Motion and time study is the modern version of increasing efficiency. There are three steps to applying time and motion princi-

(1) A recognition of the problem, (2) analyzation of the problem, and (3) a questioning process to determine if the materials should be changed or if a part of the operation may be eliminated or combined with another operation.

He has listed a few time savers: Motions of the two hands should be simultaneous and symmetrical. Rhythm is essential to a smooth, easy, work pattern.

Tools and materials should be located close and directly in front of the operator, so as to be within easy reach of the hands. There should be a definite place for all materials and tools.
