## Student Parley Asks World Government

A super-world government, to be established immediately, was the chief proposal of 63 student delegates to the Western College Conference on International Affairs at Stanford University. In addition, the students, representing 38 colleges throughout the United States, endorsed 37 resolutions on various world problems.

Kay Updegraff and Bob West, UCSBC delegates to the congress, are now preparing to present these proposals to the Gaucho student body for a referendum vote next Wednesday, December 17. Results of the voting at all 38 colleges—a consensus of the opinion of thousands of students—will be delivered by two student delegates to the U. S. Congress in Washington and to the United Nations in New York.

### Honor Depends on Vote

The honor of being chosen for the mission to Congress and the U. N. will be conferred on those delegates who are most successful in securing the opinions of their student bodies on the set of resolutions. Whether Kay and Bob are chosen for the trip East depends on the volume of Gaucho voting.

Discussion and debate on the various issues at Stanford was often heated, the SBC delegates report, and working sections lasted far into the night.

In addition to the proposal for immediate establishment of federal world government, highlights of the students' resolutions were:

- (1) All U. S. atomic bomb secrets should be turned over to the World Government.
- (2) To halt deterioration of American-Soviet relations a goodwill mission, headed by President Truman, should be sent to Moscow.

cho campus, neither Americans for Democratic Action, of which Dr. Harry Girvetz is chairman for the Santa Barbara chapter, nor its subsidiary, Students for Democratic Action, were included in the Attorney General's blacklist.

AYD, an outgrowth of The Young Communist League, has long been listed in government files as Communist.

- (3) The 10-point anti-inflation program submitted to Congress by the President should be carried out.

- (4) There should be no cuts in U. S. income taxes, and to curb inflation further, incentives should be initiated to encourage more domestic production and more private investment abroad.

- (5) No political strings should be attached to the Marshall Plan. No stipulations should be made by the United States as to how the nations we help should run their economies.

- (6) All nations should be allowed to join the world super-government and none should be permitted to secede.

- (8) The United States must initiate measures of reconciliation toward the U.S.S.R. to prevent further breakdown of relations between the two nations.

- (9) The United States should withdraw troops and aid from China. The Congress said "the responsibility for the maintenance of the territorial and political integrity of China should be borne by the United Nations."

- (10) Occupation forces should remain in Japan, taking a subordinate role at a practicable time to an economic and political council formed by the U. N.

- (11) Germany should be allowed and encouraged to establish a strong federal and democratic government of "limited powers."

- (12) The American Military Government should be directed to redouble its efforts to educate the German people along democratic lines.

- (13) A program of student exchange with other countries, and student-ships-to-Europe should be initiated under the sponsorship of the U. S. State Department.

El Gaucho invites letters from the student body expressing views on these resolutions.

A near-capacity crowd of some 1500 frenzied fans watched the Golden Gaucho basketball crew open their 1948 cage career last Friday night against the 20th-Century Fox team. The film folk edged out the hard-fighting Blue and Gold men 48 to 43.

The Gauchos' impressive first-game showing against the undefeated Foxes presages a stand-out season against other collegiate teams.

The tight Gaucho defense held down the potent visitors, but the forward wall was unable to penetrate often enough into the Foxes bucket. The southerners scored first, and ran up a six-point, 21 to 15, halftime edge. They never relinquished this hold, although it varied two points one way or the other at times. With all this, veteran ace Frank Lubin, 6' 6½", 240 lb. playing coach and six-time AAU All-American of the Foxes called the Gauchos the "best team we've faced all season," which includes Whittier, Loyola, Chapman, and other top southern California colleges. "They're on a par with UCLA right now," he said. UCLA is rated top team on the Pacific coast.

Although Quentin Sims, high scorer of the evening, stood out, the Gaucho quintet is a smooth-working team, more than a one-star outfit. Hubler, newcomer Scott, Eckerman, and many others were equally good.

