## Five UCSB Students Receive Woodrow Wilson Fellowships

Five undergraduates at UCSB were awarded coveted Woodrow Wilson Fellowships for 1961-1962, it was announced today by Sir Hugh Taylor, president of the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation in Princeton, New Jersey. This was the largest number of Wilson Fellowships awarded to UCSB in a single year.

In addition, the foundation awarded honorable mention to six other Santa Barbara students. The Wilson Fellowships cover the first year of graduate study for the recipient at the college or university of his choice.

### Fellows

Two local residents were among the recipients. R. Robert Russell, an economics major, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne H. Russell, 220 W. Valerio will use his fellowship to do graduate work at Harvard or the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Miss Sasha D. Schmidt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul A. Schmidt, 5623 Armitos Ave. (Goleta) will continue her studies in Hispanic Civilization at the Berkeley campus of the University of California.

Other winners were Robert L. Lanphear of Ojai, a history major, who also plans to attend UC, Berkeley; James L. McMichael of Pasadena, who will go to Stanford to take advanced work in English; and Henry P. Lundsgaard, of Los Angeles, an anthropology major whose graduate work will be taken at the University of Wisconsin or Harvard in Socio-Anthropology.

### Honorable Mention

Listed below are UCSB students receiving honorable mention and their respective fields of study: Mrs. Dorothy Adcock, English and drama; Frank N. Bunker, history; David C. Hood, history; Robert D. Lane, English; Dennis A. Livingston, international relations; Kenneth E. Scott, English.

Woodrow Wilson Fellowships encourage students to consider college teaching as a possible career. Nominations for these awards are initially made by faculty members; candidates are also screened by one of 15 regional committees throughout the U.S.

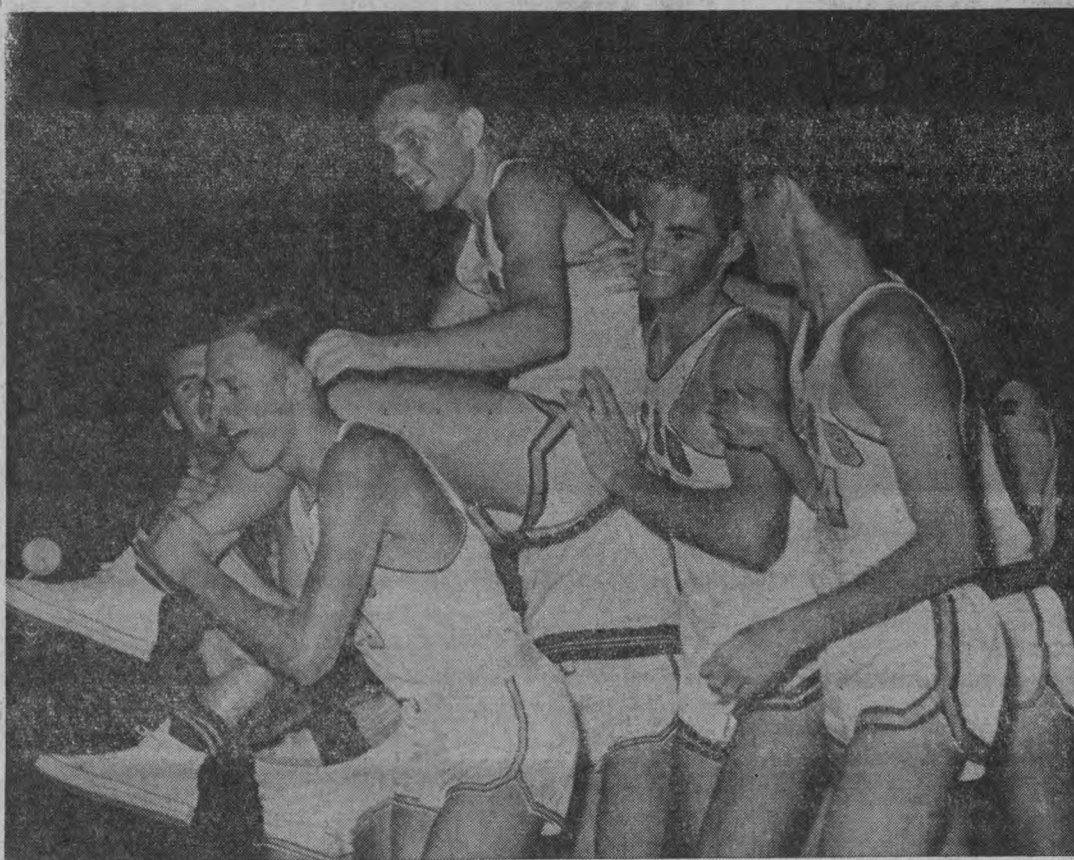
This year's awards totaled \$3,000,000; 1,333 students from 381 colleges and universities throughout this country and Canada were finally chosen from over 10,000 nominees. In addition to the awards for first-year graduate study made to students, the Foundation also makes subvention payments to the various graduate schools where the Wilson Fellows enroll to encourage continuation of scholarships to the students after this first year.

