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49ers Strike Gold Early, Panned Later

Down 22-6, UCSB Battles Back to Beat #25 Long Beach, 61-60

After 39 minutes of basketball and one of the most impressive comebacks in UCSB history, it had all come to this:

With :09 showing on the clock and the Gauchos up by a point, Long Beach State superstar guard Lucious Harris drove to the basket and went up for a layup.

And missed.

Harris grabbed the rebound and put up another shot, but was blocked by Gaucho center Doug Muse. Long Beach's Bryon Russell got to the ball and threw up a desperation attempt, but it was well off the mark as the buzzer sounded.

UCSB fans flooded the court in celebration of the Gauchos' 61-60 upset of 25th-ranked LBSU Monday at the Thunderdome.

"You should see us in the locker room," said UCSB guard Ray Kelly, whose team had lost three in a row before Monday. "This feels so good. I haven't been this happy all season. Coming off the three-game losing streak, who else is better to beat than the best team in the conference, the 25th team in the nation?"

"I just had a bad feeling in my heart after these last three losses, I almost forgot what it felt like to win. Tonight, I'm so happy."

The Gauchos (9-4 overall, 2-3 Big West) got to share their happiness with a nationwide ESPN television audience, which also saw the 49ers (12-2, 5-2) squander a 22-6 first half lead en route to losing for only the second time this season.

It was UCSB's first victory over a ranked opponent since a 78-70 win over then-#2 UNLV in February of 1990.

After trailing late Monday night, the 49ers were able to even the score at 51-51. With 5:48 to play, Gaucho forward Paul Johnson was called for his fourth foul and LBSU's Mike Atkinson converted on both ends of a one-and-one to put the 49ers back up by two, 53-51.

But the Gauchos were able to regain the lead with a 12-footer by Kelly and a three-pointer by Idris Jones. With 1:10 remaining and the Gauchos up by a point, UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm called a timeout to set up another play for Jones to seal the win.

"I have confidence that Idris, when he gets his feet under him, is going to make the shot," Pimm said. "And on those kinds of plays, when you're going for a particular shot, he's going to come through for us and make that shot."

Jones did, burying a 18-footer that put UCSB up 60-57. When 49er guard Jeff Rogers missed a shot and Kelly was fouled, it appeared that the Gauchos would coast to victory in the final 35 seconds. But Chris Tower nailed a three-pointer with 20 seconds to go to pull Long Beach to within a point at 61-60.

