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UCSB and Loyola Marymount Battle in Opener **Gauchos Meet Best in the** West at UCLA Regional

In 1983, the Stanford baseball team defeated UC Santa Barbara in the final game of the Western Regionals, 11-5, giving the Cardinal a berth in the College World Series.

Now, three years later, UCSB Coach Al Ferrer is once again in a position to send his team to Omaha, Nebraska. The Gauchos begin the 1986 Western Regionals at UCLA with an 11 a.m. game against Loyola Marymount on Thursday.

How does Ferrer propose to win the double-elimination tournament? "Right now, we're going to try to get three wins before we get two

losses, and I'm not being funny," Ferrer said. "Basically, that's what it's down to."

If the Gauchos can win the regional at Jackie Robinson Stadium, they will be the first UCSB team ever to go to Omaha.

While the ninth-ranked Gauchos (44-17, seeded third) play the eighthranked Lions (45-12, seeded second) in Thursday's first game, the 10thranked Bruins (39-21, seeded first) will take on the 16th-ranked Hawaii Rainbows (41-22, seeded fourth) in the second game at 3:30 p.m.

In the opening game, UCSB's senior right-hander Mike Tresemer (9-1, 3.38 ERA) will get the start versus right-hander Tim Layana (16-2, 3.92). Gaucho righthander Bruce Egloff (6-1, 5.04) and lefthander Steve Connolly (8-3, 4.80) will also see action this weekend.

Although the Gauchos have lost two games to Dave Snow's Lions this season, 11-4 and 6-2, Ferrer knows that post-season play is an entirely new ball game.

"Neither team has been to regional play before," Ferrer said. 'Both coaches have, but transmitting what you have experienced to your players is not easy. What we have to do now is just really look at

come at you with."

The Lions will bring in a .326 team batting average, as opposed to the UCSB's .348 mark. Lion first baseman Jim Holleran (.377), seven home runs), catcher Mark Grafitti (.375), pitcher/first baseman Steve Polk (.363), and centerfielder Billy Bean (.353, 57 RBI's) will lead the Loyola attack.

The Bruins will be led by rightfielder Bill Haselman (.371, 11 home runs), second baseman Torey Lovullo (.323, 16 home runs), center fielder Tony Scruggs (.349), and catcher Todd Zeile (.346, 15 home runs). On the mound, UCLA's righthander Alex Sanchez (16-2, 4.06) and left-hander Mike Magnanti (2-0, 2.41) will see action on Thursday and Friday, respectively.

The Rainbows, who swept three games from UCSB earlier this year on Oahu, boast third baseman

Marcus Owens (.349), shortstop Kelsey Isa (.306), catcher Phil Williams (.319), and outfielder Nelson Inabata (.302). Hawaii is led by two left-handers, Mark Kawakami (1.71) and Joey Bierra (2.90).

Ferrer assessed the other two teams: "Although we beat UCLA twice this year (18-9, 4-3), we never faced their best pitchers. But on the same token, they never faced ours.

"Hawaii is a different team out of their ballpark," Ferrer said. "They're a good team, but their ballpark makes them five times better. Either way, we'll have to play well to beat any of the teams."

The Gauchos played exceptional when they swept three games at Cal State Fullerton in the final weekend of regular season play, but in the first game, Ferrer had to call his troops over after he saw "terror" in a couple of the players' eyes.

"If I see that this weekend, I'll call them over and say, 'Hey, we're not going to choke because of fear,"'Ferrer said. "That's exactly what I told them at Fullerton.'

Ferrer will also do his best to prepare his team before Thursday. 'You can say, 'Look, you're going to be nervous in the first couple innings, but it will go away. You didn't get here because you're lucky, you got here because you're good.'

Regional Notes: Ferrer expects good support at UCLA, including families and students. One other group that may show up is the Hammerheads, who received national attention three years ago at Stanford. "The Hammerheads are a unique group, they do their own thing," Ferrer said. "I'd love to see them. There's a heavy alumni Hammerhead group down that way. You might see Hammerheads in ties down there.'

