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UCSB Weekend Update

The UCSB men's tennis team earned a berth in next week's NCAA Championships by winning the NCAA Region 8 Championships on Sunday. The Gauchos defeated #1-seeded Pepperdine University 4-1 to take the title.

Santa Barbara, which was seeded second in the tournament, gained the early edge over the Waves by taking the doubles point with victories from the teams of Cory Guy/Simon Shen and Simon Kurth/Darren Potkey. UCSB then went on to win three singles matches in straight sets to seize the title. Pepperdine came into the match ranked 12th in the country, while the Gauchos entered the tournament ranked 30th.

Santa Barbara reached the finals by defeating the University of Washington in the semifinal round Saturday, also by a 4-1 margin. The squad received a bye in the first round of the six-team tourney on Friday.

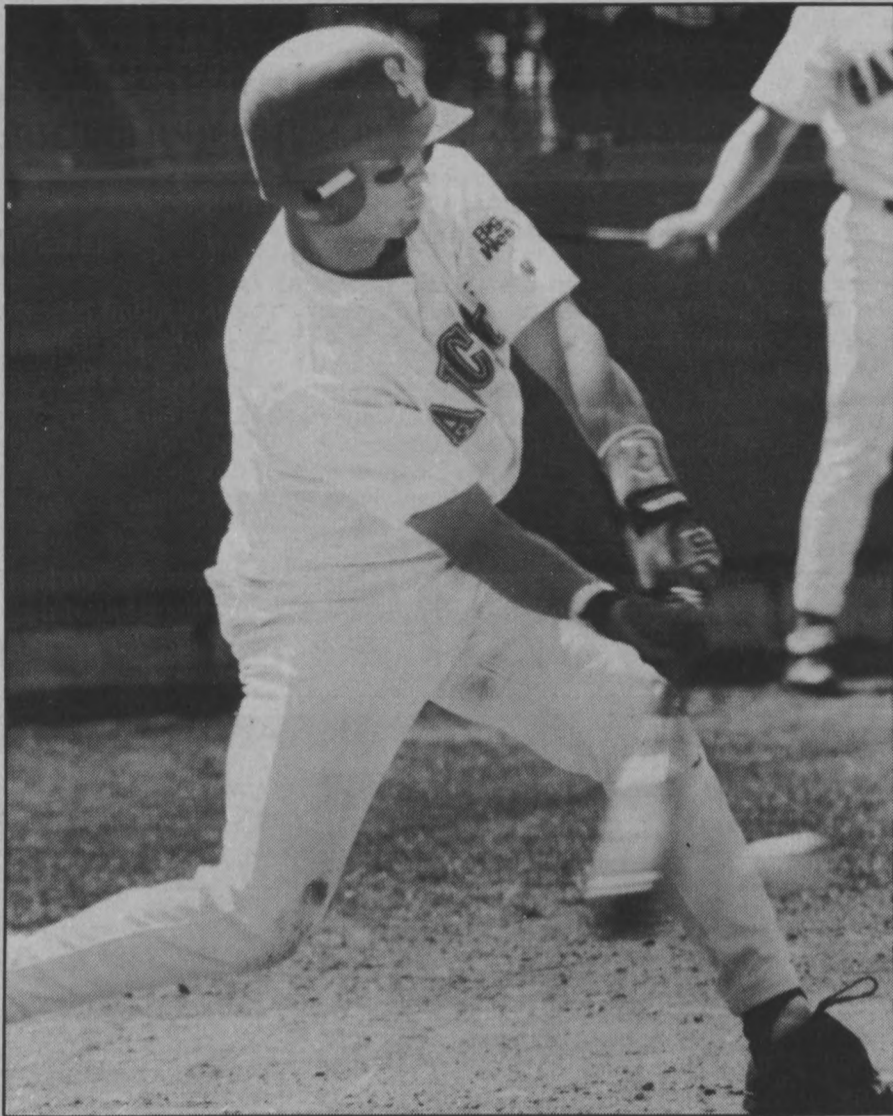
The 16-team NCAA Championships will begin May 17 at the Los Angeles Tennis Center in Westwood.

The UCSB women's water polo team competed in the Intercollegiate Championships this weekend, advancing to the finals of the consolation bracket. The results of that game were not available at press time.

