

Hart, Palmer: A pair of liberals fight for Isla Vista's new voters

Two men vying to vie for elected office will surrender their fate to the ballot box Tuesday after a long, wearying primary fight.

In the meantime, candidates for the State Assembly, Ken Palmer. and Gary Hart, both liberal Democrats, will be looking for any left-over votes in a bitterly contested election in which Isla Vista will doubtlessly play the decisive role.

By the end of the campaign both candidates expect to have contacted every single potential voter in the Democratic primary, through precinct walkers and telephone committee workers.

The contest started early and quickly caught the imagination of the I.V. community. Ken Palmer, a former aide to Speaker of the Assembly Bob Moretti, had run against incumbent conservative Republican Assemblyman W. Don MacGillivray in 1970, and lost in a Republican district by a surprisingly small margin of 1,500 votes. With thousands of new voters between the ages of 18 and 21, Palmer looked eagerly toward the 1972 race.

Gary Hart had also surprised a lot of people in 1970. Running for Congress as an anti-war candidate against entrenched Republican incumbent Charles Teague, Hart pulled 42 per cent of the vote, the closest any challenger came to unseating a Californian incumbent.

But when Congressional reapportionment time came around last February, Hart found that Teague had carved out the Democratic portions of his district, leaving only a hard-core Republican area.

Given this roadblock, Hart decided to join Palmer in a primary race of which Isla Vista, with its 9,000 volatile young voters, may be the ultimate prize.

The campaign has featured Hart emphasizing his "grass roots" campaign financing and "commitment to the people" versus Palmer's emphasis on legislative experience and effectiveness. The candidates have met in frequent debates, and both have agreed to halt media campaigning in favor of "people-to-people" contact through precinct work.

Both candidates claim they have over 200 volunteers making the rounds. Hart has already covered every "walkable" precinct in the Santa Barbara area, while Palmer's campaign staff hopes to accomplish the same feat by the end of this weekend.

Both Hart and Palmer will spend the bulk of their time before Tuesday's vote walking the precincts, taking time out for a few appearances before the final balloting. Both candidates are planning victory parties.

Hart's campaign manager, Jerry Seedborg, remarks that he is "very optimistic.'

"Most of our precinct workers," he said, "are reporting 3 to 1 for Hart. We're going to beat Palmer decisively. It won't be a close election."

Palmer's campaign manager, Phil Spector, likewise expresses optimism. "Although there haven't been any polls," he said, "I have a good feeling about it."

Both campaigns will cost about \$9,000.

As members of the Editorial Board of the DAILY NEXUS, we offer to UCSB students and local residents the following endorsements for the June 6 Democratic primary election:

FOR PRESIDENT: GEORGE McGOVERN. Virtually ignored a year ago, McGovern has shown he now has wide support across the nation. He is the Democratic frontrunner in delegates and in momentum coming into Tuesday's primary here, and a victory in California might clinch for him the Democratic nomination that seemed so distant only a few months ago. If the politics of change are to survive in America, George McGovern must be elected President. The Tweedledum-Tweedledee Humphrey-Nixon farce of 1968 at all costs must not be repeated.

FOR ASSEMBLY: GARY HART. We feel Gary Hart would be an effective Assemblyman, working for the principles that elude W. Don MacGillivray. His ideals are based on deep convictions and personal experience; we think he is the best man for this job.

Both Gary Hart and Ken Palmer are well qualified for the Assembly; whoever the primary winner, he deserves the support of all progressive local voters against MacGillivray in November.

FOR 3rd DISTRICT SUPERVISOR: JAMES SLATER. The domination of growth-minded interests on the County Board of Supervisors is a danger to the public. James Slater is a no-growth candidate with wide support; he should be an honest voice of the citizens against the mindless policies of Dan Grant and Co.

Richard Duprey, who received IVCC's endorsement, and Lyn McClurg are other voices of citizen concerns in this campaign. Duprey has strong local support. Both are good choices over business-backed Michael Morisoli for Supervisor.

FOR CONGRESS: JOE GREEN. He opposes the oil depletion allowance, expensive campaigns (his costs are under \$1000) and U.S. aid to totalitarian dictatorships. He favors Proposition 9. His would be a voice of a type rarely heard in the House of Representatives.

