## Take Two: Santa Barbara Pounds Dirtbags

■UCSB Captures First Two Games Before Dropping the Third; Von Schell Ties School Record With 17th Home Run of Season

The #25 UCSB baseball team had hoped to do some spring cleaning this weekend with Long Beach State in town. But after winning the first two games against LBSU, the Gauchos' brooms didn't leave the closet Sunday.

Santa Barbara (35-12, 9-3 in the Big West) pounded out 10 hits, including three home runs in game one, ripping the Dirtbags, 11-4. UCSB then ran its winning streak to seven games with a hard fought 5-4 win Saturday, before falling Sunday, 10-4. With the series victory, the Gauchos moved into second place in the Big West, only trailing #6 Fullerton. Although UCSB is happy with the series win, the club is disappointed that it couldn't complete the sweep.

"Taking two out of three looks good on Thursday [before the series starts]," UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema said. "It doesn't look too good on Sunday after winning the first two. [LBSU] is a good team, and they just got more big hits [Sunday]."

The Gauchos fell behind Friday early in game one, as LBSU took a 2-0 lead in the third inning.

After being sent down in order during the first three innings, UCSB finally broke through in the fourth for its first run of the game. Sophomore center fielder Skip Schumaker started the UCSB rally, leading off the inning with a double, and eventually coming around to score on a groundball from senior second baseman Chad Peshke.

"Schumaker gets us started," Brontsema said. "He always gets us going. He doubled and then Kolbach moved him over, and then Peshke drove him in. When you play a good team, that's what you have to do. That's what got us going."

Senior shortstop Jeff Bannon tied the game in the fifth inning with his fifth dinger of the season, a solo shot. The Gauchos' offense finally found its stroke in the sixth, scoring four runs, three coming on a round tripper from junior left fielder Jed Stringham.

The onslaught continued in the seventh, as UCSB scored five more runs to take an 11-2 lead.

Junior first baseman Tyler Von Schell got in on the long-ball action with a three-run shot of his own, tying the team record of 17 in one season.

"It's awesome," Von Schell said of tying the record. "We know we have to play well to beat these guys. I feel that if I play well against these guys we're going to win."

Junior starter James Garcia picked up the win for UCSB, improving to 9-1 on the season. The junior-college transfer gave up only two earned runs in nine innings.

"[Garcia] was erratic at the start," Brontsema said. "He didn't have the command he usually does. He can pitch bad and still get away with it, and he made the good pitches when he had to."

Game two was a classic Big West duel, and for most of the game it appeared that UCSB couldn't solve Long Beach pitcher Nate Beuler. But Santa Barbara finally broke through in the seventh inning, scoring three runs to take a 5-4 lead.

Senior closer Jamie Gonzales then finished off the Dirtbags in the ninth inning. Gonzalez needs only nine pitches to retire

Long Beach State.

"[Gonzales] was definitely pumped," Brontsema said. "He was coming out and throwing hard. When he throws his breaking ball like that, he's fun to watch."

After giving up three first-inning runs, senior starter Rylie Ogle settled down to shut out Long Beach for the next five innings.

"I didn't really have my 'A' stuff," Ogle said. "I just did what I could to keep us in the game. I didn't come out the way I should have,

but I made good pitches when I had to. I wasn't happy with coming out [after the sixth inning], but looking back it was the right thing to do."

Santa Barbara was looking to bring out the brooms Sunday, but two big innings from LBSU led to the Gauchos' demise. With the game tied at one heading into the fourth inning, LBSU scored three runs to take a 4-2 lead. The fifth inning was just as unkind to UCSB, as the first six Dirtbags reached base,

leading to a six-run explosion. UCSB could only muster two runs the rest of the way, dropping the final game of the series.

Although UCSB failed to complete the sweep, it finished the week taking three of four games from the Dirtbags.

"It was a good week," Kolbach said. "Obviously I'm disappointed with the loss. We did take two out of three this weekend and put ourselves in good position [in the Big West]. Now we've got to get ready for next week."

## Matadors Put Final Stake in Gauchos' Season With Three-Game Sweep

They usually say that parting is such sweet sorrow, but this may not be the case with the 2001 UCSB softball team as it finished its season this past weekend, dropping three in a row to a tough Cal State Northridge squad.