Chairman of the local committee at UCSB for these Fellowships is Dr. Lawrence Willson, associate professor of English.

## UCLA's Murphy Speaks For UC Charter Day Celebration

A series of special community events will mark the observance here of the 93rd charter anniversary of the University of California on March 20-23, highlighted with two speaking appearances by Dr. Franklin D. Murphy, new chancellor at UCLA.

The University committee on public ceremonies announced that Chancellor Murphy will speak at an outdoor convocation ceremony at 2 P.M. on March 21. That same evening, under the auspices of the UCSB Affiliates and alumni groups, he will speak at the Charter Anniversary Banquet at the Miramar Hotel. The public is welcome at both events.

Banquet reservations may be made by writing the business office at UCSB or phoning 7-5611, ext. 2216. No tickets are necessary for the afternoon ceremony where 2,000 chairs will be set up on the campus mall.

**First Public Appearance**  
The chancellor of the Los Angeles campus will make his first public appearances in Santa Barbara since becoming chancellor last July. He previously established an outstanding record as an educational administrator at the University of Kansas where he was chancellor since 1951.

The holder of the MD degree, Dr. Murphy was Dean of the School of Medicine and Associate Professor of Internal Medicine at the University of Kansas. He is a member of the board of directors of several foundations and educational organizations in addition to business corporations.

In 1949 he was one of the ten outstanding young men in the nation selected by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce. Another honor came his way in 1958 when he was among the seven university presidents who visited Russian universities under the then newly concluded U.S.-USSR agreement for scientific and cultural exchange.

He is also chairman of the executive committee of the Commission on Higher Education in the American Republics made up of the presidents and rectors of selected U.S. and Latin American Universities.

**Special Events**  
Other activities commemorating the University's 93rd birthday will be the traditional Faculty Research Lecture on March 20 at 8 P.M. The faculty elected Dr. William D. Altus, professor of psychology, to be the 1961 lecturer in recognition of his outstanding contribution to scientific research.

The Paganini Quartet, in residence at UCSB, will give two concerts during the celebration — in the Lobero Theater on March 22 and in the Campus Auditorium on March 23, both at 8:30 P.M. The UCSB Readers' Theater has planned a special performance of "The Devil and Daniel Webster" on March 22 at 8 P.M. in the Classroom Building Lecture Hall.

**CUSHING SPEAKS AT SCIENCE CLUB**

## FOREIGN STUDY IN VIEW FOR 1961-62

In a far-reaching new program announced today by Chancellor Samuel B. Gould, students at UCSB will have the opportunity to take a portion of their academic work in foreign study centers located in four parts of the world.

To be known as the Foreign Study Program, the Santa Barbara campus plan will move forward with establishment of study centers in Europe, Latin America, the Far East and Middle East.

Chancellor Gould, who had wide experience in overseas educational centers while directing the successful Antioch College program, said that he hoped the area center work could begin at UCSB next fall or by January, 1962.

**Family Residence**  
Negotiations at present are underway with one of the great universities of Europe to initiate the program on a pilot basis so that the techniques and procedures involved with a foreign study program

can be evaluated and developed. The instruction would be conducted by both native professors and Santa Barbara campus faculty members. Students would reside with families near the study center or in university residence halls with students of the land.

The world-wide educational undertaking reflects the growing recognition that education is the chief long-term instrument in creating international understanding and achieving international goals. Educational leaders, including Chancellor Gould, have been voicing the need for the increased international educational opportunities.

The international plan will affect considerably the mainstream of the University's academic program. It will have important educational implications in courses offered here before the students go abroad, and influence the content and teaching of courses following the students' return to the campus.

**"It will require support of many kinds," the Chancellor continued, "especially to put this travel-study opportunity within the reach of the average student."**

Preliminary planning and documentation for the far-flung educational program has been under study by Dr. Philip D. Walker, assistant professor of French. In general, the program will be under the jurisdiction of the vice-chancellor for undergraduate affairs and a part of the College of Letters and Science. The Chancellor will seek the appointment of a director of foreign study to administer the program under policies established by an advisory committee of the faculty members.

