Following the talks, the audience will have an opportunity to ask questions of the evening's speakers. Everyone interested is invited to attend.

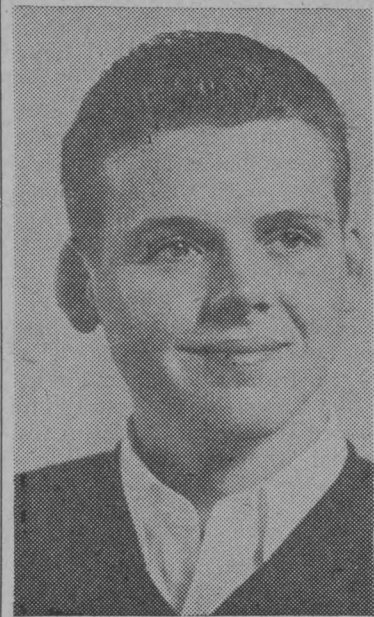
### La Cumbre Office Moved

Offices of *La Cumbre* have been moved again, according to Louise Heitfeld. They are now located in Oak Hall 101.

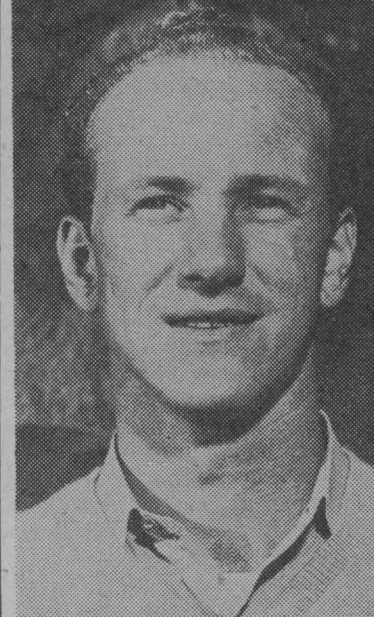

## PLATFORMS

Two candidates, Bob Christofferson and Ed McCann, are running for the office of president of the Associated Students for the coming year.

Realizing the importance of the election, *El Gaucho* herein presents the platforms of both candidates and a brief biography of each.

**"Chris"**  
Bob Christofferson is a 21-year-old sociology major. He is a junior and calls Santa Barbara his home town. At present he is representative-at-large for the student body and a member of SAE fraternity. He has been a member of the Legislative Council for three years, and is also a member of Blue Key and the Cal Club.

Extending his list of campus activities are the co-chairman position of the Special Events Committee, and membership on the Inter-Fraternity Council, and Squires. In his Sophomore year Bob was class president.

**Naval Reserve**  
Bob is currently enrolled in the Naval Reserve Officers Candidate School program which guarantees graduation.

**Ed McCann is an industrial arts major and president of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. He has also held the position of house manager for his fraternity. Ed worked for the new Goleta campus as chairman of the Student Union.**

**BOB CHRISTOFFERSON**  
As a candidate for the office of Student Body President, I would like to offer the following as the main planks of my platform—what I intend to do next year if elected:  
1. Supplement our necessarily smaller income next year through drawing of students from other Santa Barbara colleges and servicemen to our athletic events. I

propose to do this through increased publicity and a "Student Season Ticket" for non-UCSBC students.

2. Develop a long range plan for the Goleta move.

3. Stress our athletics program through aiding the Buck-a-Month Club and augmenting the Varsity Program.

4. Investigate the possibility of purchasing the bookstore—ownership would be a tremendous asset if purchase is possible at this time.

5. Develop the University of California Student Body Presidents' Council, which is now in the embryonic stage and could be of great value to Santa Barbara College in particular if established immediately.

These and other planks of my platform constitute an ambitious program for next year, but one which is necessary if Santa Barbara College is to continue growth. I assure you that they are not a series of empty campaign promises to be used during elections and then forgotten, but constitute the plan of action which I intend to follow if elected.

*The office of Student Body President is a big job—one that demands considerable experience and a realistic outlook on student government. I am not running on a "two-faced" platform; my ambition next year is to serve the entire student body. I hope that through your vote you'll give me that opportunity.*

## Students Will Vote On Proposed Change Of Election Dates

An amendment to the Constitution, proposed Tuesday night by the Associated Students Council, will be on the ballot in the general elections, April 17 and 18. The amendment, which must be passed by a two-thirds vote, reads as follows:

"Regular Associated Student elections shall be held in the Spring Semester a minimum of three school weeks before the beginning of final examinations."

This would change the time of elections to a later date in the Spring from the present minimum of six weeks from the beginning of final exams.

## BRITISH ECONOMICS LECTURE SUBJECT

"The Economics of the British Labor Party" is the subject of the All-College Lecture to be given tomorrow afternoon at 4 pm by Dr. Harold J. Plous, lecturer in economics.

Dr. Plous will discuss the problems faced by Britain's Labor Party in its sweeping program for redistributing income, nationalizing of industries, and its "cradle to the grave" welfare policy.