His chief rivals appear to be James Christiansen and Tim Lemucchi. Of the two, Christiansen is a much better representative of local needs.

with Rather than continuing endorsements, we believe it is far more important to carefully examine the relative choice facing the voters between two very good men in the Democratic Assembly primary.

The basic difference between them, one significant in terms of UCSB and Isla Vista needs, is the difference between talk and action. Here are just a few examples:

Both men talk about coastline protection and beach access. Ken Palmer helped develop the Sieroty Coastline Protection Act and then brought Assemblyman Sieroty to Santa Barbara to publicize the bill and to raise funds for the. Ecology Center. Ken also has done more than just talk about beach access; he has worked closely with the Shoreline Access Committee since its inception, making many concrete and useful suggestions.

As a final example, both men talk about the need for a bilingual, bicultural approach to education for Chicanos. Ken Palmer has actually developed such a program for pre-schoolers, significantly reducing the number of poor children placed in classes for the mentally retarded. Another factor which should be considered is the question of who can best defeat MacGillivray in November. Here it's important to look at 1970, where Ken Palmer ran ahead of his Democratic registration while his 1972 primary opponent, then in another race, ran significantly behind the Democratic figures.

FOR MUNICIPAL JUDGE: JOSEPH LODGE. Already a respected Judge, Lodge combines ideals with an effective knowledge of the law. The courses he has taught at UCSB demonstrate his concern outside the courtroom.

FOR MARSHAL: ROBERT LOPEZ. He is, simply, the most qualified candidate for the job. As a Chicano, he understands the problems of selective law enforcement.

On proposition measures, Editorial Board favors:

PROPOSITION 1: YES. It makes \$250 million in loans available to veterans for building homes.

PROPOSITION 2: YES. It provides \$350 million for repairs to earthquake-damaged schools.

PROPOSITION 3: NO. We oppose taking away the right of a citizen to defend himself in court.

PROPOSITION 4: YES. It creates an open primary system in California; all declared candidates would go on the ballot.

PROPOSITION 5: YES. Appointments to the UC Board of Regents, where significant political power is compounded by 16-year terms, should be subject to approval by the State Senate.

PROPOSITION 6: YES. Let naturalized citizens vote as soon after their naturalizations as possible. They're probably better informed then than are most natural citizens.

PROPOSITION 7: YES. It protects small homeowners from an excessive property tax load through an easing of zoning regulations.

PROPOSITION 8: YES. It simply amends the Chiropractic Initiative Act. No argument against it was submitted to the state.

PROPOSITION 9: YES! The Clean Environment Act's principles by far outweigh its weaknesses. If significant environmental legislation is to come about in this state, the people will have to do it themselves. And Proposition 9 is significant.

Vice-Chancellor Smith has stroke; expect recovery


Vice-Chancellor of Student Services and Isla Vista Affairs George Smith suffered a cerebral hemorrhage at his home last Saturday night which left him initially unable to speak and with total left side paralysis. Smith, 47, was admitted to Goleta Valley Community Hospital and placed immediately in the facility's intensive care unit.

At this time, according to doctors, the short-range prognosis is good. Smith is expected to leave intensive care by today.

As of Wednesday, he had regained partial use of his left arm and was able to speak. Doctors are cautious about making any predictions due to the variables involved but the prospects for total recovery look excellent with Smith possibly able to return to work by the beginning of fall quarter.

Smith was elevated to the position of Vice-Chancellor in April 1971, replacing Stephen Goodspeed who was shifted at the time to become Vice Chancellor for Administration. Since that time Smith has become intensely involved with students and student interests, often finding himself acting as a





Lyn McClurg: citizen input is major issue

Lyn McClurg, who has lived in Santa Barbara for 19 years and in the Goleta Valley for nine years, entered the Third District supervisorial race because "government's responsibility is to the people, not to business".

As a merchandise executive at Robinson's Santa Barbara and in public relations and advertising jobs, she has acquired a business background complimented by community service.

McClurg's record is dominated by involvement as a member of organizations such as Consumer Action and many citizen's advisory committes to the Santa Barbara Board of Education, as well as having served as the president of the Santa Barbara Council of Parent-Teacher Associations.

