Improvement Shown In Gaucho Finances

"The student body is in a sound financial condition for the first time in several years," Harold Martin, student body manager, reported to the Finance committee last week.

The Associated Students books for the school year of 1942-'43 were audited by A. S. MacFarlane, and his report shows a vast improvement in the condition of the student body.

During the past year the student body indebtedness has been reduced from \$19,570.71 to nothing at the present time. This situation is due to the excellent management by Bill Russell, former graduate manager, and Mr. Martin. The sale of the print shop equipment for \$10,000.00 last semester also helped to improve conditions.

Other factors that contributed to the situation was an operating profit of \$1,978.77 on student body accounts, a print shop profit of \$2,320.31, and a budget appropriation of \$3,000.00 to reduce the debt.

Last week Mr. Martin placed \$5,000.00 in a savings account to cover reserve funds which may be needed in case of an emergency.

According to Voltaire, Babouc the Scythian was sent by a genie to Persia to examine its vices. While there, he was struck by the hyprocricy, the wide variance between theory and reality extant. Finally reconciled to this anomaly, he recommended that the genie Ithuriel leave "the world as it goes".

What if Babouc were to visit the United States today on a similar mission? In one American attitude alone he would find much to astound him and convince him of the blind duplicity so prevalent here.

He would find that in a nation pledged to fight to the bitter end to insure the four freedoms to all that 10% of its inhabitants are despised because of the color of their skin. In the South, the Negro is urged to co-operate in observing segration because "if the peoples of this country's races do not pull together, Victory , according to the sign on one bus. In the nation's capital, is lost, according to the sign on one bus. In the nation's capital, poll-tax legislation to give the Negro a measure of political freedom has been sedulously avoided. In every part of the country, ignorant people complain bitterly because the Negro is making living wages for the first time in his life and perchance may have the insolence to encroach upon the sacred environs of the white because his own are indescribably squalid, yes, and in the shadow of the Capitol dome itself.

The Good Neighbor has been extolled, but in California the hapless pachucco has been the brunt of wartime unrest and prejudice. It is hailed as very beautiful magnanimity that in Fullerton, California, the Mexican Bernals may live on the right side of the railroad tracks.

Chinese wisitors to this country are feted, China's long endurance is acclaimed, and public leaders declare that long exploited China will find its true place in a peaceful world. But Representative LeRoy Johnson of California recently asserted that "the white man deserves his place in the world" where the crying need is for "world stabilization where wars would cease and the white man would not be depleted", and that "the ignorant, prejudice, biased human beings in the other parts of the world" should be taught "intelligence, self-denial, and self-control". Can he be afraid of the righteous wrath of the wronged in China and

Would that the ignorant, prejudiced, biased people of our own country could be taught at least the self-control that would prevent them for yielding to demagogery and the ugre for mass violence. Perhaps then Babouc would have some slight justification for leaving this world as it is.


Offices Open
