UCSB Struggles in Game 3, Defeats Northridge in Four

Before the UCSB women's volleyball team's match with Cal State Northridge Friday night, referee Rick Olmstead delayed the first serve of the contest in order to let some air out of the somewhat overpumped game balls.

Apparently, that took some of the air out of the Gauchos as well. UCSB defeated the Ma-

tadors Friday at the Events Center, 15-7, 15-7, 16-18, 15-4, but considering CSUN has only been com-peting at the Division I level for just one year, the fact that the Gauchos struggled to put away the Matadors doesn't exactly make UCSB Head Coach

Kathy Gregory very happy. "We won the first two games pretty easily, but when we needed to rise to the occasion to put them away, we made too many errors," Gregory said. "They did play well and dug some balls, but we still should have put them away (earlier)." The Matadors totalled

83 digs over the four games to Santa Barbara's 86.

After staying relatively close to UCSB during the early portion of game one,

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

the Gauchos (18-8, 11-5 Big West) tightened up their service game and cruised to the first-game victory. Santa Barbara jumped out to a 9-2 lead in the second game before holding on, but that brought the Gauchos to game three, where Santa Barbara's ball control fell apart.

Ineffective Gaucho serving, coupled with poor passing, kept the Mata-dors close throughout the game. Then, when UCSB exhausted all of its substitutes for the game, outside hitter Julie Pitois, who has been the Gauchos' leading attacker in recent weeks, was forced to remain out of the game. CSUN took advantage of Pitois' absence to pull out the third-game victory.

It brought my mind back to the dog days of August, when I would stand every day on a practice field with a whistle around my neck and sweat on my brow. Over the summer, I had

Because the UCSB school year starts in late September, I only had a few weeks to help out, but I figured those weeks would be great for getting a look at the coaching side of sports. Force a week ago, things were beginning to look much brighter for the 10th-ranked Gauchos. But UCSB responded by putting forth two of its worst performances in recent memory.

The seventh-ranked Trojans were able to do anything they wanted with the Gauchos yesterday, using an aggressive style of play to complete a three-game season series sweep of Santa Barbara. The Gauchos appeared to be out of sync from the start, much to the dismay of the fans at Campus Pool.

"We just weren't ready to play, it's as simple as that," Head Coach Pete Snyder explained. "It was one of our

Gauchos Happy After Finishing in 10th Place

After nearly losing their pride to a mid-season slump, the UCSB men's cross country team rose to the occasion at the District 8 Championships and regained their respectability by finishing 10th

among some of the country's best teams. Twenty-five teams were invited to the race, of which only 12 decided to enter, due to the high level of competition.

"Tenth out of 13 teams is a little mis-leading," Santa Barbara Assistant Coach Jeff Jacobs explained. "The teams that know they're going to get worked just don't come.

UCSB beat their season-long rival Cal State Fullerton, who was third in confer-ence, to finish in the top 10 among the nation's best teams.

"Beating Fullerton was no easy task," Jacobs said. "They were ahead of us until the last mile, when Rene (Rigal) pulled through for us and passed their #3 and #4 guys at the finish."

Considering that five of the teams were nationally ranked, and two other teams were probably considered to be in the top 30, 10th place is quite a respectable



"We definitely have to be more motivated when we play these teams we're supposed to beat," UCSB junior outside hitter Kristie Ryan added. "Our level of play should've been a lot higher."

Pitois led the Gauchos once again with 17 kills, but wasn't as effective as in recent matches with just a .196 hitting percentage. Ryan added 16 kills (.295)

and 19 digs. After three solid matches, middle blocker Ana Elisa Franca struggled to put down 10 kills at just a .179 percentage. The Gauchos were actually outblocked by

the Matadors, 7-6. "Our middle was nowhere to be found," Gregory said. "Ana wasn't ready to play and (junior middle blocker) Tina (Van Loon) didn't have enough kills. Our middle is in a funk right now.'

UCSB freshman outside hitter Heather Collins continued her strong play with 16 kills at a .375 clip, while also adding a match-high 20 digs.

"Heather is improving with every game," Gregory said. "She is playing great defense right now."

Freshman Missy Cle-ments led Northridge (12-14) with 20 kills (.183). Outside hitters Dawn Kre-nik and Karen Scholl were CSUN's leading defenders with 15 digs apiece. Krenik added 18 kills at a .250 percentage while junior middle blocker Nancy Nicholls added 12 (.182). As a team, the Matadors hit just .190 to the Gauchos' .263. NOTES:

Although senior Stephanie Cox started the match as the Gauchos' setter, freshman Chrissy Boehle shared time at that spot as well. Boehle set games two and three while Cox set games one and four... Pitois added four block assists to lead Santa Barbara... UCSB will play its final two Big West Confer-ence matches this week against New Mexico State on Thursday and San Jose State on Saturday. Both matches are at home.