McClurg's campaign has focused on what she terms "human problems," which she feels are now being ignored by the Board of Supervisors, "We have to stop thinking only of

She strongly supports the idea of a Municipal Advisory Council, which would legitimize IVCC and force the supervisors to consult IVCC on all issues relating to Isla. Vista. "Citizen input is very important to me as a representative," she declares.

"Santa Barbara County needs a re-working of the General Plan," observes the only female Supervisorial candidate. She recommendations of citizens' planning groups. 



Slater: no-growth Supervisor hopeful

James Slater, 33, is a Santa Barbara attorney who has done extensive free legal aid in Isla Vista through Switchboard and Unicorn Bookstore. His no-growth platform has won him the endorsements of the major environmentalists in the area. NEXUS: Would you support Isla Vista incorporation?

SLATER: If the people decide they want it, I would back them. I'm more in favor of special, regional districts because you avoid some of the expenses and fragmentations of government.

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You have to determine which form of government will get Isla Vista the self-determination it wants - I think it can be done through the county - nobody downtown has tried yet. They hold Isla Vista in contempt; it's merely the subject of wry political jokes.

NEXUS: Do you consider IVCC representative of the thoughts and desires of Isla Vistans?

SLATER: I don't think you get enough of a picture of Isla Vista from IVCC. It's an active segment of the community, but it's not a full-flow of ideas. I'd like to set ZODIAC ASSOCIATES PRODUCTIONS PRESENTS

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up an office in Isla Vista manned by residents, and I'd be out there during the week to get a good feel for its problems.

NEXUS: What do you think those problems are?

SLATER: Self-determination, a voice and reflection of its views in aovernment.

NEXUS: You said you favor regional districts. Would supporting the creation of an Isla Vista Justice Court be a step in that direction?

SLATER: Very definitely. Justice should be close - you shouldn't be forced to go far in order to get it.

NEXUS: One of your opponents, Mr. Morisoli, has said he opposes

the I.V. Justice Court idea because everyone gets equal justice in the courts and Isla Vista doesn't deserve special treatment. How would you respond to that? SLATER: It's not special treatment, it's different treatment. The Third District is made up of three very different communities - Santa Ynez is a ranching community, Goleta is a suburban, bedroom community, and Isla Vista is an intellectual center which is very sensitive to politics and the society. The supervisor must realize that.

NEXUS: You have maintained that you will stay in your law practice if you are elected. Some of your opponents feel this

would make you a part-time supervisor. Is this the case?

SLATER: I want to keep active in the practice to stay up on current changes in the law. The two jobs go together - it will help. But one (the Supervisor job) will be taken care of before the other.

NEXUS: What is your environmental platform? SLATER: I'm a proponent of preserving the environment and controlling growth - taking measures to prevent abuses of the citizens. I strongly favor free access to beaches and would encourage establishing bikeways between residential areas and shopping centers.



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

Mike Morisoli: chasing Chamber of Commerce vote

"I am running for Third District Supervisor because I have a knowledge of the area and the problems out here," Michael Morisoli tells the NEXUS. Morisoli, raised in Santa Paula, spent 20 years as a news reporter and television director in Salinas. He passed his bar exam in 1967 after courses at La Salle Extension University. Since that time he has been an attorney in private practice in Goleta, and has served as president of the Goleta Chamber of Commerce for the past three years.

Morisoli stresses that he is the only candidate who supported the controversial Allstate development, and is primarily concerned with the economy in Goleta and the high rate of unemployment. He supports local growth on the basis of more jobs for Goleta residents.

"I endorsed Allstate because of the economy," declares Morisoli. "It should be an exception. It does not do that much damage to the General Plan, and I do not favor other types of commerce in that area."

"Young people in Isla Vista should have a say in county government," says Morisoli. "I would support a Municipal Advisory Council - if it were democratically elected and truly representative of all facets of the Isla Vista community." He feels that the concept of a Justice Court is good if it is for the purpose of convenience, but "if it's to have a different standard of justice, then everyone would want their



own. The Mexicans would say they want a Justice Court so that when they drink a little too much vino on Saturday night and get arrested for drunk driving, they could have their own standard of justice. Justice should be given with an even hand."

