Election Date Draws Candidates May Be on March 28

Student Body elections for 1949 will be put into motion in the very near future. Monday, March 28, has been tentatively set as the earliest date for the filing of names and candidates and for the securing of petitions. Election dates are March 19 and 20.

Qualified Gauchos may file with the Graduate Manager for the office of president, vice-president, secretary and head yell leader of the Associated Students, all of which officers will be elected by vote of the entire student body. Other officers, who are elected by groups which they represent, are the presidents of the Associated Men and Women Students and student council representatives in each of the classes.

Qualifications

Qualifications for the ASSB officers require that the candidate be an upper classman, regularly enrolled during the term of office, having been in regular attendance at UCSB, with a grade average of C or better, for at least one semester prior to nomination.

Yell Leader must meet all the requirements except that he need not be an upper classman.

Class representatives, to be elected by their respective classes, must also be regularly enrolled with a minimum C average in all classes and must have attended SBC at least since last fall.

File Names

All candidates must have filed their names with the Graduate Manager by April 1 and must be prepared to pass a test on the SBC constitution to be given by the election committee on April 15.

The election procedure was outlined by the Election Committee. Each candidate must secure a petition the time he announces his intention to run, and must return a petition on April 15 signed by 250 students, or ten per cent of the enrollment, before the meeting of the election assembly.

Campaign Instructions

The Graduate Manager will furnish instructions on the rules connected with campaigning, including information on those practices which are taboo.

Tentative Schedule

Tentative schedule of election events is as follows:

Monday, March 28 - Friday, April 1: Petitions issued from office of the Graduate Manager.

Monday, April 4: Candidates' names go before eligibility committee.

Tuesday, April 5: Meeting of candidates with ex-publicity committee to discuss rulings for publicity.

Friday, April 8: El Gaucho announces candidates.

Monday, April 11: Publicity goes up on campus.

Tuesday, April 12: Constitution set for candidates, 4:30 p.m.

Friday, April 15: Petitions due.

Monday, April 18: 12:00 campaign assembly.

Tuesday and Wednesday, April 19, 20: Voting.

Friday, April 22: Revote day; final candidates announced.

Gaucha Thinclads Play Host to Occidental Tigers at La Playa

Santa Barbara College tracksters look toward their first 1949 dual meet tomorrow afternoon at La Playa Stadium when Occidental College brings both varsity and freshman teams to Santa Barbara.

The Tigers annexed the Southern California College Relays title last week earning 35-5/6 points and capturing every baton-passing event. The Gauchos took an unofficial fifth place in the Long Beach Relays last week for their initial competition of the year. Coach Nick Carter's men gathered eight points for the best Gaucha record ever made in the event.

Dancer Prances

Willie Dancer, former national junior college high jump champ, gave the Gauchos a first when he with USC's Dick Barnes. The pair shared top honors in his event tied at 6 feet 3 inches. Santa Barbara's Del Pickarts picked up a second in the javelin with a toss of 204 feet and Mel Patton, Gaucha discus ace, placed fourth with a throw of 144 feet. Dancer tied the school record and Pickarts surpassed the former school record by 18 feet.

Dancer will probably not jump against Oxy after injuring his foot Monday. Trainer Don Gill has ordered him on crutches for the next few days. Earl Engman, holder of the school broadjump record, may possibly make his first leap of the season tomorrow. He has been awaiting the healing of a knee injury from football.

Mel Patton is expected to get the discus out to around 150 feet—passing up the present school record of 147 feet 2 inches. Oxy is likely to give UCSB some trouble in the sprints with speedsters Francis Katchaturian and Bill Parker. The distances look toward the Tigers and middle distances could go either way.

Those of you who regularly read *Wax Works* will remember an item a few months ago about Capitol's releasing German *Telefunken* calssical records in the U. S. Telefunken's library, containing some of the world's best serious music, was flown to the U. S. where Capitol made copies for distribution here. It was quite a job and it is good to hear that the first of the new records are on the stands now.

Erna Sack, world-renowned soprano with a range of six octaves above a hummingbird, whatever that means, is featured in one of the five albums in the release. Franz Lehar operettas comprise the second package, Beethoven's popular "Eroica" symphony No. 3, conducted by William Mengelberg, constitutes a third album and Paul Hindermith's "Mathias the Painter," conducted by the composer himself, is the fourth. Also to be released soon is the Bruckner "Mass in E Minor."

