Student Body Fails To Attend Own Meeting

Only One Man Present

Business Transactions Impossible

Due to lack of a quorum last Thursday's Student Body meeting adjourned without transacting any business. Only forty-two members or a little more than one-tenth of the Student Body appeared for the meeting. Only one man, the Student Body President, was there to represent the men.

Important constitutional amendments are under consideration at the present time and measures regarding men's athletics were to have been voted upon during the meeting. No action could be taken with only forty-two members present.

These amendments will be voted upon at the next Student Body meeting to be held on Thursday, March 26, fourth hour. Following the business of the day, the Sophomores will entertain with their annual "Frolic."

Roadrunners Will Compete With Pomona Frosh In Season's First Inter-collegiate Meet Tomorrow

Events Will Start At 2 o'clock At Pershing Park

Comparison Of Records Predicts Close Meet; Teams Evenly Matched

The Roadrunner track squad has been going through some stiff workouts in the past week to prepare for the first of the two big home meets of the present season, the meet with Pomona Frosh at Pershing Park tomorrow afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. If there are heats to be run, they will probably be before two o'clock.

Track Dance Planned For March 28

The track dance will be held in the gymnasium Saturday evening, March 28, in honor of the annual invitational track meet on the same day. Visiting track teams will be guests at the dance and medals will be awarded during the evening. The three year track cup which was donated by last year's Student Body will be presented to the winning team. Santa Barbara won the cup last year. Both medals and cup are on display in the trophy case in the office.

Final plans for the dance will be arranged by the social committee next week.

High School Officials Will Attend Play

"The Mantle of the Virgin," the play by Vida Sutton, which will be presented in the college court on Monday evening, April 6, has been put on the convention program of the high school principals who are meeting in Santa Barbara that week. High school officials from every part of the state will probably witness the production.

Mr. D. M. Sutton, father of the author of the play will probably be here for the play also, according to a letter received by the manager stating that he would certainly attend if he is in the state. At present Mr. Sutton is in Los Angeles. Friends of Mr. Sutton who reside in Los Angeles may also come up for the play.

A comparison of records recently made by each team shows that the Roadrunners have a slight edge on tomorrow's chances, but it's hard to predict anything considering the change of conditions under which the Sagechicks will do their stuff.

Santa Barbara may look to Lyle Johnson in the half, Ken Pinney in the century, and Natland in the 220 for formidable adversaries; but an edge is predicted for the Roadrunners in the 2 mile, javelin, and discus.

That such disloyalty should exist is highly disgraceful, but that the men are far more disloyal than the women is astonishing. When one considers that approximately 50 per cent of the Student Body money is expended for men's athletics it is incredible that the men are not more concerned in the body controlling this money. Moreover important amendments to sections of the Student Body constitution dealing with men's athletics were to have been considered at last Thursday's session.

The men are in utter disgrace and the women don't deserve much praise. Imagine a little more than one tenth of the entire Student Body had spirited interest enough to attend its own meeting. Think of it! And the men expected their honor to be upheld by one lone man or less than one one-hundredth of the men on the campus.

Such disloyalty and disinterest in Student Body affairs is deplorable, and we sincerely hope that this situation will not be repeated again next Thursday when a Student Body meeting is called.

Invitation blanks for this meet are now in the hands of the following colleges and universities: San Jose State, Bakersfield Junior College, La Verne College, Loyola College, California Christian College, Santa Maria Junior College, California Polytechnic, and the University of Redlands. The entrants will be definitely stated next week. An attempt will be made to make that meet of state-wide importance for state colleges because the State Junior College meet is scheduled for the same day.

It is believed that Santa Maria and Bakersfield will prefer the local meet.

There is no meet scheduled between the invitational meet of March 28 and the State and A. A. U. meets early in May because the baseball season will intervene at that time. Track stars will remain in training during that time for participation in the late meets.

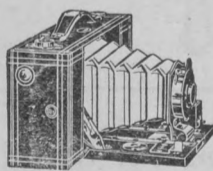
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
