

versity, its administration, and its students. In addition, this networking system will provide the students with access to job opportunities, internships and scholarships. The networking system will provide a voice (the majority of people are now excluded from the A.S. decision-making process) and a sense of togetherness. This will potentially promote togetherness. This is a low cost plan with a promising long term return. The MicroComputer Lab has already agreed to support this plan once A.S. authorizes its budget. This year, I prepared a survey paper for the Office of Budget and Planning and for Parking Services that includes establishing map boards at key locations to make permanent, short and long term temporary information (such as location of bike-paths, areas of construction, pedestrian walkways, etc.) more accessible. As A.S. president I will turn this project into a reality. Real communication means real progress. An effective government requires a means of communication easily accessible and visible to everyone. — vote for Michael Lieberman.

I am running for A.S. President in order to activate current A.S. committees that are ineffective due to poor panel coordination by the Legislative Council. My past work with A.S. committees has convinced me that, in order for A.S. government to adequately represent the entire student body and avoid falling prey to inappropriate agendas, all of its task forces must be energetic and must communicate with each other. The failure to communicate often results in a lack of student awareness of basic issues and this, in turn, leads to a defiant attitude amongst students. The student government then does not act upon the interests of the entire student body. As past Chairman of the Campus Development Committee, I was able to see the lack of structure this program suffered from before my appointment. My approach of unification, re-

flected in work on the Long Range Development Plan (LRDP) and the bicycle transportation system, was honored by the Campus Activity Center as the "Most Creative Program of the Year" in 1992. As A.S. President I would like committees like this to be the rule rather than the exception. I will propose that each council member take responsibility for insuring that at least two of the A.S. committees are active and in the public eye. In order to achieve this goal, council members would participate in an outdoor A.S. Open House in the Fall to increase awareness about committees and to recruit members.

As A.S. President, I will open lines of communication on campus between faculty members, students and administrators by establishing open access to University affairs and events through a computer networking system. For instance, there will be an electronic kiosk system on campus, making possible the "on-line" electronic interaction between the Uni-


I plan to run Leg Council more fairly and efficiently. Every



Problems include Regent reform, Academic Minors, Student governance of facilities we pay for- the library (\$13.7 million/yr.), and other important issues.

My other goals include cutting some of the bureaucratic waste in A.S. Do you feel like you get your \$38.15/quarter worth out of A.S.? I want to strive to increase communication

within our student government's various boards and committees and encourage legislative council to focus on these goals. I am concerned with the quality of life here at UCSB. 



Edwin Lopez






I will also work on parking services and attempt to increase parking spaces that are conveniently close to the dorms and not a ten to fifteen minute walk away.

Jon Kolastain



Brian Crone



The University of California Student Association was founded in 1972 as a response to the University's Office of the President's attempt to institute a tuition at the university, which would have required students to pay for the total cost of instruction. By stating that this practice would be in direct conflict with the State's long-established commitment to accessible, affordable higher education, UCSA was successful in stopping the tuition from being implemented. Since that time, UCSA has been the sole venue for united statewide student formulation of academic and financial aid policies, serving as a highly valued source of information for State policy makers seeking the student perspective on issues pertinent to higher education. UCSA's staff and active membership numbers over 150, and is stewarded by a Board of Directors, consisting of elected representatives from each of the nine campuses in the system.

Throughout its history, UCSA has been active in the struggle to increase the amount of student involvement in the University's statewide decision-making processes, specifically at the Regent level. Currently, UCSA is involved with three pieces of legislation at the State Capitol that would, if passed, democratize the Regent nomination and appointment processes and increase the accessibility of the Board of Regents as a whole. UCSA has been at the forefront of student action in this area for several years.

UCSA has also sought to increase the diversity of the University throughout its history. Today, UCSA, in conjunction with MALDEF, the American Federation of Teachers, and other groups is

seeking to institute a "Pipeline Project", a program which seeks to increase the number of students of color enrolled in the engineering disciplines, computer science, lab sciences, and mathematics at the University, thereby increasing the amount of minority candidates for professorships (to diversify the faculty as well as the student body). UCSA has long advocated for a higher level of commitment from the University in the areas of early academic outreach, affirmative action, and in the funding of CalGrants.

Also, UCSA serves as a watchdog at the Capitol and at the University's Office of the President, serving as a valuable on the spot advocate for the concerns of the students on the campuses, as well as a desperately needed source of information for both the students and the lawmakers. Recently, UCSA was successful in thwarting an attempt to eliminate both the Native American Heritage Commission and the Commission on the Status of Women in Sacramento, two commissions vital to the protection of students' rights at the state level.

For over twenty years, UCSA has provided the student with a viable means to inform the University's Office of the President (UCOP) and the state Legislature of the issues that UC students face. Without UCSA, student concerns would most likely be ignored by the UCOP and lost among the red tape and shuffle in Sacramento. UCSA is vital to the continuance of united statewide student action and coherent student advocacy in California.