The Telefunken items will be released in two forms: the standard 12-inch, 78 RPM type and the new smaller 45 RPM type.

Frank De Vol's latest Capitol recording of "Farewell Blues" is one wax you should hear. Frank takes an old jazz tune and gives it a powerhouse arrangement in the semi-classical tradition which makes excellent listening. The flipover features a little novelty item called the "Teddy Bears Picnic." Despite my fraternity brother's vile comments when I play it, I think that it is a great record.

Those of you who enjoy good jazz will be glad to hear that we are presenting another Jazz concert. Dr. Walters is going to pick out a few more of his great records for another informal session to be held Thursday, March 24, in Pine Hall 100 at 4 o'clock. Of course everyone is invited, its for free, and we surely would like to see a good turnout. Plan now to be there. Adios.

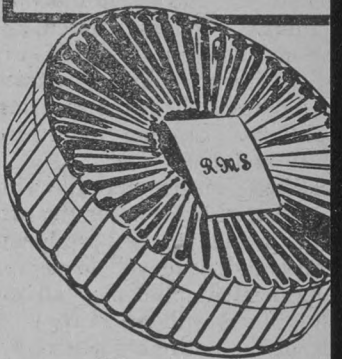

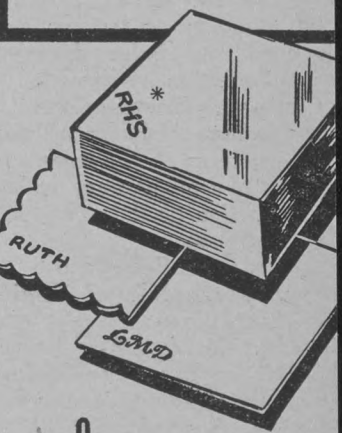

Port Hueneme to Meet Gaucho Horsehidrs

It's Port Hueneme's Sailors versus the Santa Barbara Gauchos this afternoon in what, for the fourth time this season, shows promise of being the opening baseball game of an already rapidly dwindling season. Hampered by wet-ground cancellations of all their scheduled games to date, the Hilltoppers hope to squeeze in this game and another with Stanford Tuesday before opening their conference season March 25-26. Cloudy weather was forecast for most of this week but if no rain has fallen as yet, the contest will get under way at 3 p.m. at Cabrillo Field.

Coach Joe Lantagne, in order to get some much-needed practice, had his horsehidrs choose up sides for an inter-squad game last Tuesday. The Blue Sox, aided no little by a six-run uprising in the first inning, coasted to an easy 13-3 triumph over the White Sox. Bob Johnston, Pasadena City College southpaw, and Hal Abbott combined forces to hold the White Sox in check with seven hits. Neil Goedhard and Bill French twirled three innings apiece for the losers.

Abbott, performing his first real mound duties of the season, was in tip-top shape and proved it by allowing just two hits, one of the infield variety, and the other a high fly ball which fell for a double when lost in the sun. The pint-size, part-time outfielder and last year's winner of an all 2C2A berth, sent five men down swinging in the three frames that he worked.

Booming Gaucho bats accounted for 17 assorted base hits, nine of them for extra bases. Lantagne was especially pleased with the heavy stickwork of Jack Huntsinger, Oren Skeith, Hal Abbott, Lou Munson, and Clyde Francisco. He hinted that changes in the lineup may come at any time in order that as many heavy hitters as possible will be able to play at once. Skeith collected two three-baggers in three trips and will bat cleanup in today's game; and Huntsinger, ex-Long Beach Jordan High star, laced out a triple and double in three trips and is expected to see plenty of action in the infield. Abbott banged out a triple and single, Munson a homer and a single, Francisco a double and single, Bassler a triple, and Gmur a double. Jones, Talley, Kutch, Dailey, and Wrightson each collected a single.

Although several more inter-squad games are in the offing, the Gauchos have only today's contest and the practice game with Stanford as real tighteners before they open their league season at Cal Poly March 25-26. The Stanford game will be played either at Cabrillo in the afternoon or at Laguna Park in the evening of March 22.
