Last but not least, graduating seniors will be informed of job opportunities in teaching and regular positions obtainable through the Bureau of Occupations in Los Angeles and Berkeley. Information concerning civil service positions with the state and federal government will also be given. This section is being arranged by Frank Goodall with the cooperation of the various agencies concerned.

The Administration realizes the importance of these senior matters and has allowed this special meeting only on the grounds that it will be well attended.

EXTEND ENTITLEMENT FOR PAST MID-POINT VETERAN DROP-OUTS

Veterans who have dropped out of school during a semester in the past may have the time repurchased in order to extend his entitlement past mid-point, it was recently announced by the Office of Veterans Affairs.

If any veteran so concerned who has enough time to carry him one day beyond mid-point, the U. S. Veterans Administration will carry him the remainder of the semester, including subsistence. Further information regarding this may be obtained in the Office of Veterans Affairs.

Placement Service Arranged for Non-Teachers

Placement service for non-teacher majors is now available on this campus for the first time in its history. Arranged by the Associated Students, this program is being operated through the Bureau of Occupations at UCLA.

The idea of non-teacher placement has interested Gauchos for some time, but this is the first real step that has been taken, according to AS President Frank Goodall.

Result of Platforms
Newly-elected Senior Class President in his campaign platform, as did newly-elected Sophomore Class President Don Noble.

Upon election Kindel accompanied Goodall to UCLA to ask the Bureau of Occupations there what could be done about non-teacher placement on this campus. The Bureau said that jobs were abundant and that UCSBC graduates have ample opportunity for good jobs with reputable nationwide companies.

Definite Advantage
This college definitely has an advantage over some of the other schools, according to the Bureau, and some non-teacher majors in particular were asked for by many companies.

Both men and women may take advantage of this placement ser-

vice and job openings secured through local contacts will be posted in the Associated Students Office, Building "D."

"Concrete Accomplishment"
"This placement service for non-teacher graduates is one of the most concrete things accomplished this year for the students," Goodall said. "It is not so much what we will be able to furnish now, but what we can build this into in putting pressure on the University to have our own Bureau of Occupations."

The continued success of this service on our campus depends on the number of applicants, according to Kindel.

Draft Disregarded
Draft or reserve status are to be disregarded since employers are hiring anyway. Many fields that are wide open are particularly pertinent to Santa Barbara College students.

Applications for the service are not commitments, and students in doubt about what to do should send in applications anyway to see what type of jobs are available.

Procedure
The procedure for making applications follows:

1. Application blanks are available in the Student Body Office.
2. Applications should be com-

pleted and returned to the Student Body Office not later than Tuesday, May 15.

3. These applications will be sent to the Los Angeles Office and then an interviewer, if enough applications are made, will come to this campus. These interviews will be made by the Bureau of Occupations in order that they may determine what type of work the applicant is best suited for.

4. Some of the interviews with the actual employers will be made on the UCSBC campus and some will be made on the UCLA campus.

Dr. Andron Awarded Summer Fellowship

Dr. Mortimer Andron, assistant professor of economics, is one of 19 economists awarded a Summer fellowship for field study in Chicago, beginning June 17.

The program, sponsored by Swift and Co., is designed to provide an opportunity for a selected group of economists to become intimately acquainted with the operations of business. The company said that only "university professors of general economics who are seriously interested in industrial organization and in price and production policies" were considered eligible for the awards.

Dr. Andron, a member of the faculty since 1947, is a graduate

Dr. Theodore Hatlen, this farce is distinguished from other kinds of comedy in that it is drama which depends on situation rather than upon character interest. Unlike high comedy, which provokes thoughtful laughter, the farce is content to arouse spontaneous merriment and "the loud laugh that speaks the vacant mind."

Faracial Characters
"The shrewish wife, the braggart soldier, and the imposter are all good examples of faracial characters which have always been popular," stated Dr. Hatlen. "Authors take these types and involve them in complicated intrigues, domestic quarrels, physical beatings, cases of mistaken identity, and similar comic patterns. Of all forms of literature, faracial comedy is least likely to survive because what is humorous to one age or nation is often tedious to another."

Dr. Hatlen added that this has not happened to Moliere. The French writer is still recognized as the foremost writer of all time in the field of farce.

Goerner as Sganarelle
Fred Goerner plays Sganarelle, buffoonish ne'er-do-well, who finds himself unexpectedly accepted as a great physician. He is taken to the house of a nearby nobleman and directed to cure his client's daughter, Martine, of a mysterious inability to speak.

The cure is finally brought about after Martine learns that she has feigned dumbness to keep from marrying a man she does not love. The all-student production is a perfect example of how its author, Moliere, earned his reputation as one of the greatest comedy writers of all time.

Others in the cast are Ken Kellogg as Lucas, Marie Willet as Martine, Tom Keen as Geronte, Lee Jackson as Leandre, Betty Groebli as Jacqueline, Annette Dunster as Lucinde, and Bill Vasse as Valere.

Tchekov One Act
Coupled with Moliere's play is "The Anniversary," a one-act farce by Anton Tchekov. Though best known as a short story writer, Tchekov nevertheless was very successful in the comedy field.

The second production will present a cast new to campus footlights. Dave Wood is Andrey Shiputich, Marlene Shapiro as Tatyana Alexeyevna, Minor Rootes as Hirin, and Audrey Williams as Mertschutkins.

Curtain time is 8:30 pm. Tickets can be reserved by calling 3116 at the College. They will be held at the box office for either night desired.

"For Defense, Blood Means Life!" That's the slogan for a student-inspired blood donor campaign to be staged on campus May 24 and 25 under the sponsorship of the Associated Students and the Santa

Santa Barbara chapter of the American Red Cross.

