages and problems,

it's a very unique situation. It deserves consideration, it deserves a little governmental thought. It's about time somebody carried a little county government out that way."

Endsley does not favor I.V. incorporation at this time. "I don't like seeing anybody do what they can't afford," he said, adding that neither I.V. nor Goleta can presently afford incorporation. "There's no way to pay for incorporation overhead and keep pace with owning the homes we're paying taxes on. There's nothing wrong with incorporation but we can't afford it."

Endsley feels that alternative energy sources such as solar heating need more research, and that the business community should work with the district in providing it. "We're back to the old dollar and cent question," Endsley stated. "Seems to me there are better ways of

pursuing alternative energy sources." Rather than leave it up to the district alone, Endsley said "we should encourage industry and government to unite to work on these things."

ISRAELI PRIME MINISTER RABIN has rejected demands by Israeli Arabs for an end to government land purchases in the occupied West Bank. Rabin also turned down calls for an investigation of the March 30 rioting in which five Arabs were killed. The riots erupted during protests over the government's plans to allow settlements in the occupied territory. Arab leaders dispute the official reports on the

SOVIET PREMIER KOSYGIN will visit Syria and Iraq early next month, according to the Russian news agency Tass. The announcement came as Saudi Arabia and Kuwait continue their efforts to reconcile the Syrian and Egyptian regimes. The Soviets and Iraq have been working to bring Syrian President Assad into the "radical camp" of Libya, Algeria and Iraq, which oppose the Sinai Agreement worked out by Secretary of State Kissinger.

SAUDI ARABIA'S KING KHALED arrived in Tehran for a five day state visit to discuss the security of the Persian Gulf. Both the Saudi's and the Shah of Iran have undertaken big military buildups in efforts to attain dominance over the vital waterway.

The gulf is essential to the vast oil exports of both nations, and it is hoped that the King's visit will lessen the two monarch's mutual distrust. Nearly 86 percent of the world's oil moves through the Persian Gulf. Its security has been a bone of contention between the two gulf powers since the British withdrew from the area.

SWEDISH PREMIER PALME and Secretary of State Kissinger held talks in Stockholm in which the Swedish leader told Kissinger that he was not as concerned as the United States over the election of Communists to southern European governments. Palme's remarks referred to the Italian elections early next month, in which the Communist Party is expected to win enough seats in the Parliament to gain a role in the government. Palme conceded that he and Kissinger did not "see eye to eye" but that they had a "good exchange of views."

CONCORDE SUPERSONIC JETLINER SERVICE to Washington's Dulles Airport was nearly marked by disaster. As the controversial plane was coming in for a landing on its first day of scheduled service, a light single-engine aircraft intruded into its path and the two planes came within 400 feet of each other. The only effect of the near disaster was the the British Concorde was four minutes late in its arrival.



# **Defense and Prevention Tips** Offered During Rape Forum

"70 percent of the rapes in Isla Vista occur on a date or in a dating environment," Foot Patrol officer Ellen Stetson said at a recent Rape Forum. Stetson warned a small but attentive group of women that the basic defense against rape is to think ahead to avoid circumstances which might make a woman vulnerable in a rape-risky situation.

Using Storaska's film, "How to Say No to a Rapist ... and Survive" as a guide, the rape forum, sponsored by UCSB's Community Service Organization was designed to give students an increased awareness as well as alternative viewpoints on the subject of rape.

Storaska's film explained rape as a hate emotion, whereby the rapist attempts to humiliate the woman. According to Storaska, the most effective way to deal with a rapist is to treat him as a person and to make sure you

represent no threat to his security. Storaska advocates going along with the assault attitudinally. "Emulate humility," he said.

Speaking against the use of weapons in a rape situation, Storaska maintained weapons are not always readily available and may serve merely to anger the rapist. "IF you insist on a weapon (such as an object in your purse) take it in both hands and ram it into his upper lip," Storaska explained.

Storaska also spoke of the use of physical force as a means of warding off a rapist. According to Storaska, most women are not adequately trained in self defense and would have a difficult time mustering up the anger and fortitude necessary to inflict serious pain. "Both men and women must know their own

psychological limitations," Stetson stressed.

If physical force is the only alternative, Storaska advocates one of the following techniques, pushing heavily against the rapist's eyes with your thumbs and squeezing his testicles. "These are the only techniques that will always, without failure, work," Storaska claimed.

In addition, Storaska warned against the effectiveness of screaming, crying and yelling. "It may work 50 percent of the time, but the other 50 percent the rapist will turn around and beat the woman. In addition to raping her, he will assault her, he warned.

Storaska suggested playing along with the rapist until the woman is sure she can safely take some form of positive action. Storaska cited examples of successful rape prevention such as throwing up on the rapist, pretending to faint, or acting as though the woman enjoyed it until she was in a position where she could take positive deterrent action.