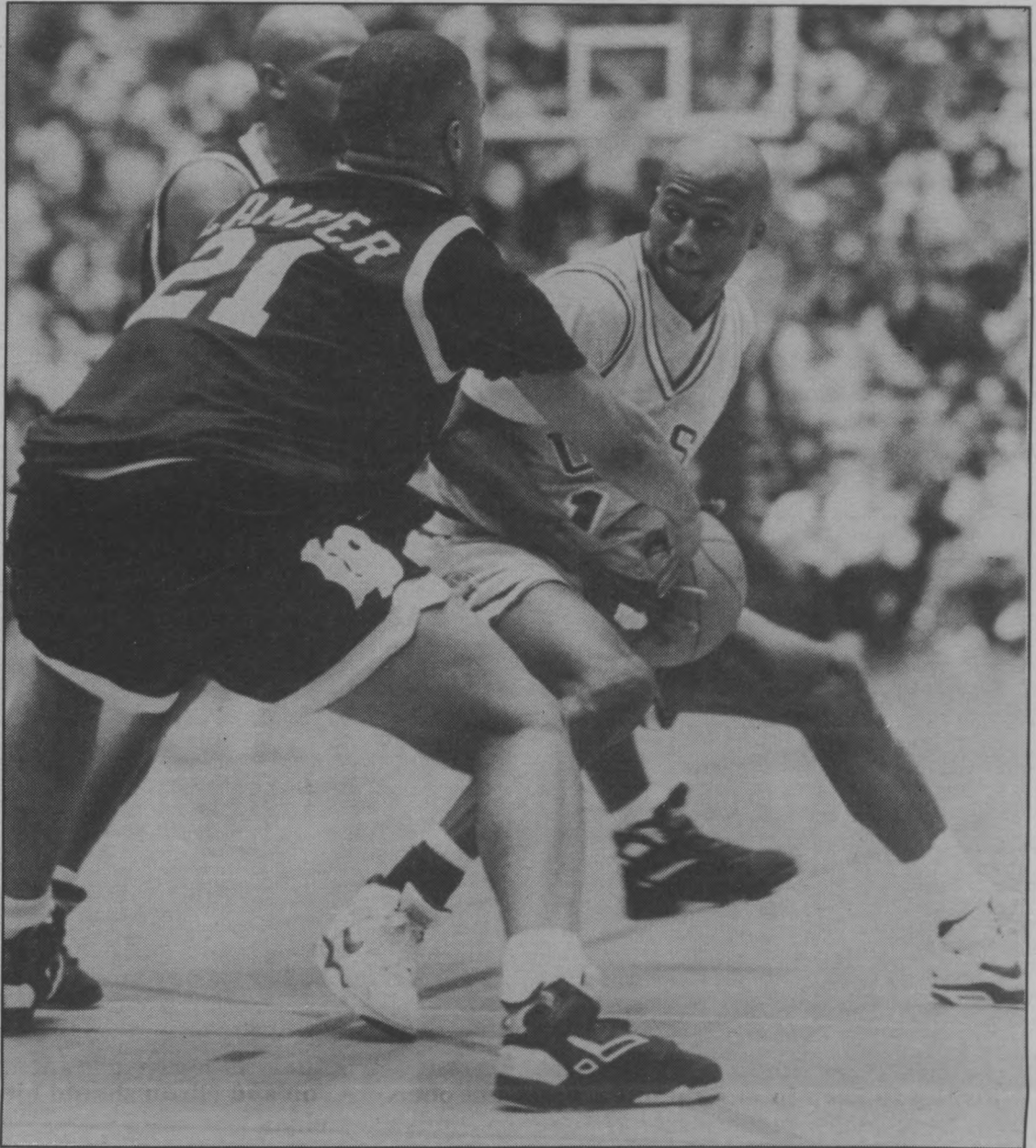
When Duane Carter was unable to handle a pass from Jones and was tied up, the 49ers got the ball on alternating possessions with nine seconds to play and a chance to win it.

"Nine out of 10 times he makes that shot," Long Beach Head Coach Seth Greenberg said of Harris' missed layup. "The ball just didn't bounce our way tonight."

Greenberg obviously forgot about the first 10 minutes, when the Gauchos had no chance to even make a game of it, let alone win. Long Beach forward Brian Camper started the onslaught with a layup 32 seconds into the first half, and by the time Russell slammed one home four and a half minutes later, the score was 14-1. Carter and Kelly each scored for UCSB in the next minute, but the 49ers continued to beat up on the struggling Gauchos, pushing their lead to 22-6.

"We were getting embarrassed out there, and nobody wanted

Frustration Finally Ends as Swimmers Down Vegas

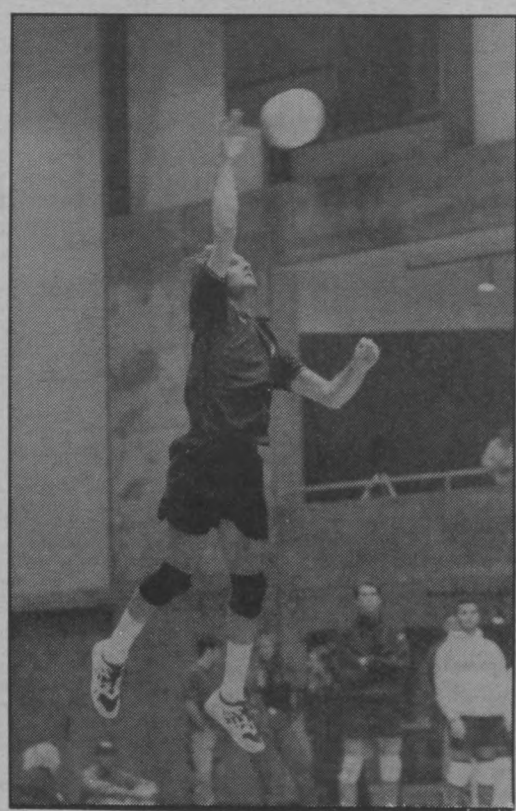

The Lady Gauchos avenged a loss taken last year from the Runnin' Rebs at Campus Pool with a 135-104 victory at Vegas, while the men also beat UNLV, 135-105.

