
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# Gauchos Crap Out, Lose Big at Vegas

## Rider's 31 Points Leads Runnin' Rebels to Victory, 82-69; SB Slips to Seventh Place

LAS VEGAS, Nev.— The city of Las Vegas, dotted with grandiose buildings in which out-of-towners gather to partake in frenzied games of chance, usually sends its visitors home as losers.

This weekend was no different, as the UCSB men's basketball team came out on the losing end of a 82-69 decision to the University of Nevada, Las Vegas in front of 14,218 fans at the Thomas and Mack

Santa Barbara (11-7 overall, 4-6 Big West) had Lady Luck on its side early in the contest, leading by four points with 4:16 remaining in the first half. However, 4:16 remaining in the first half. However, the Gauchos rolled nothing but craps the rest of the way, as the Runnin' Rebels of UNLV (14-2, 7-2) scored the next 16 points to coast to victory.

"We just didn't have it those last four minutes," UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm

said. "It should have been an even game at the half. We really buckled under. We just played horribly those last four minutes. We didn't keep our poise. It really wasn't anything the Rebels did — we just collapsed."

One thing the Rebels did do was run, although it took them a few minutes to find their fast-paced attack. Coming off a loss Thursday at Pacific, UNLV began Saturday's contest faltering on offense, allowing UCSB to dictate a slow pace to the game. The Gauchos went out to a 13-9 lead on Idris Jones' jump shot with six minutes elapsed, but UNLV quickly found its run-and-gun style and began to speed it up. The Rebels proceeded to score on a trio of layups to key an 8-0 run and go up by two points.

"I thought we were somewhat lethargic early on," UNLV Head Coach Rollie Massamino said, "but we stepped up and made it our tempo kind of game."

"They wanted to create tempo, and when they create tempo like that, we've got to do something to combat that," Massamino added.

The Gauchos were able to hold their own for the next several minutes, as freshman Chris Ford nailed a 10-foot jumper to open a 23-19 UCSB lead with 4:14 remaining in the half. But the Rebels soon held all the cards, with forward J.R. Rider dealing out seven points in three minutes to send the teams to the break with UNLV

up 30-23.
"They forced the tempo, they got the tempo, and they got the lead," Pimm said. "We had to take shots quicker than we wanted to and the game obviously got out

The game did indeed get out of hand for the Gauchos. A three-pointer from Dexter Boney gave the Rebels a 12-point lead two minutes into the second half, and Rider went to work from there. The 6-foot-5, 215 pound senior hit the jackpot in the second half, scoring 23 of his gamehigh 31 points after halftime. Rider also led all players with eight rebounds on the night, and with a basket in the second half, he became only the fourth player in UNLV history to tally over 1,000 career

"He's like a man among boys out there," Pimm said of Rider. "He's very dif-ficult to stop, although we did a good job on him in the first half.

"But he just elevated his play in the second half. It seemed like when he wanted to get the ball, he went and got it, and when he wanted to score, he scored," Pimm added.

With Rider running the show, the Rebels took advantage of a UCSB team that was struggling on both ends of the court. The UNLV lead quickly became 17 points after a pair of layups from Rider midway through the half, and things didn't get any better for UCSB. Jones connected from three-point range with 5:08 remaining to cut the lead to 64-50, but the Rebels ran their advantage back to 20 a minute later

## **UCSB** Bats Go Silent as **CSUN Sweeps** Softball Team

NORTHRIDGE- A combination of tough pitching from Cal State Northridge and lack of offense from the Gaucho bats led to the shutdown of the UCSB softball squad on Saturday.

The Santa Barbara sluggers were swept in a doubleheader by the 14th-ranked Matadors, dropping the opening game 4-1 and being shut out 3-0 in the

nightcap. "Northridge is definitely a solid team and they are very well coached," UCSB Head Coach Sandy Pearce said. "They just hit the ball hard and that made the difference. We knew they were going to hit it hard and we were just hoping that we would be able to get the bat on the ball."

In the opening game, UCSB hitters were silenced by Matador pitcher Amy Windmiller, who threw a one-hitter. Gaucho freshman Ginny Mike broke up the no-no with an infield single

## History No Help as Sluggers Drop Three

History may have been on the side of the UCSB men's baseball team this weekend, but offense was on the side of the University of San

The Toreros, who were thumped 12-0 by the Gauchos when the teams last met in 1990, swept UCSB in three games this weekend at Cunningham Stadium in San Diego. USD pounded the Gauchos 8-4 on Friday, 12-2 Saturday and 7-5 in Sunday's season finale.