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Coaches Reflect on '83 Regional Playoff Team By Bruce Meyers Assistant Sports Editor

It's been three long years since UCSB last saw NCAA baseball playoff action, and although the program has undergone many changes since then, comparisons between the 1986 and 1983 teams are







still inevitable.

Over 50 players have shuffled through the ranks and donned the Gaucho Blue and Gold since 1983, vet two current members of the Gaucho coaching staff, Bob Brontsema and Paul Smith, remain from that '83 club.

If scoring runs is the key to winning ball games, then both teams had a lock on winning. Although the '86 version has rewritten the school record books in virtually every offensive catagory, the 1983 team also possessed an ability to light up the scoreboard.

"Our team had some surprising power," Brontsema reflected, "yet there is no comparing us and this team (1986) in terms of offensive firepower. At the time we broke the old school record for runs, but we used a lot more speed. We were a better base running club."

In that season, Brontsema accumulated the highest single season stolen base total (45) in UCSB history.

"We counted on execution to score runs," stressed Smith. "We didn't have the people to put up the big numbers like the current club. We scratched for runs."

The scrappy, running philosophy had a direct effect on the way Head

Current Gaucho coach Paul Smith hit .600 at the Western Regionals in 1983.

Coach Al Ferrer managed his team. "Ferrer was more of a strategist in '83," asserted Brontsema. "He used the full roster. We would manufacture runs through pinch running, stealing, and executing the hit and run. We didn't have the luxury of sitting back and relying on the quick offensive explosion. We made things happen."

"We had a very consistent group of hitters," he continued. "When one guy cooled off, another would pick him up for him at the plate. On this year's team there are always at least three red-hot bats in the lineup. This club is like a nine-armed octopus: If one arm doesn't get you, another will."

The Year of the Bat Gaucho Attack, Offensive to Opponents, Has Paved UCSB's Path into the Playoffs

1986 may be the Chinese year of the tiger, but the UCSB baseball team has turned it into the year of the bat. The aluminum bat that is.

In a year when UCSB reached the regionals for the first time since 1983, it has been the offense which has carried the load. This year's squad has virtually rewritten the offensive record book. The Gauchos combined to set eight team and three individual batting records.

You want power? How about 69 home runs (season record), 106 doubles and 18 triples.

You want average? How about a record .348 team batting average (old record - .318) and 725 hits, an average of 12 per game.

You want run production? How about 479 total runs for an average of nearly eight per contest, both records, and 20 games of 10 runs or more.

With those stats, the Gauchos have established themselves as one of the premiere offensive teams in the country.

"This is the most explosive team I've ever Gaucho bats have been but a blur to opponents not have produced at the played on," said right- this season. fielder Quinn Mack, who

set a school record with 22 doubles while ranking second in the PCAA with his .467 conference average. "Last year, I played on an explosive team at Cerritos College, but it wasn't nearly as explosive as this one.'

The key this season for the Gauchos offensively has been depth. Twelve Gauchos hit over .300 for the regular season, 12 hit at least one home run and nine had over 20 runs batted in.

First baseman Greg Vella, ranked 12th on the team with his .311 overall average, finished the regular season with 15 home runs, tieing him with third baseman Vince Teixeira for a new school record.

"This is the first team that I've been on that almost every position in the lineup has power," Vella said.

With all this talent, Coach Al Ferrer has been able to start many different people without a reduction in offensive punch, although sitting three or four .300 hitters per game.

We have 14 guys who can all hit equally well," said Teixeira, who also broke the school record for RBI's in a season (69, old mark 65). "I think coach (Ferrer) wishes he had a few more designated hitter spots."

'I've purposely started 11 or 12 different guys to get the hot bats into the lineup," Ferrer said.

Typical of this has been the case of junior Russ Ballati. Normally a second baseman, the former walk-on has had to play behind starter Scott Cerny. Cerny, who led the team in overall average (.404), hits (86), and triples (7), was recently named PCAA co-Player of the Year along with UNLV shortstop Matt Williams.

So Ferrer started Ballati in the outfield at times to get his bat in the lineup. After hitting only .071 last year, he has contributed a .364 average, three homers and 24 RBI's in only 81 at bats.

"When you have five or six guys hitting well," Ferrer started, "you can't pitch around hitters, so everyone is getting good pitches to hit."

