

# GAUCHOS TACKLE CAL TECH TOMORROW NIGHT

Tomorrow night football will once again come to the forefront as students will file into La Playa stadium when the Gauchos open the 1950 season against the Cal Tech Beavers.

Tickets for this season opener may be purchased today in the Graduate Manager's office or at the game. With student body card the price will be 25 cents.

Rooters will enter the two lower stadium entrances. Students may not enter from the Mesa.

When the whistle sounds the start of the game, the Beavers will be up against a Gaucho squad which offers real possibilities for this season.

A strong offensive eleven plus some good defensive men and 24 returning lettermen give the Gauchos the favorites role.

Leading the Gaucho attack will be the team of Ron Ternquist at left half, game captain Russ Bertell, leading Gaucho ground gainer last year, at the right half slot, and Rollie Brice at full.

The brain work and passing chores will be handled by Dick Gorrie. Receiving Gorrie's attempts will be Adrian Adams and John Juday.

One of the biggest gains in the Gaucho football picture will be in the line, which is heavy this year. Corky Johnson

and Grant Gaunce, two heavy and promising men, will hold down the starting tackle spots.

Gene Bynum and Ray Stark will start at guards, and Mike Moropoulos will hold down the center position.

Coach Engle will also field a strong reserve backfield which will see plenty of action. The outfit will consist of Don Steere at left half, Doug Gorrie at right half and brother Dave Gorrie at fullback. George Law will take over the passing

Providing some very useful reserves will be LeRoy Criss and Herschel Dean at ends, John Craven and Lloyd McCollum at tackles, Frank Dominguez and Chuck Allen at guards, and Dick Schafer and Lionel Percell at center.

On defense, Engle will use Brick Reed, 250 pound tackle, who will also handle most of the punting chores, Warren Vinton at guard and Ted "Pappy" Boyer at end.

In the backfield Al Southworth, Gibby Dear and Ken Brittingham will provide strong support.

Tries for extra points on conversions will probably be in the hands of Clyde Francisco. Also on hand will be Glenn Vanderlinde to do a little signal calling.

## Injuries

Some training injuries have hit the squad and three men will be sidelined, though all are recovering and are expected to see action against Pomona. On the injured list are John Diskin who has a slight shoulder separation, Bill Davis who has a bad knee, and Ray Richards who acquired a broken finger.

Coach Engle cut the squad to around 40 players this week. Many of the remainder will join the

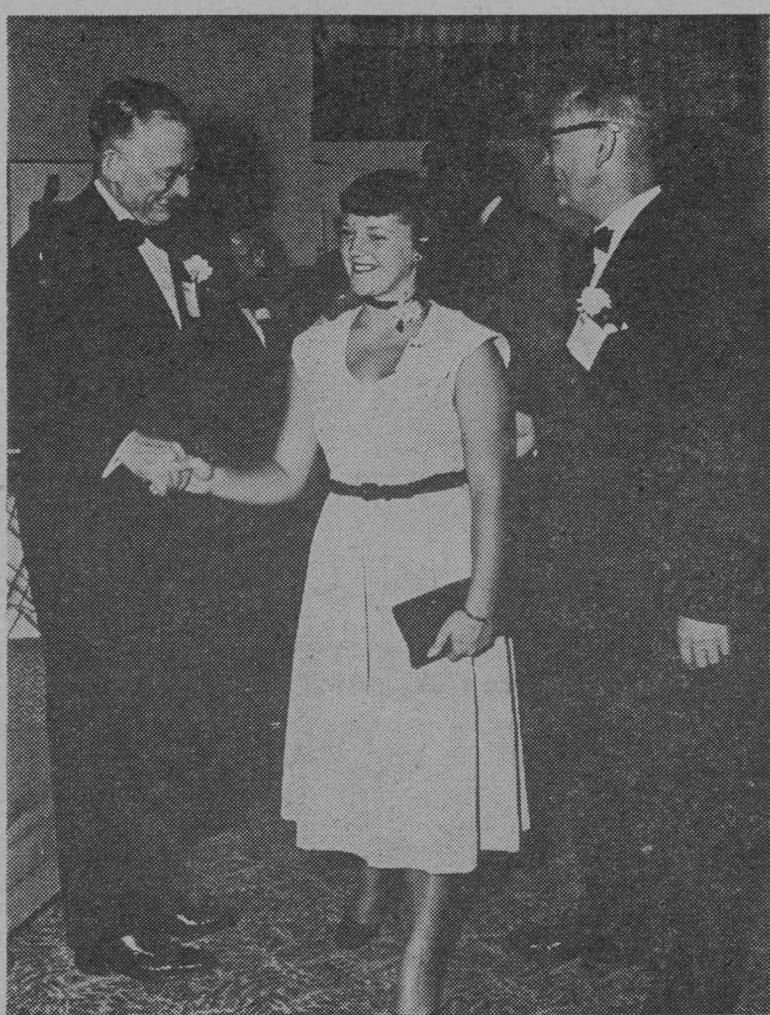
### Class Meetings

#### Game Procedure

Another reminder about the new football game admission regulations for students. Enter only at the East and West lower gates. No students will be admitted through the upper gates and there will be no student parking permitted in the upper parking lot. There is plenty of room down below so don't worry about finding a place to park.

