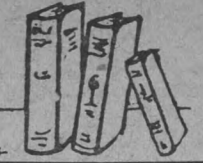

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State Welcomes You, Delegates

Santa Barbara State college cordially welcomes the delegates of Alpha Phi Gamma to its campus and throws open the doors of the institution for their use during the three day conclave. State college is glad to act as host for the first National Convention of Alpha Phi Gamma held in the West, and hopes that the visiting delegates find their stay here both pleasant and profitable.

The convention program opens at two o'clock tomorrow afternoon with registration and tea, and continues for three days with a crowded schedule, drawing to a close Saturday night at eleven o'clock at the conclusion of a theatre party. It is our desire that the visiting guests avail themselves of the opportunities open to them, which should offer activities that will be both stimulating and lasting in their minds.

Santa Barbara abounds in beautiful gardens, winding bridle paths, historical structures, colorful show houses, and interesting restaurants and cafes, avenues which have been opened to the delegates through the untiring work of the officers and managers of Pi chapter, in arranging the convention program.

State college at an earlier date was given the opportunity to be host to a divisional convention of Alpha Phi Gamma, having been the location for the western division meet in 1929. By looking back in the records of the local journalistic organization, it is found that Santa Barbara State was the father to the Omega Xi Alpha, journalistic fraternity, which in 1928 consolidated with Alpha Phi Gamma. It holds a warm feeling for the organization of which it is now a part, and again greets the delegates with a hearty welcome.

Football Banquet

With the success of the first annual football banquet and dance as an item of history at Santa Barbara State college, the Roadrunner wishes to commend the Women's Athletic association for the organization and efficiency with which they handled the affair. It is an example of what can be done at this institution if backed by the proper spirit and people.

The thought of staging such a celebration was first conceived by a small group of students the latter part of last week, with the first official action being taken at the Student Body Council meeting Thursday evening. Realizing the significance of the function, Cathryn Kitley, president of the W.A.A. and their representative at the council, displayed the cooperative spirit that exists among that group of students by immediately endorsing the movement and pledging their support to it. Securing the backing of the group she represented the following morning, Miss Kitley immediately started plans for the banquet and carried them through to a crowning success. The W.A.A. showed its mettle when it took upon its shoulders the job of sponsoring such a task, fully realizing that it had less than three school days to complete the job. The Roadrunner wonders what men's organization on the campus it could ask to duplicate the job.

Not only did the success of the dinner exemplify what could be done on the campus, but it also brought out the fact that the citizens of Santa Barbara are sincere in pledging their support to Santa Barbara State college. At the dinner meeting there were representatives from the Lions club, Rotary club, Chamber of Commerce and other business and professional men and women of the city. Many of the downtown people being compelled to alter early plans in order to attend the college function.

State college has secured relationship with the people of the city that have long been needed to complete its program. It has been through the new progressive spirit on the campus that this connection has been made. It will be through your help and cooperation, students, that it will continue.

SYMPHONY GROUP ANNOUNCES PLANS

The All-Southern California Symphony, composed of musical representatives from practically all of the colleges in the southern part of the state, will be held March 4, 5 and 6 in the high school auditorium under the direction of Henry Eichheim, internationally known composer and orchestra conductor.

Advance applications which are coming in from colleges and universities, some of whom have not participated before, indicate that the symphony will have a broader representation than ever before. Applications for places in the orchestra are due December 1. Loyola university and the University of California at Los Angeles are new applicants to the symphony. For the coming year there will be a better selection of the musical talent with a resulting higher standard being achieved.

Henry Eichheim, who will direct the orchestra, has left for Philadelphia, where, on December 1, "Bali," the last movement of his original symphony, will be played by the Philadelphia Symphony orchestra under the baton of Leopold Stokowski. Mr. Eichheim will discuss the coming program of the All-Southern California Symphony with Mr. Stokowski, and investigate the possibility of borrowing some of the music from the library of the Philadelphia orchestra for the local symphony.

Mr. Eichheim is greatly interested in the idea of gathering together musicians from neighboring colleges for the rendering of the classical music. He has spent much time in contributing to the success of the orchestra in past years. According to available information, the type of organization gathered

together here of the inter-collegiate orchestra is the only aggregation of its kind in the United States.

Much favorable publicity for the Santa Barbara State college and for the city of Santa Barbara has been secured through the symphony. Last year the program from the high school was broadcast over a nationwide hook up of the Columbia Broadcasting company.

Delegates from these schools will attend the social events with the Alpha Phi Gamma group, but will hold separate business meetings.