Junior shortstop Erik Johnson, a two year starter for UCSB, was expected to be a mainstay in the Gaucho hitting attack this year. But after hitting near the .200 mark for the first month of the season, Ferrer put him down at the bottom of the lineup. With some of the pressure off, Johnson soon found his stroke and hit a more than respectable .346 for the regular season.

Although Johnson may plate during UCSB's

tough early season schedule, the team, as a whole, benefitted while playing top-ranked teams. Instead of padding their record and stats by playing lower ranked teams, the Gauchos played high-caliber teams from the start. Twelve of the Gauchos first 17 games were against current or future top-20 teams.

National powers Stanford, Hawaii, and California were among the early opponents, which were followed by Loyola Marymount, Pepperdine and UCLA. Keep in mind that the Pacific Coast Athletic Association is considered one of the toughest conferences in the nation. This has given Ferrer the right to say that, "It's about as legitimate of a .350 (average) as you'll find in the country.

The batting success of this year's team stirs up comparisons from past years. For example, the 1983 team, UCSB's version of the "Cardiac Kids," made it a habit of pulling out victories in the last few innings.

"1983 was an incredibly clutch team," Ferrer said. "but for flat out hitting, this team has to be at the top."


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



Q & A with Al Ferrer Coach Discusses Season, Career

When Al Ferrer took over the baseball helm at UCSB six years ago, he adopted a program which had not placed higher than fourth in conference in the previous seven years. After guiding his first UCSB team to a 27-32 record in 1981, he posted four straight winning seasons while capturing the Southern California Baseball Association title in 1983. In his six years at UCSB, Ferrer, once a standout pitcher/shortstop/outfielder while at Chico State, has compiled a 235-138 record while capturing two conference championships.

In his time at UCSB, Ferrer has overcome many obstacles, including sub-standard funds, to become one of the most respected coaches ever at UCSB.

With the Western Regionals just around the corner, Ferrer took time out to reflect on this season.

Nexus: In your wildest dreams, did you think the team could do this well up to this point in the season?

Ferrer: In my wildest dreams, yes. Every year I evaluate the team and I look at both ranges of possibilities, the positive and the negative. My last four teams had this possibility as the utmost positive, and two of them attained it. It's like a light switch. We could take off and go all the way right now, or we could just shut down and be over in two games. So you have to be aware of both extremes

Nexus: What can you say about the team's offensive strength this year? Ferrer: Well, you never expect to break a record by 30 points, which we have done with the batting

At the pitching mound is where the '83 team held a distinct advantage over the current one. "From top to bottom that pitching staff was the best the school has ever had," Brontsema claimed. "Guys like Dan Yokubaitis (14-4) and Mike Fulmer (8-1) consistantly shut the opposition down. Plus we had some real quality guys coming out of the pen. The current staff, although they've struggled some, do have some good arms.

Another trademark of the '83 team was its penchant for late-inning heroics. Time and again they battled back from deficits to capture ball games in the last couple of at bats.

"We were a confident team," Smith explained. "If it was close we had a certain feeling that we'd come through. This team has rarely even fallen behind. And when they have they've usually roared right back."

"We thought we were good; this

average record and the slugging percentage record, and to break the home run record by seven. You don't go out thinking 'yeah, we can do that.' You think it might be one of the best seasons ever and it might be comparable to the records that have been set in the past 40-50 years. This thing just destroyed them all. Now the only thing that might worry you is that offense turns on and off like a light switch. One good pitcher comes out, throws a two-hitter, and that's the way it goes. That's always in the back of your mind too.

Nexus: What does it mean to the

team to be ranked as high as it ever has in its history? (fifth last week). Ferrer: Nothing, it really doesn't. I mean it helps a little bit with recruiting and its a pat on the back that we're very proud of, but if someone said you're going to be number one in three weeks, I'd grab that one. As I've said all year, that's the only one that matters. Although we knew we were pretty good early in the year, the team was pretty frustrated because we weren't getting any recognition. That was pretty tough on the players for quite a while, but I kept saying 'hey, I'd rather be fifth or 10th at the end of the year than fifth or 10th right now, so keep shooting for the end of the year.' That's helped motivate us too. Nexus: Do you think the team learned from the experience in 1984, when the team was ranked sixth early in the season but faltered later in the year?