In 1991 the Associated Students passed a measure to support the University Children's Center by contributing \$3.00 per quarter to help subsidize child care tuitions for student parents. In this Spring 1993 election, each undergraduate student is asked to continue their support. All moneys raised remain on this campus and go directly to support student parents with children. These moneys allow the Children's Center to provide a tiered tuition schedule with faculty and staff paying the full cost per month of \$450 for children 3 to 5 years old and student parents paying approximately 66% of the full cost or \$300 per month.

Currently over 50% of all student children served are from minority/international families, and of the children from undergraduate student families 43% are from single parent families. Student parents are the most under supported minority on this

campus and they need your support. **STUDENT PARENTS ARE NOT ASKING FOR FREE CHILD CARE, ONLY AFFORDABLE CHILD CARE!**

It is in the best interest of each and everyone of us to help ensure positive beginnings for young children and to offer support to families as they strive for a better education. We need to continue our commitment to diversity at UCSB. We also need to greatly increase our support for the many single parent women who are striving to pursue their education while shouldering the responsibility of parenthood.

A.S. Bike Shop: Do you support continued funding of Seventy-five cents (\$.75) per AS/UCSB Membership per quarter for A.S. Bike Shop

The Associated Student Bike Shop is a non-profit bicycle safety, repair, and education facility. It is also the sole entity on the campus of the University of California at Santa Barbara to provide to the students, staff, faculty, and alumni, therein, free services and goods (i.e.: oil; grease; rags; cleaning solvents; air outlets; hand cleaner; work stands; truing stands; specialty tools; mechanic help and advice; totaling approximately \$20,000.00 per year). The Associated Student Bike Shop provides free service to as many as 25,000 students, staff, faculty, and alumni per year (this number does not reflect customers using services *without* a purchase, so the overall number of customers being served could be as much as twice this amount). Until 1991, the A.S. Bike Shop paid for these free goods and services out of its annual parts, and employee wage budget without any compensation, or the ability to turn any revenue on these funds. As of the 1991 vote in which students gave a 90% approval vote, the A.S. Bike Shop has come within \$1200.00 to the goal of breaking even.

The Associated Student Bike Shop does not operate as a "normal", privately owned, and operated bicycle retail outlet (i.e.: loaning free tools and other said bicycle related repair goods, and services; not selling a full inventory of bicycle related goods such as clothing, helmets, bicycles, and expensive high performance, high profit items due to shop space; the shop is closed December, and most of the summer months due to student population reductions; and no bicycle sales). The A.S. Bike Shop does operate as a bicycle

repair and safety education center, providing the campus population access to do their own repairs with the proper tools and experienced mechanical advice. *There is no other bicycle shop that provides the free services that the A.S. Bike Shop does.*

Without the lock in budget, the A.S. Bike Shop will operate at a loss due to cost increases, employee wage increases, accounting increases, and most of all, cost of free goods, and services. The shop cannot be solvent with the annual revenues it receives from parts sales, as well as, the annual debts it incurs. Thus, the Associated Student Bike Shop asks that the lock in of .75 cents be continued to provide the invaluable service to all campus populants. The resulting \$34,875.00 allows the shop to pay its bills, and continue to offer the campus population the free goods, and services it has become so well known for. We feel that this measure is the only way that the shop can survive if it is to keep serving the students, staff, faculty, and alumni of this campus without closing permanently. The shop has always promoted bicycle safety, education, and repair for those who want to learn about, as well as, maintain the vehicle that they must ride to class and/or work on a daily basis. Losing this valuable entity would be a great loss to the safety education, and service that the Associated Students has provided to the students, staff, faculty, and alumni, for fifteen years.

Student Health Center: Do you support continued funding of Twelve dollars (\$12.00) per AS/UCSB Membership per quarter for the Student Health Center

Due to the current funding crises of the State of California, reaffirmation of the \$12 lock-in fee for the campus' Student Health service (SHS) is more important than ever. Two years ago, the Associated Student Body passed the original initiative by an impressive two-thirds vote. The original "pro" statement, printed in the Nexus on April 22, 1991, was written by Michael Chester, Associated Student President. Mr. Chester supported the lock-in fee because he believed it would allow the SHS to survive the following situations without resorting to crippling cutbacks in staff, services, or equipment:

- The recent and future cutbacks in funding by the State
- The inability of minimal increases in registration fees to offset large increases in health care costs
- The inability to use proposed tuition fee increases to fund student services programs

Unfortunately, during the two years since the lock-in initiative was originally passed, the financial situation of the State of California has worsened. Health care costs have continued to skyrocket; the huge increases in tuition fees have not been used to support non-academic programs like student health; and the financial situation of the SHS and other student services is poorer than ever.

Yet, despite an even more severe economic condition than that facing voters in 1991, the cost of obtaining health care at the SHS is still dramatically less than typical community rates, even with a

lock-in fee.