Arrangements have been made for a Mobile Blood Donor Unit to be on campus from 9 am to noon on Thursday and from 10 am to 4 pm on Friday, Chairman Pete Burgher announced. The Unit will be located at the Health Cottage.

Wholehearted Support
Provost J. Harold Williams gave his wholehearted support to the drive and called on faculty and administrative personnel, as well as students, to take the necessary time and trouble to contribute.

All blood, either in whole form or processed into plasma, will go directly to United Nations armed forces now fighting in Korea, Burgher emphasized.

Few Restrictions
There are few restrictions as to those who can be donors, according to Red Cross officials. Barred are those people who have had jaundice, recent inoculations, recent operations, malaria, are underweight or have high blood pressure.

Burgher urged all Gauchos who are under 21 to get written permission from their parents in advance. The permission need not be in any formal form, just so that it is in writing.

Direct Contributions
"The campaign offers us a chance to contribute directly to our troops in Korea," AS President Frank Goodall said. "I hope the turnout will be as large as it should be."

Panhellenic and Inter-Fraternity Councils have given tentative endorsement to the drive, as have other campus organizations.

FOSSIL COLLECTION PRESENTED TO UCSBC

A collection of approximately 1000 fossil specimens has been presented to the college by Dr. Ernest L. Bickerdike, associate professor of chemistry who has also made an extensive study of geology.

The specimens are representative of all eras from the Paleozoic through the Cenozoic age, including plant and animal forms. Many of the specimens are from foreign countries.

Included in the collection are such fossils as that of a saber-toothed cat, parts of a mastodon, and other large and small animals. The collection is being temporarily stored at Goleta until display arrangements can be set up on the new campus.

 To be sweetly stupid."

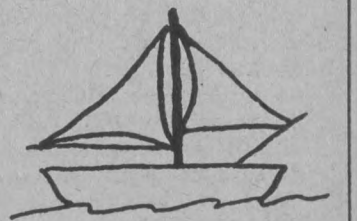
The long-forgotten author of the volume on toasts truly predicted the pitiable state of present drinking habits when she said:

Gauchos Face Diablos At Mesa Field Today

Santa Barbara's luckless nine, seeking an end to their 16-game losing streak, face the Diablos of Los Angeles State College at Mesa Field this afternoon.

The contest looms as a battle for the 2C2A cellar, as the Hilltoppers have won 2 and lost 11 in conference play, while the devils from the heart of the Southland boast a 1-5 record. In their only previous meeting this Spring, the Gauchos and the Diablos split a doubleheader. The locals won 12-10 and were defeated 4-5.

Coach Spud Harder has indicated that he will start Lefty Ray Rubenstein on the mound for San-

ta Barbara. Rubenstein sparked in a relief stint against Fresno State last Saturday, allowing only one hit in the 5 1/3 innings that he worked.

A previously planned tiff with USC, planned for Saturday night at Laguna Park, won't materialize due to schedule difficulties.

Gauchos Enter Ten In West Coast Relays

Santa Barbara College's crack high hurdler, Alberto Triulzi, gets his first shot at USC's Art Barnard this Saturday at Fresno's 25th Annual West Coast Relays.

Barnard has a 14.1 on his record and did 14.2 last week against UCLA's Bruins. Triulzi, a tall newcomer from Argentina, set a new CCAA Conference record last Saturday in 14.3. No one is worrying about the Relays record, however. Dick Attlesey established a new world mark there last year, topping the barriers in 13.5.

Track Coach Nick Carter said he planned to send 10 men to the Relays. Included in the list are Willie Dancer, high jump; Delf Pickarts, javelin; Les Reed, javelin and discus; Bob Daly, 5000 meters, and Leo Jennings, broad jump.

The Gauchos will enter two relay races. A quartet composed of Oley Scruggs, Ted Vick, Howard Cook and Ron Ternquist are signed up for the quarter-mile and half-mile events. Triulzi is listed as an alternate.

In recognition of his outstanding play Don Steere was given official All-American rating by the national tournament directors.

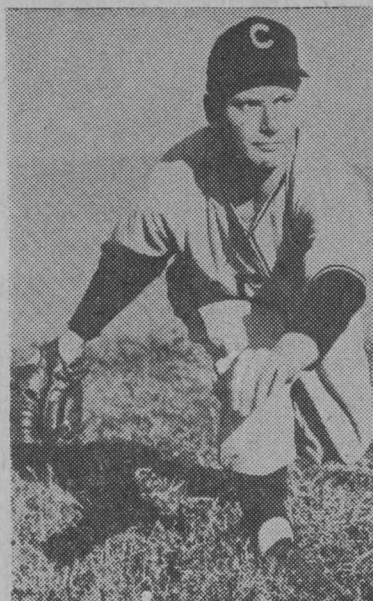

Dr. McClure Makes List Of Time Saves Which Improve Efficiency

"A lazy man is very often efficient. He may not look like he's working hard, but his steady, rhythmical motions with waste motions eliminated, may get the job done more quickly than if he were a busy 'speed-demon,'" states Dr. John A. McClure, assistant professor of industrial arts at UCSBC.

In one of his classes, a student gave an oil company an idea that saved that company \$50,000 a year and another student produced an idea that saved \$12,000 a year. Both ideas dealt with oft-repeated motions.

Motion and time study is the modern version of increasing efficiency. There are three steps to applying time and motion principles.

(1) A recognition of the problem, (2) analysis of the problem, and (3) a questioning process to determine if the materials should be changed or if a part of the operation may be eliminated or combined with another operation.

He has listed a few time savers: Motions of the two hands should be simultaneous and symmetrical. Rhythm is essential to a smooth, easy, work pattern.

Tools and materials should be located close and directly in front of the operator, so as to be within easy reach of the hands. There should be a definite place for all materials and tools.
