EMINENT CANADIAN OPENS CAMPUS LECTURES

A highlight of your summer experience here will be the All-College lecture series beginning Tuesday, July 1, with the brilliant Canadian critic and intellectual leader, H. Marshall McLuhan, speaking on "The Electronic Revolution and the Undeveloped Countries of the Mind."

Dr. McLuhan, in addition to being a regular contributor to the important literary journals on this continent and in England, is the founder of "Exploration," a magazine devoted to the implications to society of the 20th century technological revolution. A professor of literature at University of Toronto, Canada, he is teaching two courses here this summer.

The lectures will be held at 3 p.m. in the New Classroom Building Lecture Hall. There is no admission charge, and all students, conferees, and the general public are invited.

SUMMER ENROLLMENT HIGHEST IN 8 YEARS

With 746 students enrolled by last Tuesday, the 1958 Summer Session has reached a peak not exceeded since 1950 when veteran enrollment was significant. Late registrants will increase this figure somewhat.

This represents a 36% jump in enrollment over last year, according to the Registrar's Office.

The increase reflects the expanded offerings in almost every field of study. Dr. Lewis F. Walton is the Summer Session Director and he is now planning for an even larger 1959 summer term.

The enrollment in 1950 was 1,065, the final peak post-war year. It decreased to 523 in 1952 and has gradually increased since that time.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS LECTURE

"Home Construction in the High School-- A Total School Project" will be the subject of William LaPorte's lecture July 2 at 11 a.m. in the Mesa campus auditorium. Mr. LaPorte is supervisor of industrial arts for the Whittier School District. He will present colored slides showing how students work together within their industrial arts curriculum to build an entire house from buying the lot to the furnishing and decoration.

The lecture will be the second in a series of six presented each Wednesday at 11 by visiting industrial arts specialists from all over the state. The public is invited to attend.

Students deficient in any section of any division of the test must retake the entire division, and will be held responsible for any part taken whether passed formerly or not.

No appointment is necessary in advance. Students appear at the time scheduled. above for a particular make-up division. However, a Statement of Study is required of each student. This Statement of Study may be obtained at the office of the student's major department or at the department of Education. Before signing it a student should spend at least ten hours in study---preferably with a tutor. This Statement of Study must also be signed by a faculty member.