The women's team was especially fired up, since it has failed

Tourney Wins Aren't Light

Gauchos Beat #2, #4 Teams Before Losing to #1 UCLA

If the preseason is any indication of what is in store for the regular season, then the UCSB men's volleyball team may have a lot to look forward to when its 1993 campaign begins in less than two weeks.

Holders of the top seed in their own tournament but with a #9 national ranking, the Gauchos breezed through preliminary and qualifying group play before their winning streak ended at the hands of #1 UCLA, 15-4, 15-10, 15-7 in the championship match of this weekend's 29th Annual UCSB/Bud Light Collegiate Invitational.

UCSB's second team, which was comprised mostly of Gaucho reserves due to the team's roster of 21 players, also did surprisingly well, placing 6th overall. Its victories were over Loyola Marymount, 15-12, 16-14, 15-13; San Jose St., 15-7, 15-3; Manitoba 15-7, 15-8; and UC Berk-

eley, 11-15, 15-6, 22-20.

But the squad's biggest win of the tournament, and perhaps the biggest surprise of the weekend, was over the #5-ranked Trojans of USC, 16-14, 6-15, 16-14. In the crossover playoff match, UCSB's second team was defeated by CSUN, 15-5, 15-5.

"Sean Stafford and Daren Torbet had unbelievable passing," said Todd Ahmadi, referring to the USC match. "The whole game is based on passing and when you have that, you're going to win that third and decisive game."

By the time UCSB's first team came out to play the championship game, it was apparent that the demands of the tournament had started to take its toll. The squad appeared sluggish in the first game, and the result was several uncharacteristic mistakes, which put the Gauchos in a 0-5 hole.

The team never regained its composure as UCLA's Dan Landry got his season's kill totals off to a good start, finishing the

Lady Gauchos Run All Over Spartans

Big Second Half Lifts SB, 77-49

Home sweet second home.

That's how the court at Robertson Gymnasium felt to the UCSB women's basketball team, which continued its mastery of opponents on the home court with a resounding 77-49 victory over San Jose State University Saturday night.

UCSB is now 6-7, 5-1 in Big West conference play, while SJSU falls to 3-9, 2-2.

The first half of the game was a see-saw affair, as the two teams exchanged leads seven times in the opening 20 minutes. Neither team built up a lead larger than four points, and the Gauchos

had the last one at half-time, when they were ahead 32-28.

"San Jose State played really well in the first half," UCSB Head Coach Mark French said. "I don't think necessarily that we didn't play well — I thought we played with reasonable intensity, but San Jose State just played very well. I thought it was really critical that we didn't get too frustrated at halftime."

If UCSB had any frustrations about the outcome of the first half, they unleashed them on the Spartans after the intermission. The Lady Gauchos turned up the defensive pressure early, and opened the half with an 11-4 run to go up 43-32 with 16:32 left after Lauren Goldstine completed a three-point play. The Gauchos closed with a 21-3 spurt over the game's final 10 minutes.

"In the first half we really played our game, but we made some crucial mistakes to let them go up by four [at halftime]," SJSU Head Coach Karen Smith said. "They picked apart our press and gave us more pressure than we're used to. We didn't handle that very well — we lost our cool and let up, and you just can't do that."

The Gauchos were led by guard Anna McConnell, who scored a game-high 16 to lead five UCSB players in double figures. Christa Gannon added another double-double to her collection, as she had 12 points and 12 rebounds. The Spartans were led by forwards Hulett Brooks and LaDonna Irving, who each scored 14 points. The Gauchos forced 33 SJSU turnovers, and tallied 21 steals, led by Gannon's five.

