Rosa Hall forced to remain in private confinement for eight years—without seeing or hearing a man. Add to that the natural passion of the Spanish temperament-and you have Freudian frustration at its height. Put the situation into play form and you have Federico Garcia - Lorca's "House of Bernarda Alba" which opened last night for a sevennight run at the Campus Little Theater.

"Bernarda Alba," appropriately presented where the residence ratio is approximately four to one in favor of the men, is the seething story of a houseful of women ruled by Bernarda, a tyrannical matriarch who persists in the belief that everything and everyone must be sacrificed for respectability. Society must not have the chance to frown upon her household.

#### Rebellion

Her "respectable" daughters, rightfully sick of their imposed virginity, begin to rebel-culminating in the final victory of Adela, the youngest. The explosive passions involved are dramatically understated by the wise old servant Poncia, ". . . they're just women without men." Blood ties are forgotten. Sisters become merely jealous competitive animals under the watchful eyes of Bernarda. But even the hawk must sometime sleep. . . .

for Junior Class vice president. Unanimous approval by Legislative Council two weeks ago placed the amendment, initiated by Noel McGinn, '57, on the bal-

#### Removes Editor

It is designed to remove the El Gaucho editor as a voting member of Legislative Council.

The editor was made a voting member only two or three years ago, the intention at that time being to increase the prestige of the position, according to Bob Lorden, '49, Graduate Manager.

Since that time, states McGinn, all El Gaucho editors have been dissatisfied with the arrangement, not only because it gives the editor another job but because it involves the editor in politics, confusing his role as a journal-

#### Opponents' Views

Opponents to the amendment argue that it at least requires the editor to attend Council meetings, so that he might know what is happening in student govern-

In approving the amendment some members of Council stated that this could continue to be the case without the editor being a voting member.

Editor-elect of Et Gaucho, Ray Ward, '58, has voiced his approval of the amendment, too.

### Takes Effect Now

The change, if approved by the student body Monday and Tuesday with a two-thirds majority, will take effect with the first meeting of next year's Legislative Council, to be held within the next two weeks.

Members of the Junior Class will choose between Russ Hoyt and Maureen Mahoney for the office of Junior Class vice president. These two persons were highest in the counting of the April 25 and 26 elections, but neither attained a majority.

### Qualifications

Hoyt, a member of Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity, has participated in the Gaucho band, El Gaucho, and has served as secretary of Pine Hall.

Maureen Mahoney is a member of Chi Omega sorority and has been secretary of Laurel Hall, treasurer of Manzanita Hall, secretary of the Awards Committee, co-chairman of the Rally Committee, secretary of Spurs, and a representative to Panhellenic

Voters will mark their ballots at one polling place, located in front of the Library and open from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday and Tuesday.



# MATHEWS RECEIVES FULBRIGHT GRANT

A Fulbright fellowship has and Ph.D. from the University of been awarded to Dr. J. Chesley California, Berkeley. Mathews, associate professor of English at Santa Barbara College, according to an announcement by Dr. Elmer R. Noble, acting provost.

Dr. Mathews will serve as visiting lecturer in American literature at the University of Turin, Italy, during the 1957-58 academic year. The grant is offered under the International Educa-tional Exchange Program conducted by the Department of State. The basic purpose of the program is to promote mutual understanding between the people of the United States and those of other countries. He is one of 26 American scholars selected from various fields of study to lecture in Italy.

#### 2nd In Family

He is the second member of his family to receive a Fulbright award. His wife, Pearl, a teacher at Santa Barbara High School since 1950, was the recipient of a Fulbright grant for the overseas study of Italian culture in the summer of 1954.

The award to Dr. Mathews is particularly appropriate because he is not only an authority on American literature but has become widely recognized for his intensive research on the work of the Italian poet, Dante, particularly on the poet's influence in American literature. He has published some 15 articles on this subject and has given numerous papers before scholarly organiza-

#### Academic Record

A member of the faculty at UCSBC since 1944 and chairman of the English department from 1951 to 1956, Dr. Mathews pre-viously taught at the University of Texas. He received his A.B. degree from Furman University, his M.A. from Duke University

He was arrangements chairman of the 50th annual meeting of the Philological Assn. of the Pacific Coast when it met at Santa Barbara College in 1952 and a member of the executive committee. That same year he was elected a vice president of the American Assn. of Teachers of Italian.

#### Scheduled Speech

Before leaving for Italy he is scheduled to speak at the national meeting of the Modern Language Assn. at the University of Wisconsin in September, his fifth appearance before this national or-

Funds for grants under the Fulbright Act are derived from certain foreign currencies owed to the United States. Under this act, separate executive agreements have been signed by the U.S. and 30 other countries. Programs are currently in operation in 23 of these countries.

# Laris To Attend Physiology Meet

Dr. Philip C. Laris, instructor in biological sciences at Santa Barbara College, has been invited to be among approximately 25 participants in a two-week workshop on the teaching of undergraduate physiology to be held at University of Oregon, Eugene, in August.

The workshop is one of two such programs to be held in the nation this summer and is sponsored by the education committee of the American Physiological Society. Discussions concern approaches to subject matter, recent advances, worthwhile laboratory experiments and general educational problems.

Two other biological sciences department faculty members have been honored with invitations to conferences and for summer research, but commitments here present their acceptance. Dr. Mary M. Erickson, chairman of the department and professor of zoology, was offered a grant for research in the anatomy department of UCLA's Medical School by the American Physiological Society. Dr. Demorest Davenport, associate professor of zoology, was invited to be one of several Americans in attendance at the Fourth International Ethnological Conference at Freiberg, West Germany, which he helped plan at the third conference, in Holland.