A special UCSB faculty committee has been named to deal with the detailed development of the program and the Academic Senate committee on educational policy is studying the academic aspects of the foreign study plan.

## BRITISH AUTHOR TO GIVE LECTURE ON 'THE PRESS'

Francis Williams, well-known British author, editor, journalist and press advisor to former Prime Minister Clement Attlee, will talk in the University Lecture Series at UCSB this afternoon at 4 P.M. The public is invited to attend his lecture on "Press, Governments, and People."

The journalist and former governor of the British Broadcasting Co. is serving this semester as Regents' Professor on the University of Berkeley campus.

### Author

Williams is author of eleven books on public affairs and three novels. His latest work, now being serialized in the London Sunday Times, was written in conjunction with former Prime Minister Attlee and will appear in book form next month under the title "A Prime Minister Remembers."

After he began his career in journalism at the age of 17, Williams' great skill as a reporter and editor caused him to rise rapidly in London's Fleet Street, as well as in Labour Party circles.

In 1936, he became editor of the Labour Party newspaper, "The Daily Herald," and brought the paper's circulation to the then unheard-of figure of 2,000,000 copies daily by 1940.

During World War II, Winston Churchill appointed him controller of news and censorship for the British government.

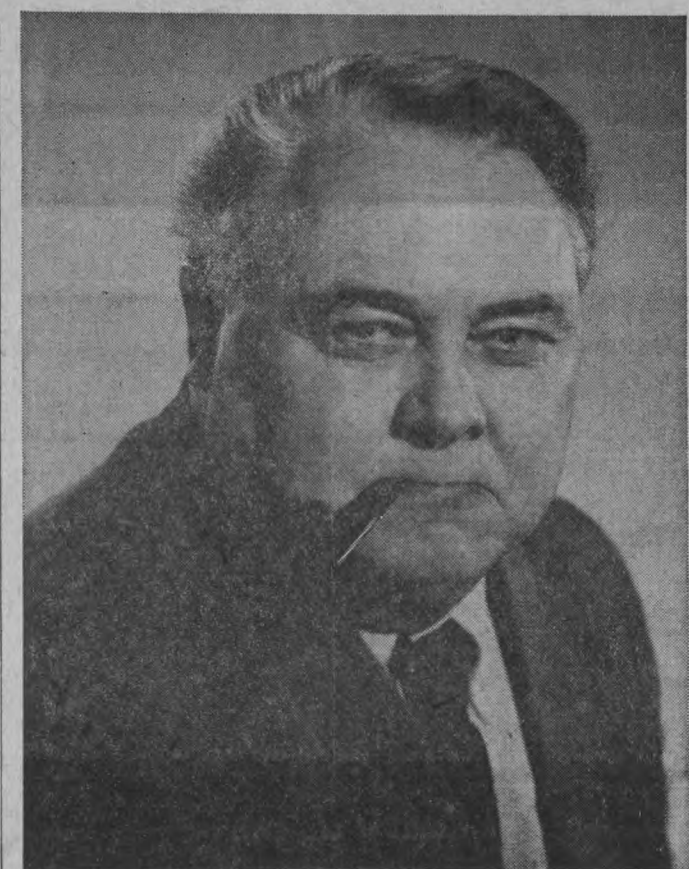
He was made a Commander of the British Empire for his wartime service in 1945, and he received the American Medal of Freedom from the U.S. government for his organization of press coverage of the D-Day invasions of Western Europe. Williams came to San Francisco in 1945 as chief press advisor to the British delegation of the first United Nations conference.

### Press Advisor

When the Labour Party took over direction of the British government after the war, the journalist became Attlee's press advisor, a post equivalent to Presidential press secretary in this country.

Among several distinguished works published by Williams are "Press, Parliament, and People," a book on the role of government and the press in a free society, and "Fifty Years' March," a history of the British Labour Party.

While Governor of the BBC, the journalist was moderator of the "BBC Press Conference," a program of television interviews with prominent people; he was also a regular commentator on the BBC documentary program "Panorama."

Williams has appeared before the British Royal Commission on Freedom of the Press and is a frequent contributor to the magazine "New Statesman." He has also held the post of chief American correspondent to the London "Observer."

## NEW WITHDRAWAL RULES

The UCSB faculty has approved a change in the regulations concerning withdrawal from courses to become effective immediately. The new regulation provides that a student wishing to withdraw from any course or courses during the present semester and after March 17, 1961, must obtain the approval of the Dean of Applied Arts or Letters and Science, depending upon the division in which the student's major subject lies.