Bowerbank was able to get into the second round in his first major college warm-up tournament, where he lost to the #2 player from Texas A&M, 6-3, 6-1. Barbarie was defeated in the first round by

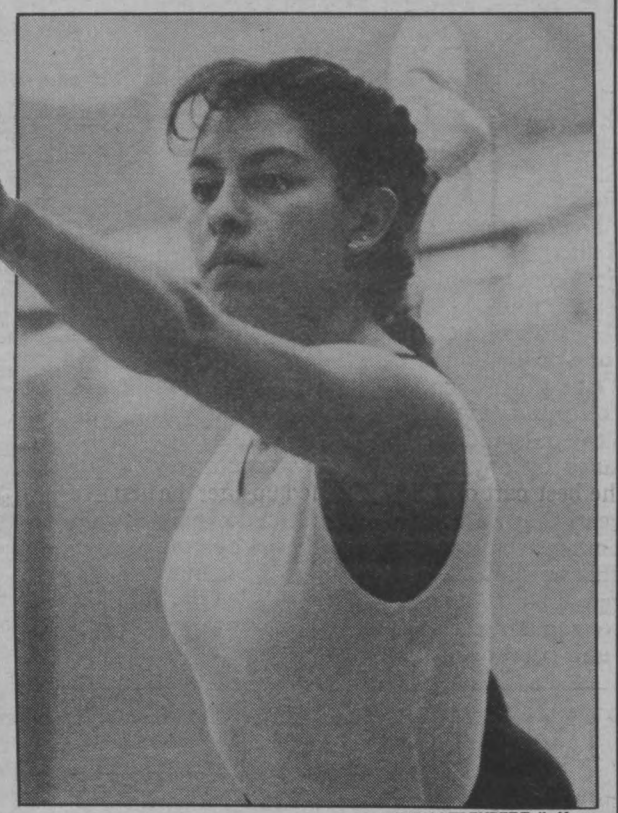
David Zardon of Ball State in a tough three-set match.

Playing with a steady confidence that built upon itself match after match, Fox scored a very impressive win over fifth-seed Mark Everl of Texas A&M, ousting him in straight sets, 6-3, 7-6. After defeating Southern Methodist University's Eric Clark, 7-6, 7-5, in the fourth round, Fox finally was defeated by second seed Chris Dionne of Drake, 3-6, 7-6, 2-6.

"I just concentrated well and was focused throughout the tournament," Fox said. "The confidence factor was there as well and I know now that I can play competitively with anyone."

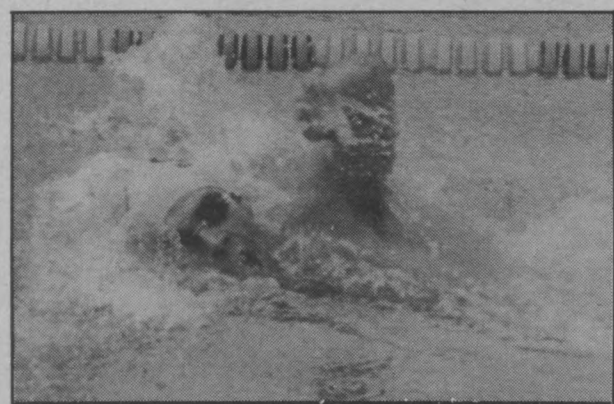

Continued from p.1A to come away with a victory against Vegas in the past. Last year, the Santa Barbara women came the closest to victory when it came one race away from a win.

"We have been focusing on this meet before Christmas and I think our overall performance was really good," UCSB swimmer Stephanie Raymond said. "It was a very emotional meet. People were really up for this meet and we proved that we really pulled together as a team."

The first race of the meet was the 400-yard relay, and the women beat out UNLV by 20 seconds with a time 3:55.62. The narrow

victory gave the women momentum as Gauchos Ashley Cusato and Stacy St. Martin posted their season-bests in the dual meet. Cusato had a career-best time in the 200-yard backstroke (2:12.83), while St. Martin posted

her season-best with a first place finish in the 500-yard freestyle in 5:01.86.

"The 400 individual medley relay was an especially exciting spark for the women because it started the meet out on a good

foot and got us pumped up for the rest of the races," Cusato said.

The indoor pool proved to be a nuisance for some of the women, but UCSB's new arrival Wenka Hansen came less than a second shy of breaking the school record with her win in the 200 IM (2:05.55).

"It was muggy indoors and we are not used to that," St. Martin said. "It can get hot indoors and it is really hard to catch your breath, but we overcame that and swam very well."

The Santa Barbara men didn't have the pressure to avenge any losses and had an easy time with the Runnin' Rebels by posting the 30 point win.

