Baseball Boys Bow In This Afternoon At Cabrillo Lot

With Saturday afternoon comes the first test of the season for "Spud" Harder's Gaucho baseball team who play Bill Willard's All-Stars, 3:15 p.m., on Cabrillo Field, overlooking the beach. The All-Stars are composed of major and minor league ball players—a good indication of the type of ball club we can expect to see.

Bill Willard was formerly with the Philadelphia Athletics.

While this game is tentative as yet, it is well worth looking into, for we not only will have our Gauchos representing us we will have assurance of a ball game with lots of quality in it on both sides, and an opposing ball club that should afford much stiff competition for Santa Barbara.

The starting line-up for the Gauchos will be, as follows: battery: Charles Vasquez catching, Ralph Keegan pitching. Infield: John Valentino at first, Eddie Saenz at second, Carl Fisher or Leo Helfridge at third, and Mark Steinberg at short stop. The outfield will be composed of Bob Elliott and Jack Kenning with a toss up between Johnny Rodgers and Dave Morgan to complete the ball club.

Dale Scott will be in there waiting to relieve Keegan in the event this is needed. We have a couple of casualties to contend with too. Gene Mangini cannot be counted on where pitching is concerned since he ran over his hand spiking it; also Bill Metcalf who has been nursing a very sore thumb all week.

This will be a fine game to start out the season with. It offers the kind of competition that should bring out the type of mettle the Gauchos are made of right from the start; and that is about how soon fans like to know about these things. Early in the month of March this student body will be called upon to make a decision regarding one of the most important factors of college activity—the question is that of tradition.

Some members of the student body and of the faculty advocate a change from the traditional Los Gauchos to some other name, the foremost of which, at the present time, is the "Cubs". Said persons desire this change for the following reasons:

1. The Gaucho is not a native (nor was he ever) of this locale and is thus in no wise representative of it.

2. Since we are now a part of the University of California we should aline ourselves more closely with that institution in name as well as in activity.

3. There are even some who feel that the parent organization will "frown" on us if we dare to make any attempt to maintain old traditions.

Because we feel that the question is a large one and because we have definite ideas to the contrary in this matter, those of us who feel differently wish to present our views in this writing so that in studying the situation the potential voter will at least have been presented with both sides of the argument.

These are our contentions for your scrutiny and we hope for your edification.

1. We willingly admit that the Gaucho is not a native of these parts but his characteristic ten-

acity, his courage, and his dexterity are certainly attributes of which any individual or group could be proud. California has imported the Eucalyptus from Australia, rice from China, oranges from Italy and horses from Arabia. Why not the Gaucho from South America.

2. The "Cub" presents a picture of adolescence and ignorance together with clumsiness and near helplessness. Is this the emblem for a school with traditions as old as those of U.C.L.A., and alumni like Howie Yeager, Bob Morelli, Doug Oldershaw, and Tommy Guerrero?

3. If any of you have ever been to a competition between U.C.L.A. and the University of California, I need not draw a picture of the two student bodies glaring across the field at one another and singing the same songs, with different word inserts, while the Bears and the Bruins chase each other about the gridiron.

4. We have just been nationally advertised by Bob Hope as Los Gauchos. Why ruin a million dollars worth of advertising?

And finally, I wish to say that there are many of us who are proud of the Gaucho tradition and who are looking forward to the day when we will kick the teeth from every mouth of the Bear or the Bruin, or for that matter from both at the same time. Lastly, whatever your feeling in the matter, let's all show interest enough to come out and vote one way or the other.

EDITORIAL

Santa Barbara college is a growing institution. The population of the college has swollen to almost twice that of last semester. With the growth in registration, the housing situation has become more acute. Although the problem of housing is a national problem, immediate steps are needed to solve the dilemma.