The Gauchos opened the tournament with an 8-2 victory over Michigan on Friday. They were then ousted by #3 Stanford 10-4, putting the squad into the consolation bracket. On Saturday, Santa Barbara was able to defeat #7 USC 6-2 behind three goals from senior Keri Santos. UCSB was scheduled to play in the fifth-place match Sunday against Slippery Rock.

UCSB Loses Two of Three to CSUF

■ Santa Barbara Drops a Spot in Big West Tournament Seeding

It was not what they had hoped to accomplish in the final week of Big West Conference play. But then again, they didn't get any help from anybody else either.

The UCSB baseball team headed to Cal State Fullerton on Friday in firm grip of the third seed in the Southern Division of the conference — two games ahead of Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. However, two losses to the CSUF Titans coupled with an unlikely three-game sweep by Cal Poly over division-leading Long Beach State suddenly propelled the Mustangs ahead of Santa Barbara in the standings.

With this weekend's results, the Gauchos' plan for the Big West Tournament has been drastically altered. Instead of battling the University of Nevada in the first round, Santa Barbara (26-28 overall, 15-15 in the Big West) now faces the undesirable task of playing the 19th-ranked LBSU on its home field in Long Beach come Thursday.

"Long Beach State has lost four straight conference games at home," said UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema, not worried about the sudden turn of events over the last three days. "To win in the tournament, you have to go through [them anyway]. To get Long Beach first might be best for us."

If there is one thing the team has learned about Big West play this weekend that will help them in the tournament, it is that pitching is the key down the stretch.

The Titans' (34-21-1, 21-9) pitching staff absolutely stifled the normally prolific UCSB batters, allowing only three runs and 15 hits over three games.

GaUCHO Track and Field Shines Again in Two Meets

Just another meet, just another set of GaUCHO records shattered and numerous individual triumphs for the UCSB men's and women's track and field teams.

Santa Barbara continued to break school records and earn personal bests at both the Stanford Cardinal Qualifier Meet on Friday and the Occidental Invitational on Saturday.

"There were a lot of personal bests this weekend," said UCSB Head Coach Pete Dolan. "We have really good momentum going into the conference meet [May 23-24]."

Leading the way for the GaUCHOs was senior Dave Cullum. Cullum established a new UCSB record in the 5,000 meters with a time of 14:00.00 Friday. Cullum's time demolished the previous record of 14:18.

"I was overwhelmed," Cullum said upon hearing of the record. "It was a perfect race. I stayed focused and that was the main goal. I knew it was a good race for me to gauge myself and get a good time."

The GaUCHOs continued to compete at a high level in heat two of the 5,000 meters. Senior

Brad Glosser finished the race in a time of 14:14.98, while senior Nate Jobe's 14:27.08 was a personal best.

Junior Trent Bryson came in ninth in the 3,000 meter steeplechase with a time of 9:00.29.

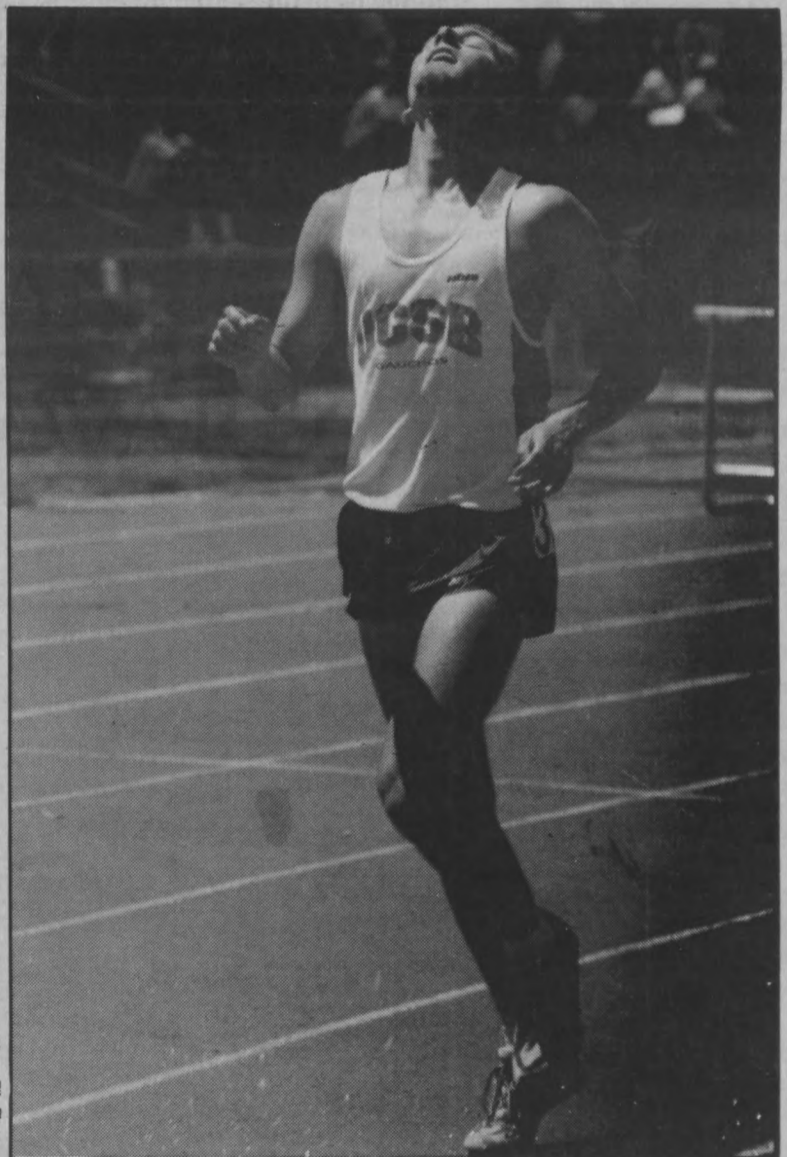
Santa Barbara traveled south to Occidental on Saturday with more positive results. In the women's 1,500 meters, senior Laurie Murphy gained a personal record with a second-place finish of 4:40.94.