Ferrer: Yeah, I know I did. Because you get to the point when you're ranked sixth in the nation and you give up two runs in an inning and you think 'Oh my god there goes the rankings.' Well, that's ridiculous. If you're number six, you're going to lose a few games.

I remember the turning point in that season. We started out 0-2 against Irvine and it was the 11th inning of the third game and we're losing and Dan Clark comes up, hits a home run out to right, and we won that game. The dugout went crazy, the Hammerheads went crazy and it was all over for the league after that one. We won 25 out of the next 28 and many of them were come-from-(See FERRER, p.7A)

Gaucho Regional History

UCSB baseball teams have made two previous apperances in NCAA post-season action. In 1972, Dave Gorrie's Gauchos captured the PCAA title (14-4 in conference, 31-16 overall) and entered post-season winning two of three games at the University of Santa Clara, claiming the first-round District Eight series. UCSB earned the right to host USC in the championships.

The mighty Trojans, however, swept their hosts in two straight games at Campus Diamond. Powered by future major-leaguers Fred Lynn, Roy Smalley, and Steve Kemp, USC went on to the College World Series in Omaha, where the Trojans captured the NCAA Championship.

Here's a recap of the 1972 playoffs:

The Gauchos last appeared in post-season competition in 1983, when Al Ferrer led his co-SCBA champions to the Western Regionals at Stanford's Sunken Diamond. UCSB picked up wins against San Diego State and Oregon State, yet those victories were sandwiched around an opening game loss at the hands of SDSU and a Championship game defeat to Stanford. UCSB placed second, yet failed to qualify for the World Series with a 44-22 record. Current assistant coaches Bob Brontsema and Paul Smith, as well as Dan Clark, all received alltournament accolades.



behind. It was kind of a humble arrogance, if you'll excuse the contrast in terms, like 'hey we're behind, it's the seventh inning, but we're all right and we're going to win this thing.' And it kept hap-pening that way. That year was like a chess match, as opposed to this year. I had to make all kinds of moves that year. In the playoff game against Fullerton (which the Gauchos won, qualifying them for the regionals), I used five straight pinch-hitters in that game, and all five came through. This year, you don't make as many moves, you just wait for somebody to hit one out. So you're still coming back, but it's a different type of ball game completely.

Nexus: Do you feel there was a turning point this year?

Ferrer: There were a number of turning points. The first one is probably the UC Irvine series where we lost the second game and came back to win it to open the (PCAA) season. We've historically started slow.

Then the second one was the sweep of Fresno State. They were nationally ranked, we weren't, and they came in here and we swept

them. They were the defending conference champions, so that was a big one. Then the other big one was coming back after the loss to Vegas knowing we had to win to have the upper hand on Vegas. Winning that game was a big plus.

Nexus: What about Hawaii. Was that another turning point?

Ferrer: Yeah, that was the lowpoint of the season so far. For me, that was no fun at all. We didn't play well and we got swept by a Division I team, and that hasn't happened in a very long time. It was very frustrating.

Nexus: How has team camaraderie helped the team this year?

Ferrer: Well it's something that we strive for every year. This, as far as I'm concerned, is the fifth year I've seen team camaraderie. It's been in varying degrees over the years: We never had a real bad year, and I think this year is one of the best. But you have to find that out from the players more than me because to some degree I'm always an outsider in terms of that.

Nexus: You've been known to recruit players that get along well. Do you feel that's true?

Ferrer: I look for certain qualities of character, because you never know how 35 people of different backgrounds, environments, and programs are going to mesh. That's my job once they get here. I look for the same type of people who show the same respect and values, and if they have those values, then it's going to be easy to put them together.

Nexus: You've recruited many players from Northern California. What's your connection with that area?

Ferrer: I grew up in San Mateo and I played for a coach named John Noce in junior college, who is at the College of San Mateo. Consequently, I got to know many of the junior college coaches up there. After I went to Chico State, I got to know an awful lot of people. I know where the