"I thought it was a very exciting meet," Gaucho Jason York said. "We have

been focusing on this all year long so it was gratifying to win by a large margin."

Santa Barbara swimmer Bill Sweeney headed the men's team with first place victories in the 50-yard freestyle (21.35) and in the 100-yard freestyle (46.19). Freshman Mark Andersen won the 200-yard breaststroke (2:06.18), while sophomore Chris Garces placed first in the 200-yard backstroke with a time of 1:52.48.

"I was nervous about UNLV because I felt a great pressure to perform well," Sweeney said. "My events were strong and I was satisfied with my swims considering all of the traveling we were doing."

The UCSB diving teams

also beat up on the hosts with first-place finishes in the 1-meter low board and second-place finishes in the 3-meter high board.

Santa Barbara diver Erin Evans took top honors in the three-meter and second in the 1-meter for the women.

"I was more fired up for this meet than I ever was," Evans said. "I set some personal goals that I wanted to meet and I was satisfied with my performance. I have some new dives that are really starting to come along."

Gaucho freshman Toby Reclusado took first in the 1-meter and placed third in the 3-meter, while junior Ted Moore placed second in both the low and high boards.

The second game was the closest of the three, as UCSB freshman Amaury Velasco led his squad back from an early 1-7 deficit with three strong line spikes, which added to his tournament total of 16 kills. With the Gauchos

trailing 9-10, Velasco and setter Jeff Zevely tripped over each other in pursuit of the ball, increasing the Bruin lead. A couple of UCLA kills and Gaucho mistakes later, the second game was over.

Despite an early 5-0 lead, UCSB could not overcome the Bruins' momentum in game three, as UCSB committed crucial errors late in the game. Landry and sophomore

Jeff Nygaard led the Bruin attack with five kills and two blocks.

"Overall, I think we proved that we are right there with all of the top teams in the conference," senior Greg Ryan said. "Against UCLA, well, they had been resting their starters all day while we had only 10 players who saw action almost every game."

Before losing to UCLA, the Gauchos were nearly

perfect in all of their preliminary group play and qualifying pool play matches. Upset victories over Pepperdine, the nation's second ranked team, 5-15, 15-6, 15-12 and #4 CSUN, 17-15, 17-16 on Friday evening were the squad's biggest of the weekend.

"By upsetting those two teams, we showed that we could play good, solid volleyball and that we will be

there when the season matches begin," senior Kory Hull said.

In Friday morning's group play matches, UCSB was in full control, beating Sonoma St., 15-0, 15-0, UC San Diego, 15-4, 15-4 and University of Pacific, 15-5, 15-8. The wins continued Saturday morning as the squad rolled over University of British Columbia, 15-7, 15-7 and

UC Irvine, 15-6, 15-9.

Zevely, who finished the tournament with 30 of UCSB's 33 assists, and Velasco captured All-Tournament honors along with Pepperdine's Tom Sorenson, UCLA's Nygaard and Landry, and Stanford's Canyon Ceman. Setter Mike Sealy, who led UCLA with 32 assists, won the tournament MVP award for the second straight year.

Losing Road Trip Capped by Saturday Loss to Reno

Just two days after dropping a Big West Conference game at Utah State, the UCSB men's basketball team finished a winless road trip Saturday by losing 64-58 to the University of Nevada at Reno.

The loss dropped the Gauchos' record to 8-4 on the year, including 1-3 in conference play, and extended UCSB's losing streak to three games.

Nevada's Ric Herrin led the Wolf Pack, as the 6'10" center scored a game-high 22 points and grabbed 12 rebounds. Forward Eric Martin added 14 points for Nevada.

Senior guard Idris Jones led the Gauchos with 16 points, while Paul Johnson added nine. Point guard Ray Kelly, coming off a scoreless outing at Utah, scored only five points on the night.

In addition to losing the game, the Gauchos also lost the services of freshman J.J. Polk. The backup point guard suffered a twisted ankle during the first half Saturday, and was not in uniform for Monday's game against Long Beach State. Polk also remains doubtful for this Saturday's game against Cal State Fullerton.

For Nevada, which joined the Big West this season after leaving the Big Sky Conference, Saturday's win improved the Wolf Pack to 7-5 on the year, 2-3 in conference play.

