Move to Eliminate **Barbary Coast** Nixed by Council

Attempts to limit major AS social activities such as Barbary Coast and Spring Sing and to separate the Galloping Gaucho Review from Homecoming were defeated at the Tuesday Legislative Council meeting.

The discussion on eliminating one of the major activities from the social calendar was prompt-ed by Council advisor Dr. Robert Kelley at the meeting two weeks ago.

Dr. Kelley informed Council that various faculty members felt the preparation for the major activities drew heavily on the students time. He also stated that Barbary Coast is becoming a discipline problem.

However, Council defeated a motion to drop Barbary Coast for the following reasons. 1) Groups are not compelled to participate. 2) Barbary Coast and other activities have become traditions. 3) Council should not drop major activities without consulting the students.

A compromise motion to allow participation in either Spring Sing or Barbary Coast was also defeated, as was a move to hold the GGR before the Holiday basketball tournament later in the vear.

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Housing Construction On and Off-Campus **To Provide Room For 1,000 More Students**

Over 1,000 new students can be added to the present UCSB quota next year because of housing facilities both on-campus and off-campus which are scheduled to be completed by the opening of the fall semester.

On campus the new Anacapa Hall will open its doors to 420 new men students. For the spring semester, Santa Cruz Hall will provide additional housing for 420 women. This will bring the total to 1,700 students living on campus.

Recently ground was broken in Isla Vista for a \$1,000,000 studio apartment project designed to house 334 students. The apartments will be named Villa del Sur and are located on Camino del Sur Road. Isla Vista's Largest

This will be the largest project of its kind in the Isla Vista area, containing almost as many students as a residence hall. Approved by the housing office, the apartments will be staffed by a resident manager and his wife and will have accommodations for junior and senior women in one area and for men students in another.

The two-story construction will have in each unit two bedrooms on the second floor above the kitchen and dining units. Each apartment will have one and a half baths.

Private Patios Offered

Every unit will have its own walled private patio. Four large areas have been reserved for lawn which the residents can use for recreation areas or sunbathing.

All walls between apartments have been soundproofed. There will be a laundry room and enclosed yards for drying clothes. Rates in the new apartments will be \$212.50 per semester per student. Four students will share an apartment.

Women's Hall

A privately operated women's residence hall located within walking distance of the campus will also open next fall. It will accommodate 120 women. Freshmen and sophomore women are eligible to live in this supervised hall.

Many other apartment houses are being built much smaller in size and will be ready by fall for occupancy by students.

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





Mired deep in the California Collegiate Athletic Association cellar, the University of California, Santa Barbara baseballing Gauchos go looking for some help from the law of averages this afternoon.

There will be plenty of activity on tap for local diamond fans this weekend, what with rival Cal Poly moving in for a single game today and Fresno St.'s impressive Bulldogs, hoping for a slice of the conference title, arriving tomorrow for a doubleheader.

This afternoon's festivities are scheduled to get under way at 3 p.m. on the campus field, while the lid will be popped on tomor-row's twin bill at 1 p.m.

The Gauchos close out the 1959 season Tuesday when they make up a rained-out doubleheader with Long Beach St.

Santa Barbara has dropped ten straight conference contests without a win, and there is only a slight flicker of hope for the Gauchos to escape from the basement, every other team in the league having won at least five gamės.

Coach Rene Rochelle's UCSB crew, already absorbing its share of injuries and personnel losses this season, was further depleted this week when veteran right-

hander Jim Hezlep was forced to quit due to doctor's orders.

Hezlep sustained an elbow injury and in order to prevent possible permanent damage, submitted his resignation.

Rochelle will be going with somewhat of a makeshift lineup and "new blood" for the weekend games, with Rich Gunner, of outfield fame, scheduled to open on the mound this afternoon. Gunner was impressive in a relief role at Cal Poly last weekend and Rochelle is counting on the stocky righthander to fill the gap in the Gaucho mound corps.





HUGE VOTE HEALTHY SIGN

Student government at UCSB is very much alive. The largest vote in Gaucho history, 1,343, or about 65% of those eligible, shows that interest in student politics in on the upswing.

The number of votes cast in last weeks election is an increase of almost 500 over last year's figure. Should this trend continue it is interesting to speculate about some possible political changes.

Heretofore it has been a well known fact that candidates cannot win a major office without the Greek vote - the exceptions have been rare enough to remember.

An examination of the rough voting statistics in this year's election reveals that now, for the first time, it is possible to win without Greek support.

RHA Gaining

While the Greeks still remain the largest single voting bloc (despite a smaller membership) with 475 votes cast, the RHA were a close second with 460 and surprisingly enough the non-affiliated students ran a respectable third with 345.

What's more, the trend away from Greek voting domination promises to continue. With more students living on campus starting next year, the RHA could become the major group for candidates to win.

Non-Greek Prexy

For the first time in many year's the AS president-elect is not an active Greek. While Guy Shipp formerly belonged to the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity, he has been inactive this year.

The fact that most of the other elected officers are Greeks indicates that the RHA and non-affiliated students still have a long way to go to match the fraternities and sororities in active inteerst in student affairs.

Voting percentage is usually a reliable sign of interest in community government.

Last week students let it be known in no uncertain terms that interest in student government at UCSB is healthy.





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