Santa Barbara lost both games of its Saturday doubleheader, 5-0 and 4-3. Then, in senior second baseman Teresa Tolson's last game as a Gaucho, UCSB fell 5-2.

"We definitely wanted to end the season with a win," junior second baseman and team co-captain Kim Sawyer said. "You never want to say that you have nothing to look forward to, but it is hard to get motivated when you have no post-season ahead of you."

Santa Barbara (18-34, 4-17 in the Big West) entered this weekend's series coming off of six straight losses, three to #9 Cal State Fullerton and three to Utah State this past weekend. UCSB was hoping to finish its season on a high note.

Unfortunately, Northridge brought its ringer in to spoil the party.

Rarely does an entire team revolve around one player, but Northridge has a player of such caliber: Sarah Farnworth. The Matador hurler tossed nineteen scoreless innings, tallied three wins, and added a home run in the three games this weekend.

"She is definitely one of the best pitchers in the league," sophomore outfielder Ashley Groefsema said. "The [team] was good all around. She did everything. She [pitches] great and she hits great."

Saturday's first game was an impressive pitching display from Matador pitching aces Farnworth and Tanya Ledesma, who combined for a one-hit shutout. Farnworth also provided all the run sup-

port she would need belting a three-run homer. Northridge cruised to an easy 5-0 blowout.

But the tide would turn in Saturday's nightcap, as the Gauchos exploded in the seventh inning after remaining dormant for much of the game. Trailing 3-0 and heading into the bottom of the seventh inning, Santa Barbara put together one last rally. Sophomore catcher Jami Trinidad singled in an RBI, and then the Gauchos capitalized on a fielding error and a wild pitch to tie the game.

The score was deadlocked until the ninth inning, when CSUN's Veronica Lopez stepped to the plate and doubled home the winning run. UCSB failed to score in the bottom of the inning, and the team suffered its eighth straight loss, 4-3.

Heading into Sunday's game, the Gauchos had a bittersweet taste in their mouths. The team obviously was going to play for pride, but Santa Barbara would also play for Tolson, who was playing in her final game at UCSB.

Things looked bleak for the Gauchos, as the team was unable to score any early runs. The Matadors would score all five of their runs in the fourth inning behind back-to-back long balls from Summer Richardson and Colleen Spencer.

But Santa Barbara would not let the sun set on its season so easily, clawing back to score runs in the sixth and seventh innings on an RBI single from sophomore Natalie Adame and off a Matador error. Yet, Northridge proved too strong, winning 5-2.

Although Tolson ended her career on a losing note, she will always be remembered by her teammates as an exceptional team player and leader.

"She definitely had the best team leadership," Sawyer said. Sawyer, who knows Tolson better than most because they live together, added, "Everyone looked up to her. She would always fire the team up and you could just see the desire in her eyes every time that she was on the field."

### Register Now for Summer Session Philosophy of Law 143

This course will begin with a reading of the famous Supreme Court death penalty case *Furman v. Georgia*. The death penalty will provide us with an example with which to explore and evaluate different theories of constitutional interpretation. We will consider what advocates of an original intent approach to interpreting the Constitution like Robert Bork would say about the death penalty. Then we will investigate whether Ronald Dworkin's approach with its stress on unwritten principles can provide grounds for declaring capital punishment unconstitutional. This will lead us into a comparison of the merits of Dworkin's general theory of jurisprudence with H.L.A. Hart's rule-based approach to the law. Then we will look at how advocates of Legal Realism and Critical Legal Studies movements would criticize Dworkin's approach to the law.

The second section of the course will deal with whether the adversary system in American law can be justified and if there are any feasible alternatives. The third section of the course will deal with particular issues such as privacy, abortion, affirmative action, strict liability, exploitative contracts, and pornography. We will examine relevant Court decisions and philosophical commentaries on such issues. The fourth and final part of the course will examine different theories of punishment. We shall compare the merits of reform, retributivism, restitution, deterrence, expressivism, and hybrid theories that combine elements of retributivism and deterrence.

This course is highly recommended for pre-law students as well as those with an interest in public policy issues. The student's grade will be a result of two multiple choice tests and a short paper. The course prerequisites for this course, have been waived, but students who don't meet the original requirements won't be able to RBT unless they email the instructor for an add code at dbh1@uimail.ucsb.edu
