'Need More Nature in Art,' Says Lecturer Huxley Here

Author-lecturer Aldous Huxley linked the destruction of natural resources to man's loss of respect for and identification with nature, in the latest of a series of Monday lectures at UCSB.

Calling for a return to the depiction of the natural in art, Huxley struck out against the modern schools of extreme abstraction and praised Wordsworth and the early Oriental artists.

After summarizing a previous discussion of facts and figures demonstrating man's destruction of his natural resources, Huxley

said, "We have to take the responsibility for what is happening on our planet. If we don't, we shall destroy the ground on which we are living and finish off our

Nature and China

"The fact is that we have returned with Darwinism toward the primitive position on a higher level. We now recognize our oneness with nature and try to act upon it in a rational way. The modern conception of nature has a great deal in common with the traditional views of the Chinese.

"The Chinese way of thinking about nature has always been different from that of Western men from the 6th century B.C. The Chinese have never thought in terms of substance. European philosophers have asked 'What is this?' The Chinese have asked, 'What are the relationships between this and this?' This change to thinking about relationships is characteristic of modern science. The Chinese did anticipate in many respects the modern scientific thought.

Leibnitz and Whitehead

"Leibnitz became interested in the translations which Jesuits brought back from China of Chinese philosphy. There is no question at all but that Chinese thought exercised an influence in molding his philosophy. His philosophy has had an influence on such modern philosophers as Whitehead.

"I am an old and unregenerate Wordsworthian," he continued, "and I regard him as among the five greatest poets. In regard to what should be our relation to the world, Wordsworth's whole idea was that man and nature were more closely interlinked.

Wordsworth and Japan

"We find in Chinese poetry and landscaping painting and Japanese poetry and painting, curious prophetic images of the Wordsworthian attitude toward nature. In that strange art form of Japan called the Haiku we find the Wordsworthian conceptions. This idea, characteristic of writing on the problem of reprethe 19th century in the West, was sentation and political power, commonplace in the far East many centuries before it was

"We see this in the rise of landscape painting in China, which took place at least 1,000 best landscape painting. It seems to explain and express those areas of the human mind which are just as impersonal as the given objects outside of us.

Layer of Conscious "It seems to me that there is a layer of the conscious beyond the personal conscious. They present us in a powerful way with images of our own mind, of this deep, fundamental essence of the Mind at large, from which the individual mind takes its

"We see in painting a retreat into non-representative kinds of painting. These abstract forms which are supposed to be symbolic to my mind are less expressive than the landscapes.

Back to Nature

"In poetry, we see something of the same thing. I find a great deal of contemporary poetry is too abstract for my taste. There is a tendency to use abstract phraseology to escape into the

"I would like another reaction towards this nature poetry, nature mysticism and nature landscape painting of an earlier day. We can never repeat the past, but the general tendency is a tendency of health and genuine religious feeling. In my own view, we could very well do with more of this type," he said.

Dr. Gordon Baker Awarded Fellowship

A \$750 Haynes Fund Summer Fellowship Award has been given to Dr. Gordon E. Baker, a member of the UCSB department of social sciences, it was announced by Dr. Elmer R. Noble, vice chancellor.

This award, the gift of John Randolph and Dora Haynes Foundation in Los Angeles, is given to an instructor or assistant professor who wishes to have the summer free from teaching and other employment to complete the writing of a significant research manuscript.

Dr. Baker is currently on sabbatical leave doing research and with special reference to the three West Coast states.

Tom Taylor Resigns PCB Post; McGinley Says Council 'Doing a Pretty Good Job'

Tom Taylor resigned as chairman of the Press Control Board at the Legislative Council meeting Tuesday night. Taylor explained in a written resignation that his job as editor of La Cumbre left him no time to hold the PCB position

Taylor's action brings the total of resigning council members to seven for the year.

In other council action President Stan McGinley evaluated the first semester's work of council. In doing so the president pointed out areas which should be stressed during the spring semester.