For years the Board of Regents of this university have regarded housing as a problem outside their jurisdiction. When Santa Barbara college became a part of the University of California, dormitories were badly needed at Berkeley, Davis, Los Angeles, and Santa Barbara. Because the problem has become a serious one, because the university is being flooded with returning veterans who need and are entitled to good housing, the Regents have gone on record that they believe that the responsibility of providing appropriate living quarters is their responsibility. The Regents recognize that fact that accommodations that had hitherto met the need have become permanently restricted.

As a result a dormitory unit was constructed this summer on university grounds on the Berkeley campus with university funds.

This, of course, did not meet all the needs of the Berkeley campus or any of the other campuses. Assembly Bill 47 was presented to the Ways and Means Committee of the Assembly and the Finance Committee of the Senate. The bill made a request for \$5,600,000 from the State Legislature which will be matched by funds which will come from private sources in the state.

Two students from the Santa Barbara campus were invited to appear in Sacramento to present the urgent need of the Santa Barbara student body for more adequate housing. The case of returning veterans was vividly covered by representatives of each campus. The committees unanimously passed the bill and it went to the Senate and Assembly. Both legislative bodies passed the housing bill.

Assembly Bill 47 is now awaiting the signature of Governor Earl Warren. This bill is only one of many asking for money needing the governor's signature. Our hope is that the governor will see the urgency of our need and give us the requested appropriation. If the bill is signed, dormitories will be built on the Berkeley, Davis, Los Angeles and Santa Barbara campuses.

In addition to Bill 47, the Board of Regents has been instrumental in approving the thirty-five units of emergency housing for veteran students. These units will be available in several months.

According to the Dean of Women's office, the opportunity to obtain part of Hoff Hospital for living accommodations is not closed. Officials of the college and the university are anxious to have the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors continue negotiations to use Hoff Hospital for the welfare of many agencies and citizens in this area.

The Board of Regents should be commended for their attitude in the current housing problem. The Board has reversed itself from a definite negative attitude to that of an affirmative view. It has shown that it definitely, in this instance, has the welfare of the students of the university in mind.

With adequate housing the university will continue to expand and Santa Barbara college will expand with it. Until this housing is available, veterans will continue to live in one room apartments and those veterans with children will not attend our college. For some reason, children are a drawback to a college education these days.

Until the university is able to provide the college students with good housing, the responsibility for housing the veterans rests with the people of Santa Barbara. In most instances they have been most helpful. In other cases, the landlords could show us a little more cooperation.

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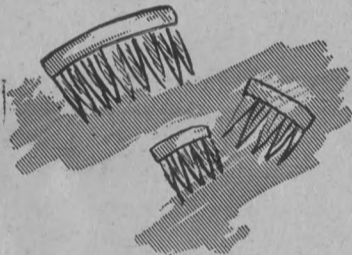

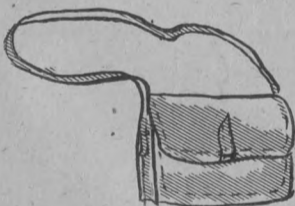

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A Report on the Battle Against Inflation

Undoubtedly, the best report about Truman's reconversion administration has been that which was recently made, announcing the appointment of Chester Bowles as the head of a powerful Economic Stabilization Board.

This appointment was the outcome of a protracted conflict between Price Administrator Bowles and Reconversion Director John W. Snyder over the now settled U. S. Steel strike. Bowles advocated the policy which he has always stood for, one of strict price control which will hold down prices all-along-the-line; whereas Snyder has demanded what might well be called a policy of "controlled inflation to promote production." Pressed hard by opinions from Vinson and Byrnes and the possible resignation of Bowles, the President made the following moves during this time: revived the old Stabilization Board and gave it new power and a new director, Chester Bowles; put Paul Porter, then head of the F.C.C., in Bowles' old job as his right hand man; and then ordered Porter to lift the ceilings on steel to insure an overall \$5.00 per ton increase in all types produced by U. S. Steel according to the agreement which brought the strike to a close.

