COMMITTEE REPORTS ON RUSSELL'S OFFICE

The Special Committee for Surveying the Graduate Managers Office submitted a report of part of its work last Tuesday, Nov. 30, at the Student Council meeting. This report was adopted on that evening by a unanimous vote of the council.

In essence, the report was devised to revise the setup of the Graduate Managers office in such a manner that the University would handle some of the functions now being performed by that office. This assistance was requested on the grounds that:

1. Student-body expenditures for administration and publicity, account for an excessive proportion of student-body fees and total student-body income, resulting in an undue restriction on the budgets of the other departments.

2. SBC has no student-owned store from which profits might be made available to the student-body budget.

3. In other colleges surveyed by the committee, with enrollments similar in size to that of SBC, some of the student-body functions which students pay from their own funds at SBC, are at these other institutions paid for from University of College funds. Institutions included in the survey were Cal Poly, C. O. P., San Jose State, and the University of California at Davis.

The committee investigated the possibility of consolidating the publicity function of the Graduate Managers office with the Office of Public Information recently established by the University here. This suggestion was made in order to attain "economy through joint use of source materials, files, and secretarial help... avoidance of duplication of effort... elimination of the confusion sometimes caused by having two public information offices on a campus of this size."

The committee suggested that the Office of Public Information assume the publicity functions now performed by the Graduate Manager's office; that the University increase the staff of its Public Information office by one full-time professional assistant and pay his salary; that the Associated Students contribute a sum of money to assist in office expense of this joint operation. The Associated Students under this proposal would probably save \$3000 to \$3500 per year.

Student Council adopted the plan of this committee and submitted it to Provost Harold Williams for his approval. Should it meet with the Provost's approval, he will send it with his endorsement to the appropriate University office.

Japanese Records To Be Heard

College students and faculty members are invited to the regular Music Department meeting, Wednesday, December 8, at 4:00 pm., to hear a unique collection of Japanese phonograph records, and to participate in a discussion of oriental music and art. This discussion is to be held in Music Hall 100.

The two record albums, donated to the University recently by the Pacific Society of Religious Education, Inc., contain the music of old Japanese string and wind instruments plus songs sung in the melody of early chants. Some of the songs date back 102 years and others 120 years previous in Edo (old Tokyo).

This music seems very strange to occidental ears. Even the best singing reminds us of cater wailing, according to Dr. Christy, department chairman. The orchestra accompaniments are sparse, and peculiar, and at times play with very discordant harmonies.

The rhythms are complex, at times even bombastic, and in this respect, the music should be found most interesting to everyone. Mr. Faulkner has been in Korea and Japan, and has studied the Japanese language, resulting in an excellent background for enlightenment on such music.

I noticed with profound regret that publicity printed in the News-Press and the Gauchito has presumably been the apparent cause of a seeming schism in inter-departmental harmony, so necessary during play production. The injured parties are assured that the offending items were obtained in good faith from ostensibly legitimate and reliable sources; and, that, as far as was known, such information was innocuous and correct. Abject apologies only are offered, because no documentary proof exists that would shift blame on to other shoulders.

Now, haply to the further hurt of sensitive souls, publicity must go on! Sophocles' *Electra* will still be staged on Thursday and Friday, the 9th and 10th of December, in the Riviera Auditorium, at 8:30 pm. Tickets on sale now at the Graduate Manager's Office.

Here briefly, is the plot of the play, (information contained therein was obtained during an interview with the school's recognized authority on Greek literature, Mr. Warren E. Schutt, B.A.):

While *Electra's* father, Agamemnon, is away at Troy, her mother Clytemnestra enters into a liaison with Aegisthus. The queen plots to kill Agamemnon on his return; successfully carries out her plan, and then marries her paramour. *Electra*, thereafter, is subjected to the utmost dignities by both mother and stepfather, perhaps because the girl constantly cherishes a loving memory of her murdered father, and even flaunts it before Clytemnestra and her consort.

Electra's elder brother, Orestes, brought up in exile, nurses identical plans for vengeance to those of *Electra*, who has planned revenge for many years. Orestes spreads false rumors about his death in furtherance of his plot; *Electra* thinks, on hearing this news, that she must carry on alone; but, finally, brother and sister meet under intensely emotional conditions. Bloody and complete vengeance is exacted by the two, who kill both Clytemnestra and Aegisthus.

EDITORIAL

People in the abstract comprise an amazing group of creatures. The "sapiens" half of the phrase "homo sapiens" is a moot point open to some discussion and even doubt.

Anyone naive enough to wish to dispute that point need only look at the whole generation of psychologists, psychoanalysts, and psychiatrists who have come into being for no other reason than to try to figure out the more unsapient points of the "homo sapiens."

One of man's quirks which has evinced the need for such a group of scientists is his gross antipathy toward change. A man of means thinks nothing at all of buying a new car every year, and often a completely different make of car.

But just suggest a slight change of ideology to him, or even a minor shift in the application and field of emphasis of his present ideas and he blows his top. He throws a wall of defense up that would put to shame the Maginot Line.

The current vogue along this defense line is to label any group as "Communist" which proposes a change for the better. It seems that almost every such group in the country except the WCTU and the SPCA has undergone such a phrase.

Among the organizations suffering such a moronic charge is the NSA. The group has quite successfully, completely, and decisively proved the falseness of such an accusation. At the very outset it ridded itself of any chance that such an element might develop within the organization.

