SUMMER PROGRAMS

Students will enjoy a varied recreational program. Photography, bridge, chess, radio and sportsmen clubs will hold meetings. Every Sunday evening, at 7:30, film fans will have a chance to see a new or old optic. "Smiles of a Summer Night," "Vertigo," "A Big Deal on Madonna Street," are some of those programmed.

Folk dancing is on tap. Softball, volleyball, basketball, badminton, trampoline and shuffleboard are a few of the sports for insiders. Outsiders have short golf, tennis, archery, and an Olympic pool for their share of California sun. The University beach is lifeguarded 12 to 4 p.m. daily.

At the campus theaters there will be three outstanding performances: "The Taming of the Shrew," the thriller "The Deadly Game," and Porter's musical "Anything Goes." Malcolm Hamilton will give a harpsichord recital; the Al Huang dance company will perform; a student talent show is listed.

Off campus, there will be five matinee Sunday musicals at a Sherman Oaks Theater, with transportation provided. Summer schoolers can take in the Hollywood Bowl, Hearst Castle, the new Los Angeles Music Center, and attend the Dodgers-Cardinal stadium game. A deep-sea fishing trip has been booked.

POLICE REGULATIONS FOR CARS, BIKES

All motor vehicles and bicycles on campus during the summer session must be registered with the police department, according to department Captain W. A. Lowe.

This includes those that belong to registrants who are not regular UCSB students. Fees are \$3 for vehicles and \$1 for bicycles for the summer.

After paying the fee for vehicles, the owner is issued a parking decal that entitles him to use A (parking for faculty and staff), B (for residence hall students) or C (students living off campus) facilities.

Racks are provided for bicycle parking, and areas where bike riding is prohibited are clearly indicated.

The campus police will continue 24-hour service during the summer session. In addition to maintaining a lost and found service, rendering first aid and transporting sick or injured, the department will patrol the campus round the clock.

The police offices are in the Administration Building, Room 1248. Hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The police emergency number is 2221.

FOUR CONCERTS ARE SCHEDULED HERE FOR SUMMER COMMUNITY

Three musical concerts and a performance by a professional dance company are in store for Summer Session students, through a series offered by the Committee on Arts and Lectures.

First event of the series will be a harpsichord concert by Malcolm Hamilton, talented musician who has toured other UC campuses this year, on Friday, June 25, at 8 p.m. in South Hall, followed by a program of "Asian Music on an American Campus" by UCLA's Institute of Ethnomusicology, also in South Hall, at 8 p.m. July 13.

An evening of music, "Mozart Serenade," will be directed by Carl Zytowski, associate professor of music, UCSB, at 8 p.m. on July 22. Final event of the series will be Al Huang and his dance company at 8 p.m., July 24, in South Hall.

Admission for the first three events will be 50 cents, with tickets at the door. Dance performance admission is \$1 for students and faculty members, and \$2 for the general public. Tickets will be available after July 5 at the Arts and Lectures office, Building 402, and the Associated Students Business Office.

EXTENSION OFFERINGS

Summer workshops, institutes and special courses offered by University of California Extension, Santa Barbara, will attract teachers, scholars, professional people and adults interested in continuing education to the UCSB campus during Summer Session.

Four workshops will meet here and in this area during June. They include a Foreign Language Workshop (Spanish) and a Child and Youth Study Leadership Workshop, which both begin next week; the Pacific High School Debate Institute and early Childhood workshop, which start the following week.

Later summer programs include the 33rd Annual Field Science and Conservation Workshop, a Folk Dance Workshop for Teachers and Recreational Leaders and the Tenth Annual Folk Dance Conference.

A special lecture series, *Shakespeare: From Script to Stage*, will be conducted by Dr. Homer Swander, associate professor of English. Six lecture-discussions on campus will be combined with a weekend trip to the Old Globe Theatre in San Diego for productions of *Coriolanus*, *Henry VIII* and *Merry Wives of Windsor*. The class also will attend a UCSB Repertory Theatre production of *The Taming of the Shrew*.

SUMMER LECTURE SERIES WILL OPEN TUESDAY AFTERNOON IN SOUTH HALL

The Summer lecture series sponsored by the Committee on Arts and Lectures gets under way Tuesday afternoon (June 22) with a discussion of "The Pathology of the Popular Arts" by Mary Holmes, art historian, lecturer and critic.

All lectures are scheduled for Tuesday afternoons at 4 p.m. in South Hall Lecture Room.

In succeeding weeks, Dr. A. T. Mason, McCormick Professor of Jurisprudence, Princeton University, will discuss "The Supreme Court Under Fire" on June 29; Prof. Ritchie Calder, currently in residence at the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions, will lecture on "The Tyranny of the Expert" or "Who Takes Care of the Caretaker's Daughter When the Caretaker is Busy Taking Care" on July 6; "Pressures On Children And Youth" will be the topic of Miss Helen Heffernan, chief of California's Bureau of Elementary Education, on July 13, and Stanley Cavell, associate professor of philosophy at Harvard University, will give "Some Remarks About Film As An Art" on July 20.

CAMPUS RECREATION FOR STUDENTS, FACULTY, STAFF

Students, faculty and staff members are invited to participate in the recreation program that will begin this week and continue through the summer.

Beginning Monday, children five years old and over are invited to LEARN TO SWIM, under a program sponsored by the recreation department each year in the university pool. Lessons are scheduled for 10 a.m., Mondays. Regular pool hours will be from noon to 6 p.m. daily.

- (a) Any change in study list after packet filing (adding, dropping classes; changes in section).
- All students who do not pre-enroll prior to Thursday, June 17, must petition to add the desired classes. Students who have pre-enrolled must attend the classes outlined on their copy of the preferred program card or petition to drop classes.
- (b) Taking an excess or deficit load.
 - (c) Taking upper division courses while a student with less than 55 units.
 - (d) Graduation matters.
 - (e) Honorable dismissal - withdrawal.
 - (f) Taking 199 courses.
 - (g) Repeating an upper division course.