Dr. Plous recently spent a year in research at the London School of Economics.

The lecture is one of the All-College series sponsored by University of California Extension and the Committee on Drama, Lectures and Music, and is free to the public. It will be given in Pine Hall 100.

Our biggest problem, one which is not unique to Santa Barbara College, is that of a decrease in our enrollment. Such a decrease will create problems which will be felt by the students as individuals in the coming year. For example, the hampering of our move to Goleta, reduction of student funds, a reduction of faculty and a limiting of our curriculum.

My proposed solutions to this issue can be stated as separate continuation of the emphasis on athletics by such activities as the Varsity Committee and the athletic brochure already organized under Frank Goodall. (2) Increased publicity of our college activities to all the available sources of students, locally and throughout the state. (3) An enlargement of the present ROTC unit and consideration of a possible air and naval ROTC unit.

Another plank which would be of benefit to the student body is my proposal to the Legislative Council for student ownership of the Bookstore. It has been estimated that this could result in an annual income of approximately \$10,000 which could be passed on to our students through lower prices and campus improvements.

I feel the need for a greater emphasis on our student-faculty relations committee. This committee should function by bringing the problems of the students before the faculty and secondly by coordinating student-faculty activities.

The utilization of Goleta facilities for Gaucho recreation at this time has good possibilities. The well-equipped gym, the rifle range and the large heated swimming pool are good examples of what could be done.

*In summary, I pledge to you a sincere, dependable leadership with an eye to the future in anticipation of the coming problems to be faced by our student body.*

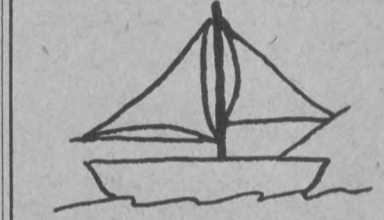

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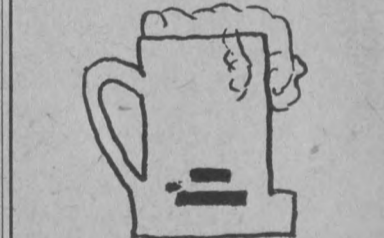

Nose-diving practically out of CCAA contention, the hard-luck Gaucho baseballers took it on the chin again Saturday on the Mesa diamond as they dropped a doubleheader to a visiting Cal Poly nine 6-3 and 3-1.

A pair of errors in both games figured in both losses, but a liberal sprinkling of walks contributed to a balanced duo of losses to the talkative Mustangs, who were both baseball team and rooting section. First game starter Ray Rubenstein pitched some good ball and high-lighted the Gaucho offensive game by knocking a one-run homer over the cliff in the third inning.

But two walks, two singles and an error in the top half of the third frame gave the Mustangs a winning bulge never threatened by the Gaucho batsmen, who collected but six hits to the visitors' seven. A big crowd of fans up from the track meet were on hand to see the seven inning nightcap resolve into a pitching duel between Wynn Smallwood and Bud Bauhofer. However, a tight one-all game was broken up in the fourth inning as a tragedy of errors allowed the winning margin of two runs to cross the plate.

Smallwood, in receiving his fourth loss, gave up but six safties, but the free-swinging Gauchos could garner but two bingles from Bauhofer.

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## Three Teams Tied For First Place in Intramural Softball

Three teams are tied for first place after two weeks of intramural softball play. They are Sigma Tau Gamma, Sigma Phi Epsilon, and the Naughty Nine.

"We're having two toughies in a row," said Nick Carter, track coach, after having met San Diego Saturday and meeting Fresno this coming Saturday. The Fresno tilt will be at Ratcliff Stadium there for another top 2C2A dual meet.

The Gauchos have had some close meets with the Bulldogs, but have never managed to come out on top. This season appears to show the local fans the best opportunity of taking the Fresnoians since 1947 when the Gauchos were edged 66-65.

The Bulldogs are strong in most of the running events and may contribute to the rupture of meet records in the 880 and mile, while the Gauchos will be aiming for the relay and high hurdle marks.

The Gauchos have an apparent edge in the field events, but will have trouble in the pole vault and broad jump.

## WIN IS SECOND IN TRACK HISTORY; THINCLADS UNDEFEATED ALL SEASON

'Twas brillig and the slithy Gauchos did gyre and gimble on the wabe as Santa Barbara downed the frabjous San Diego Aztecs for the second time in track history, 72 2/3 to 58 1/3 Saturday at La Playa Stadium.

Despite the cold and wind, four meet or school records fell during the meet as competition between the two foes brought out the best

in both squads. New mile, 880 and two-mile records were made by the visitors, who took eight firsts to the Gauchos' seven, but the outstanding race of the day was turned in by Otey Scruggs.

### Otey Led

Otey led a trio of fine Aztecs all the way from the post, beating off several determined challenges to post a new meet and school record of 49.5, clipping a tenth of a second off his own school record of last year.

