Gillespie To Present Recital Tonight At 8:30

A survey of harpsichord music by six representative composers will be offered in a recital by Dr. John Gillespie, UCSB professor of music, in Campbell Hall tonight at 8:30 p.m.

The concert is free to the public.

Dr. Gillespie will open his recital with music by two German composers, Johann Sebastian Bach and George Frederick Handel. Handel will be represented by two pieces, "Passacaille" and "Air Varié," and Bach by his "Italian Concerto."

The music of France will be heard through Francois Couperin's satirical suite, "The Festivities of the Great and Ancient Order of Minstrelsy" and by Jean-Philippe Rameau's "Les Niais de Sologne."

In addition, the program will include three selections by Italy's Domenico Scaratti and his Spanish disciple, Padre Antonio Soler.

For the second half of the program, Dr. Gillespie will be accompanied by a chamber orchestra conducted by Carl Zytowski, associate professor of music, in playing Joseph Hayden's "Concerto in D Major."

A Fullbright scholar, Dr. Gillespie made his Paris debut as a concert harpsichordist in 1950 and has since performed widely in the United States and Europe.

A graduate of De Pauw University, Gillespie holds a Ph. D.

degree from USC. He is currently professor of music at UCSB, where he teaches classes in music literature and harpsichord.

Associated Students President Joe Sorrentino will introduce Dr. Kerr at the forum.

The picture of a university president discussing problems

and policy with students is no longer unique on UC campuses. Dr. Kerr has conducted similar forums on all campuses, including one in Campbell Hall last year.

The University President and 150 leading educators will be UCSB guests Friday when Dr. James B. Conant, former Harvard University president, will speak on "Public Policy and Excellence in Education" in Storke Plaza.

Chancellor Vernon I. Cheadle will report on campus progress at the ceremonies.

Among the visiting educators are Dr. Sterling McMurrin, former U.S. commissioner of education; Thomas Braden, now battling for Senate confirmation of his appointment as head of the State Board of Education; and Dr. Roy Simpson, former State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

They are delegates to the first of seven University conferences dealing with problems arising from California's population boom.

Gaucha Survey

Discrimination Policies Explained By Other Schools

In following up the question of how other universities have coped with policy directives on discriminatory practices of student organizations, El Gaucho sent letters to the Dean of Students and to the Presidents of the local Panhellenic Council at nine state universities.

Replies were received from only four campuses: Stanford, University of Minnesota, University of Michigan, and University of New York.

None of the Panhellenic Councils responded to the queries.

In the letters the situation on the California campuses was outlined and the following three questions concerning similar circumstances were asked: 1. How has the administration implemented the policy? 2. What has been the reaction of the Greek organizations? 3. What have been the overall conse-

quences of the directive?

The Dean of Students at Stanford replied that the Board of Trustees at Stanford issued a policy statement which was adopted on February 21, 1957. It states, in part, "...The University is opposed to discriminatory racial and religious clauses and practices. Insofar as such clauses or practices presently exist, the University will work actively with student groups to eliminate them at the earliest possible date."

The Stanford Dean continued, "Under this policy, our fraternities have had varied experiences. For several of the fraternities, action was taken at the national level removing restrictive covenants. The charter of our ATO chapter was withdrawn by the National because the chapter refused to depledge the Jewish students,

which it had pledged. The University supported the chapter in its resistance to the National as did the alumni of the chapter. Our Sigma Nu chapter has requested its national to withdraw its charter after an unsuccessful effort to secure the removal of its restrictive covenants. The University supported this action by recognizing the former Sigma Nu chapter as Beta Chi local fraternity. Our Delta Tau Delta chapter has pledged a Negro, although the national policy of Delta Tau Delta Fraternity has been interpreted previously to prevent this. With the support of the University, the Negro student in question has been declared eligible for membership in Delta Tau Delta at the national level."