Morisoli thinks that "the General Plan reflects the thinking of the early 60's, and planning thinking has changed. The new General Plan should be devised in line with current views on planning." He outlined the type of person he would appoint to the Planning Commission: "They will have no land interests, no no-growth sentiments, and they must be willing to work with today's thinking."


Morisoli also proposes a study of government efficiency in the hopes of cutting county spending. "It has to be like a business, spending money and getting returns," he explained. In line with his views on the current job crisis, Morisoli plans to

study county employment practices. "The county should strive for equality of employment, but not let the guidelines become discriminatory in themselves," he commented.

In answer to a question concerning the role of the supervisor in a community, Morisoli stated, "A supervisor has to have an open mind on all issues. County government has failed to realize that people have a right to be heard."

County figures accused of fraud

Minier, Cappello and

Morisoli deny charges

By DAVID HANDLER Speaking of politics: Probe is back.

A local muckraking journal whose chief contributors are Bonnie and Perry Adams, Probe has been inactive since publishing an expose on Third District Supervisor Daniel Grant in spring 1970.

But a new edition hit the stands Wednesday which features an Third District investigation of candidate Michael supervisorial Morisoli's real estate investments and lengthy, detailed expose linking District Attorney David Minier, Santa Barbara City Attorney A. Barry Cappello and former Third District supervisorial candidate Jim B. Worthen together in fraudulent real estate schemes.

Probe accuses Morisoli, an attorney, of having an interest in a fraudulently listed piece of property, and of using "questionable business practices" to acquire "a quarter of a million dollars

A

worth of real estate here in the past year and a half "

According to Probe, Morisoli owns a 1.3 acre parcel of land on Calle Real (in Goleta) which is zoned by the County for residential usage (10-R-1) yet is being sold by Morisoli under the guise of recently having been rezoned to a higher-value Professional/ Institutional (PI) and Highway Commercial zoning.

The story continues, "If anyone bought the property based on the representation that it is zoned PI, the buyer would have good cause for a fraud suit against Morisoli and Action Reality."

With Pauline Wilson of Action Reality serving as middleman, Probe that Morisoli on several states occasions acquired property at advantageous prices from divorce case clients whom he advised to sell.

In conclusion, the investigation argues. "What emerges from this is not only questionable business practices, but also the fact that Morisoli had a substantial stake in real estate. The office for which he is running, county supervisor, is concerned almost entirely with making public policy governing use, development and taxation of real estate."

Morisoli responded yesterday, "All dealings are public record. Nothing I've done has been illegal.

"I agree with them 100 per cent that you shouldn't be on the Board of Supervisors if you are engaged in real estate. I'll sell my property if I'm elected." he continued.

investigation focuses on possible links between the district attorney's office and Oakdale Manor Inc., a real estate corporation facing nine Superior Court cases - six of which are for fraud.

Ex-candidate Worthen, a real estate partner with Minier, is named as defendant in two of the cases.

Serving as defense attorney for Oakdale Manor in a case dated July, 1970 was A. Barry Cappello, who was at that time Minier's chief trial deputy.

Charging Cappello with "corrupting the machinery of justice in Santa Barbara County" and "a clear case of malfeasance in office", Probe summarizes their contentions as follows: "The fact that Minier's chief trial deputy invests through Oakdale Manor, that he has moonlighted to defend it against a fraud action, and the fact that six fraud actions have been brought against this firm without any criminal proceeding from the district attorney's office has led many persons to believe that Cappello and Minier are part of the corporation."

Minier explained yesterday that he was fully aware Cappello was defending Oakdale Manor.

Because of that knowledge, he stated, "Mr. Cappello was kept ignorant of our investigations. To the best of my knowledge, he still doesn't know the nature or results of our investigations into Oakdale Manor.

'There was no conflict of interest," he concluded.

called the charges Cappello "falacious."

"Probe has taken certain facts and drawn false innuendoes. It's nothing less than a smear attempt," he argued.

Maintaining he has never been involved with anything even close to conflict of interest, Cappello explained, "When I found out there was an investigation on Oakdale Manor underway, I immediately told Oakdale Manor to find another attorney."

"I stand on my record," he concluded.







Prop. 9: Who will win?

The deadline is approaching in the bitterly contested battle over the Clean Environment Act. (CEA), Proposition 9 on the June 6 ballot. The story of who emerges victorious will be written by California voters, at least those who take the time to trek to the polls.