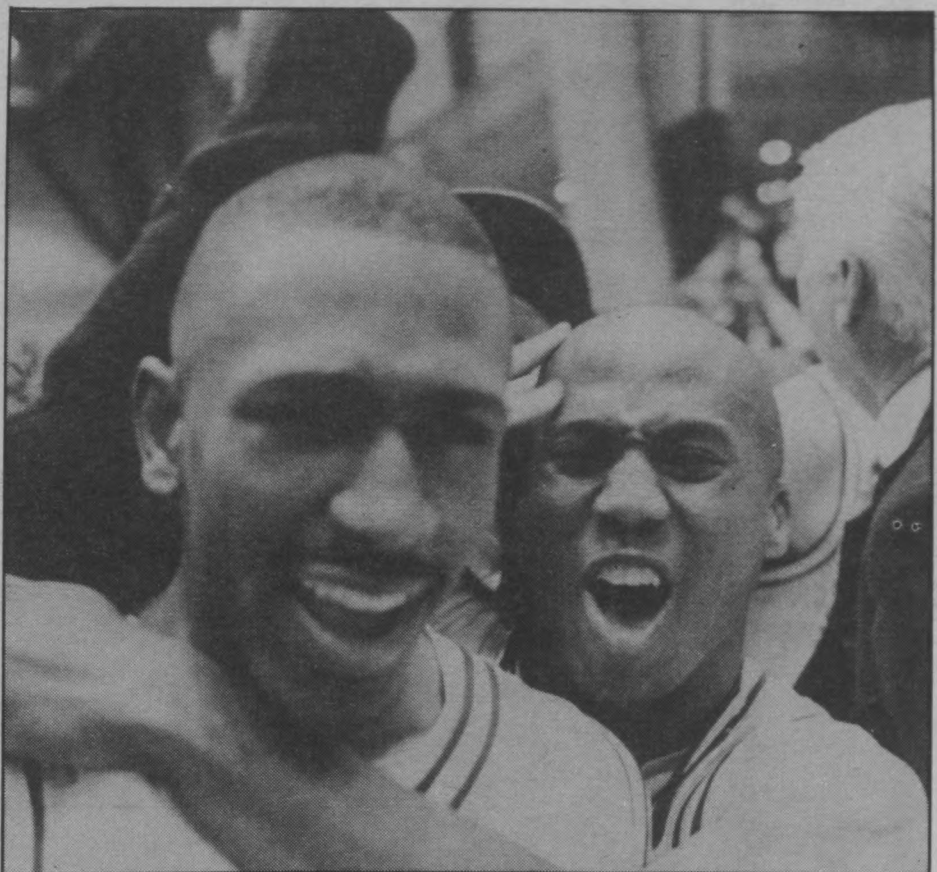
Long Beach — it takes a lot of guts and a lot of heart. I think we showed that tonight, especially getting down like we did."

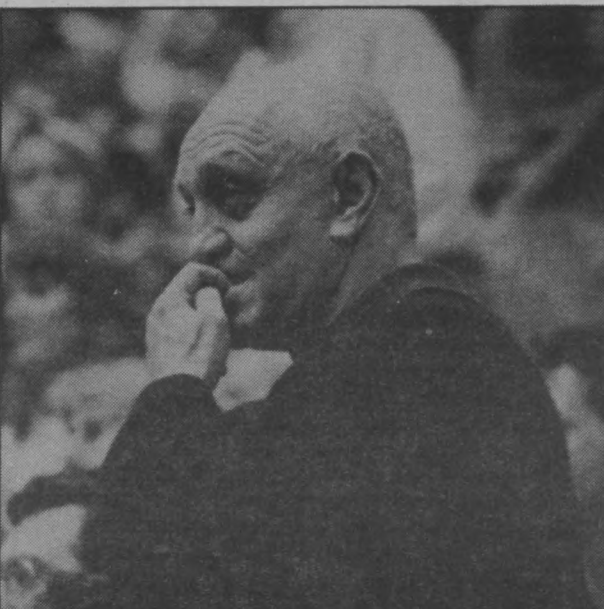

 The casual observer could see a blowout waiting to happen. The casual observer, however, knows nothing of the workings of the Big West, and of the Gauchos. The casual observer would have turned off the TV set after seeing UCSB fall behind 22-6 in the first half, while looking worse than an intramural B team.