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# Guideposts for Next Year . . .

On February 15, 1957, El Gaucho presented to the student body of Santa Barbara College a copy of the "Kidder plan," a series of ideas for improvement of the Berkeley campus by Associated Students president on that campus, Jim Kidder.

Kidder took the time to draw up his list of suggestions for improvement with the idea that his campus has not yet reached perfection and that a comprehensive list of needed changes might stimulate thinking and activity on the part

of the student body. Until this time there has been no "Kidder plan" presented for this campus. El Gaucho, and the student body, have felt the need for such a plan, and have waited patiently for elected officials to present evidence of their thinking

along this line.

It is in the absence of this evidence, then, that El Gaucho takes upon itself the burden of delineating those improvements which seem necessary from our point of view. We do so with the knowledge that we are presenting far more suggestions than can be implemented in one year. We also present them knowing that a number of them are not original, and have been recognized for many years, which is in itself strong testimony to the difficulty of getting such ambitions accomplished.

#### IN THE AREA OF STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Revision of the Associated Students Constitution.

The Constitution needs to be revised in many ways. Not only is an improved system of representation a recognized vital necessity, but also the Constitution contains much material which is superfluous, contradictory, and contrary to the best interests of government.

Creation of a Judicial Council.

This group would serve both as a final student authority on matters of student conduct and as the official body of interpretation for the Associated Students Constitution. Both functions are not being fulfilled at the present time.

We might add that an amendment to the Constitution to create such a body has been drawn up by certain influential members of the Associated Students, and will be presented in the near future to the Constitution Committee. Removal of El Gaucho from the control of Legis-

lative Council.

This is one aim that has plagued student government Santa Barbara for some years, according to back issues of El Gaucho. In order to preserve the freedom of the press it will be necessary to create a new body (or use existing ones) that will both hire and fire the El Gaucho editor without being involved in the politics of Legislative Council.

4) Passage of a resolution by Legislative Council that will prohibit student recognition of fraternal organizations with restrictive clauses after 1960. This ambition speaks for itself.

5) Extension of time for campaigning for student

We feel that the main reason for lack of participation by the student body in student government stems from highly restrictive rules on campaigning, which prohibit students from finding out who and what candidates for office are. We believe that if candidates had two or three weeks in which to run for office, instead of the present one week, the student body would be better qualified to elect proper candidates.

### SOCIAL-RECREATIONAL PROBLEMS

We need a Student Union.

Little or nothing has been done toward the activation of a campaign to raise funds for a new and permanent student union. Construction of such a building will accrue great benefits to both the campus and the student body. 2) Establishment of a Freshman Orientation pro-

This need is already being met by next year's Sophomore Class President, Dennis Naiman, an El Gaucho staff

member. Revision of Special Events.

Members of the student body for some time have felt dissatisfaction with our special events, which are geared around the old Riviera campus and fail to meet the needs and possibilities of this campus. We would urge the estab-

lishment of a special committee to study the problem over the summer, and to come up with ideas that can be used to insure greater student participation in special events.

4) Improvement of the Assembly Program.

Some steps have been taken along this line this year, with a series of high-class motion pictures and several firstrate jabb shows. Much more can be done.

5) Revision of the Recreation Control Board.

Legislative Council has had before it for some time a number of suggestions by RCB Co-chairmen John Wilband, '58, and Harry Weinberg, '57. Published recently in El Gaucho, these suggestions would establish a recreational program on this campus designed to meet the needs of almost every student.

#### IMPROVEMENTS IN ACADEMIC RELATIONSHIPS

Students on this campus can take a much greater part in the formation of academic and administrative policy if they so desire. Contrary to common opinion, most members of the faculty would welcome student suggestions in the area of policy-making. Students who complain about lock-out hours, academic and final exam calendars and the like could exert sufficient influence on the administration to have such matters corrected. In many liberal arts colleges students have made significant contributions in this

#### PROBLEMS OF ECONOMIC INTEREST

1) Management of the College Bookstore in such a manner as to guarantee more equitable prices to

This is not intended to imply mismanagement on the part of the current employees. On the contrary, they have done an excellent job thus far, without the assistance of Legislative Council. We feel that prices can be reduced, however, without loss of revenue. This is certainly an area worthy of study.

2) Improvement of Parking Conditions.

Plans for the final campus call for peripheral parking for students. In essence this means that students will park as much as a mile from some of their classes. It is our contention that this need not be the case, but nothing will be done unless our student government asks that something

# Vote YES On Constitution Change

This coming Monday and Tuesday the student body will have an opportunity to vote on a constitutional amendment already approved by Legislative Council. This amendment will remove the El Gaucho editor from Council.

Not only Council but this year's and next year's El Gaucho editors approve of this measure. In effect, the purpose of this move is to separate the journalistic branch from the executive or legislative branch of student government. Under our present system the editor, once defeated in Council on a certain point, can now go to his typewriter and criticize the actions of this legislative body. The editor then not only criticizes the other members of the Council but also himself, since he is also a member of this group.

Under the proposed system, the editor, like any student, would be entitled to attend Council meetings. But he would not be considered a member of Council. He could thus criticize or commend the actions of this group without being considered guilty of backslapping or hypocrisy.

El Gaucho urges a yes vote on this proposed amendment for two reasons: 1) It allows the El Gaucho editor to remain objective in his approach to the proceedings of the Legislative Council, and 2) It does not put the editor in a difficult, if not embarrassing, position if he attempts to commend or condemn its actions.
