## NEW CLASSROOM BUILDING HALL SCENE OF TONIGHT'S NSF TALK

Heavy attendance has led to a change of locale for tonight's (July 9) National Science Foundation lecture - third in the series - and all others hereafter.

The new classroom lecture hall will be the scene of Dr. Robert L. Fisher's intriguingly-titled talk of "Subsidence and Life or Caught in a Tectogene."

Dr. Fisher is a research geologist from the Scripps Institution of Oceanography at La Jolla.

On Wednesday, July 15, Dr. Joel W. Hedgpeth, director of the Pacific Marine Station at Dillon Beach will speak on "The History of Marine Biology."

## DELINQUENCY TOPIC OF ALL-COLLEGE TALK

Dr. Charlotte E. Elmott, visiting associate professor of education, who has long been associated with the city schools in Santa Barbara and interested in problems of delinquency will give an All-College lecture next Tuesday at 3 p.m. on "Juvenile Delinquency and the Schools."

The lecturer has done extensive research on this subject and is presently engaged in a project on school and community responsibilities for the prevention of behavior disorders, personality problems and delinquency. This talk is free to the public and will be held in the new classroom lecture hall.