Without mitigating the dangers of rape, Storaska emphasized the importance of putting rape in its proper perspective. "It's still better to be raped and come out alive rather than dead," he stated.

Officer Stetson outlined the following precautions in order to minimize the chances of being raped: lock windows and doors of your home and car, always let someone know where you are

and when you plan to return, know the dangerous areas and always be aware of where you can go to for help.

In addition, Stetson warned women against hitchhiking. "It's like playing russian roulette," she explained.

For those women who insist on hitchhiking, she stressed the six following precautions; ride with a female, do not ride with a group, look in the car to notice if the door handle is engaged, ask where the driver is going before he asks you and do not accept rides with individuals who for any reason seem suspicious.



# Vote YES For Recall

Former RHA President Greg Evans has stated that Aaron Chaney's and Greg Boyer's "attitude pretty well shows their lack of concern for the dorm students." This states the case succinctly. In Boyer's and Chaney's own words, "our primary reason for running for office was to secure funding for the water polo team." A noble purpose? Only if their constituency were the water polo team.

The water polo team is not their constituency. Both Chaney and Boyer were elected by residents of the dorms, otherwise known as the Resident Halls Association (RHA). The RHA constitution states, "No person shall be eligible to hold any office in the RHA who is not, at the time of election, and during their term of office, a member of the UCSB RHA."

It is true that Chaney and Boyer are currently residents of RHA, but it is also true that they have not taken out contracts to live in the dorms next year.

Both Chaney and Boyer have stated that they will resign in the fall when they will no longer be RHA members. It is clear now, however, that they in no way represent the constituency from which they were elected. In the words of their promoter, Ed Mackie,

"Greg (Boyer) was kind of interested in politics at the time, and Aaron (Chaney) just came along for the ride."

Water Polo Coach Dante Dettamanti has urged Chaney and Boyer to resign, or abstain from voting on water polo funding in order to keep politics out of water polo.

Boyer and Chaney have made no attempt to represent their constitutency; they have never attended an RHA meeting, and are in no position to know what the interests of RHA are. The two have missed Leg Council meetings, and have attempted to appoint proxies, which have no interests in the dorms, to take their place.

If residents of the campus dormitories are interested in their representation on A.S. Leg Council, then they must make an effort to vote in the recall election to be held Wednesday and Thursday. Turnout is very important in this election, as a recall requires 25 percent of the constituency to vote (about 650 voters). RHA members have no choice but to vote YES, in favor of the recall of Greg Boyer and Aaron Chaney.

# Representation is Violated

Editor, Daily Nexus:

On May 26 and May 27, a recall election vote will be held for RHA representatives Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer. The Residence Halls Association of UCSB, the representatives for dorm residents, encourages all dorm students to vote FOR their recall. Being a non-political representative body, it was difficult to make this decision. However, when the RIGHT of dorm student representation is violated, we feel it our duty to do everything in our power to correct it. Both Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer have violated their right. With this in mind, the RHA unanimously voted to obtain signatures to initiate a recall election, and endorse a YES vote on their recall. The RHA bases its decision on the following information:

1.) Both Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer have not submitted their contracts to live in the residence halls next year, which shows their lack of interest in the body they were elected to represent. Even if they submitted their contracts today, they would not be accepted, as the deadline has passed. Both Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer were informed of this fact by the RHA prior to the deadline.

2.) Since they will not be living in the residence halls, they are violating Article IV, Section 1 of the RHA Constitution which states: "No person shall be eligible to hold any office in the RHA who is not, at the time of the election, and during their term of office, a member of the UCSB RHA."

3.) Both Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer have never attended any of the RHA meetings which they are required to attend. Since they have not attended, how can they possibly know of dorm interests, and vote accordingly at A.S. Legislative Council?

# Recent Leg Council Action Places Future of A.S. Concerts in Jeopardy

There is more than just magic in music. There is a unifying force that brings people together. Yet it now seems apparent that the special performances which have graced the UCSB campus, through it's top-ranked concert program, will be terminated as of this year. Recent action taken by Leg Council to eliminate the A.S. Concerts coordinator position, held by Jim Curnutt, has placed the future of the concerts program in immediate jeopardy.

The validity of Curnutt's \$13,000 a year salary, as well as the fact that he is no longer a student at UCSB, were cited by proponents of the measure last Thursday at Leg Council. One must wonder if a certain amount of personal grievances has kept these "student representatives" from realizing the full impact of their decision.

Elimination of the salaried coordinator position would also lead to the eventual demise of the entire A.S. Concerts

production unit. At present, the committee is recognized by promoters and their acts as the most active campus organization of its type in the state.