The legislation further provides: In each case the dean shall consult the instructor involved. At the dean's discretion, he may cancel the student's enrollment in the course, or he may excuse the student from attending the course and direct the registrar to enter a grade of "F" on the student's official record. The dean may also stipulate that re-enrollment in the course will be authorized only with his approval. If withdrawal from a course reduces a student's program below 12 units, the dean of the student's college or school must approve his program of study in the succeeding semester. The registrar will enter a grade of "F" for each unauthorized withdrawal from a course.

A student wishing to withdraw from a course at any time must obtain a petition from the Office of the Registrar and secure the required signatures. After March 17 he will be required to confer with his adviser, the instructor of the course, and the appropriate divisional dean.

Grades of "W," "WP" and "WF" will not be assigned when students withdraw from courses after March 17. This brings Santa Barbara's grading practice into line with other campuses of the university.

A student who wishes information concerning the policies to be followed by the deans in acting upon petitions for withdrawal may consult his faculty adviser or the appropriate divisional dean. The deans are informing all faculty advisers concerning the general policies to be followed in considering petitions for withdrawal from courses.

Interviews may be scheduled by contacting the Marine located at the appointment table in the Student Union.

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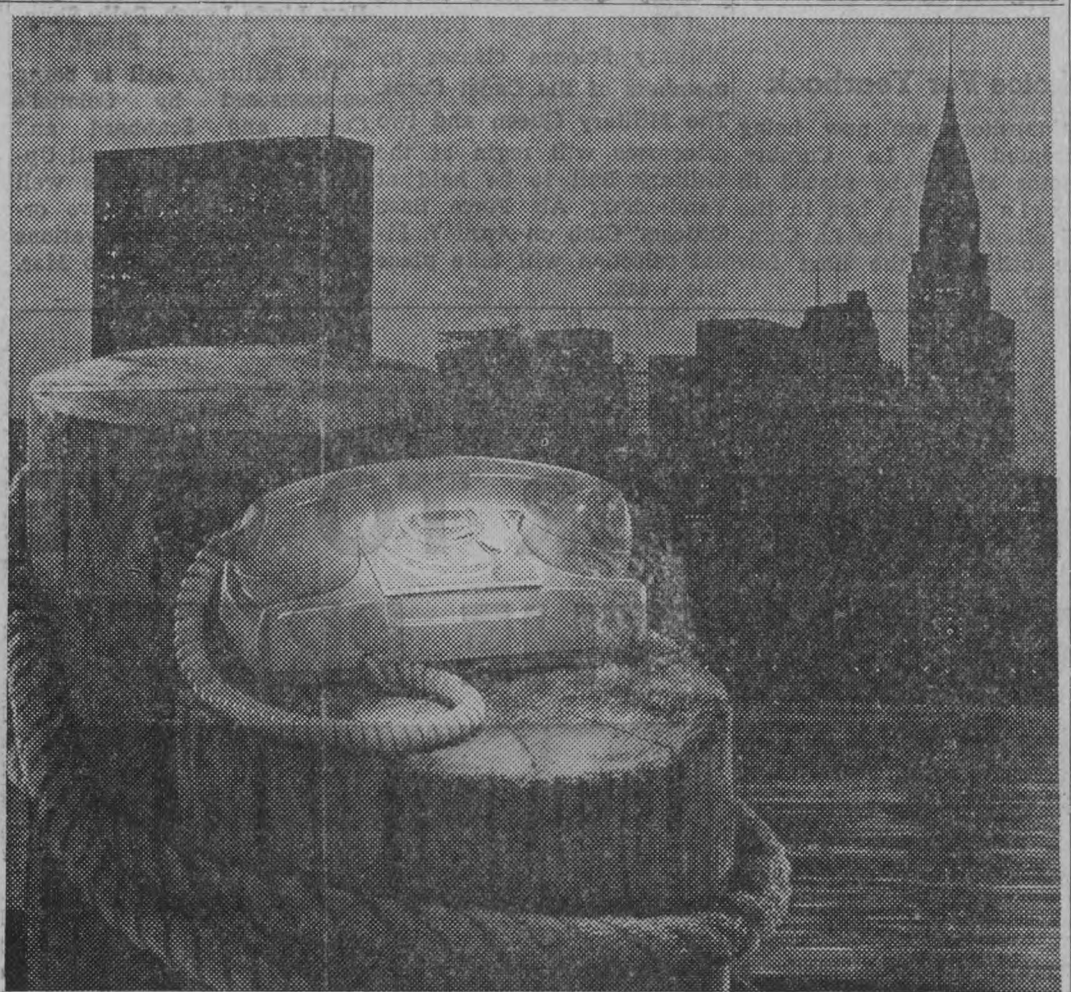
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