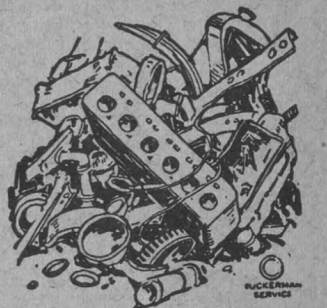
PATRONIZE ROADRUNNER ADVERTISERS

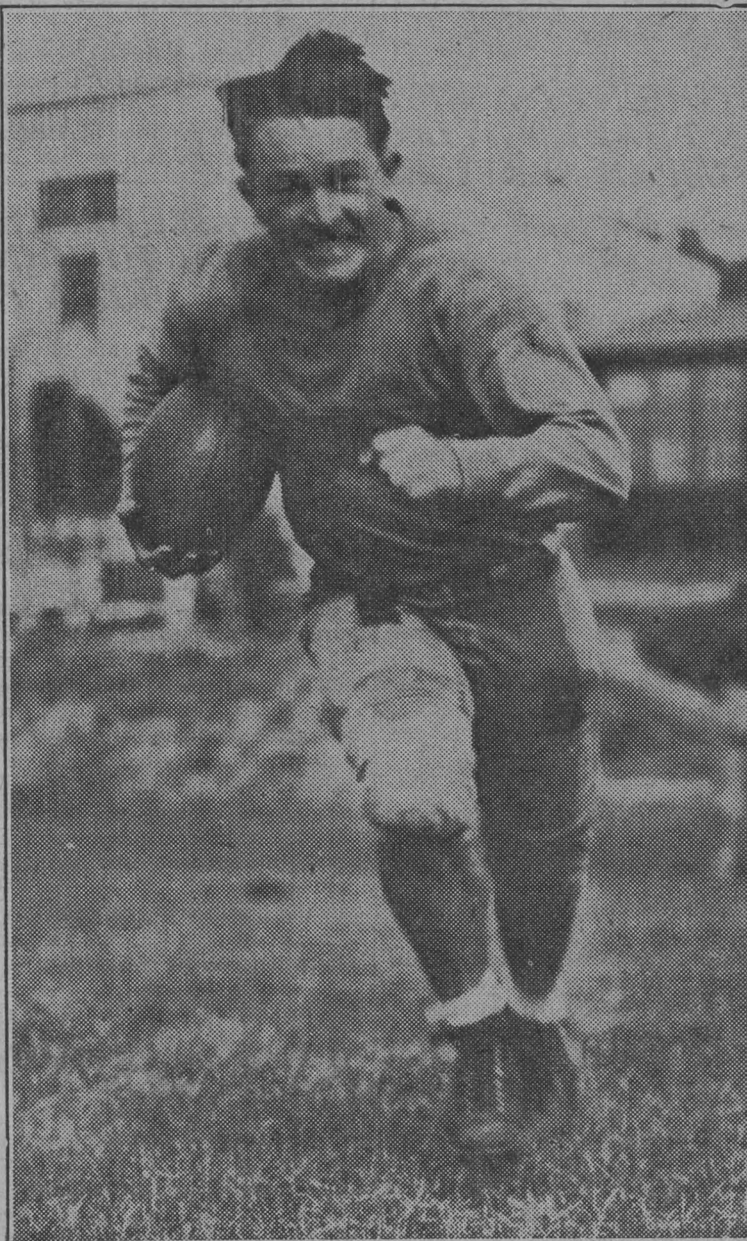

Freshmen Bolster Last Years Men

Initial practice of varsity basketball began last Monday night with thirty men signing up. Coaches Davis and Denno hope to conclude a successful season as a great number of experienced men have returned. The six returning men bolstered by the last year's frosh together with numerous junior college transfers make up a squad that appears as good as any seen at State for the past several years.

Facilities of the Flying "A" gymnasium have been procured by Coach Davis from the United States Infantry which is organized in Santa Barbara. Through the efforts of Davis and Denno the gymnasium has been remodeled into a modern basketball court with two regulation floors.

Out of the seventeen games scheduled the Roadrunners should garnish at least a dozen wins according to pre-season campus predictions. The feature games will probably be the contests with the Olsen Swedes and the Chicago House of David. Records show that the Olsen Swedes, who last year won over 125 games and only lost eight, will undoubtedly be the most interesting team here this season. The Swedes will not overshadow the House of David team which appeared here last winter and gave our boys an exhibition of how basketball should be played. This game should draw a record crowd due to their past success.

Letter men who will return this year are Ralph Stockel, forward; William Pensinger, forward; Charles Hoffer, forward; Fritz Zapf, center; Fritz Muegenburg, guard; and Shirley Keith, guard. Around this nucleus Coaches Davis and Denno hope to mold a well-functioning basketball machine with the last year's frosh and junior college transfers.

A-G GROUP COPS TENNIS HONORS

With the winning of the college singles championship by Julio Bortolazzo, intramural attention is now centered on basketball, according to Mayville Kelliher, who has announced the team standings in the recent tourney. Bortolazzo beat Gerard Weeshoff in a thrilling match as tight as a rubber collar, 6-2, 4-6, 5-7, 8-6, 6-3. Both played outstanding tennis, the match not being decided until the final point had been registered.

The unmarred record of Bortolazzo went a long way in running up a total score of 50 points for the A to G squad, which led the parade. The Q to Z contingent wound up in second spot with a grand score of 42 digits. Leading the fraternity parade came Beta Sigma Chi and Tau Omega, who struggled on remarkably even terms for third place, with the Beta Sigs edging out the Tau Omegas by 39 points to 37. Sigma Alpha Kappa trailed the tongs with 14 points, while the H to P group brought up the rear with seven tallies.

These points earned by the various groups will form the initial scores which will be added to throughout the year in a number of future athletic contests scheduled in the wide intramural program mapped out by Kelliher. The team piling up the most points at the end of the school year will be crowned intramural champions. Championship teams in each event will also be given recognition.

Directory Campaign Will Complete Sales