The Dean of Students at the University of Minnesota stated, "...I must say that I am com-

pletely opposed to the practice of requiring presidents of fraternities or any other group to certify each year by disclaimer oathe (sic) that they are not discriminating. This is as bad as the disclaimer oathe required for NDEA loans to students, in my opinion."

"We have no organizations" he continued, "on the campus that have a discriminatory clause in their constitution because some of them were removed last year, or by one way or another, including a special dispensation from the national organization for two fraternities whereby locally they could have the autonomy in the selection of members."

Thirteen years were spent on this policy, but the pressure was kept up through requiring a public report from the representative of each fraternity with discri-

minatory clauses as to what progress and what efforts were being made by the group to remove the clauses.

The University of Michigan replied, "Discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, creed, national origin or ancestry is prohibited whether practiced by students or other persons involved in an organization's membership selection process. The use of a time limit has not been favored by the University of Michigan. When discriminatory practices are discovered, the case is dealt with immediately."

"The Interfraternity Council and the Panhellenic Association at The University of Michigan give full cooperation in the carrying out of the University regulation. While it is impossible to predict future developments, considerable progress has been evident."

New York University's specific statement of policy is; "The University approves the principle that all fraternities and sororities should be free to exercise their own choice locally in the induction of members regardless of such considerations as race, color, or creed."

According to the Dean of Students at New York "This policy has been periodically communicated to each Greek society by directive and generally disseminated through student publications. Persuasion by consistently advocating the abolition of restrictive clauses has resulted in steady progress regarding their elimination by all social organizations at New York University. We have not thus far found the enactment of more stringent measures to be necessary."

Final Symphony Set For Thursday Night

Directed by Erno Daniel, UCSB associate professor of music, the Santa Barbara Symphony Orchestra will present its final concert of the season at the Granada Theatre on Thursday evening, April 4 at 8:30.

Tickets are now available at Symphony headquarters, 105 East de la Guerra, or by telephoning WO 21416. Prices are \$1.25 for students, \$2, \$2.25, \$3, and \$3.75 for the public.

Dr. Daniel has selected an all-French program which will include a performance of the Symphony in D Minor by Cesar Franck and the Gloria in G for soprano, chorus and orchestra by the late Francis Poulenc.

The Poulenc composition will feature Shirley Easley, soprano soloist and the A Capella Choir of Santa Barbara High school under the direction of William Hatcher.

The soloist has appeared here numerous in concert, opera and oratorio performances and has been particularly associated with musical undertakings at UCSB. The A Capella Choir will be making its concert debut with this performance.

Mr. Hatcher has performed as chorus master of the Civic Opera's "La Boheme" and Music Academy's "Manon", and is Director of Choirs at First Baptist Church.

The Poulenc composition is one of the major choral works of the twentieth century and received its world premiere in 1961 by The Boston Symphony Orchestra. It has achieved acclaim following a recording by The French National Orchestra under Georges Pretre who is credited with the European premiere.