Each student has to carry his own ticket through the gate and that ticket must be accompanied by a student body card.

Tickets for tomorrow's game at

La Playa Stadium will be on sale today in two places—the Graduate Manager's office in Ebbets Hall and the blue ticket-sales booth on the Men's Gym lawn. Avoid the inevitable rush at the field tonight by getting your tickets early if you don't already have them.

#### Editorial

### On Student Body Card Objections ...

Objection to the compulsory Associated Students membership fee is being expressed by a small group of students characterized as "married veterans." The group has met with Associated Students President Frank Goodall to protest paying the ten-dollar fee.

The dissatisfaction came to light after the recent Veterans' Administration ruling that the fee must be paid by the individual rather than as a part of the GI Bill benefits. It is the Regents of the University who have made the student body card compulsory as it is on the Davis and UCLA campuses.

Such dissatisfaction is so amazing that it must be assumed that the objectors are not fully cognizant of the extent to which the funds derived from the student body cards are used to the student's benefit.

Perhaps a quick glance at Article I of the By-Laws of the Associated Students constitution, in which the membership privileges are listed, would be in order.

All members of the Associated Students are entitled to admission to all athletic events, all social events, all Artists Series and Music Control Board events, a reduced price on the yearbook, *La Cumbre*, a subscription to *El Gaucho*, use of the College Cabin, admission to all rallies and assemblies, participation in AMS, AWS or WAA, and the services of the Graduate Manager's office in addition to their right to participate in the affairs of the Associated Students. Naturally, all the admissions are subject to the conditions set by the Legislative Council and its subsidiary groups.

All the activities listed are financed wholly by the revenue from the sale of student body cards. Such a program would be impossible to maintain should the payment of fees be on a voluntary basis because of the uncertainty of the amount of money available to budget.

If the services and advantages of membership in the Associated Students are to be made available to every student, every student must be a member. This the Regents realized when they made the compulsory card regulation.

If the small group objecting will but consider the "greatest good for the greatest number," the many services available for the nominal fee, and the many benefits which they themselves may derive from membership, then they must accept the student body fee and begin enjoying its benefits.

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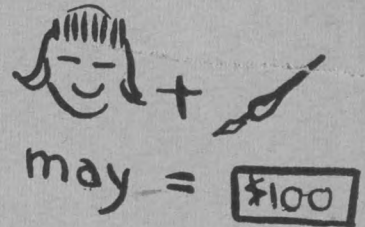

Bert LaBrucherie's Cal Tech Beavers provide the first obstacle for the blue and gold machine. The calibre of football at the Pasadena institution is lowered immeasurably by the rigid entrance requirements at the institute.

Not since the Navy saw fit to transfer Ross Dana and most of his Stanford teammates to Cal Tech have they been a real threat. Wartime V-5 cadets also augmented the Beaver track team enough to make them the last outfit to defeat USC in a dual track meet. But all this was long ago during the Great War as Coach "Boo-Boo" will readily testify.

### Scrappy Bunch

The Beavers are one of those teams, however, which never believe the form sheets. With a consistently undermanned bench they have earned a reputation as a

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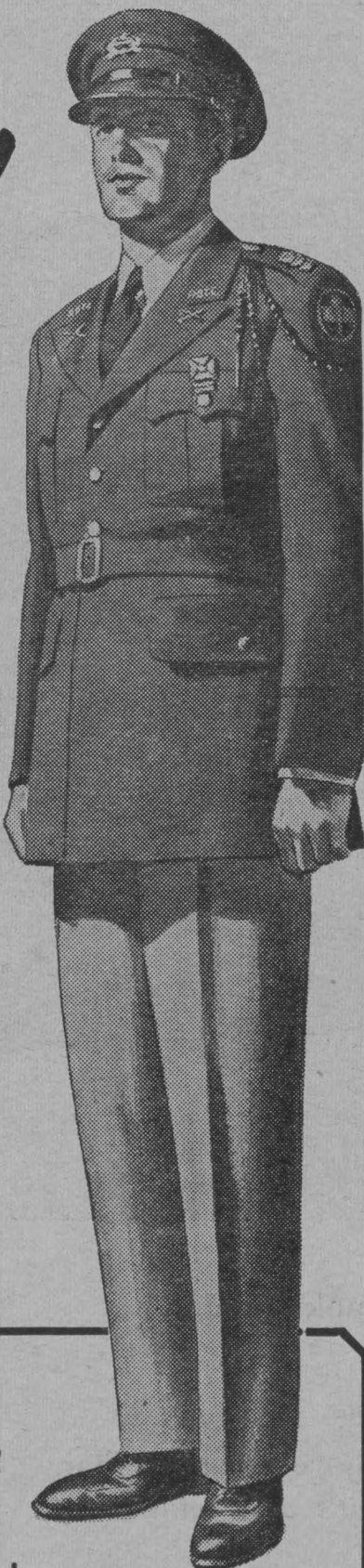
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## GAUCHOS TO FACE FOUR LEAGUE FOES DURING '50 SEASON