Sepp Donahower of Pacific Presentations gives one reason why: "You can't promote a program with consistent quality unless you have somebody to coordinate it all, and give your program some continuity." A representative of International Creative Management had this to say: "Our artists like to play Santa Barbara for a number of reasons. One of them is that UCSB has a professional coordinator who's been there a long time. Artists like to work with professionals and the program at UCSB is consistently good."

This consistency can be directly related to the experience Curnutt has gained working at his position. His established reputation has helped him book high quality acts at this campus: Rod Stewart, The Beach Boys and Bruce Springsteen to name but a few. Top booking agents would be less likely to respond to an inexperienced student in the role of

coordinator, and thus, the quality and quantity of acts booked would be reduced substantially.

Replacing Curnutt at his position with non-salaried students would also create various other major problems. Since Curnutt can be found in his office every weekday for about eight hours or more, it seems highly improbable that a student could man the position and still devote his time to studies.

Even if this could be arranged, it's hard to imagine anyone who would effectively run the position for no salary. It should be clear that concerts coordinator is a full time job requiring a full time salary.

The size of Curnutt's salary has also been disputed, although proponents of the measure to eliminate his office seem to ignore the dollars that each concert pours into the A.S. Reserves. Also omitted from their reasoning is the prestige and fringe benefits a successful concerts program adds to the university.

Elimination of the program would lead to sole dominance of the Santa Barbara (Cont. on p.5, col.1)





concert scene by professional promoters, whose prices have ranged from up to four dollars above the student price charged by A.S. Concerts.

Pacific Presentations, who presents the majority of County Bowl shows, allows for special student discounts partly because of its strong relationship with Curnutt and A.S. Concerts.

A.S. Concerts, in the last five years, has proved to be one of the more valuable resources in the UCSB community. Elimination of the head position, due to a few members of Leg Council, would cause the collapse of the whole concert program at UCSB.

This would lead to higher ticket prices, low quality acts, and a lot of trips to L.A. to see one's favorite performers. Then the university itself would lose one of its landmarks, and sink into an anonymity that plagues the majority of college campuses today.

uncommitted. However, Ford
recently received the
endorsement of .88 of 97
uncommitted delegates from
Pennsylvania. Only 1,130
delegates are needed to win at the
Republican Convention.

The Republicans hold primaries today in the same six primaries as the Democrats, except that only 172 delegates are to be chosen. As of last Friday, President Ford was ahead only in Oregon with Tennessee being a toss-up. Reagan should win between 90 and 105 delegates, Ford around 60, with the rest being uncommitted.

Unlike the Democrats, ten

states will make their final delegate selections after the June 8 primary. These states have a total of 290 delegates and the momentum established on June 8 would be a decisive factor in their selection of delegates.

Neither party wants a convention fight, yet both will probably get one. Jimmy Carter has already stated that if he is short of the needed 1,505 delegates, he will "deal" to get the one or two hundred that he might need.

The deciding factor at both conventions will be the uncommitted delegates. There will be 400 to 500 uncommitted delegates at each convention, many controlled by party officials.


#### How to Take Tests How to Catch Up



# **RHA Recall Election**

# Argument in Favor

Today and tomorrow, a recall election will be held for RHA Representatives Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer. The Residence Halls Association encourages all dorm residents to vote **FOR** their recall. We base our case on the following information:

Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer have not submitted their contracts to live in the residence halls for next year. This not only shows a lack of interest in the group they were elected to represent, but is in direct violation of Article IV, Section 1, of the RHA Constitution which states: "No person shall be eligible to hold any office in the RHA who is not, at the time of election, and during their term of office, a member of the UCSB RHA."

Mr. Chaney and Mr. Boyer have admitted their special interest. In an article entitled "Water Polo Reps Can Take the Heat," from Friday's Nexus, Chaney and Boyer freely admit the primary reason they sought office was to secure funds for the Water Polo Team. Not only is this unethical and amoral, but it violates Article IV, Section 2, Number 3, of the RHA Constitution which plainly

states: "The Associated Students Representatives shall represent the **RHA** in the Associated Students Legislature."

Chaney's lack of knowledge about his office is demonstrated by his threat to recall Dana King. Dana King was the representative who held Aaron's office prior to the April election. In the same speech, Mr. Chaney clarified his position by stating, "I'm on Leg Council, and I don't have to follow those RHA By-Laws."

Neither Chaney or Boyer have attended any of the required RHA meetings, which further demonstrates their lack of interest in the body they are suppose to represent. How can they possibly know of dorm interests and vote accordingly at A.S. Legislative Council?

With these facts in mind, it is important to remove these people who are solely dedicated to the monetary interests of the UCSB Water Polo Team. Since we are the group that elected them, we hold the responsibility of recalling them. **VOTE FOR** the recall of Aaron Chaney and Greg Boyer.