The NSA's only affiliation is with various student bodies as such. Above and beyond this, it's only connection with other groups is sponsoring organizations like the WSSF. There is no connection between this association and any group, political or otherwise, which could be construed as evenly remotely subversive.

Anyone interested enough to look into the background and administration of this organization will find it to be nothing but conservative in both its aims and its means in attaining those aims.

Among those who have seen fit to go on record as favoring the group and to commend it for its activities and aims, is President Harry S. Truman. A section of his personal message to the constitutional Convention of NSA is quoted below.

"... It is a pleasure to send greetings to the Constitutional Convention of the United States National Student Association.

"Our faith in education requires no apology or defense. We must, however, make certain that the programs of our educational institutions serve most effectively the needs of our democratic society. We should therefore welcome hopefully the formation of any organization that has as one of its prime objectives a constructive effort to improve the quality of the services in institutions of higher education.

"I congratulate your group on the opportunity that lies before it. I trust that the effort of the organization you intend to form may always be directed unselfishly toward improving the contributions that higher education may make to the welfare of our country and of mankind throughout the world."

News Letter

(Ed. Notes: This is the first in a series of articles by Tom Padden, a UCSBC student now attending the University of Zurich Switzerland. It will be Mr. Padden's endeavor to describe to the students here the present European situation as he sees it.)

Zurich, Nov. 24

As you read these lines, endless streams of American aircraft soar through the dangerous mists over the Brandenburg plains bringing food, medicine, fuel and other desperately needed supplies to two million Germans besieged in our cause within the tearful rubble of Berlin.

How long we can continue the airlift is indeed questionable, for our section of Berlin is dying even while the lift operates. The bare necessities supplied by the lift are vital, but are in no way helpful to the stagnation of the sector's whole economy which has resulted from the blockade. Thus it is also a matter of how long there will be any purpose in the continuation of the lift.

If we leave Berlin (and it now seems that there may little else to do), the effect on the entire population of Germany will be instantaneous. The German people expect us to leave Berlin, in spite of the statements we have made to the contrary. They anticipate our leaving, for they know how hopeless our position is. They also know that we cannot raise the blockade of Berlin without giving the Russians some other advantage in turn, which will be another step in the Russian march across Europe.

Either way, the Soviets are in a position to demonstrate to the German people the obvious fact that Russian policy is successful while American policy is not. And if Berlin goes, the people of Germany will be more resigned than ever to a future dominated by the Politburo.

The German people fear the Russians. They do not want to be ruled by the Russians. They do not want Communism, nor any other "ism." They want peace. Those who warn us that the Germans are "snickering and waiting for the chance to jump on some-

Do you think the football teams of bygone days were greater than those on the gridiron today? Were the stars of yesteryear the all-time greats?

What happy combination has approached the now legendary Four Horsemen of Notre Dame? Who has surpassed Red Grange, the Galloping Ghost, who carried the ball for Illinois four times in one game—and scored four touchdowns against Michigan?

Perhaps the present day passer is more skillful because of greater frequency of the pass as an offensive weapon. Back in the flying wedge days a couple of musclemen would pitch the ball and the quarterback himself over the line of scrimmage. He had special handles on the sides of his trousers so they could get a good grip on him. Yale used fourteen quarterbacks in one game, two of whom soared into the general admission section, were pounced on by souvenir hunters and never recovered. In those days the quarterback was thrown for a gain.

My nomination for one of the greatest teams of not too long ago is the pro team that the Chicago Bears fielded in 1940. One thing about this team is that they were eating regular. Here's the forward wall: ends, Plasman, 230, and Wilson, 215; tackles, Stydhar, 255, and Torrance, 338; guards, Bray 250, and Musso, 260, and at center, Turner, 245. This massive Bear line averaged 256. The backfield averaged 221 and consisted of Maniaci, 215, at full, Luckman, 215, at quarter, and Famagietti, 240, and Snyder, 215, at the halves. The team as a whole came to a tidy 243 average.

This team won the National League championship by redwashing the Whiteskins, I mean whitewashing the Washington Redskins, 73-0. One Redskin fullback

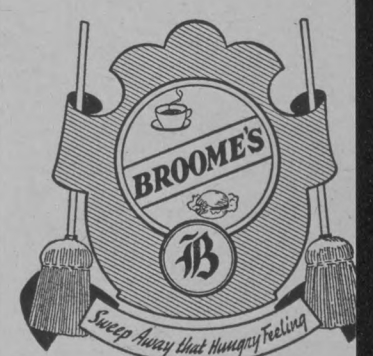

The UCSB Golden Gaucho football team took their revenge on the State of Oregon last Saturday night in Bakersfield's Potato Bowl as they roared to a 46 to 7 upset victory over Willamette University of Salem. In their last game of the 1948 season they almost equaled the margin pushed down their throats in the first game when the University of Oregon pounded out a 55 to 7 win. The center of the Gaucho line, led by Joe Rossi and Frank Kirkland stopped the vaunted Bearcat attack cold. Taking over on their own 41, the Hilltoppers racked up another score as Tom Kelley cracked off right tackle and raced down the right sideline for six points. White converted.

The Gaucho line again held the northern outfit, and after five plays, starting at the Bearcat 49, Royal Cathcart smashed over right tackle from the five.

After Jim Taylor intercepted a Willamette pass and Tom Kelley set up the score, stubby Russ Bertell smacked over from the one to put the Gauchos ahead, 27-0, at halftime.