Proposition 9 was qualified for the June ballot through the initiative process by collecting over 500,000 voter signatures up and down the state. The guiding organization behind this drive has been the People's Lobby, a volunteer non-profit corporation dedicated to legal and political action against pollution and polluters.

Opposing the CEA and the People's Lobby is a wealthy and powerful group composed generally of major businesses and industries, Chambers of Commerce, legislators and others who stand to lose if the act is

passed. It is not just a coincidence that the list of major contributors to the campaign to defeat Proposition 9 reads like the Who's Who of California's major polluters.

Add to this the influence of almost every governmental agency in the state, every major newspaper (aside from the NEXUS) and a large number of radio stations and you've got a formidable opponent.

The bone of contention in

Proposition 9 is complex -23 provisions covering a wide range of pollution problems. Among other things it will phase out lead in gasoline, restrict sulfur content in diesel fuel, ban offshore oil drilling and certain pesticides, place a five-year moratorium on

nuclear power plants, and establish stiff genalties for polluters.

Foes of Proposition 9 have run an expensive, often hysterical campaign warning that if the act is passed it would have various adverse effects on the state ranging from ruining the state's economy to endangering your very life!

Effectively countering these arguments, the People's Lobby

has produced decumentation that attests to the workability of the act. Often they have procured the polluters' own fact sheets to prove the inconsistencies in their claims.

"The problem," the Lobby points out, "is that our anti-pollution laws are not being enforced. Pollution control boards are riddled with conflict of interest and political influence, while the legislators and administrators are reluctant to get tough with wealthy polluters who provide the bulk of their campaign financing."

It is agreed by both sides that the Legislature has moved too slowly in enacting environmental protection, but foes argue that the problems won't be solved through "restrictive, punitive measures such as Proposition 9."

Supporters note that even if there are defects in the act, clearly the benefits far outweigh the defects. The Legislature must be shown that the majority of Californians are willing to pay the costs to clean up the state, they declare.

Moreover, they add, if the act is defeated there is a strong likelihood that the Legislature and the major polluters will interpret the defeat as an indication that people aren't concerned with the quality of life in this state and legislation for its improvement will be voted down in increasing amounts.



stay alive, but feels that a better answer is for them to organize.

Baker does not support Proposition 9, but is a member of Get Oil Out.

JAMES CHRISTIANSEN. The only candidate who resides in this area, Christiansen has made efforts to link himself with the fight to retain old and create new public access to beaches. He is presently a lawyer in private practice, although at one time he was a Deputy Attorney General of Calfornia.

The AFL-CIO Committee on Political Action gave their endorsement to Christiansen, and Cesar Chavez has also given his personal approval to this candidate. While this is something of a political coup, some of his opponents - perhaps embittered believe that he is now in debt to labor.

WALLACE GEORGE. A reformed alcoholic who owes his abstinence to "the man at the head of the stairs," George is careful to tell his electorate that his name is definitely not George Wallace, despite the fact that he doesn't believe busing is a logical answer to racial balance in our school system.

JOE GREEN. A 25 year-old construction worker, Green is running a very low-budget campaign based largely on student support and people-to-people contact.

He believes in "strong enforcement of the anti-trust laws, and a strengthening of those laws," and feels that major problems the country faces cannot be solved until we "break down the large economic structures that put people in office."

One of these six Democrats will face either William Ketchum or Mel Stephans of the GOP. Ketchum is reputed to have backing from oil interests; Stephans feels that the recent mining of Haiphong's harbor is regrettable, but necessary...

Green is a "pick and shovel" worker who is certain that "general union membership will not go behind the endorsed candidates," but will back those such as himself who genuinely represent the membership, and not the leadership, of those unions.

Outspoken on American foreign and domestic policies, Green has become the radical candidate,

On the subject of labor-management disputes, Lemucchi announced, "They're in bed together," and somehow the consumer is the loser.

DONALD UPP. Among other stands, Upp supports a strong national defense posture, does not feel that granting amnesty to people who have left the country to avoid the army for any reason is in the best interest of the country, and objects to the high tax burdens placed upon the people by the often unresponsive government.

