Tau Omega Float in Second Place; Delta Zetas Finish Third

ROSEN PRESENTS PRIZES

State Freshmen, Beta Sigs, and Sig Alphas Receive Honorable Mention

Receiving much praise from the students and townspeople, the industrial education department float took first prize in the homecoming rally parade staged on State street last Thursday night. The entry was built in the form of a landing field with the Gaucho plane forcing the La Verne ship to the ground. Those who designed and built the float, will benefit from the prize, a trip to Warner Brothers studio, are: William McKenzie, Bob Padén, "Fuzzy" Phelps and Paul Westbury.

Tau Omega took second place with its boat on wheels, which was constantly bailed, and dismantled at every intersection to clear the wires. Four members of the fraternity will be awarded a dinner at the Biltmore.

"Whip that Tiger," a float entered by the Delta Zeta Delta picturing a tiger underneath the foot of a Gaucho, won third place.

Honorable mention went to the frosh with the quintuplets, to the Beta Sigma Chi with an antique auto, and to the Sigma Alpha Kappa featuring the homecoming queen.

Other well-planned entries were the Anacapa club portraying sports, the W.A.A. with victory crowning El Gaucho.

Dan DeReign, chairman of the parade with Miss Arvilla Brewster, as Gauchos led the parade mounted on their horses, followed by Mayor E. O. Hanson, Marilyn Basham, student body president, and Ester Janssens Porter, president of the alumni. Councilman Crawford, and the yell and song leaders, riding in the official car.

Using flashlights, tied to their feet, on a darkened field members of the State Gaucho band under the leadership of Wells McAllister, drum major, presented a novel half-time stunt last Saturday night at the La Verne-Gaucho game.

Coming from the lower end of the darkened field the band immediately went into a serpentine and after winding around, marched back into formation, and the lights came on. In front of the La Verne stand is played "Cross-eyed Kelly," using Captain Glover's name in place of Cross-eyed Kelly.

During the skit, a green "S" and a golden "L", representing the La Verne and Santa Barbara colors appeared on the hillside.

When the lights came on, three of Nick Carter's tracksters staged a high-hurdle race, with Bill Crow winning. Bill Gray and Dave Rumbaugh followed Crow across the line.

A Leopard followed by a trainer then entered the football arena. The trainer was unable to control the leopard of La Verne, but a man on horseback, representing the Gauchos, entered and made the animal toe the mark. The stunt was put on by the rally committee. Gauchos Win From Leopards

Yeager Runs Eighty Yards to Score First Touchdown for Gauchos

SUBSTITUTES PLAY

Credit for Victory Is Given to Gaucho Linesmen for Fine Blocking

Before the largest crowd of the season, the Galloping Gauchos, with a dazzling display of reverses, spinners, and fake plays, decisively trimmed a band of fighting Leopards from La Verne, 21 to 0. 3,500 fans watched the Hardermen outmaneuver the southerners in the 1935 Homecoming battle.

The colorful gathering had no sooner settled in their seats, when Yeager, State halfback, took the opening kick-off on his own 15 yard line, fumbled, recovered on his 20, and with his shifty hips functioning perfectly, galloped the length of the field to score the first touchdown. The Gauchos paved the way for Yeager's sensational run with some fine blocking. Sanderson converted for the extra point and in the first minute of play the locals held a 7 to 0 lead.

Leopards Stubborn

Midway in the first period, the Staters moved to within a few yards of pay dirt, but were repulsed by the stubborn Leopard line. Near the close of the first quarter the Gauchos advanced to the La Verne 12 yard marker as the result of a sustained power drive featured by the line smashes of 'Sandy' Sanderson. At this point Yeager on a wide sweep around his right end scored his sixth touchdown of the year. Sanderson again booted the pigskin surely through the uprights for the 14th point of the game.

Harder Substitutes Freely

Coach "Spud" Harder substituted freely in the second quarter and the Leopards held the Gauchos

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Golden Gloves Tournament in Second Year

Gaucha Boxers in Training to Take Part in Trials for Olympic Team

The second annual Southern California Golden Gloves Boxing Tournament will be held at Hollywood on December 2nd, 4th, and 9th. The tournament this year is expected to create more interest in amateur boxing in California. The Los Angeles Examiner is again sponsoring the tournament and is urging the full support of all amateur organizations.

The entry list is expected to exceed that of last year. Officials expect more than three hundred participants.

With the Olympic Games in sight, the competition will be keen. There will be five last year's champions and practically all of the runners-up returning for this year's competition.

On December 19th the winners of the southern tournament will meet the winners of the San Francisco and Portland divisions for the Pacific Coast championships. This meet will also be held at the Hollywood stadium. The winners of this meet will be the Pacific Coast representatives at the National Try-outs for the Olympic team.

The Santa Barbara State college is expected to have a good representation in this tournament.

YEAGER IS IN TIE FOR CONFERENCE SCORING LEAD