Otey also won the shot put and placed second in the discus to tie with high-stepping Alberto Triulzi for high point honors at 13 markers apiece.

### Blue Ribbon

Alberto took the blue ribbon in both hurdle events and a second in the 100-yard dash. The century event was marred by at least five false starts singularly disturbing to the high-strung Alberto. His 14.5 in the highs was disallowed by wind-man Dr. Woodhouse.

Returning to competition with a taped-up arm, Delf Pickarts took the javelin with a nice throw of 187' 8" followed by teammate Brick Reed, who in turn led a clean sweep of the discus as his throw of 135' 11" won the blue ribbon. The discus put the meet on ice for the Gauchos, who were leading by a slight margin at that time with several doubtful events remaining.

### Dancer Outstanding

Willie Dancer posted the outstanding field event mark of 6' 4 1/2" in the highjump and placed third in the broadjump behind second placer Leo Jennings, who also picked up a point in the discus.

The meet was in doubt to the onlooker many times, especially when the public address system went on the blink and Ken Kellogg had to address the spectators *per se* from the track.

### Fresno Next

The undefeated Gauchos take on the perennially tough Fresno Bulldogs this Saturday at Fresno, in the last remaining meet before the Conference finals at San Diego May 5.

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# REP-AT-LARGE HOPEFULS STATE THEIR PLATFORMS

Eight women and five men are running for the positions of representative-at-large for the coming year. To bring their views upon campus subjects to light before the election, each candidate has been interviewed and has presented a short statement of the policy or platform on which he is to run for office.

Three candidates for women rep-at-large and three for men rep-at-large will be elected.

**Ken Brittingham:** As a candidate for rep-at-large I am a candidate for both the Riviera and Mesa campuses. I believe both campuses should be brought together, not divorced from each other. The two campuses could easily work together for the good of the entire school.

**Pete Burgher:** 1. Personal representation of the students by consulting with them and with the organized leaders to find what is really wanted. This I propose to do actively instead of passively. 2. Due to drop in enrollment there will be less money in the student budget. Fair allocations will let organizations get what they really need to keep their performances up to standards. 3. Proper sponsorship and decisions on all matters is something that is called for. A fair and decisive plan of action is what I feel we need.

**John Cook:** As representative-at-large I propose to represent the consensus of the entire student body and to work towards unifying its various components. This would include increased coordination of the alumni organization with the Associated Students and further integration of the Riviera and Mesa campuses.

**Des Kincaid:** I sincerely hope to be elected to one of the men rep-at-large posts. Should you choose me, I promise to devote my whole-hearted efforts to the best interests of the Associated Students and to serve well in any and all duties which the Legislative Council or you, the students, delegate to me.

**Ted Troy:** 1. Student control of the Bookstore. 2. Support of the athletic activities and varsity teams. 3. Thorough investigation and revision of *El Gaucho*.

**Sally Carter:** Since the office of Women's Rep-at-Large is a relatively new one and as yet has not acquired a clearly defined program, I would like to further develop its possibilities and promote more interest among the women of the college in student affairs.

**Benny Droste:** To strengthen the relationship of the student leaders and the efforts of the students to yield a more harmonious functioning of UCSBC will be my goal if elected to fill one of the positions of women's rep-at-large.

**Joyce Kaufmann:** Because student opinions are an important factor in college life, I would like to facilitate expression of the needs and interests by my representation if elected.

**Veronica Lechleiter:** I believe that Santa Barbara could become the most outstanding of the University of California's campuses. However, student interest in school activities is necessary to make our college an outstanding campus. Since this interest seems to be lacking here, I believe bigger activities should be promoted to improve student interest. This I would attempt to do if elected to

one of the women's rep-at-large positions.

**Claire Maher:** Reps-at-Large are the student's own members of the Legislative Council who try to work for the best student interest. During the past year as a member of the cabinet I have become fully acquainted with the workings of student government. I feel that the relationship between student boards and the faculty and administration can be improved; that the IA and Riviera campuses can become a closer knit group and that students as a whole can be made to feel more free in voicing their opinions to the Legislative Council. I hope that you will give me the opportunity to use this experience.

**Anita Mitchell:** If elected to be women's rep-at-large, it is my aim to investigate and to make known to women students the opportunities for service and activity in student body offices as well as to represent their views as fully as possible.

**Pat Welsh:** 1. Implement a program for publicizing UCSBC because of the decrease in enrollment makes this more vital. 2. Take over the Bookstore by students rather than waiting until the college moves to Goleta. 3. Strengthen the Alumni Association. As a rep-at-large I feel that I could do a great deal in this respect. 4. Establishment of a free hour near noon, one day a week, for assemblies, Provost lectures or committee, board, or faculty meetings. My proposal of this in council meeting was unanimously passed and is now waiting to be approved by the Scheduling Committee.

**Margaret Wright:** If elected to the office of rep-at-large, I will try to continue this year's policies of good government and high caliber activities. I will express the ideas of students to the Legislative Council and work hard on any special duties delegated to me by the Associated Students.