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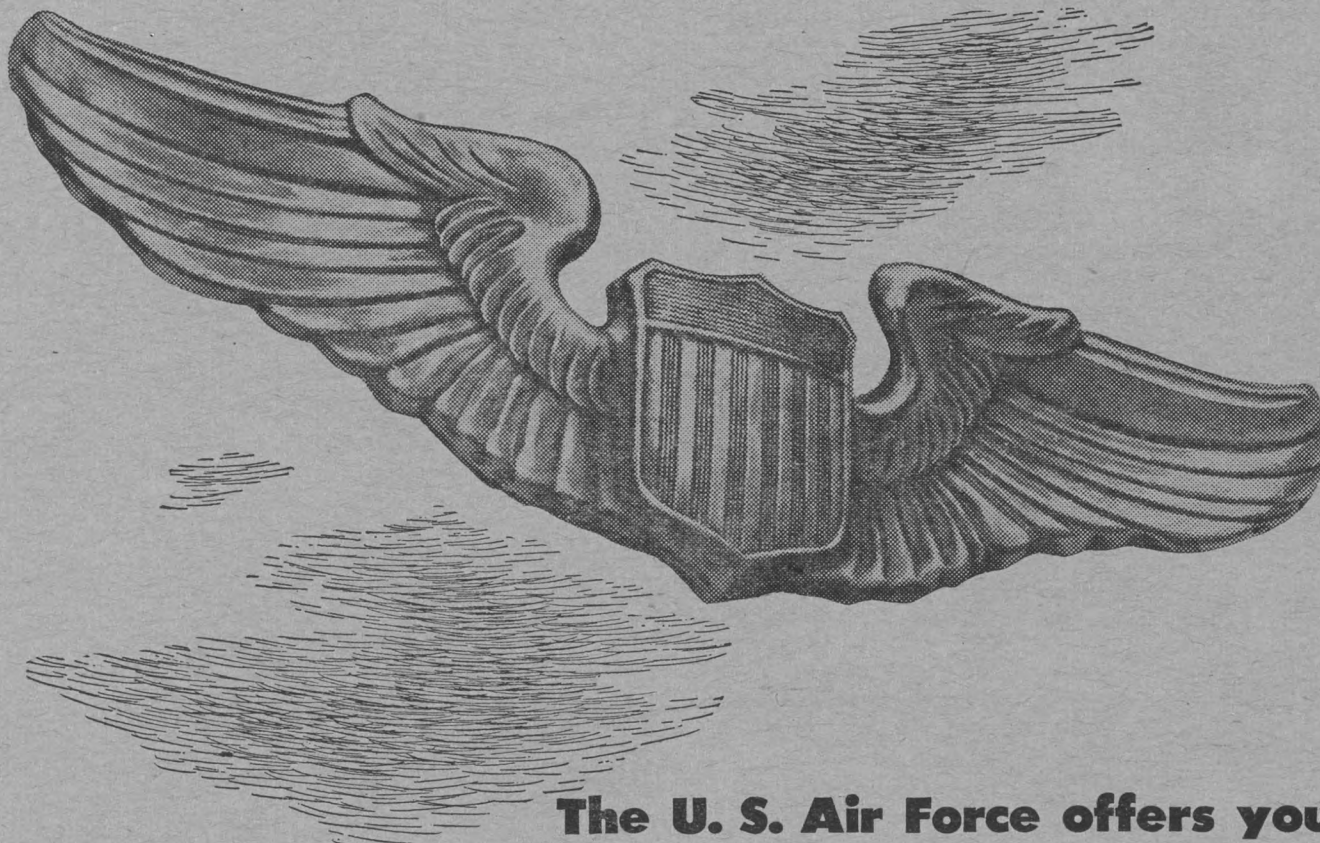

### Former Instructor Now Red Cross Exec In Switzerland, Revisits Campus

Dr. Fred Sigerist, former instructor at Santa Barbara College, now associated with the League of Red Cross Society in Geneva, Switzerland, revisited the campus recently and spoke briefly to members of Dr. William Aggeler's French class about his experiences as a worker for the Red Cross before, during, and after the war.

Born in Switzerland, Dr. Sigerist speaks several languages, among them German, French, Italian, several Swiss dialects, and Rumanian, which he learned for part of his work in Europe. This knowledge of languages is essential to his present position as Head of the Bureau of Publications and Communications in Switzerland, where he must edit material in several languages.

#### FRENCH VALUABLE

Of special interest to the students of French was his statement that the French language "is the common denominator," since most people meet in that tongue. The practical value of knowing foreign languages was also stressed in connection with the Marshall Plan "and what will come after."

Dr. Sigerist spoke of his work in Rumania, where he assisted in emergency relief operations, and of the relief programs in fifty European and other countries.

At present clothes and medical supplies are being sent in some quantity, but, Dr. Sigerist pointed out, it is useless to clothe and give medical attention to starving people; it is food which they need most desperately.

### Announce Opening Of Christmas Seal Sales Here

The Santa Barbara County Tuberculosis and Health Association announces the opening of the annual sale of Christmas Seals in this county to raise funds to finance the operation of the Christmas Seal Chest X-ray Unit during the coming year.

This year the unit was on the campus twice, offering free chest X-rays to students and faculty. On February 20 and 21, 1,333 free chest X-rays were taken and on September 17, 589.

Christmas Seal funds also finance the Rheumatic Fever Diagnostic Clinic which examines ten Santa Barbara children for this disease each month.