The losses extend Santa Barbara's losing streak to four games and drop the Gauchos' re-

cord to 1-5 on the year. The three-game sweep improved unbeaten San Diego's overall record to

Hitting was the significant factor in USD's dominating performance against the UCSB pitching staff. On Friday, the Toreros pounded out 12 hits, nine of which were charged to Gaucho starter Armando Delsi. The senior right hander took the loss in his only decision of the year after giving up four earned runs and striking out two in four and one-third innings pitched. Sophomore right-hander Pat James notched the

## Spikers Take Third at San Diego ASICS **Tournament**

The Gauchos (7-3 overall) embarked on their San Diego road trip last Wednesday and defeated UC San Diego that evening before moving onto this weekend's ASICS Grand Prix Tournament at San Diego State. The trip ended late last evening with the Gauchos, who entered the event as the third highestranked team of the field, taking their third place finish back to the bus for the ride home.

UCSB's final match of the tournament was not without excitement, as the Gauchos came from behind to beat #7-ranked Long Beach State, 12-15, 15-11, 15-17, 15-10, 15-10. Staked to a two-games-to-one disadvantage, the Gauchos entered the

## Men's Tennis Players Get Match Experience in San Diego Tournament

Match experience: It's one of those intangibles you can never get enough of if you're a tennis player.

Three members of the UCSB men's tennis team, who up to this point have seen little action, went looking for it this past weekend at the 22nd Annual San Diego Intercollegiate Tournament.

While freshmen Andy Joseph and Ryan Radtke and junior Gil Monteaux all were unable to make it out of the first round in the main draw, Monteaux advanced to the semifinals of the consolation draw. In doing so, he proved to himself that he has regained some of the form that had been missing all season long due to a debilitating shoulder injury that has prevented him from playing for several

"This [tournament] was good for me," said Monteaux, a transfer from Brazil. "It's been really hard watching all the other guys playing while I've been hurt. While they've been practicing, I've been with the trainer for two-and-a-half months. The problem has been my injuries, but now my shoulder is good and I really feel like things are going to get

In the consolation rounds, Monteaux defeated David Comadena, from the University of Redlands, in straight sets,

winning 6-3, 6-1. His next opponent — Josh Manning of BYU — had to default his match, and that let Monteaux into the semifinals, where he was defeated by Rice University's Mark Gately in straight sets, 6-3, 6-3.

For the two other Santa Barbarans, things didn't go quite as well, but nevertheless, it was a good opportunity to play some competitive tournament matches. Radtke lost 6-3, 6-3 to the University of San Diego's Phillip Hoffman, who went on to win his draw. In the consolation draw, Radtke went out in the first round to Jerry Miyamoto of UC Irvine in two sets, losing 7-6, 6-4. In the first round of the main draw, UCSB's Joseph lost to Craig Geldard of the University of San Diego in a three-set battle, losing 6-4, 1-6, 6-4. In the consolation draw, Joseph was defeated by Michael Weston of Red-

"I've been kind of struggling lately," and I was hoping to break out of it here," Joseph said of the tournament. "I haven't practiced in a while because of a back problem, so my groundstrokes aren't really in tune. I realized I need to have an alternative to my groundstrokes, so I tried to come to the net more. Overall, I learned quite a bit."

The Gauchos will next be in action on Feb. 14 when they host Big West rival

UCSB sophomore Steve Lane took the defeat and evened up his record at 1-1 after surrendering four runs on five hits in four and one-third innings. Senior Chris Johnson relieved Lane in the fifth and went for two

and one-third innings, giving up two runs on four

"It was a close game until the fifth inning, and then I made a few mistakes and then the game got out of hand," Lane said. "We didn't have enough offense, and we didn't have the pitching to stop their offense."

Sunday's contest was closer, although Gaucho starter Mike Wolger lost his second start in a row

after UCSB fell behind early in the game, 4-0. The sophomore left-hander did not make it past the first inning.

The Gauchos made a game of it in the latter stages of the finale, but their offense could not carry them through. It appeared that everything hat Santa Barbara hit bounced into the gloves of the San Diego defense.

"We didn't play really

well, to be honest, but it member of the Gaucho wasn't bad enough to get swept in the series," Johnson said. "Everything pretty much went their way and nothing really went our way. Our pitching wasn't too bad. It's tough to say what happened. The games went so fast, it seemed like."