Jerry Pimm couldn't turn off the set. As the Gaucho coach, he had to stick this one out with his troops. He had to come up with something, anything, to get the guys going.

"I just kept telling them the same thing — that there was a lot of time left," Pimm said of his tactical discourse during a timeout early in the game, when Santa Barbara trailed 22-9.

"I told them for once, let's get back and keep them from scoring layups. Once you do that, you can keep them from scoring."

The Gauchos shored up their defense, and the momentum started to slip away from the Beach. With senior forward Mike Meyer shouldering the offensive load, UCSB began to crawl back. A defensive stop here. A good entry pass there. Meyer for three — yesssss! — and suddenly the Gauchos are within seven. Duane Carter drops one in, and

UCSB trails by one. What once was a travesty is now a game.

"The best part of it was the heart we showed to come back, and the guts we showed when we were tired," Pimm said. "That's what it takes to guard good athletes and good teams like Long Beach, a lot of heart."

Notice a trend? You can talk about the scoring and the big plays, but Pimm will always bring it back to defense. That's what the Gauchos are built on, the tough defense, and that's what kept UCSB in the game.

It showed in the final numbers. Hounded by Meyer, 49er star guard Lucius Harris hit only five of 14 shots from the field, and his 16 points were well below his season average of 24.9.

For the Man of the Evening, Meyer, the night will always be remembered by one play — Harris' knifing, diving last-gasp layup attempt that fell short with three seconds left. Gauchos win, 61-60.

"If there's one thing that sticks out in my mind about this game right now, it's that last second shot," Meyer confessed. "I think God wanted me to win this game personally or something, because that ball just rimmed out. Maybe He realized that I needed this game more than anything."

The Gauchos needed the game, and they got the

game. Paul Johnson and Doug Muse on the boards, Ray Kelly dishing the ball, and Idris Jones, stuck in a horrible personal shooting slump, coming up big when it counted by nailing a three-pointer to give UCSB the lead for good. Teamwork pulled it out last night.

And that's the secret to the Big West this year. Harris is a star, but with Chris Tower and Bryon Russell, the Beach can win even without him. UNLV can throw J.R. Rider and Evric Gray at you, among others. New Mexico State has Sam Crawford dishing the ball out to a cast of characters. Utah State, Pacific, even Nevada feature solid teamwork, not just a reliance on one person.

"There's going to be some losses in this conference," Pimm said, adding that the Big West champion could finish with up to five losses. "Anybody can beat anybody. San Jose State and Irvine have no wins, and they're good enough to beat anybody. This year, this conference is very strong."

Very strong, and very strange. A muddled, chaotic mess, in which anybody can beat anybody. Last week, the Gauchos proved that in losing to Nevada.

And last night, of course, they proved it once again in beating Long Beach State. So get used to it. It's gonna be that kind of year.



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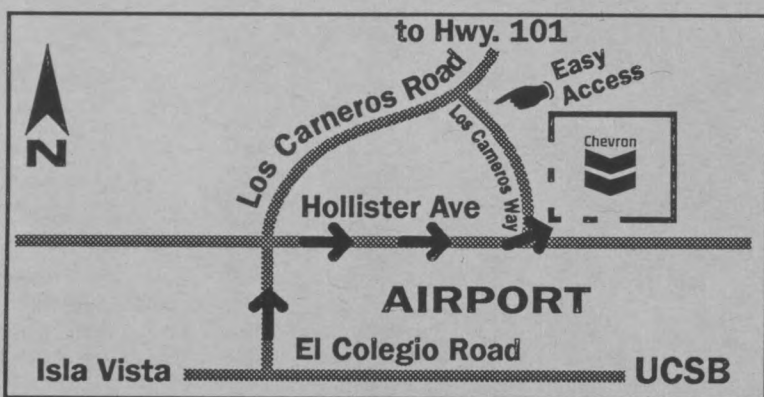
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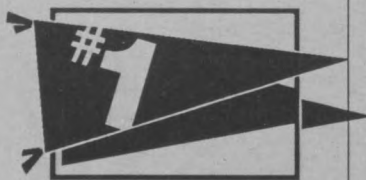


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