At a time when students are facing huge fee increases across the board, it is difficult to ask for your continued financial support. Yet in times such as these, it is more important to spend money wisely than not to spend it at all. So, while we are asking for your continued support, please understand that we are not requesting an increase in our lock-in fee.

A "YES" vote reaffirming the SHS \$12 lock-in fee is a wise use of your money because it helps keep medical costs at UCSB low and accessible to all students. This is because the loss of the \$12 lock-in fee would require the SHS to institute a large user fee (\$25 per quarter or more). Since most students use the SHS at some point, a general charge benefits the entire student body by keeping fees lower for everyone. Furthermore, the student controlled lock-in fee provides the SHS with a stable funding source which can not rise without a student vote, unlike a user fee which could unexpectedly increase without student input.

With this background in mind, the SHS would like your invaluable support in reaffirming this years \$12 lock-in fee.

Disabled Student Program: Do you support continued funding of One dollar (\$1.00) per AS/UCSB Membership per quarter for Disabled Student Program

Pro:

The Disabled Students Program (DSP) which provides academic support services to students with temporary and permanent disabilities is clearly underfunded by the state and University. In order to guarantee that UCSB disabled students can be adequately served by DSP, we are asking that you reaffirm our lock-in.

The majority of the students served by DSP are students with temporary disabilities. Hospitalized students receive note takers while they are unable to attend class. If a student has a temporary hand injury and cannot write, a note taker is provided. Many temporarily injured students use our on-campus transportation so they can still attend classes during their healing process. Frequently, these students have written or commented to DSP after they've recovered; they say had it not been for this service, they would have had to withdraw for the quarter.

Students with permanent disabilities utilize a variety of academic support. DSP arranges and provides sign language interpreters for the deaf and readers for those with visual or learning

disabilities. Students with mobility or other disabilities may qualify for note takers, mobility support, registration assistance, special parking, test-taking accommodations, supplemental orientation, arrangements for specialized educational materials, and equal access to all programs. Some adaptive equipment is also available for students' use. All of these services make it possible for students with disabilities to successfully complete their academic careers.

Your reaffirmation of this lock-in will help DSP to continue existing services for temporarily and permanently disabled students on our campus. All funds generated from the lock-in will go directly to supply academic support to students with disabilities. We hope you will not need our services in the future, but if you do, DSP will be there to assist you!

Whereas: The concept of a Student Senate is viable and it is a component of Associated Students at UC Irvine and some Cal State schools.

Whereas: The students of UCSB should have the opportunity to assess improvements made to the AS Constitution by voting on it, in some form, in the upcoming Spring Election.

Therefore Let It Be Resolved That: That the new AS Constitution be placed on the Spring General Election Ballot and if approved will take effect in Fall of 1994.

The ballot question shall read: Do you approve of the new AS Constitution?

Pro:

- 1) The representation on the Student Senate will be more fair because it will include both geographic and academic representatives rather than just geographic.
- 2) The additional Vice-Presidents (Academic, Administrative, and Cultural Affairs) will meet with Student Senate members and undergraduate students who sit or serve on Academic Senate, Campus Advisory, and A.S. Committees. These meetings will bring undergraduate students into associated Students to help fill all the Senate positions and outreach from A.S. to undergraduate students and other Academic Senate and Campus Advisory Committee members will be facilitated.
- 3) The more diverse representation on the 30 member Student Senate (16 geographic, 8 academic, and 6 rep-at-large senators) will prevent the formation of factions. Also, the 30 member Student Senate will become more like a town forum in that a wider variety of important issues will be discussed because of involvement in academic Senate and Campus Advisory Committees.
- 4) Less time will be spent debating over the annual A.S. budget during Spring Quarter for the following year because the Senate will only have a "yes" or "no" vote when presented with the budget from Executive Council. Rather than arguing over specific items and amendments, therefore resulting in a "marathon meeting," a majority (50% +1) vote of "no" will simply send the budget back to Executive Council for reassessment. The Student Senate will still have the final say.
- 5) The effect of number 4) will be that Senate members will have more time for

their Group Projects, committee work, and other Senate responsibilities.

6) The budget process will improve in that the budget formulated by the President for the following year will be submitted to the Executive Council at the end of Winter Quarter, the same quarter as the budget hearings. The President, as chair of the Executive Council, will be able to discuss his budget proposal with the other 6 Exec. members before submitting it to the Student Senate for a vote.

7) Filling all the Student Senate positions will not be difficult because in effect the only additional positions created by the new Constitution are those for one more University Owned Off-Campus Housing Representative and eight college representatives. Also, the fact that there were over 30 candidates running for Off-Campus Rep. alone for next year demonstrates that there is an interest to get involved. Furthermore, seeing the opportunity to represent one's specific college will motivate people to run for these positions.

8) The increase in the number of positions will be accompanied by changes in honoraria to make sure that the new A.S. Constitution does not require more money from A.S. student funds to implement. Also, the duties of A.S. offices will be reassessed and examined to make sure that the honoraria is consistent with these duties.