Freshman outfielder Wynter Phoenix made a homecoming of sorts during his first road trip as a

squad. Phoenix - whose hometown is nearby El Cajon — saw action in all three games, but had mixed feelings about his overall performance.

"I was a little disappointed in myself at the plate, but defensively, I was happy with it — I try to keep that up if my batting's not going so well," he said.
"I think [being swept] showed us that we need to

pull together a little more, and once we do that, the winning will come sooner or later. [On Sunday], we didn't have that bad of a game. [Head Coach Al Ferrer] just wanted us to stay involved and intense throughout the game, and we did that."

On deck for the Gaucho sluggers are the Cal State Northridge Matadors this Tuesday afternoon at Campus Diamond.

ranking.
UCSB, which outblocked LBSU 25-16 in the match, was able to regain its earlier momentum, and the squad sent the match to a fifth and decisive game. Because of rally scoring, the Gauchos were able to capitalize on the

'49er mistakes and eventually closed out the match

Redshirt freshman Amauray Velasco, who finished the tournament with a team-leading 118 kills, led the Gauchos with 37 kills and four blocks against Long Beach. Senior outside hitter Stace Lougeay added 19 kills and five blocks.

UCSB started the tournament on Friday afternoon with a rematch of Wednesday's game against UCSD. This time around, the results were no diffe-

rent as the Gauchos who outhit the Tritons .378 to .179 — swept San Diego, 15-12, 15-12, 15-6.

The team's next match was its biggest upset of the event, as Indiana-Purdue at Fort Wayne came into the tournament as the highest-ranked team in the field at #4. However, because UCSB Head Coach Preston was able to beat San Diego with his reserves, his regular starters were well rested Friday evening and they rolled over IPFW in three, 15-2, 15-3, 16-14. UCSB outhit

Purdue .408 to .146 and outblocked the Boilermakers 15-6. The Gauchos also came away with 14 service aces and Velasco led the squad with 18 kills, four blocks and a .548 hit-

ting percentage.

The Gauchos' five game winning streak ended Saturday morning at the hands of #5-ranked Cal State Northridge, 15-10, 15-7, 7-15, 7-15, 15-12. The Gauchos' 20 service errors were responsible for the loss, as the teams played close to dead-even in all other statistical categories. However, CSUN All-Americans Coley Kyman and Ken Lynch were tough, combining for 32 kills and 18 blocks.

Later that afternoon, the Gauchos took to the floor against the 13thranked host SDSU Aztecs. Despite 21 Gaucho service errors, the team had a relatively easy time in capturing the win, 15-7, 8-15, 15-9, 15-8. Once again, Velasco led the squad with 26 kills, while redshirt freshman Doug Hughes put down 15 kills on his

way to a .542 hitting percentage.

Playing against #8-ranked Hawaii Sunday morning, UCSB knew that a win could put them in the championship game, with a chance to rematch CSUN. However, a .269 team hitting percentage and 20 service errors gave the Rainbows the three game sweep, 15-9, 15-12, 15-11. Junior Hector Lopez was the Gaucho star in the losing effort, recording 14 kills and hitting .345, while Lougeay chipped in nine for a .667

"This loss is very frustrating because we wanted to at least split with a ranked team," UCSB second baseman Jen Gomez said. "There are a lot of quality players here and I don't think we were mentally or physically prepared for this game. Some days it's like that and we just have to deal with it."

In the nightcap, the

Santa Barbara sluggers faced sophomore Kathy Blake, who led the Matadors as a freshman with a 25-7 record last season. Blake shut out the Gauchos, allowing one hit from junior Krissy Kyriazis in the first inning.


The Matadors scored in

the third inning when Calcante hit her second home run of the day to give Northridge a two-run lead. CSUN scored again in the fourth when Kari Hazlett scored on Denise Swank's single to right

"The loss is emotionally

really hard, but I think it's good to take a loss like this now because now the girls know they have to work really hard in order to step things up," Pearce said. "We certainly want to play teams that challenge us and it's good because we learned a lot today."



The loss leaves UCSB with a 2-2 split on its now completed four-game road trip, and also drops the team to seventh place in the Big West Conference standings heading into the final eight games of the season. The Gauchos will now look to regroup for a game this Thursday against the Nevada Wolf Pack, a team that beat UCSB at Reno last month.

"We're going to take [Sunday] off and have a good, solid practice on Monday to get ready for Thursday," Pimm said Sa-turday. "We are where we are, and we need to understand who we are and

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
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