The women's 4x400 relay team put in another strong performance Saturday. The team's time of 3:52.6, with a phenomenal 56.2-second anchor leg by sophomore Sabrina Caplis, was a 10-second improvement from its previous time established earlier in the season.

Senior Eliza Alexander compiled one more personal record for the GaUCHOs at Occidental. Her 9:50 in the 3,000 meters is her best time to date.

In the men's 800 meters, sophomore Mike Heggland had a personal record with a 1:54.86.

In field events, senior Charlie Gardner threw the shot put a distance of 50'2", marking only the second time in his career that he has eclipsed the 50' plateau.

The lone Santa Barbara victory came Friday, when the Gauchos defeated CSUF 2-1 in a classic pitcher's duel. UCSB was pounded 17-0 Saturday before falling 6-1 Sunday.

In Friday's contest, senior Bryan Noyes (6-4) shined with seven strong innings. He allowed only six hits and one run while striking out seven. Senior John Minton pitched two solid innings of relief to earn his third save of the year.

Offensively, the Gauchos were led by sophomore catcher Justin Lehr, whose seventh home run of the season proved to be the difference in the game. Freshman third baseman Justin Gemoll also added two hits and an RBI.

Although Fullerton's pitchers fared well Friday — allowing only the two runs on five hits — the staff came back with a vengeance the next two days.

On Saturday, three CSUF pitchers combined to pitch a three-hitter — all singles. Fullerton ace Brian Tokarse (10-1) struck out 10 Gauchos in only six innings of work, helping to prevent all but one UCSB runner from advancing to second base all night.

"Their pitching was good," said senior center fielder Joe Kemper. "But it wasn't anything we haven't seen. They weren't better than anyone. We just didn't have the

necessary good approach at the plate."

Freshman southpaw Barry Zito (3-6) was shelled hard, allowing 10 runs and 10 hits in only three innings of work. Senior Jorvic Salazar and freshman Matt Dailey mopped up in the loss.

Sunday's contest saw much of the same things for the Gauchos. CSUF's Brandon Duckworth (8-1) combined with two others to allow only one run on seven UCSB hits.

Lehr provided the lone offensive score with another solo shot against Duckworth. Senior designated hitter David Willis, sophomore left fielder Brad Wright and junior right fielder Corey Burnell each chipped in with two hits.

Junior Seth Bean pitched a complete game for Santa Barbara. He allowed six runs on nine hits and two walks in eight innings. Fullerton scored all but one of its runs in the first three innings.

"Fullerton has good pitchers and they pitched us well," Brontsema said. "Sure the team is down, but playing in the tournament next weekend is an opportunity of a lifetime for these guys. If they don't see it as being great, it'll be a quick tournament. It starts with pitching and the ability to execute."

The Big West tourney, which will feature double-elimination rounds, starts Thursday for the Gauchos. They will play host Long Beach State at 7 p.m. at Blair Field.