One of these six Democrats vying for the nomination will face either William Ketchum or Mel Stephans of the GOP. 

The two-bedroom units are two stories, with living room and kitchen on the first floor and the two bedrooms and bath on the second floor. ELIGIBILITY (NO MORE THAN TWO ADULTS ARE PERMITTED IN ANY APARTMENT)

Unit I: 1 Bdrm. - couples without children or with one child under three years of age.

2 Bdrm. - couples with one child over three years of age and with no more than three children.

Unit II: (All Two Bedroom)

Married Students - no restrictions as to ages of children; however, maximum of three children to an apartment.

Married Faculty - same as above.

Married Staff - same as above.

Single Graduate Students - two students to an apartment will be permitted.

UTILITIES

Water, gas and electricity are furnished with the apartment at no extra cost for normal use.

A telephone jack is installed in each apartment, and the telephone installation can be arranged with the General Telephone Company in Santa Barbara. Bathrooms are equipped with a tub-shower unit, lavatory, stool and medicine cabinet. The floors throughout are vinyl tile. A gas wall heater and a TV jack are located in each living room.

Traverse rods are provided at all windows of both Unit 1 and Unit II; drapes are provided for the living rooms of Unit II only.

ANIMALS

Pets are NOT ALLOWED within the apartments or in the area. Offenders will be given 30-day notice to vacate.

SERVICE FACILITIES

There are laundry buildings equipped with coin-operated washers and dryers for the use of all tenants. No private washing machines or dryers are permitted in the apartments or in the laundry buildings.

Central trash rooms are available throughout the project.

There is no storage space other than the closets in each apartment.

Parking facilities are available for ONE CAR for each apartment.

UNIT II, located off Los Carneros Rd., approximately one-half mile west of the UCSB campus, provides 300 unfurnished two-bedroom apartments on a 15 acre site. The 30 new apartment buildings are varied from one to three stories and produce a village effect around eight large private courtyards. No exterior television or radio antennas are permitted.

McGovern campaign: busy, busy, busy

UCSB news team obtains interview

Two NEXUS reporters, Dave Carlson and Lee McEachern, along with KCSB reporter Mike Sugerman, travelled with the George McGovern campaign entourage one day last week on a trip throughout Southern California. Their report:

We joined the McGovern campaign at the Santa Barbara airport where almost 3,000 people waited for almost an hour before McGovern's chartered United Airlines plane glided in for one of nearly a dozen campaign stops.

In a flat, midwestern accent, McGovern told the crowd that if elected "no more would we send American boys to defend corrupt

dictators in far-off lands." Promising to add Richard Nixon's name to the rolls of unemployed Californian citizens, McGovern received a nice reception, and stayed to shake hands, throwing his schedule even farther off whack.

Meanwhile, members of the NEXUS staff were pulling strings to get some reporters on the McGovern plane. In spite of a cordon of Secret Service agents, all wearing little triangular buttons and all looking coldly professional, we succeeded in getting on the plane.

The "coach" portion of the plane was reserved for the press, most of whom looked bored and

highly jealous about who sat where.

The staff aides sat up front in first class. Half of the aides seemed to be concerned with "press relations."

One of the staff members, Carol Firstenburg, looked after us on the trip, and soon after take-off on our way to UC Riverside, she arranged for us to interview Senator McGovern for nearly half the 30-minute trip.

"I always knew that we would eventually come out ahead," said the Senator. "It was just a matter of time." He predicted that his friend and opponent, Hubert Humphrey, would lose the California primary but would go all the way to the convention where he would also lose the nomination.

Although McGovern said he was always confident of his chances, we nevertheless got the impression that he was somewhat in awe of the fact that he would probably be the nominee of his party.

Having dealt with the coldness of a Birch Bayh and the professionalism of a Pete McClosky, we were impressed with the sincere graciousness of McGovern. Although every candidate feigns optimism, we felt that in McGovern's case, the optimism was real. It was an attitude shared by his enthusiastic staff, who, when

asked if the campaign would be successful, would answer "of course."

After observing enthusiastic crowds in Riverside and Whittier, we left with the feeling that that

the modest South Dakotan past the party warhorses, glamour kings and image makers who have long dominated Democratic politics in California.



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Can Humphrey win in California?