As Good as Past Councils In his comments regarding the

work of council as a whole, Mc-Ginley stated, "I don't think we can criticize what council has done. It is as good as any of the past councils I have seen.'

The president summarized his remarks by saying, "I would say we are doing a pretty good job."

McGinley encouraged the voting members to come into closer contact with their constituents. He also pointed out that "leadership at meetings must be furnished by the voting members from the floor." He encouraged the voting members to ask the advice of the non-voting legisla-

tors on major issues.

Council passed a Special Events motion to have the 1959 Barbary Coast in front of the new gym. The president appointed Ned Wilson to head a special committee to study the parking situation on campus. Reps Carol Saindon, Dick Perry and John Fiscalini will serve on the committee.

Fiscalini was also appointed as council rep to the finance committee. Judy Owen was named Easter Relays Queen chairman.

New SU Funds

Student Union co-chairman Neila Loebs informed the solons of the proposed plan for financing the new Student Union. She explained that it might be necessary to assess the student body in the future to make enough money to finance the union.

Gallon honored the members of the 1958-59 Gaucho cage squad, as did Frank Rohter with his freshman basketballers. Gallon also recapped the past season, which found Santa Barbara with a 4-20 seasonal mark and 2-8 CCAA record.

"At no time during the season was there any letdown in the desire to win," commented the popular UCSB mentor, and he looked forward to next year with an air of optimism and seven returning veterans.

"We dedicate our new gym in our opener against California in 1959, and I don't know why now," declared Gallon. "They're the best team on the West Coast. We also are planning a 10-day jaunt to Hawaii. It must have done Sax Elliot's Los Angeles State team some good this season, because they came back from Hawaii and won the conference. We'll try the same thing."





The dozen elected Reps make up the heart of the AS Legislative Council. Council's effectiveness depends in large part on the quality of the Reps. Unfortunately our Council does not have any outstanding Representatives.

This has been the major reason for Council's shortcomings the first semester. El Gaucho pointed out in the first issue of the year that the Council lacked floor leaders. This void remains unfilled.

All of the Reps are certainly not inadequate. In evaluating them, only their work at Council meetings will be considered. It should be stressed that all of the Reps serve on

various committees in the student government program.

The primary job of a Rep is to intelligently discuss business at meetings before voting final approval. Reps should know the major problems of the students. They should attempt to get as close to the electorate as is feasible.

Harris, Naiman, Owen 'Good'
Bill Harris, Dennis Naiman and Judy Owen are the best Reps on Council. They warrant a "good" rating. All are sincere legislators. They would deserve re-election.

Harris spends considerable time studying various problems and presenting them to Council. However, he lacks the personal leadership required of an outstanding solon. Often some of his good ideas are defeated for this reason.

Naiman is the most ambitious member of Council. He has attempted periodically (as in the "Naiman Survey" on El Gaucho) to seek out the views of the electorate. However, he often lacks objectivity and mature judgment.

Miss Owen is interested in student affairs, but is sometimes naive. She makes a good attempt to clarify motions before they

are passed. She also lacks personal leadership.

Don Leavey and Ann Lowry, the Greek Reps, deserves an "adequate" rating. Both are new to Council this year, which could account for their lack of participation at times. When they do speak their comments are usually sound.

Five Reps 'Inadequate' Five of the Reps must be rated "inadequate" on the basis of their work on the council floor. They are Judy Dean, Jan Bartlett, Dick Perry, Gladys Johnson and Carol Saindon.

They seem to contribute only when their direct interests are involved. All five have lacked any semblance of leadership.

Council has given the AS inadequate government for the fall semester. It has been led by a passive president and a vice-president who has not approached her potential. The Reps have been unable to provide the necessary leadership from the council floor.

However, Council shows signs of improving. In the four meetings of the new term they have accomplished more than in the first four months of school.

Because of the present make-up of Council it is doubtful that it will ever be outstanding. However, following through with the enthusiasm shown early this semester Council can give the AS improved representation.