Although the end of the steel strike and the success of Bowles' "hold-the-line on prices" policy are both welcomed with joy by the mass of the American people, one must not become too overconfident. Bowles and Porter will have a difficult time holding the lid on the prices of steel products which would ordinarily have a parallel increase in prices to compensate for that increase in the basic material. Bowles and Porter are in a precarious position and are under the increasingly tremendous pressure of a great many "profit hungry" business men. These are the words of Porter in this respect: "The pressures against that line (price line) are terrific. We are face to face with critical dangers that inflation will destroy all we have and blast us into a future of limited markets, constricted earnings and needless poverty."

Doubtless, Bowles will not get a great deal of support from the Administration, for he is under the supervision of Snyder directly, and under the President only indirectly; this is why he and Porter need all the support they can get from the group for which they

are putting up such a thrilling fight; the American people. If you doubt for an instant that business, without price control, will go the way it went after the last war with the same result, you can not be familiar with its record of effort to wreck price control and with its practices which often result in dangerous economic trends. Note the incredible 55% price increase recently sought for by Ford Motors; it is obvious they would have gotten it in the event of the absence of the OPA from the scene.

It is we, the consumer, who would be forced to pay such fantastic prices; it is we who will suffer from the future which has been mentioned by Porter, but which could be made possible by his opponents; it is for us to jump upon the "Bowles-Porter Bandwagon" and let them know we are there, for it is obviously going in our direction, but as yet, without our help.

Nick Carter, track and field mentor, has been working hard ever since his return to his pre-war post, lining up and conditioning his prospects for the coming track season. It can be said without any doubt that it will take a little time to get the fellows in shape, but after this milestone has been passed, the Gauchos should prove to be a winning squad.

In the 100-yard and 220-yard sprints you will see the talents of Mel Patton, a former Woodrow Wilson High speed-merchant, who has a previous record in the 100-yard dash of 9.7 seconds. If Mel is able to hold this time in the hundred he will set a new pace for the Gauchos. The school record for the 100 was held by Hovis Bess and Bill Morgan, a returning veteran of the track, and the official timing was 9.8 seconds. Other fellows who are also 100-yard dashmen are Charles Bingham, who stops the clock at 9.9 and Owen Buskirk, a member of the 1942 track team.

The 440-yard run will see the talents of Paul Fritts, who competed one year at San Francisco State in 1941; George McKenzie Santa Barbara high school 440 man; Charles Skidmore, a former San Diego Aztec trackman; and Edwin C. Rice, Pepperdine college letterman, with 48.6 seconds as his best time for the 440-yard run.

The 880-yard run and the mile have openings for more men, only two men, Fred Beckman and Narducci Marino are out for the 880, and Bob Pratini, Fresno high school star, sole candidate for the mile.

High hurdles will be cleared by Sam Cathcart of Long Beach, Ray Lloyd, Fremont high school, and George Anderson, transfer from U.S.C.; Pinky Mohr 1941 letterman for the Gauchos, along with Cathcart and Anderson will compete in the low hurdles this season.

Big Ed Grabast, 240 pound exponent fullback for the grid season, along with Gail Squire and Francis Graham will be behind the shotput. Incidentally, Gail Squires has a record of 46 feet, 6 inches and Ed Grabast tops his mark with a 47 foot, 2 inch shotput. Grabast, Squires and Art Brazil, a former college student, will also participate in the discus throw.

Gauchos Netmen Hard At Work

With a squad of ten men trying for positions on the Gaucho tennis team, Coach Terry Dearborn expects to develop a sextet of smooth-stroking netmen to represent Santa Barbara in 2C2A play and metropolitan area matches during the coming season. The first local conference matches will be with Fresno State college on March 30.

Although most of the squad are freshmen, several men have already proved themselves in competition and should provide the nucleus for a strong team during the next four years.

Santa Barbara high school has contributed three players, John Sanders, Juan Solis, and Larry Wathey, three-year man and team captain.