In comparison to the tightly knit, well-funded McGovern campaign in California, the Hubert Humphrey drive looks unimpressive these days. Humphrey is jealous of the well-oiled McGovern machine.

This comparison between a tight McGovern campaign and a loose Humphrey campaign has occurred not only in California,

but all over the country, wherever these two men have met in primaries.

A good example of the tight schedules that campaigning candidates must keep and the pressure it puts on them, is what took place at the scheduled Humphrey rally in Santa Barbara last Wednesday. Humphrey was scheduled to appear at a luncheon of the Channel City Club (the same club to which Reagan spoke recently).

A crowd of some 550 businessmen waited over an hour and a half for the Minnesota politican to arrive. When he finally appeared, the tail end of the luncheon crowd was filing out of the hall.

Louis Lancaster, Channel City Club president, welcomed Humphrey who was visibly upset that the audience had not waited. Lancaster told him that the time for adjournment had come and passed, and tried to present Humphrey with a piece of birthday cake saved for the occasion. Humphrey refused the cake and slammed his car door in Lancaster's face.

Why did Humphrey react as he

did? He is under a great deal of pressure at this point in the campaign as time grows short.

But what happened Wednesday was a sign of problems in the HHH drive for the presidential nomination. Because of McGovern's unexpectedly strong showing, Humphrey has found himself running a catch-up campaign.

Unlike the McGovern campaign, where organization has been largely on the local level, Humphrey has tried to run a nationally-organized campaign. His California drive remained low-key until he entered the state. McGovern, on the other hand, had a well-based organization at work here several months ago.




and will be until the guns are silent. Today is the 17th day of the Concerned International Students Against War peace vigil, located in front of the Foreign Student Office across from Storke Tower.

He added, "People are starting to organize. The first concrete action is beginning this weekend." Bacal's reference: to the Friday and Saturday meetings of the Group for Nonviolent Action/Training (GNAT) a project of the American Friends Service Committee. GNAT conducts participatory learning experiences for people who feel ready to seriously engage in creative nonviolent social change action on peace and justice issues. GNAT workshops cover preparation for public events, strategy development, organization building and research for action.

On Tuesday, May 30, 1500 dorm residents fasted instead of eating at the dorm dining commons, donating the money thus saved to a Vietnam Hospital project. The hopsital, Nguyen Van Troi, will serve children from Laos, Cambodia and Vietnam. It is a world-wide project which evolved from a conference in Chile last year.

On Wednesday, May 31, activities included a "welcome" to Senator Hubert Humphrey who spoke in Ventura, and a noon guerilla theater sketch at the UCen, Storke Plaza and the Library.



Foreign lang. get s L&S axe

As of fall, 1972, there will be no general education requirement for language at UCSB.

Wednesday, the Academic Senate voted to leave determination of language requirements to individual departments. Although it is not expected, some departments may now institute language requirements for their major students.

With nearly 65 per cent of the eligible voters responding, this second mail ballot carried the proposal by an even larger margin than the first. "Yes" votes numbered 232. 164 voted "no". In the mail ballot conducted only in the College of Letters and Science last April, the proposal passed 167-142.

The affirmative decision from the senate ballot essentially ends the controversy and takes the matter out of the hands of the Faculty Legislature which referred it to the Committee on General Education at their May meeting.

This action however does not preclude the language departments from proposing new program ideas and course offerings to attract prospective students. In fact, many of those who supported the resolution to drop the requirement expressed their hopes that the language faculty would indeed do this.

A.S. chairman of the Committee on Educational Policy, Mike Callahan, said he felt that the decision would in the long run become an asset to the academic quality of UCSB. "Such benefits, however, will not accrue automatically," he cautioned. He emphasized that it was essential that the language departments not feel singled out for fiscal motives and that they be given necessary support by the administration during the transitionary period that will accompany curricular changes in the language departments.

Callahan also added that he felt it was essential that the faculty examine the entire general education program next year to insure breadth but also options and at the same time encourage educational quality and innovation. "General education by the Registrar's Office no longer achieves these ends," he maintains.

Political Science Professor Roger Davidson and Associate Dean of Letters and Science Bruce Rickborn deserve much of the credit for securing passage of the proposal. Both were pleased with Wednesday's outcome.
