On Student Body Card Objections . . .

Objection to the compulsory Associated Students membership fee is being expressed by a small group of students characterized as "married veterans." The group has met with Associated Students President Frank Goodall to protest paying the ten-dollar fee.

The dissatisfaction came to light after the recent Veterans' Administration ruling that the fee must be paid by the individual rather than as a part of the GI Bill benefits. It is the Regents of the University who have made the student body card compulsory as it is on the Davis and UCLA campuses.

Such dissatisfaction is so amazing that it must be assumed that the objectors are not fully cognizant of the extent to which the funds derived from the student body cards are used to the

Perhaps a quick glance at Article I of the By-Laws of the Associated Students constitution, in which the membership privileges are listed, would be in order.