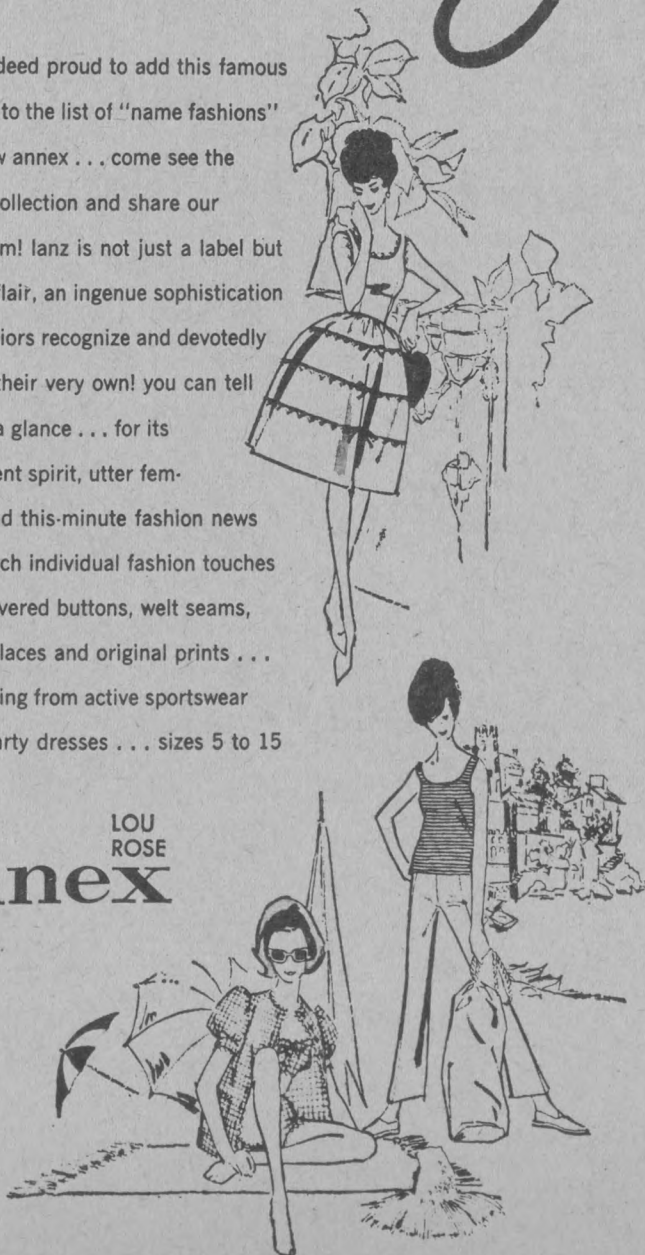

Rained out over the weekend in their league contests with Long Beach State, the Gauchos take on CIBA for Stanford University today in the second contest of a two game meeting.

Stanford competes regularly in the California Intercollegiate Baseball Association, which also contains Southern California, UCLA, Berkeley, and Santa Clara. The CIBA is considered by many to be the best intercollegiate baseball loop in the nation, and has produced several national champions in recent years.

Coach Dave Gorrie's squad claims a 5-4 mark for the season with an 0-3 record against CCAA competition. The Gauchos get back in the race for the CCAA crown next weekend when they travel to Cal Poly to battle the Mustangs for a three game set this Friday and Saturday.

Tennis Squad Scares Diablos

On the strength of a 5-4 loss to LA State and victories over Riverside and Redlands last weekend, the Gauchos tennis squad has emerged as the darkhorse team of the CCAA.

In their loss to the top tennis team on the West Coast, LA State, the Gauchos came within just one match of dumping the Diablos, who were everybody's pick for CCAA and NCAA Regional honors.

Lee Reid led the Gauchos with a straight set 6-4 7-5 win over LA's Gil Rodriguez. Reid, who was last year's CCAA singles champion, avenged two earlier defeats to by Rodriguez.

The Gauchos' battle with LA establishes them as possibly the second strongest small college team on the West Coast, and one which will certainly require consideration for top honors in the CCAA Tournament at UCSB May 3-5.

Saturday the locals dumped Riverside by a whitewash 9-0 tally, and tripped Redlands by a 7-2 final count.

Murdock, Davis Receive Honors

Hal Murdock and Gary Davis received post season honors Sunday when they were accorded the Dick Ryder and Harvey Hubler trophies, emblematic of the MVP and outstanding scorer respectively, by the local chapter of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity.

Murdock, a second team all CCAA choice, led the Gauchos all year with his fine backcourt work and accurate long range bombing, while Davis, a senior, has placed on the all-CCAA list two years and received honorable mention little all-american as a sophomore.

SAE President Tom Devaney presided over the dinner meeting at the Carrillo Hotel, with speakers Bill Russell, head of the CIF, and former UCSB coach Willie Wilton.
