Bursch Takes Action on New State College

Five Meet to Discuss Plans for Beginning of New Developments

HANSON BUDGETS FUNDS

Administrators Set Aside Funds to Construct Service Roads

The possibility of immediate action in the starting of the construction of the new State college road will advance toward a decision today when Dr. Charles Bursch, chief of division of school house planning of the State of California, and President Clarence L. Phelps complete their investigation and discussion.

Today's conference is the direct result of a recent meeting of Senator Stow, Assemblyman Robertson, Director of Public Works Kelly, State Architect McDougall and Director of Education Kersey in which several tentative decisions were made.

The rough master plan has been accepted, and the suggestion of Mayor E. O. Hanson that a certain sum be placed in the next year's budget of the engineering department of the city of Santa Barbara to be used for the construction of the Cliff drive and the entrance to the Leadbetter site.

It was further agreed by the officials that the remainder of the State funds be used to construct service roads on the site to the amount of \$10,000, and that the balance be used to construct a new building on the proposed campus site.

Following the conference in the north and the meeting today here, a definite decision will be reached within the near future, according to President Clarence Phelps.

"I believe that at last we've got something here that really means action. Within a very few days there is a very good possibility that we will know when we will be able to start work on our new college site on Leadbetter hill," said President Phelps.

Sixty Students Go on Annual Trip to Wild Anacapa Isle

Approximately sixty students returned Sunday evening and yesterday morning, having encountered interesting experiences and rough sailing on the annual island trip which was held last week-end with camp set up at Valdez harbor on Anacapa island.

Dave Pollock made all necessary arrangements for the excursion, as general manager.

The first boat left the wharf Friday at one o'clock, p.m. and arrived at Valdez at six. The second boatload left at one o'clock a.m., and arrived at the islands in time for breakfast. A heavy sea on both trips was responsible for longer hours on the journey. The first boat arrived in Santa Barbara Sunday evening at five o'clock. Due to more rough weather, the last group waited until daylight yesterday morning to leave Valdez.

Time at the islands was spent in hiking, fishing, and swimming. An excursion by a few students was made up the coast line in a boat delivering mail to the inhabitants at several harbors.

The Misses Gladys Vanu Fossen and Mrs. Clyde Campbell acted as faculty sponsors for the group.

The most humorous incident was cited by the participants as that relating to Bill Manning, who was holding tightly to a bed roll when they landed. One person on shore shouted, "Throw me the rope." Manning thought the word was "roll" and threw. The bedding promptly went over the side into the brine.

All of this, our honors, would have been impossible, except for the untiring efforts of El Gaucho staff. It was their devotion, their cooperation, their undivided loyalty which enabled us to accomplish a year of pioneering in collegiate journalism. The laurels rest not on the editor's head, but upon those who struggled fought and attained our minor degree of perfection.

The depth of our appreciation extends to those many students that served as Gaucho correspondents in the absence of the journalism class, and to the student body at large as well as those kind advisory faculty who guided and didn't dictate. Someday we hope for the privilege of repaying the obligation that we so sincerely feel.

To Petie McKinney, we wish unprecedented success. The Gaucho campus has in next year's editor, one whose potential possibilities far outrank her predecessor's of earlier years. It is a position earned, not awarded. Her work on El Gaucho during the past year has topped that of all others, and her appointment brings to actuality the prophecy of the girl editor before her in 1934-35, Miriam Firkins. Miriam editorialized, "Someday Petie will be editor, you watch that girl."

(So with a tinge of regret as the year draws to a close and we put our sixty-second paper to bed, my fondest hope is that the ground work that we have laid this year will be followed-up and carried on, and my most affectionate memory is that of the loyalty showed so often by those with whom I worked.)

Kindergarten Primary Class With Elementary Group Enter Projects

Students and faculty of the Santa Barbara city schools have been invited to review the exhibit put on by Mrs. Florence W. Lyons, supervisor of integrated activities, in conjunction with classes of Miss Edith Leonard and Mrs. Laura S. Price, on the college campus.

In the kindergarten primary department division, the students work out units and then plan the manipulative side. An arctic scene, "Uncle Sam's Attic", shows an igloo made of cotton and chicken wire, a polar bear of paper sacks, and icebergs of crushed paper. A second, the "Dairy Farm" unit, presents a house made of mattress cartons, paper animals, and a colorful frieze in the background. Behind the arctic scene are found the Aurora Borealis lights in the distance.

In the elementary part, the exhibit contains a replica of a colonial cabin, with cardboard shakes as roofing, hand made candles and utensils, and a spinning wheel. A second is the Mexican unit showing all sorts of pottery, and fruit and vegetables made of paper. "Westward Expansion" a scene with mountains made of paper pulp, and dotted with figures of Indians, settlers, trappers and covered wagons cut of soap, together with "Panama Canal", showing mountains made of crushed calomined paper, marked with villages and cities and the ship locks, also feature the elementary division. Tin can carving, puppet making, weaving and basketry will also be exhibited to the visitors.
